Introduce New Ideas In Drive To Retain Cleanest Town Title

In an attempt to successfully defend the title of "Cleanest City of Its Size in the Nation" won by this community for the first time in 1954, members of the Negaunee Business and Professional Association Clean Up Committee have decided on several innovations for the campaign beginning Thursday, in addition to those ideas that have proved successful in the past.

Retained from previous drives are the making of posters by public and parochial school students, the kick-off parade, distribution of "Thank You" cards where residents have done a particularly good job, and "Let's Cooperate" messages in instances where the Clean Up drive is below par.

Publicity on the drive, as in prior years, consists of newspapers, radio and theater trailers, in addition to the posters. However, this year the committee to stimulate interest on the part of students and to improve the standard of art work

Jackson Park Reservations Being Made

Although the Jackson Park recreation lodge has been open for only three days, 20 reservations have already been received for the popular summer center, city officials disclosed Wednesday.

The lodge opens annually the first day of May and remains open through the summer and into seasons as late as weather permits.

Rules for use of the lodge provide for a rental fee of one dollar up to 11 p. m. After 11 p. m. the rental fee is set at one dollar per hour due to the fact that the municipal caretaker must remain overnight. Complete facilities are available at the lodge including dishes, glass and silverware for preparation and serving lunch or dinner. During the spring and fall months, the structure is heated.

To obtain use of the lodge, reservations should be made by calling the caretaker at Jackson Park.

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Iron Street Scrubbing, Kick Off Parade Start '55 Clean Up Campaign

Scrubbing of Iron street, the principal business thoroughfare at 5:30 this afternoon and a kick off parade that will get underway at 7 o'clock tonight, highlighting the opening of Negaunee's biennial annual Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up program, a campaign in which the community will go all out to recapture the title of "CLEANEST CITY OF ITS SIZE IN AMERICA," which it won for the first time in 1954.

Never in the five years of the campaign here have there been such intensive preparations made for Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up as there is for the impending drive, as the committee representing the Negaunee Business and Professional Association, sponsoring the drive, realizes that while winning a first place trophy in 1954 was an outstanding feat, it will be even a more noteworthy accomplishment to repeat this year.

Improvement Of Rural Mail Boxes Urged

Cooperation of rural residents in the Negaunee area in repainting and beautifying mail box equipment and approaches are being urged by the postmaster, being sought by Mrs. Agnes Rogan, postmaster.

With spring the season of the year designated for Clean Up-Paint Up-Fix Up time, Mrs. Rogan urged rural patrons to include mail boxes as part of the project in connection with Mail Box Improvement Week, which will be held the week beginning Monday May 16.

The Post Office department is the most important agency in keeping people of the nation informed, Mrs. Rogan pointed out. The rural delivery is a post office on wheels and many times these services are taken for granted and not fully appreciated.

Carriers attempt to serve patrons promptly with as few mistakes as possible. However, errors are sometimes caused by the patron's name being omitted on the mail box, especially when a substitute serves the route while the regular carrier is on vacation or sick leave. The mistake generally is not as well acquainted with the route as the regular carrier.

To minimize these errors the Negaunee postmaster suggests that patrons paint their mail boxes and in contrasting color letter their names on the receptacles.

Sun and Fresh Air Good for Baby

Babies and mothers too, need sun and fresh air even during cold weather. Though winds may be chilly, and sudden overcasts unpredictable, try to arrange your schedule so that both



you can be outdoors for at least a couple of hours each reasonably good day.

A baby's skin is tender and chaps quickly in nippy weather, particularly around the mouth and on the chin if she is at the drooling stage. Before taking her out for a stroll, dry the drooly run and smooth it over with baby lotion — the same creamy white lotion that you use after her bath or a diaper change. Protect hands and wrists in the same way.

Breasing baby for the outdoors calls for good judgment, taking into account the temperature, the amount of wind and the warmth of the sun. Don't pile on the clothes or wrap if baby is too warm; she will be uncomfortable and fretful. If she perspires, she is likely to catch cold. Dress her a little more warmly than you dress yourself, add a light blanket, and you can't be far wrong.

It's a good idea, though, to

take one precaution. Winter, weather is notoriously changeable. A stroll begun when the sun is bright and warm may end with the sky clouded and a chill wind blowing. So dress an extra covering for baby in the pocket of her carriage, and you will be prepared for a sudden change.

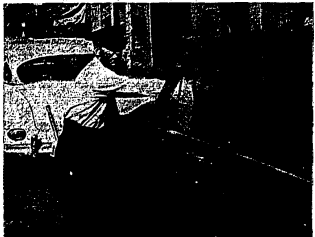
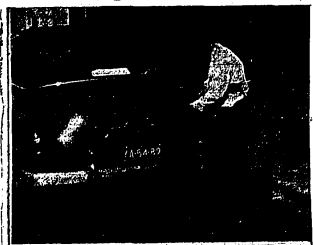

Corporation shall file with the City Clerk its extension policy.

4.3 Notice of Intention: Whenever it is necessary to shut off or interrupt service for repairs, adjustments or installations, the Corporation shall do so at such times as will cause the least inconvenience to its customers and, unless the interruption is unforeseen and immediately necessary, the Corporation shall give reasonable notice thereof to its customers.

