## Local Youth Atlas Award Candidate

Accompanied by his industrial arts instructor, Matt Vanni, a Negaunee High School Senior, Roger St. John, 17, of 1914 Kalamazoo where he will be one of 18 state finalists in competition for two scholarships offered by the Atlas Press Company.

Two four year scholarships in industrial arts at Western Michigan College of Education are offered each year by the Atlas Company, manufacturers of machinery used in industrial arts classes.

In addition to the scholarships the company presents awards to the high schools from which the winning students graduate their choice of machines manufactured by Atlas.

Roger, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul E. John, 121 Mann street, is the second Negaunee youth selected as one of the state finalists.

Jack Johnson was one of the two state winners in 1953 and is now enrolled in his second year at Western under the scholarship plan. The high school industrial arts department was presented with a fully equipped 10 inch circular saw and a lathe of Johnson's being named the scholarship winner.

Personal interviews for candidates are scheduled on Saturday morning and afternoon. Winners are determined on the basis of personality, scholastic record and craftsmanship.

## Committee Advances Date For Opening Of Clean Up To May 5

Negaunee's annual Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up campaign will run one week longer than the week usually devoted to the project. It was decided at a meeting of the Neaunee Clean Up Committee this week when the opening date was advanced from Friday, May 6, to Thursday May 5, because of a conflict with the Negaunee High School Junior Prom on the following day.

At their initial session committee members discussed several new ideas for the 1955 drive in which Negaunee will seek to repeat its 1954 achievement of being named the Cleanest Town Of Its Size in the Nation. Final decision on the suggestions will be made at a second meeting scheduled for 11 a.m. today, when chairman for the various phases for the campaign will be named by Thomas Yellow, Clean Up Committee boss.

Already adopted are all of the campaign features which were in effect last year. To keep the campaign consistently before the public, there will be a movie trailer shown through the cooperation of the Varsity theater management, and releases on the drive will be given in newspapers and radio.

## Physicians Announce New Partnership

Dr. Robert G. Juedecke, Ishpeming and Dr. George O. Knutson, of this city, will become associated in a partnership for the practice of medicine here effective May 1. It was announced today.

Office for the partnership will be located in the new clinic opened here by Dr. Knutson last year.

Both of the physicians are well known residents of this area. Dr. Juedecke is a native of Ishpeming, graduate of the Ishpeming High School, completed his undergraduate and graduate work at the University of Michigan.

During World War II, he served for three and one half years with the Army Medical Corps.

His internship and residency in surgery were taken at Grace Hospital, Detroit. In 1951 he was admitted as a Fellow in the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Juedecke and his family which includes two children, reside in Ishpeming, where he started in practice in 1941.

Dr. George O. Knutson is a member of the staff of Francis A. Bell Memorial Hospital in Ishpeming.

Dr. Knutson completed his education at Northwestern University School of Medicine in Evanston, Ill.

He continued to practice here until he was called to active duty in the Naval Air Corps, serving for four years in the Philippines during World War II. Receiving his discharge in 1946, he returned to Negaunee where he has been engaged in practice here since that time. His wife is married and has two children.

**Franchise Ordinance No. 2 (14)**  
The purpose of the meeting was the introduction of the Franchise Ordinance No. 2 (14). After reading the TV Franchise Ordinance the City Attorney read from Article B, Section 1.1 that no city shall grant any public utility franchises which will or will not be in accordance with the will of the City, unless such provision shall have first received the affirmative vote of three fifths of the electors of

such City voting thereon at a regular or special municipal election. The City Attorney then read a letter from the Public Service Commission of Michigan that the Commission, as of March 15, 1955, has advised its exercise of jurisdiction over television systems to the matter of public utility. Mr. Stillwell stated that a community television station system is not a public utility and that his corporation is not requesting a vote of the people but will proceed to the enactment of a TV Franchise Ordinance to construct its antenna and complete its station. The City Attorney stated that the TV Franchise Ordinance as prepared for submission to the Council, included an additional section, as follows:

"4.9 Limitation on Charges— Exclusive of any taxes applicable to this corporation, this Corporation shall not charge more than \$125 for installation of its facilities. Excluding said taxes, the Corporation shall not charge more than \$100 per month as a service charge on the basis of three-channel reception, provided that if toll television is introduced, this section shall not be deemed to be a limitation with relation thereto."

Mr. Stillwell stated Section 4.9 as recited, was included in the ordinance draft presented to the Council. He stated that if Section 4.9 would be impractical if Section 4.9 is included, and that it would be impossible to obtain necessary financial backing. He stated that his Corporation does not expect to be in a position to go ahead with construction of television in Neagaune if Section 4.9 were to be a part of the ordinance, and that, in view of his Corporation's location in a city in which Jerrold Electronics has established a station, such as charges increased in any time, without an increase in revenue.

