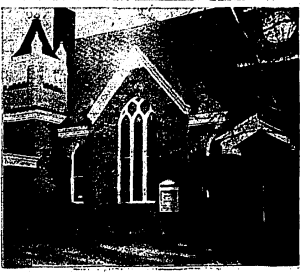
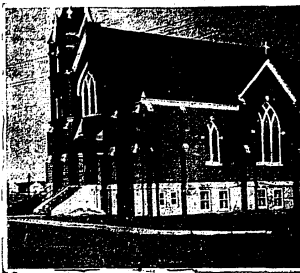

Negaunee churches will be a scene of activity this weekend as all denominations will hold Special Easter Services Sunday marking the anniversary of the Resurrection of the Saviour.

Opening the commemoration will be the Mass of the Resurrection, which is scheduled to begin at 12 midnight at St. Paul Catholic Church.

Other denominations will hold sunrise services starting at 6:00 p.m. Sunday and the worship hours will continue until noon. In addition, several churches will hold Sunday School programs or additional services, Sunday night.

Three of the seven churches in Negaunee where the faithful will gather are pictured above. They include Immanuel Lutheran in the photo at top left; St. Paul Catholic, top right; and Mitchell Methodist, bottom left.

Ordinance Provides For TV System

Negaunee became the first city in this area to take action leading to installation of a community television antenna system when the City Council at a special session Wednesday night approved in its first reading an ordinance granting a franchise to the Ferris Electronics Corporation.

As approved, the ordinance grants Ferris a franchise for a period of 30 years following the date on which the ordinance takes effect. It provides that in event the concern fails to start construction in a manner satisfactory to the city within a year the municipality may terminate the rights of the corporation by 30 days notice.

According to terms of the measure, the Ferris concern may assign its rights under the ordinance, but before the transfer becomes effective it must have a prior approval by the city. The assignee or purchaser as a condition of approval by the municipality must file with the city clerk acceptance of the terms of the ordinance and agree to perform all of its conditions.

William Bronn Dies Suddenly At Marquette

Local residents were shocked Wednesday by the unexpected death of Mr. A. Bronn, well known Negaunee man, who died at 3:30 p.m. in St. Luke's Hospital, following an illness of one day.

Mr. Bronn who was born on March 7, 1882, in Chicago, had been a resident of Negaunee for the past 15 years since retiring as a representative for the Michigan Rubber Co.

Surviving near his wife, the former Leta Senes, a daughter, Mrs. Daniel McCloy, of Minneapolis, Minn., one son, Robert of St. Paul, Minn., three sisters, Mrs. Gust Miller, Chicago, Mrs. Otto Koehnke, Cleveland, Ohio and Mrs. Jack Robertson, of Miami, Fla.; three brothers, Adolph, Chicago, Carl Kellomies, and Edward, Escanaba; a brother in law, Henry Warncke who resides in Chicago and eight grandchildren.

The body was taken to the Kosky Funeral Home, where friends may call today.

Funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Saturday morning in the Kosky Funeral Home. Burial will be in the family lot in the Negaunee cemetery.

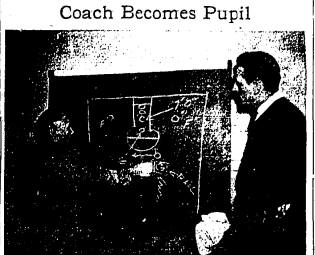

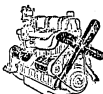

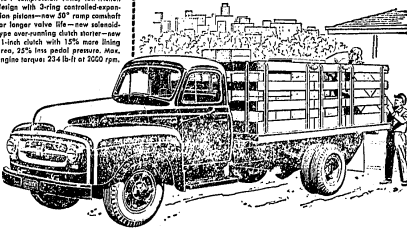

Rules Set Up For Jubilee Scholarship

Announcement was made this week concerning by-laws governing administration of the Negaunee High School Diamond Jubilee Scholarship Fund and the methods which will be used in determining the scholarship winner each year.

Members of the Diamond Jubilee committee, the group which made arrangements for the anniversary celebration, completed their task at a final session, held recently, when, in accordance with authority granted by alumni, they voted to select from their membership the first board of trustees to handle the Jubilee Scholarship fund.

Results of the balloting have not been announced, as two members of the committee were unable to attend the final session and the ballot of one of these members has not yet been received by R. K. Richards, Negaunee high school principal, who, in his capacity as an ex-officio member of the committee, was appointed to tabulate the vote.

\$3,182 Available
Following payment of Jubilee expenses, including the final mailing of alumni, Treasurer Alfred Wassberg has reported that a total of \$3,182.45 will be available for scholarship grants.

Purpose of the fund is to provide higher standards of scholarship within the Negaunee public schools and to assist by outright grant each year one student desiring to further his education, who has made an outstanding record in scholarship and who gives great promise of further distinguishable himself.

According to the by-laws, the fund will be administered by a board of three trustees with the first board to be elected from the membership of the Diamond Jubilee committee. The term of office of each trustee will be three years, with succeeding boards to be selected at general alumni meetings called for this purpose.

Aiding the board of trustees in its selection of the scholarship winner each year will be an evaluation committee consisting of members of the faculty and administrative staff of the public schools. This committee will be appointed annually by the board to evaluate the scholarship and potential of students eligible to participate and will make its recommendations to the trustees. Final
