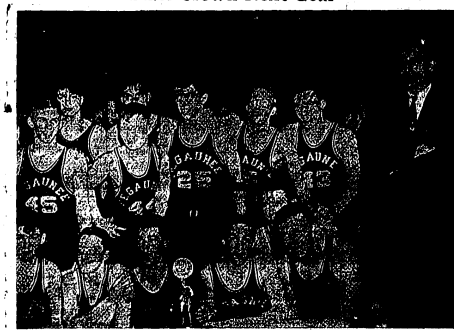

Miners Begin Quest For State Cage Title Tonight

State Crown Next Goal

Meet Mount Pleasant In Class B Quarter Finals At Petoskey

Bound for the state tournament quarter-finals at Petoskey and what they hope is the final step for the Class B basketball championship 1955, Coach Harry Sartal and his Negaunee High School team left here via chartered bus at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

With 850 reserved seats available to Negaunee residents, hundreds of local cage followers will leave here today to witness the quarter final tilt, scheduled for 7:30 Wednesday night in the Petoskey High gymnasium with the Miners meeting Mount Pleasant.

Backs Must Be Squared

Meeting in their regular March session, Negaunee City Council members authorized a "get tough" policy on the part of the municipality with regard to the water and electric utility agencies that have been delinquent in a considerable period of time.

The quarter-final test, the Miners move on to Lansing, where Class B semi-final games are scheduled at two high school centers Friday night. The championship round is slated for Jonathan Field House on Saturday afternoon.

Negaunee will be seeking its fifteenth title in 20 years when it faces the Malze and Blum in 1956 in the State and Blue and white, controlled by Art Dickson and under the guidance of Coach Eddie Shadford moved past Coldwater in the quarter-final game at Orchard Lake, to become the second Upper Peninsula school to win the championship.

Shadford brought another quiet town state the following year in an unsuccessful attempt to defend the title, as the Miners were beaten 20-18 by St. Mary's of Detroit in a first round game. Then followed a span of 6 years before the Malze and Blum qualified for the trip because of the Struts, competing in Class C on that occasion, in Negaunee club, coached by Bob Hisey.

In its quarter-final test, but was held by Roseville - Eastland 7 semi-final games.

This year the road to the coveted B title will be no bed of roses. In their first opponent Mount Pleasant, the Miners encounter what is the hottest team in Michigan. Scholastic circles claim that has won 20 games in a row.

Paced by a pair of high scorers - Edwards, Fritz and Swainey - plus a sharp-shooting Wab Wiles, the Oilers are a small, aggressive club that uses a fast break system and a full court pressing defense.

In gathering regional title and the right to qualify for the state tournament, Mount Pleasant, in their last effort, were defeated 67-57 by the best West Branch club in Michigan history, 84-59, with Fritz Holzing 28 points, Swainey 18, and Wile 17 in the title game.

Place High Valuations On Rolls; Jacobetti Raps Tax Commission

Meeting in their annual session this week, members of the Board of Review agreed to placement on tax rolls by the city mass of valuations for mining properties recommended by Harry Hardenburg, assistant state geologist, for the year 1955.

Action of the Board of Review in agreeing to the "no collect" higher valuations is in line with that taken by some other communities in the Upper Peninsula where iron mining properties are located and follows a recommendation by Dominic J. Jacobetti, Marquette County representative in the state legislature.

In a telephone conversation from Lansing with The Iron Herald this week Representative Jacobetti rapped the State Tax Commission for its action in ordering that a lower set of valuations be placed on the assessment rolls for mining properties due to the fact that valuations of non-mining properties in the city are below the state equalized figure.

"I recommend that local assessors place the higher valuation figures on tax rolls, and I question the authority of the Tax Commission to direct the geologist to place any others, as the law provides that the figures which the state geologist recommends are the ones to be given the local assessor for placement on the roll," Jacobetti said.

"When municipal officials received two sets of valuations with the notice from the Tax Commission that the lower figures were to be used, unless non-mining properties were assessed at state equalized figures, they realize that the decrease based on present tax rates would mean a decline in 1956 income for the City of Negaunee of approximately \$87,000 and a loss of revenue for Negaunee schools totaling \$15,000."

