## Reading Held On New Dance Ordinance

## Possible Annexation Of Adjacent School Districts Discussed

Future growth of the Negaunee Public School System was discussed by the Board of Education at its May meeting in connection with the need for a playground site near the Central Grade School and the possibility of annexation of adjacent school districts.

In his monthly report to the board, Supr. E. W. Born pointed out that growth of adjacent Negaunee townships in the near future would probably necessitate that this district either construct a new school of its own or be annexed to the Negaunee district.

"I am pointing this out at this particular time because the area is growing rapidly and the people in the township district will be faced with this problem the superintendent said. "As a result we should be considering the matter in our long range planning now."

Discussion regarding the matter brought out the fact that there had been evidence in the annexation idea in the Richmond township school district also. Both of the districts now send students into Negaunee, those from Negaunee township beginning at the third grade level while Richmond township high school pupils are transported.

It was decided that a meeting should be arranged to which members of the Marquette Co. Board of Education, and representatives from the Richmond and Negaunee township school districts should be invited to confer with the Negaunee board on the annexation idea.

It was also proposed a change in bus routes for students living in the Buffalo Hill location necessitated by notice given the City of Negaunee by Jones & Laurilla that Queen street as now located must be abandoned due to plating operations. The change will increase the bus mileage to about six miles less per trip.

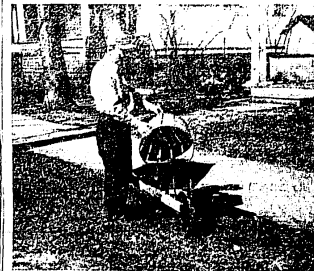

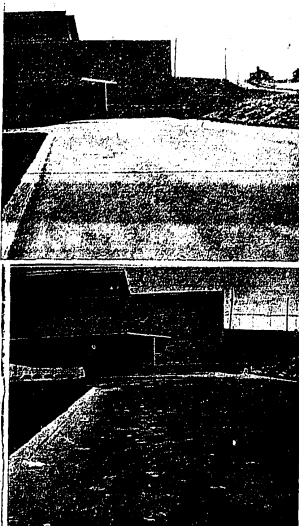

## Board Gives Approval To Scholarship

Final approval was given the Diamond Jubilee Scholarship when the Negaunee Board of Education at its May meeting Monday night accepted the program as presented by the Jubilee Committee and scholarship trust fund board.

The resolution passed by the board on motion by Leslie Richards, supported by Sam Ford, follows:

"The Board of Education will fund its moral support to declaration of the scholarship trust fund board and endorse the Diamond Jubilee Scholarship program, as published and presented by the scholarship board."

As a result of receiving official recognition by the board, the Diamond Jubilee scholarship becomes the first annual scholastic grant available to Negaunee High School seniors.

Already at work evaluating students on the basis of scholastic record and potential is a committee of three faculty members appointed by the trust fund board, which will make its recommendations to the board. From these recommendations the board will select later this month the Diamond Jubilee Scholarship winner for 1955.

## Hoff Resigns As Negaunee Grid Coach

Ending a three year tenure here, Donald J. Hoff submitted his resignation as Negaunee High School football coach at the May meeting of the Board of

Education Monday night.

Hoff, who came to Negaunee in 1951, held a position of coach at Schools K, W, Eben that in his line offered a job in the Bluefield Hills school district in the District now. A graduate of the University of Michigan, Hoff was assistant to Ed Casey in his first year in Negaunee in 1951. Following Casey's resignation in 1952, Hoff was appointed head coach of the Negaunee team.

In his three years at the helm of the Negaunee team, Hoff led 19, lost 13 and tied one. In 1953 Hoff's first year, Negaunee won only a single game while being swept in the first straight four Negaunee football games finished with a 1-7 record.

In 1954 Negaunee won four and lost four and in 1955 Hoff brought Negaunee its first winning season since 1947 with a 5-2-1 record and a second-place finish in the Green Lakes Conference. In 1947 Negaunee won 4-2 and since that time until 1954 had not been able to win more games than it lost.

Under Hoff, Negaunee won the county championship the last two years, when the Miners defeated Marquette and Isabella. His teams were 0-3 against Stansburgh, 0-2-1 against Newberry, 1-1 against Marquette, Isabella, Hamlin and Manistee and 1-1 against Calumet and Heights.

Lake avenue, Dr. Olson, who is well known here is quoted by the former Patricia Rogan, of this city.

Following is an account of the incident published in the Green Bay Press. Quote along with a three column picture on the front page:

"The child, Matthew White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Phyll White, had stopped breathing when he was admitted to the hospital.

He was revived within 10 minutes by Dr. Robert C. Olson, St. Vincent staffer, with aid from Sister Mary DeProuse and Sister Mary Viola. The sisters, working feverishly against irreversible coma, administered artificial respiration and oxygen to the child before Dr. Olson was summoned.

"The quick thinking doctor supervised operations in the St. Vincent emergency room and injected adrenalin into the child's heart when breathing resumed.

"As first there was only a faint heartbeat," Dr. Olson said, "then breathing resumed and the child was placed in an oxygen tent."

"Both parents praised the work of Dr. Olson and the hospital sisters.

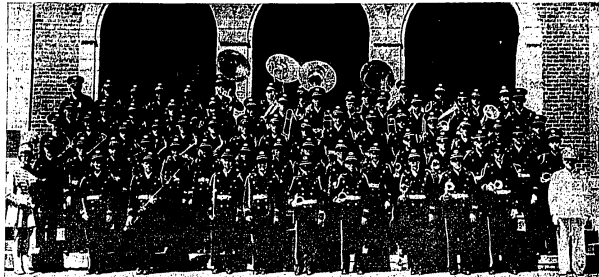
Supt. Born informed the board that while he did not feel it should bid on the estate property, it could legally purchase a playground site

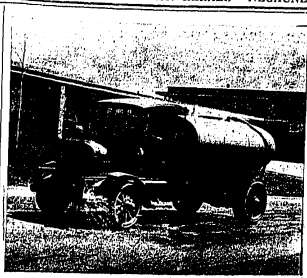

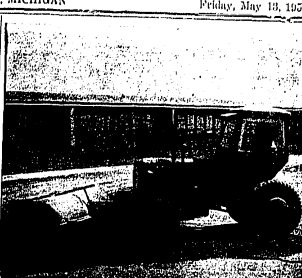