### TELEVISION FRANCHISE ORDINANCE City of Neagaune

155 NEAUNE CITY ORDINANCE 3 (15)

**TV FRANCHISE ORDINANCE**  
An ordinance granting a franchise to operate and maintain a television station system setting forth conditions accompanying the grant of franchise and prescribing penalties for the violations of its provisions. The City of Neagaune ordains:

**ARTICLE I.**  
**SHORT TITLE AND DEFINITIONS.**  
(1) "Short Title" - This ordinance shall be known and may be referred to as the "TV Franchise Ordinance of the City of Neagaune."  
(2) "Definitions" - As used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings:

(a) "City" shall mean the City of Neagaune.  
(b) "Corporation" shall mean the Jerrold Electronics Corporation, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Pennsylvania, and its successors and assigns.

**ARTICLE II**  
**GRANT OF PRIVILEGE AND CONDITIONS**  
(1) Grant of Authority - The City hereby grants to the Corporation the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in, along and across above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways and public places now laid out or hereafter laid out, all extensions thereto and all additions thereto in the City, poles, wires, cables (including television antennas) and underground conduits, manholes and fixtures necessary for the maintenance and operation of the television system.

(2) Term - The rights herein granted shall take effect, and shall be in force from and after the final passage hereof, as required by Charter of the City, and until filing of acceptance by the Corporation with the City Clerk. Said rights shall continue in force and effect for a term of 30 years after the effective date hereof. Upon the failure of the Corporation to start construction in a substantial manner satisfactory to the City within one year of this ordinance, the City may terminate the rights of the Corporation herein by giving to the Corporation thirty days' notice of intention.

(3) Compliance With Applicable Laws and Codes - The Corporation shall be subject to lawful exercise of the police power by the City and by the City Manager, a general plan showing the location of all its poles, wires and appearances, in each area where construction, be erected and maintained at such locations as may be approved by the City Manager and in accordance with the regulations and standards of the National Electrical Safety Code, and Bell System Practices and Standards. Any amendment or revision of any Code, Practices and Standards in compliance with any rules or orders now in effect or may hereafter be issued by the Federal Public Service Commission or any other authority having jurisdiction over such matters.

(4) Payment to City - The Corporation shall pay to the City for the privilege of operating its system under this ordinance non-refundable fee to be submitted to the City for registration of the system on the basis of City poles and City facilities, which rental shall provide for the same rates as those charged by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company for its pole rental.

USE OF CITY POLES AND STREETS

(5) Use of City Poles - So far as practical the Corporation shall utilize poles maintained by the City and Michigan Bell Telephone Company, but in the absence of such agreements being reached, New poles shall be placed at locations approved by the City Manager.

(6) Interference with Use of Streets - All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment installed in any location within the City shall be installed so as to cause a minimum interference with the use of streets, alleys, and other public ways and places, and to cause minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of persons who occupy any of said streets, alleys or other public ways and places.

(7) Restoration of Streets - In case of any damage to pavement, sidewalk, driveway or surface surfacing the Corporation shall be responsible therefor and in a manner approved by the City Manager, promptly repair and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of streets and places.

(8) Reclamation - If, at any time during the term herein provided, any poles and wires elect to alter or change the grade of any street, alley or other public way, the Corporation, after reasonable notice and after consultation with the appropriate its facilities at its own expense.

(9) Placement of Corporation Facilities - The Corporation shall place any facilities whether poles, wires, cables, electric, or telephone lines, antennas, and other such facilities, when placed in an alley, shall be located in such a manner as to interfere with the usual travel and use thereof.

(10) Temporary Removal of Wires For Building Moving - If at any time during the term herein provided, any person holding a building moving permit issued by the City, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings, the expense thereof shall be paid by the person requesting the same and for the removal and re-attachment of the wires to require such authority in advance.

(11) Other Determining - The Corporation shall have no Authority to interfere with or obstruct any existing streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places so as to be a burden on the City, or to interfere with the operation of the City, or to interfere with the operation of the City and at the expense of the Corporation.

**ARTICLE IV.**  
**PHENOMENA AND PROCEDURES**

(1) Construction - The Corporation may promulgate rules and regulations, subject to the conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be set forth in the ordinance in which the Corporation to exercise its rights and perform its obligations under this ordinance, and to the best of the Corporation's ability shall cause to be posted and one of all its customers.

(2) Service Standard - The Corporation shall cause the City operator its system and render service to its customers in accordance with the standards of the Corporation shall be installed and maintained in a manner and to the best of the Corporation's ability shall cause to be posted and one of all its customers.