Supl. E. J. Born issued the following statement regarding the problem Monday of this week following an informal school board meeting for the purpose

"When contacted Harry Hardenburg on this matter and he blames the Tax Commission for the two sets of valuations," Jacobetti said. "Hardenburg recommended the high figure and was directed by the Commission to have the local assessor put the lower figure on the tax rolls."

"When contacted Tax Commission members, however, placed the blame on Hardenburg," Jacobetti stated. "We finally managed to get Louis Nims (State Tax Commission Chairman) to admit to Upper Peninsula representatives that he had made a mistake. Upper Peninsula valuations and you can quote me on that," Jacobetti declared.

Plan To Buy Vehicle For Dog Warden

As the first step in solving this frequently discussed dog problem, a question that has caused city dogs multiple gray hairs, the Council at its regular March meeting authorized City Manager George Meeholic Jr., to call for bids for the purchase of a new half ton truck.

With addition of the new vehicle the municipal truck used by the superintendent of the department of public works will be turned over to the dog warden. It has been equipped with a cage suitable for transporting members of the canine family that are collected by the officer.

Reporting to the Council on the recently completed dog census, City Manager Meeholic informed members that at the present time Negaunee has a dog population of 652 or approximately one dog for every 10 persons.

In his report the manager emphasized that to date only about 20 percent of the dog owners have purchased 1955 licenses for animals. Deadline for purchase of dog tags was March 1.

Meeholic informed Council members that the City could either construct six or eight kennels in the vicinity where the ware house to confine animals that were collected, or make arrangements with a veterinarian for housing the dogs. He also commented on the serious problem that could arise with such

Hisey then inquired what percent of the delinquent customers had made appointments for conferences, and Meeholic replied approximately 65 per cent.

"Those who did come in made arrangements for periodic payments until the back billing was wiped out, and persons who failed to show up are being billed a second letter, registered mail making it mandatory for them to appear the manager said.

"If they ignore this second notice, the city attorney has completed the first draft of an ordinance to cover the situation and in cases where residents are unable to pay and don't, the cutoff authority must be exercised if the delinquent."

Council members then expressed their individual views with reference to discontinue the service, saying that it was not necessary that the cut off action be taken. Hisey, pointing out that it will be at least a couple of months before an ordinance can be put into effect, declared,

Glenn K. Kelly, Former Negaunee School Head Dies At Salem, Ore.

Word has been received by Communism at a cost of \$650,000 the most expensive utility in the history of local public schools.

Mr. Kelly, who was 63 years old at the time of his death, was born in a rural Indiana community, where he attended elementary school. He received his High School education at Logansport, Indiana.

After taking his Bachelor of Arts degree at Franklin College, Indiana, where he served for four years as an instructor, Mr. German, he enrolled in the University of Chicago graduate school, where he obtained his Master of Arts degree.

He taught in high schools at Burrbus, Wis., and Lake Linden, Mich., with his first administrative position being as principal of a high school in Porto Rico.

From 1922 to 1923, he was high school principal at Norway, Me., and from 1923 to 1925 served in a similar capacity at Houghton. In 1925, he was named superintendent of schools at Houghton, accepting this position until 1928, when he resigned to accept the superintendency at Riverside, Ill., a suburb of Chicago. He headed the Riverside schools until 1939, when he accepted the newly created residential director and field secretary of the Illinois Association of School Boards.

When the research program was discontinued during World War II, Mr. Kelly accepted administrative position as the head of the Chicago Jewish Academy, an appointment which he always regarded as one of the richest experiences of his career. At the time he taught classes in education at Lake Forest College.

Animosity returned to Michigan the state he always regarded as his first love. Mr. Kelly accepted a position in 1944 as superintendent of schools at Fenville, a Grand Rapids suburb, remaining there until he came to Negaunee in June of 1948 to succeed H. S. Doolittle, who retired at that time.

