Prior to serving in World War II, Dr. Winter engaged in practice in Cheboygan and St. Joseph, Michigan. Following discharge from the armed forces, he practiced medicine in New York City.

Surviving are his wife, three children, his father, Joseph H. Winter, Milwaukee, former well known local business man, one sister, Mrs. Margaret Campbell of Mountlake, N. J., and several aunts.

Funeral services were held in Leoile and burial was made in the cemetery in that city.

Interruptions in municipal electric service due to faulty distribution resulting from voltage conditions should practically be a thing of the past in Negaunee following installation of new regulators at the city electric plant.

That was the good news for electric customers this week from City Manager George E. Meholik Jr., who revealed that, in addition to the new units, regulators formerly in use will be installed next week on Baldwin avenue, near Mrs. L. E. & A. national trucks to serve especially the newest residential section of the municipality.

Negaunee Girl Gets Degree From Ferris

Installed at a cost of approximately \$2,000, the new regulators have a 500 KVA capacity, and the use of both new and old equipment will give Negaunee a total capacity of 700 KVA, or more than three times that available under the former system. With this installation, voltage and more constant voltage will be maintained local residents according to the manager.

The regulators formerly located at the central plant will receive the section of the city composed of Teal Lake First Second additions, the area north of Baldwin avenue and east of Prince street, Beverly Hills and the Lakeview School district.

People in this area will find a marked improvement in what these regulators are installed; the manager noted. Hereafter they have been served by a tap from the main transmission line before it reached regulators.

This resulted in a larger voltage drop than usual in the line going into the regulators, which fed the entire city, and resulted in these units working under maximum efficiency at all times.

The next improvement, which municipal officials are contemplating is the erection of a station adjacent to the new regulators in order to eliminate the long transmission line of about one mile from the Meas Mine, Iowa, which feed the entire city. This will result in further thereby reducing line losses in transmission and conserving such a station would be approximately \$30,000.

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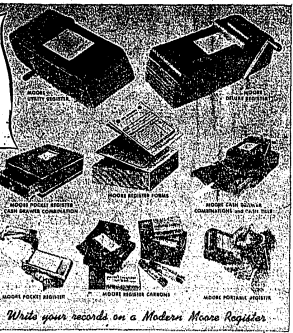

City Manager Reports On Cost Of Employment Relief Program

Concerned with increasing expenditures for relief employment, City Manager George B. Mcholicke, Jr., prepared a special report on the matter for City Council members at their June meeting in which he estimated that the cost to the municipality could exceed \$20,000 by the end of the year.

Mcholicke pointed out that - 1 - the payroll increase for the first five months of 1955 totaled \$14,688.55, but that the major share of the gain came in the period from January through April.

Two-Year Costs Compared

Payroll costs for the months of January through May for 1954 as compared with the current year follow:

January, 1954, \$31,103.72, 1955,

\$32,166.36; February, 1954, \$27,

\$48.25, 1955, \$5,095.54; March,

1954, \$20,254.04, 1955, \$23,969.67;

April, 1954, \$38,735.89, 1955, \$33,

\$52.41; May, 1954, \$33,019.69, 1955,

\$34,077.68.

"Total payroll costs for the corresponding periods were \$100,813.22 in 1954 and \$185,170.14 this year. The payroll increased budget for the current year was approximately

"four per cent, so \$6,020.46 can be attributed to raises given employees, but the remainder of the gain, amounting to \$8,058.69, can be charged to relief employment," Mcholicke said.

The manager emphasized that, while payroll costs increased as a result of providing temporary work for residents out of jobs, they were all engaged in grateful employment, supplementing the program ear-

ried on by regular municipal crews, and in some instances were able to provide services which local residents otherwise would not have received.

Funds Not In Budget

"However, the thing I am mainly concerned with," he said, "is the fact that this program was not taken into effect at the time Council budgeted for 1955. In other words, it is, what we term an un-budgeted expenditure and, as such, if it were to continue throughout the year could result in curtailment of or abandoning other programs for which we have made provision because of lack of funds.

"One cheering note in all of these activities is the fact that the slightest increase in payroll costs came in May, so perhaps we are now over the peak unemployment period and these expenses will continue to decline, in any event. I think that Council when its budgets for 1955 should make provision for a relief unemployment fund."