4.4 Color Television: The Corporation shall make provision for color television service which changes required for color shall be as the Corporation's expense.

4.7 Channels: The Corporation shall maintain at all times the best of its ability not less than two (2) channels and shall as soon as practical, add a third channel.

4.8 Savings to Customers - If during the term hereof, the cost of the Corporation of receiving the television signals which it relays is reduced, by order of any regulatory body having competent jurisdiction, the Corporation shall pass on to its customers such refunds or any savings resulting from such reduced costs, if any tax collected by the Corporation to its subscribers as a tax and billed by the subscribers is declared invalid and is returned to the Corporation, the same shall be equitably returned by the Corporation to its subscribers.

ARTICLE V. LIABILITY, ASSIGNMENT AND TERMINATION

5.1 Liability - The Corporation shall save the City harmless from all costs sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from negligence on the part of the Corporation, or for which the Corporation is the proximate cause in the construction, operation and maintenance of its system in the City. The City shall notify the Corporation promptly after presentation of any claim or demand, either by suit or otherwise, made against the City and arising from the operation of the Corporation. Prior to commencement of construction the Corporation shall post proof of insurance in the amount of \$100,000 to \$400,000 against any property damage which may be suffered by any person or property as a result of activities of the Corporation in connection with its facilities. The Corporation shall post proof of insurance at said time in the amount of \$100,000 to \$100,000 to cover any damage or injuries which may result from the activities of the Corporation and which are commonly referred to as public liability.

5.2 Assignment - No assignment by the Corporation of its rights under this ordinance shall be effective unless prior approval is given by the City. The assignee or purchaser shall, as a condition to approval by the City file with the City Clerk its acceptance of the terms hereof and an agreement to perform all of the conditions herein.

5.3 Termination - Upon the termination of this ordinance the City shall have the right to determine whether the Corporation shall continue to operate and maintain its distributing system.

ARTICLE VI. PUBLICATION AND PENALTIES

6.1 Publication Cost - The Corporation shall assume the cost of publication of this ordinance. A bill for publication cost shall be presented to the Corporation by the City Treasurer upon the Corporation's filing of acceptance.

6.2 Penalties - Any violation

7.1 Severability - Sections of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and if any provision, paragraph or sentence hereof be declared unconstitutional or invalid, such declaration shall not effect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than that part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

7.2 Repealer - All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed and held for naught.

7.3 Effective Date - This ordinance shall become effective on the _____ day of 1965.

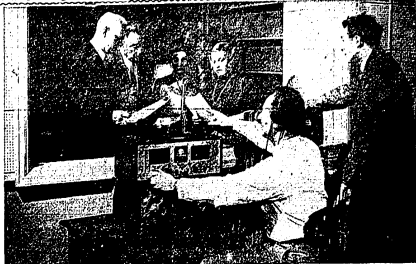

Victory in horsehide

Talking up where we left off on pitching, it is interesting to note that pitchers differ markedly in their throwing pattern.

The "Tiers" Neil Garver, for instance, possesses an excellent repertoire, including a pond curve, a sinking fast ball and a two-knuckling slider than most.

A slow worker, his success is due largely to changing speed on all three pitches. Now and then he apparently sneaks in an old-fashioned splitter, technically illegal, but a lot of them use it.

Neil's theory is to get the batter out on a different pitch each time so that the batter never knows what to expect.

Virtually the opposite is Steve Cromek, who believes in over-pitching the batter with fast balls. Steve tries to throw a strike every time, generally walks few men and works much faster than the average pitcher.

Thomas Sife Arm.
Cromek's fast ball differs from Garver's in that it is thrown more side arm so that it rises in flight. Thus, the batter is likely to hit more flies.

But Steve also has good control on a sinking fast ball, which the employes with runners on base. The ball is likely to be hit on the ground, allowing for a double play, or at least it keeps runners from advancing.

Tiger batters differ on rating American League pitchers at their toughest to hit. Harvey Kuenen, for

ears, classifies Cleveland's Bob Lemon as his greatest headache because of Lemon's ability to keep the ball away from him and because of a sinking fast ball that's difficult to hit in the air.

Harvey, one of the game's best first division players, says Washington's Ben Worterfield second because of his tremendous speed, Worterfield throwing an overhand fast ball and a curve that breaks down.

Steve to Fain
Ferra's Pain, twice American League batting champion, also classifies Lemon the toughest pitcher to bat against. He has similar respect for Ed Lopat of the Yankees, Fred Wynn of Cleveland and Mel Parrell of Boston.

According to Ferris Lopat is hard to hit because of his hot-jerky throwing motion. In addition, Lopat knows all the pitches in the book, including the screwball, knuckleball and slider.

Wynn is tough to bat against because of his control of a knuckle ball and his rising fast ball. Parrell because of his wide-breaking slider comes in close to the knees and his fast ball that crosses just over the right hand corner. Lopat, Wynn and Parrell are alike in that they try to get the batter out on a different pitch each time, just as Garver does.