Highlight of Mr. Kelly's four year tenure in Negaunee was construction of the new Lakeview Grade School and Memor-

During the period he served as head of the public school system here, Mr. Kelly suffered a coronary attack and upon advice of his physician, decided to resign in July of 1952. Upon leaving Negaunee, he semi-retired, accepting a teaching assignment in position in the graduate school of Wilmette University at Lake Forest, Ill.

Mr. Kelly was married in 1920 to Regina Hehn, whom he had met during their student days at Franklin College. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Alice Treves of Jamesville, Wis.

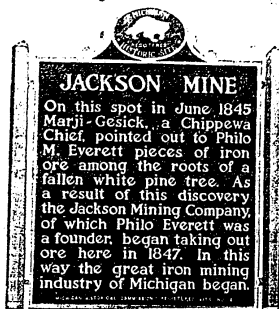
Final Rites Held Wednesday for Mrs. C. Foucault

Negaunee Whips Mountaineers, Musing To Win Regional Title

Big Bill Mitchell, who was the victim of surgery on one arm, led his team during his entire senior year—a season which did not have expected he would climax his scholastic basketball career—score of the bench Saturday night to score 17 points in a little more than two quarters of play and pace the Negaunee Miners to a 94-35 triumph over Mounting High in the finals of the Class B regional basketball tournament at Sherman Gym in Houghton.

Plagued with first an appendectomy that kept him out of five games, and then a stomach ailment that caused him to miss the Mounting contest here in which the Miners lost the Green-Lakes title, the big "Moose" was never better than the performance he gave against the Mountaineers Saturday night.

Negaunee trailed all the end of the opening period 16-0, but with "Mitch" in the game the Miners gained a decisive advantage in control of the boards, and by the intermission the Miners and Blue held a 19-point, 25-15 lead.

By the end of the third quarter, the Mounting squad had increased its edge to 18 points, the scoreboard reading Negaunee, 41, Mounting 29. Frank Hines, leading Mounting offensive man who had been held to a single field goal in the first half, scored all 10 of the Mounting points in the period.

Midway in the final stanza the Miners had built up a 38-20 lead and Coach Harry Sorial cleared the bench with three of the reserves, Lailala, Chapman and Luukkonen, scoring field goals

for the State and Blue in the final three minutes.

Mitchell netted three field goals in the second quarter, a similar number in the third period and added two buckets plus charity shots in the last quarter to account for his 17 points. Negaunee advanced to the regional championship tilt by defeating Iron Mountain in a high scoring semi-final game 83-69.

Coach Sorial's club led the Mountaineers all the way, as the Miners set a new school record for the most points scored in a single game in tournament competition. The 83 figure was the largest point total, by a Mideast and Blue unit since Sorial took over the cage three years ago, and Dave Ghirard also set a new Negaunee individual scoring record in a previous competition with 34 points.

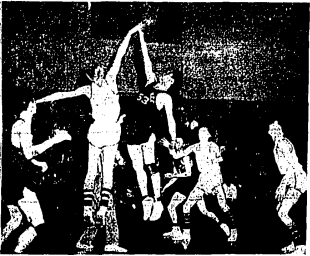

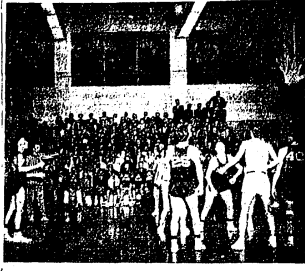

of discussing the problem. "As far as the Negaunee Public Schools are concerned, the Board of Education is not interested in increasing the taxes of individual property owners or the mining companies.

"The superintendent has proposed to the Board of Education that it eliminate all of the expenditures for the coming year except to improve mental and recreation previously contemplated.

"In line with this proposal, the Board has instructed the superintendent to prepare two tentative budgets—one in line with the anticipated decrease in revenue, and the other giving due consideration to the new interpretation by the Supreme Court in the *Harrisfield* case.

"This decision specifically states that taxes are to be levied on the state equalized basis. Should the city and school boards be forced to follow this interpretation the budget would provide a millage reduction to .025.

"In either case, we are happy to assure the people of Negaunee that their taxes will not be increased if the municipal and school authorities can legally prevent it."