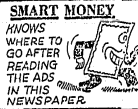
Summer Music Program Will Begin Monday

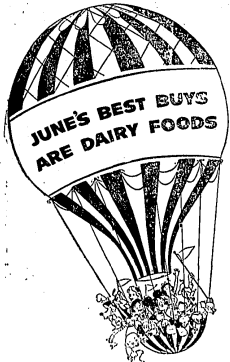

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Jacobetti Tells Highlights Of Term In State Legislature

A near capacity audience Moose members, local friends and visitors were informed by Representative Dominic Jacobetti Saturday night that had an outstanding event during his freshman term in the State Legislature, which he completed last week, was the fight to bring about a change in the valuations of mineral properties set by the State Tax Commission and ordered put in effect by the deputy state geologist.

"I regard this as the highlight of my first term," Jacobetti said, "for had the valuations stood as originally ordered, it would have meant increases on the homes of individual property owners."

Jacobetti declared he was impressed with the interest shown by persons residing in Marquette County in state government, and told of conducting numerous persons and groups through the legislature.

He paid tribute to the ability of C. Monson Williams as governor, declaring he was impressed particularly by the governor's interest in the problems of the people of the state as a whole.

Commenting on the Moose program, Jacobetti said he had been asked to be a member of an organization that was interested in helping

others. "Whether or not there were any other benefits, those of participating in the Moonshart program are sufficient to make membership in this organization worthwhile," he stated.

Other speakers on the program were Senator Phil Tishoff from Iron Mountain, and Robert Winslow, Upper Peninsula vice-president of the Moose. Tishoff paid tribute to the work of Jacobetti during his first term in the legislature, stating he had never known a representative who was more concerned with protecting the best interests of his district on every question. Winslow commented briefly on the Moose program.

Jack Powell, townmaster, introduced other guests, read letters from state officials unable to be present, and presented Jacobetti with a Moose ring, a gift of the Negaunee lodge.

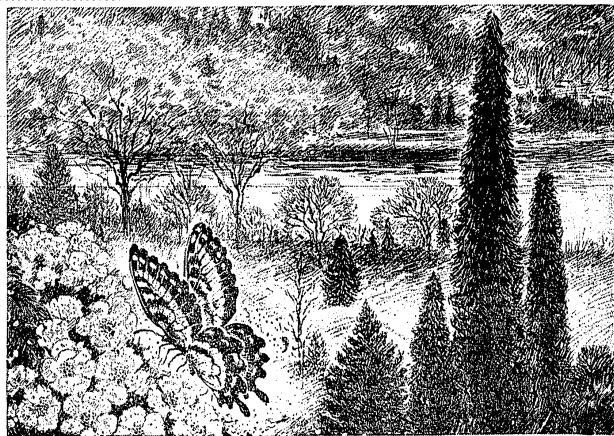

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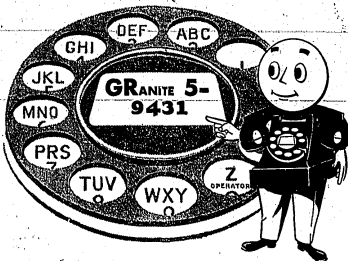
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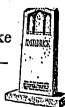
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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS CITY OF NEGAUNEE

SPECIAL MEETING Thursday, May 19, 1955 7:30 p.m.

A Special Meeting of the Negaunee City Council was held on Thursday, May 19, 1955, at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

Members present: Mayor Pro-Tem Berill Agnoli, Councilman Catron, Councilman Phillips, Councilman Lehto, Councilman Mielke.

The Student City Council... The Student City Council conducted the meeting with dignity and poise, as well as with skill and in a manner which was a credit to the Negaunee High School and its Faculty.

Mr. Richard Heidemann, on behalf of himself and Mr. Holl, instructors in Civil Engineering in the Negaunee Public Schools, requested permission for the time expended by the City Manager, City Officials and Employees in making Student Government Day such a success.