(4) Preferential or Discrimination - The Corporation shall not discriminate in the service of its system, and shall not discriminate in the rates of its service.

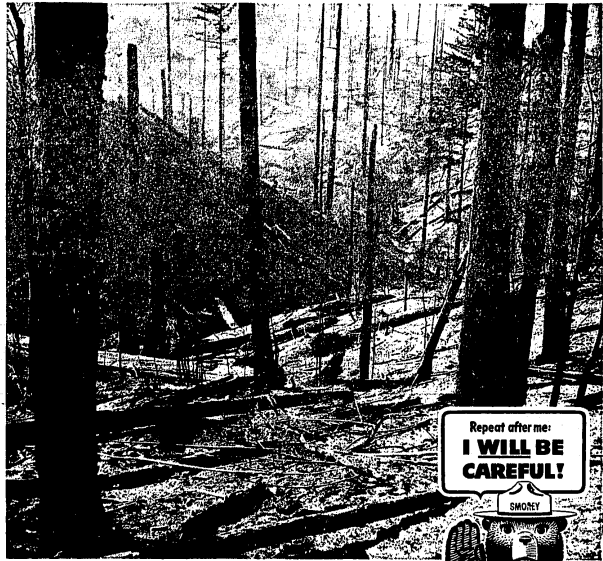

## Plan Civil Air Patrol Unit Here

Possibility of establishment of a Civil Air Patrol in Marquette County was among the topics following a meeting of interested persons held Saturday night in the Negaunee fire hall.

Speakers were Major D. Nemeth of the Dickinson County Civil Air Patrol, and William Powell, Esq., Uppur Peninsula representative of the Office of Civil Defense.

Membership in the CAP is not restricted to licensed and, or student pilots. Because the organization requires specialists in many fields, ranging from communication to the record of the troop. Although unit unit as evidence of the service such an organization can render to the public. Powell described the working association between the CAP and the Office of Civil Defense.

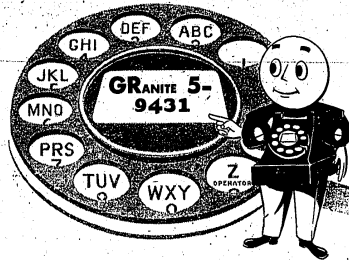
their essays the following information: Name, school, age, address, name of parents, school they plan to attend, and course they intend to pursue.

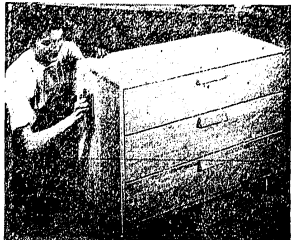

### Television Franchise Ordinance City of Negaunee

(Continued from Page Two)

**Industry Practices Prohibited.**—The Corporation shall not, as to rates, charges, service facilities rules, regulations, or in any other respect make or grant any preference or advantage to any person, nor subject any person to any prejudice or disadvantage, provided that nothing here in shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale of charges and related rate schedules to which any customer coming within such classification would be entitled.

**4.4 Extension Policy.**—The Corporation shall file with the City Clerk its extension policy;

**4.5 Notice of Interruption.**—Whenever it is necessary to shut off or interrupt service for repairs, adjustments or installations, the Corporation shall do so no such times as will cause the least inconvenience to its customers and, unless the interruption is unforeseen and immediately necessary, the Corporation shall give reasonable notice thereof in its advertising.

**4.6 Color Television.**—The Corporation shall make provision for color television, and any changes required for color shall be at the Corporation's expense.

**4.7 Channels.**—The Corporation shall maintain at all times to the best of its ability not more than two (2) channels and shall so announce as practical, add a third channel.

**4.8 Savings to Customers.**—If during the term hereof, the cost of the Corporation of receiving the television signals which it relays is reduced, by order of any regulatory body having competent jurisdiction, the Corporation shall pass on to its customers such refunds or any savings resulting from such reduced costs. If any tax levied by the Corporation to its subscribers as a tax and collected from its subscribers is declared invalid and is returned to the Corporation, the same shall be equitably returned by the Corporation to its subscribers.

### ARTICLE V. LIABILITY, ASSIGNMENT AND TERMINATION

**5.1 Liability.**—The Corporation shall save the City harmless from all costs sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from negligence on the part of the Corporation, or for which the Corporation is the legal cause in the construction, operation and maintenance of its system in the City. The City shall notify the Corporation promptly after presentation of any claim or demand, either by suit or otherwise, made against the City and arising from the operation of the Corporation. Prior to commencement of construction, The Corporation shall most proof of insurance in the amount of \$100,000 to indemnify against any property damage which may be suffered by any person or property as a result of activities of the Corporation in connection with its facilities. The Corporation shall most proof of insurance at said time in the amount of \$25,000 to \$100,000 to cover any damage or injuries which may result from the activities of the Corporation and which are commonly referred to as public liability damages.

