

"4.9 Limitatoin on Charges-Exclusive or any taxes applicable to the service herein, the Corporation shall not charge more than \$125 for installation of its facilities. Exclusive of said taxes, the Corporation shall not charge more than \$3.50 por month as a service charge the basis of three-channel ention, provided that if toll television is introduced, this section shall not be deemed to be a lim-itation with relation thereto."

An ordinance granting a fran-chise to operate and maintain a community television system, setting forth conditions accom-panying the grant of franchise, and prescribing penalties for the violations of its provisions, The City of Negaunee ordains: ARTICLE I.