The Negaunee City Council was reconvened, and the meeting was called to order. Communication - Liquor Control Commission. Motion by Councilman Mielke supported by Councilman Phillips that the communication from the Liquor Control Commission, dated March 8, 1955 be received and placed on file, and the request of Marvin and Mrs. M. Asselin for a transfer of 1954 Class C Licenses, located at Iron Street, from Victor Similti, et al., be granted. All voting members - Aye.

Legion Auxiliary, Post No. 68 Motion by Councilman Mielke supported by Councilman Catron, that the communication from the American Legion Auxiliary Post No. 68, Negaunee, be received and placed on file and that the request for permission to conduct the Army Poppy Sale on May 25, 27, and 29, 1955 be granted. All voting members - Aye.

A petition signed by the residents of the Buffalo Hill Location area was presented to the Council. Considerable discussion was had and the following comments made: The City of Negaunee maintains its position. That its long-standing policy, that it should be free from liability and all expenses on the Buffalo Hill location in the event that these streets become unsafe due to mining operations whether they be present, past or future. In this particular instance, it has been difficult to maintain this position because of an existing agreement made in 1947 between the Mining Interests now owned by the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation and the City of Negaunee, whereby the City assumed such liability and expenses.

This agreement covers a large portion of the road which is presently endangered by the re-watering operation of the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation, and it is felt that the road are complicated by the fact that they will elude a portion of the road which will prevent in-

gress and egress to the Buffalo Hill Location. One of the main objectives which the City of Negaunee has in mind is to place upon, in line with their policy, is that the city does not assume any liability on the relocated road.

The City cannot prevent or know anything about the underground workings, and is looking for a road which both the City and the Mining Companies can feel is safe for the citizenry using such road.

After several sessions with Mining Company officials, it was finally agreed to plan a road which is feasible, fairly direct, and most important of all, safe. The route which was chosen is substantially on the foot wall, with one exception, that being where the new road joins the existing Rihlman Road. Mining officials have stated, and in their opinion, the chances of ever moving this road are almost nil, and that they do not wish to move the road into any of this area. Further, with the threat of underground mining changing so rapidly, the possibility of mining sites are somewhat remote and in any company, therefore, agreed to assume part and present liability.

In attempting to clarify the expenses incurred by the long-standing policy that the City not incur expenses due to the relocation of the Buffalo Hill location. The Mining Companies stated that in lieu of the 1947 agreement, which was made, and further, that they now are willing to assume liability, they will not expect in any manner the expense item. They ended with a "Take it or leave it" attitude in the opinion stated. This is the full content of the discussion had with the Mining Officials, and these are some of the conditions the City of Negaunee will have to take into account in order to get a new route in the Buffalo Hill Location.

Comments From the Audience The audience in attendance was one of the largest in some time. It was asked to give comments after hearing the conditions in regard to the relocation of this road. In summary, the gist of all the comments was unanimously this: Due to the fact that this is the way the responsibility is placed on the City; and due to the fact that the City has done all it can do to prevent the relocation of this road; and further, due to the fact that the City will not be responsible with the Company and be in a more favorable position, we feel that the interests of the City have been protected as well as possible under existing conditions.

The tentative agreement was further discussed among members of the Council, and action on this tentative agreement was not taken until such time as all members of the Council could have sufficient time to go into the details of the tentative agreement; further, to have the City Attorney render an opinion and comment on said proposed agreement.

Motion by Councilman Phillips supported by Councilman Mielke that all bills on the 2nd

Platform Dump Trucks be rejected, and that the City Manager be authorized to call for bids on the proposed Presentation of 1955 Public Works Program. Motion by Councilman Mielke supported by Councilman Phillips, that the 1955 Public Works Program be received and placed on file, and that the City Manager be authorized to carry out the program forth in the future, to the extent possible. All voting ayes.