**5.2 Assignment.**—No assignment by the Corporation of its rights under this ordinance shall be effective unless prior approval is given by the City. The assent or purchaser shall, as a condition to approval by the City file with the City Clerk acceptance of the terms hereof and an agreement to perform all of the conditions herein.

**5.3 Termination.**—Upon the termination of this ordinance, the

City shall have the right to determine whether the Corporation shall continue to operate and maintain its distributing system.

### ARTICLE VI. PUBLICATION AND PENALTIES

**6.1 Publication Cost.**—The Corporation shall assume the cost of publication of this ordinance. A bill for publication cost shall be presented to the Corporation by the City Treasurer upon the Corporation's filing of its acceptance.

**6.2 Penalties.**—Any violation by the Corporation, its successors or assigns of any material portion of this ordinance, shall be cause for the forfeiture of the rights herein provided, after written notice by the City to the Corporation and after a written failure or default continues after said notice.

### ARTICLE VII SEVERABILITY, REPEALER AND EFFECTIVE DATE

**7.1 Severability.**—Sections of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and should any provision, paragraph or sentence herein be declared unconstitutional or invalid, such declaration shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than that part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

**7.2 Repealer.**—All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed and held for naught.

## Deadline for Bike Plates Saturday

Deadline for purchase of 1955-56 bike tags will be Saturday, April 30, bicycle owners in the city were advised this week by Sgt. Robert Johnson of the Negaunee Police Department, who is in charge for the sale.

Required by municipal ordinance, the plates, which sell for 25 cents, are good for a 12 month period beginning May 1 of each year.

Bicycle owners when applying for plates should bring with them serial numbers and descriptions of vehicles.

As the time tags are issued, police officials inspect bikes to make sure they are free of mechanical difficulties and have equipment required by the ordinance, such as horn, reflector for rear fender and, if vehicle is used

after dark, a headlight.

Each applicant is also issued a membership card in the safety league of the Bicycle Institute of America containing the following 12 rules for safe bicycling:

Observe all traffic regulations, red and green lights, one-way streets and stop signs.

Keep to the right and ride in a straight line. Always ride single file.

Have white light on front and a danger signal on rear for night riding.

Have satisfactory signaling device to warn of approach.

Give pedestrian the right of way. Avoid sidewalks, otherwise use extra care.

Look out for cars pulling out into traffic. Keep sharp lookout for sudden opening of auto doors.

Never carry other riders, passengers or load that obstructs or prevents proper control of cycle.

Be sure your brakes are operating efficiently and keep your bicycle in perfect running condition. Slow down at street intersections

and look to right and left before crossing.

Don't weave in or out of traffic, for turning and stopping.

Always use proper hand signals or swerve from side to side.

## City Manager Reports on Departments

There were 5,768 calls for books and periodicals at the Negaunee Public Library during the past month, according to the monthly report of the city manager.

Included in the circulation total were 2,286 requests for literature by juveniles, plus 3,476 books and periodicals read by adults.

Members of the police depart-

ment, according to the report, made 22 arrests. Tickets were issued for the following causes: parking violations, 10; traffic violations, 5; no license plates, 2; reckless driving, 2; drunk driving, 2; assault and battery, 2; drunk 2; and drunk and disorderly, 5.

In addition, the police department investigated 73 complaints, received 19 telephone calls, reported 13 doors open in the bad-news district, reported 48 street lights that were out, investigated 14 automobile accidents, shot three dogs and gave lodging to 13 persons at the city jail.

Seven alarms were answered by the fire department, with five of the calls resulting from chimney fires. Total damage by fire amounted to \$50, which was covered by insurance. One structure was given department members by A. J. Sironiak, Cleveland-Ciffs Iron Co. safety department.

In the electric department, employees changed 31 street lights, installed six three- wire and eight two- wire services, changed seven meters and one mercury v a pump, did electrical work at the water works station and sewer treatment plant, and linework on Baldwin avenue.

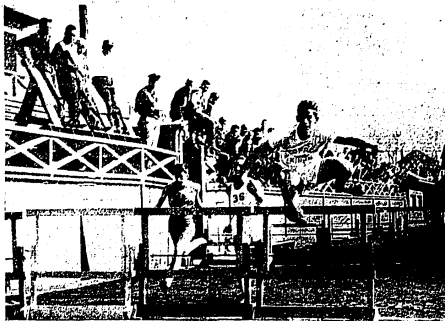