1965 NEGAUNEE CITY ORDINANCE NO. 13, TV FRANCHISE ORDINANCE
A ordinance granting a franchise to operate and maintain a community television system, setting forth conditions accompanying the grant of franchise and prescribing penalties for violations of its provisions. The City of Negunee ordains.
ARTICLE I.
1. Short Title - This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Community TV Franchise Ordinance of the City of Negunee."
2. Definitions - As used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings:
a. "City" shall mean the City of Negunee.
b. "Corporation" shall mean the Jerald Electronics Corporation, a corporation organized under the laws of Michigan and Pennsylvania, its successors and assigns.
ARTICLE II
GRANT OF AUTHORITY AND CONDITIONS
2.1 Grant of Authority - The city hereby grants to the Corporation the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain in, over, along, across above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways and public places now laid out or hereafter laid out and all extensions thereof and additions thereto, in the City, poles, wires, cables (including television cables), conduits, underground conduits, manholes and other television conductors and fixtures necessary for the maintenance and operation of the City of a community television system for the interconnection, and distribution of television signals.
2.2 Term - The rights herein granted shall take effect from and to be in force from and after the passage hereof, as required by the City of Negunee, and upon filing of acceptance by the Corporation with the City Clerk, said rights shall continue in force and effect for a term of 30 years after the effective date hereof. Upon the failure of the Corporation to start construction in a substantial manner satisfactory to the City within the year from the effective date of this ordinance, the City shall terminate the rights of the Corporation herein by giving to the City thirty days notice of its intention to terminate.
2.3 Compliance With Applicable Laws and Ordinances - The Corporation shall be subject to all valid existing laws and ordinances in force and effect having the force of law, and shall comply with the City Manager, a general plan showing the location of all its facilities, All cables, wires and apparatus, in each and every location, shall be erected and maintained at locations as may be approved by the City Manager, and in accordance with the rules and specifications of the National Electrical Safety Code, and the system Practices of the AG, C and G Series or any amendments or revisions of said Code or Practices, and shall comply with any rules or orders now in effect or hereafter be issued by the Michigan Public Service Commission or other authority having jurisdiction.
2.4 Payment to City - The Corporation shall pay to the City for the privilege of operating its system within this ordinance, according to an agreement to be submitted to the City for approval, against the reasonable value of City poles and City facilities, which shall be the same as for the same rates as those charged by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company for rental.
ARTICLE III
USE OF CITY POLES AND STREETS
3.1 Use of City Poles - So far as practicable, the Corporation shall use existing poles maintained by the City of Negunee, Michigan Bell Telephone Company, subject to satisfactory rental agreements being entered into. New poles shall be placed only at locations approved by the City Manager.
3.2 Conditions As To Use of Streets - All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by the Corporation within the City shall be so located as to cause minimum interference with the proper use of streets, alleys, and other public ways and places, and with the minimum interference with the rights and convenience of property owners who reside near or adjacent to such or other public ways and places.
3.3 Restoration of Streets - In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing the Corporation shall, at its own cost and expense, cause it to be repaired and the City Manager, promptly replace and restore all paving, sidewalks, driveways or other surfacing of any street or alley disturbed in case of any condition as here provided was commenced.
3.4 Retention - If, at any time during the term of this ordinance, the City shall have provided, the City shall lawfully either alter or change the grade of any street, alley or other public way, the Corporation, after reasonable notice, shall remove, relay and relocate its facilities at its own expense.
3.5 Placement of Corporation Facilities - The Corporation shall not place any facilities, other than the same will interfere with any public or telephone lines, fire, water, hydrant or main, which facilities, when placed in an alley, shall be located in a manner as to not interfere with the usual travel and use thereof.
3.6 Temporary Removal of Wires For Building Moving - The Corporation shall, at the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the City, temporarily remove lower line wires to permit the moving of buildings. The same shall be replaced by the person requesting the same and the Corporation shall be reimbursed for the same such payment in advance.
3.7 Erection of the Corporation shall have no authority to trim trees over and overhanging the public sidewalks and public places so as to prevent the branches from interfering with the poles and cables of the Corporation, all trimming to be done with the permission of the City and at the expense of the Corporation.
PHOTOCOPIES AND PROCEDURES
4.1 Corporation Rules - The Corporation may promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions for the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the Corporation to exercise its rights and perform its obligations, and to assure, to the satisfaction of the Corporation, an uninterrupted service to each subscriber.
4.2 Service Standards - The Corporation shall maintain and improve its service to an efficient service. All facilities of the Corporation shall be installed, system maintained in a manner that will not cause any interference with television or radio reception in privately or publicly owned television and radio installations.
4.3 Preferential or Discriminatory Practices Prohibited - The Corporation shall not raise, charge, service facilities rates, regulations, terms or conditions, or make or grant any preference or advantage in any service to any subscriber on account of any prejudice or disadvantage, provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated rate schedule, or the establishment of rate schedules to which any customer coming within such classification would be entitled.
4.4 Extension Policy - The Corporation shall file with the City Clerk its extension policy.
4.5 Notice of Interruption - Whenever it is necessary to shut off or interrupt service, or repairs, adjustments or installations, the Corporation shall, in so far as practicable, give notice to its customers.
4.6 Restoration to Customers - If during the term hereof, the Corporation of receiving television or radio reception is reduced, by order of the regulatory body, having competent jurisdiction, the Corporation shall pass on to its customers such notices and information resulting from such reduction of its subscribers. Corporation to be satisfied by the tax and collected from the subscribers. The Corporation shall be returned to the Corporation, the same shall be equitably returned to the Corporation to its subscribers.

51. LIABILITY - The Corporation shall save the City harmless from all costs sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from negligence on the part of the Corporation, or for which the Corporation is in any way liable in the construction, operation and maintenance of any system the City, or which shall notify the Corporation promptly after presentation of any claim or demand, either by suit or otherwise, made against the City and arising from the operation of the Corporation. Prior to commencement of construction the Corporation shall procure proof of insurance in the amount of \$100,000 to indemnify against any property damage which may be suffered by any person or property as the result of activities of the Corporation in constructing its facilities. The Corporation shall pay proof of insurance at said time in the amount of \$1000 to \$100,000 to cover any damage or injuries which may result from the activities of the Corporation and which are comprehended to be a public liability damages.

52 Assignment - No assignment by the Corporation of its rights under this ordinance shall be effective unless prior approval is given by the City Council, assignee or purchaser shall, as a condition to approval by the City with the City Council, accept of the terms hereof and an agreement to perform all of the conditions herein.

53 Termination - Upon the termination of this ordinance, the City shall have the right to determine whether the Corporation shall continue to exist and maintain its distributing system.

ARTICLE VII - PUBLICATION AND PENALTIES

41 Publication Cost - The Corporation shall assume the cost of publication of this ordinance. A bill for publication of the same shall be presented to the Corporation by the City Treasurer upon the Corporation's filing of its acceptance.

42 Penalties - Any violation by the Corporation, its successors or assigns of any material portion of this ordinance shall be cause for the forfeiture of the rights herein provided, after written notice by the City to the Corporation where such violation failure and defiance continues after said notification.

ARTICLE VII - SEVERABILITY REPEALER AND EFFECTIVE DATE

71 Severability - Sections of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and the validity of one shall not be affected by the invalidity of another. If any part thereof is declared to be unconstitutional or invalid, the remainder hereof shall remain in force and effect.

72 Repealer - All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent hereof are hereby repealed.

73 Effective Date - This ordinance shall become effective on the _____ day of 1925.

**1925 NEGAUNEE CITY
ELECTRICITY ORDINANCE**

An Ordinance to Regulate the Sale and Distribution of Electricity in the City of Negaunee

The City of Negaunee Ordinance

1. Jurisdiction - All electricity sold and distributed by the City of Negaunee shall be other than the City or its agents, shall be governed by, and be subject to, the rules and regulations set forth in this ordinance and to rules and regulations which may be made from time to time adopted and approved by the City Council.

2. Short Title - This ordinance shall be known as the "Electricity Ordinance of the City of Negaunee."

ARTICLE I: DEFINITIONS

2.1 Definitions - The words used in this ordinance, the following words and in the preceding sections shall have the following meanings:

(a) Hook - Up charge shall mean the amount of money paid by an applicant for electricity service to cover part of the expenses of a meter and in installing the connection.

(b) Down deposit shall mean that amount of money paid by an applicant for electricity service to cover a six-week period. Said deposit shall be held by the City Treasurer in a separate trust account for the applicant until said service is disconnected, at which time the down deposit shall be made. If any money is then due the consumer, the City Treasurer shall remit it to him.

(c) Rules and Regulations - All rules and regulations promulgated by the City Engineer and approved by the City Council, pertaining to the sale and distribution of electric current.

ARTICLE III - NEW CUSTOMERS

3.1 Hook-up Charge - Before a hook-up charge is made, the applicant shall pay to the City Engineer the amount of hook-up charge currently in effect in the Negaunee Utility, determined by the City Engineer, and as stated in regulations thereon.

3.2 Down Deposit - Before a hook-up charge is made, the applicant shall deposit with the Negaunee City Treasurer the amount of money required under the rules and regulations for a six-week period, and shall deposit said take into consideration the type of premises, as service and the number of appliances and other electrical installations.

3.3 Service - Service to the customer shall be discontinued as long as the customer is in good standing.

3.4 Disconnection - All meters for electricity consumption heretofore installed, shall be placed upon the outside of the premises, and shall remain the property of the City.

3.5 Continuous Billing - Continuous billing shall be made of the City by the City Engineer. All meter renting shall be completed by the 25th day of each month, and the entire City shall have been billed during the previous month not later than the last business day of each month.

3.7 Default in Payment - Any consumer who fails to pay his bill in time within 30 days after the billing date, shall receive a Disconnect First Warning. If

such payment in less than 10 days after receipt of the disconnect first warning, or shall receive a second and final Disconnect Notice. If such payment is not received within 60 days of said first bill, the service shall be disconnected. A settlement account shall be made, and if money is due the consumer from the down deposit, the same shall be made to collect the same.

3.8 Customer Moving - The meter of any customer who moves from the metered premises shall forthwith be furnished to the new premises until the meter has been disconnected, accounts settled, and all appliances, hook-up charge and down deposit made. If any new tenant moves into the premises covered by the procedure herein set out, the meter shall be reconnected as soon as the City learns that said new tenant is in the premises, and this ordinance shall be complied with.

3.9 Reconnections - Where a meter is disconnected for any reason, the consumer who caused the meter to be disconnected, shall first comply in toto with the requirements of said ordinance.

3.10 Hardship Cases - If any consumer claims hardship, inability to pay electricity charges as set forth, said consumer shall apply for relief from the proper agency and the City Engineer. No electricity shall be furnished to any person free of charge.

3.11 Lapse on Premises - All charges for electricity consumed shall remain until the premises in the possession of the consumer until the bill is paid in full. The owner of said premises, whether a renter or a landlord, shall be notified when the signed application is received. If at any time a renter fails to pay his electricity charges in full before leaving the premises, the electric meter shall be given to said consumer and to the owner of the premises as soon as the renter has vacated the premises. If payment is not made within 60 days of the expiration of the tenancy as finally determined, the same shall be given to the premises up to the six rolls at the next meeting of the Board of Review, and a consignor in lieu of the same and shall be collected in the same manner, as taxes generally are levied.

ARTICLE IV - COLLECTION OF ACCOUNTS

4.1 Delinquent Consumers - Every consumer who is current in his bill, when payment for electricity bills shall be announced as soon as practical. If an agreement is entered into which the delinquency will be reduced in or eliminated, the entire current charges are being promptly paid as billed.

4.2 Disconnection - If a delinquent fails to enter into such an agreement, the consumer shall be disconnected with ten days of such refusal. Payment shall be made to the consumer for payment of the delinquent bill. If any consumer fails to enter into an agreement, fails to comply thereon, or fails to pay his bill within five (5) days after the date of the City Engineer's notice, and within five (5) days of his failure to comply strictly with said agreement, service shall be discontinued.

4.3 Delinquent Non - Consumers - Where a former utility customer is no longer an electric utility customer, an earnest effort shall be made as soon as practical to collect the delinquent amount.

4.4 Reports to Council - The Manager shall report to the City Council not less than

once each three months as to the status of the individual delinquent. The monthly delinquent list electricity was furnished to the Council and the amount due on quarterly basis for the last year. No shall also report such information as he may concerning residence, names and addresses of former and current owners of property.

ARTICLE V - METERS AND SELF-CERTIFY CONSUMPTION

5.1 Claims Against Delinquent and Bankrupt Customers - Claims for unpaid electricity charges against delinquent customers or any delinquent consumer of bankrupt consumer's estate.

5.2 Electricity Consumption - All electricity consumed shall pass through a meter furnished by the City, and all electricity attached in such way as to permit the consumer to receive electricity without the same passing through the meter, the device shall promptly be confiscated. An effort shall be made as soon as practical to determine the amount of electricity wrongfully taken and the consumer shall be notified thereof. If criminal charges appear appropriate, the Manager shall refer the same to the Attorney for consideration before signing criminal complaint.

5.3 Refusal to Person shall make any connection or connection with the distribution system or make any repairs, additions or to alterations of any fixtures on the consumer's premises unless the same are so approved with the National Electric Code. With this ordinance, any person with the rules and regulations of the National Electric Code shall have the right to refuse service on proof of disregard of such regulations. All work performed and additions made, shall be subject to inspection by the authorized agents of the City.

ARTICLE VI - RULES AND REGULATIONS

6.1 Rules and Regulations - The Manager shall prepare and submit to the Council for the approval of the Council, rules and regulations for the administration of the electricity utility. Said rules and regulations shall establish all charges and procedures to be followed including the down deposit, the hook-up charge, the meter charge, service charges and rates.

ARTICLE VII - REPEALER AND EFFECTIVE DATE

7.1 Repealer - All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed and held for null and void as if they were never enacted.

If any part of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and should any portion hereof be declared unconstitutional or invalid, the remainder hereof shall not be affected by the invalidity of any such part.

7.2 Effective Date - This ordinance shall become effective on the _____ day of 1925.

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Finnish Exchange Student Guest of Negaunee Couple

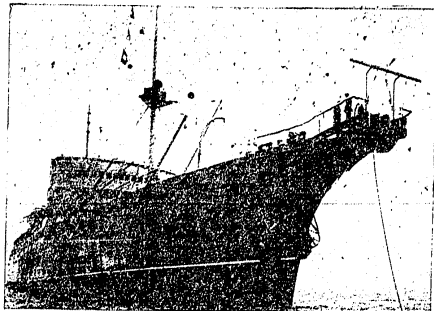

Council OKs Fire Hall Roof, Summer Uniforms For Police

Bids were opened by the Council at its June session on two new trucks for the municipal fleet with the contract awarded to Johnson Chevrolet, of Ishpeming, the low bidder with a quotation of \$6,050.00 on a roll call lease.

BROADCASTING and telescoping Tiger baseball games is not simply a task of many ears believe Van Parker and Ol' Jim are at the ball park long before the game begins.

Starting lineups must be obtained from home and visiting team managers. Cards have to be compiled on individual batters, averages and defensive positions. Note must be made of visiting destinations for later acknowledgment on the air. Voice levels have to be checked before each inning.

Moreover, an O. D. is shuffled about, gathering data, I'm stopped by fans who want to say hello. Not that I mind. I love to chat with the fans, but it does cut into my time, so I try to arrive at the ball park with the players at 10:30 a.m.

Several mornings a week Ol' Diz pitches hitting practices to the "Tigers, thus springing a regular pitcher for afternoon duty. I still have a locker in the clubhouse and my old uniform, number 11.

Work early.

As for the broadcast, Van and I have separate microphones. When I do the "radio" between innings, I take my cue from announcer Howard Gilbert, who's been handling "Tigers' talk" since 1930, when we only had one or from producer Ralph Russ when we're producing television.

Signaling me to speak, they usually point at a light, yellow in color, meaning, "You're on." If I try not to interrupt Van's play-

play unless I have some extremely important something to add. Then I signal him for a light touch. When we have something to say to each other Van or I can press out-of-buttons on our mikes that takes us off the air for a few seconds. It happens so fast that fans rarely are aware that we're off.

Telescasing is considerably more complex than broadcasting. The picture and Van's narration have to be in harmony. We have a TV monitor in our booth, which hangs down like the second clock between home and first, but helps us that producer Russ kept helping us to select which of three pictures on his big monitor best fits in with Van's description.

Different Views Each of the three cameras—located home plate, to the right of our booth and to the left of the field—is set in an annular booth, but taken home and third—is trained on a different action. One may show the pitcher, another may be on the batter and the third may take in both.

Crowd noise is picked up by a mike hanging from our booth.

Van, who possesses an excellent vocabulary, stumps me once in a while, but I keep up the word in my pocket dictionary and remember it. However, I'm still a man of simple words and intend to continue that way as long as I'm broadcasting the history and horsehide game.
