

1955 NEGAUNEE CITY ORDINANCE 3 (16) DANCE LIMITATION ORDINANCE An Ordinance to Limit Public Dancing in the City of Negaunce The City of Negaunce Ordains

ARTICLE I. SHORT TITLE AND DEFINITIONS 1.1 Short Title

This Ordinance shall be known as the "Dance Limitation Ordinance of the City of Negaunce."

As used in this Ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the following mean-

(a) Alcoholic Beverages shall mean beer, wine and liquor as defined in the Liquor Law of the

State of Michigan.

(b) "Premises Licensed for
the Sale to the General Public",
shall mean premises authorized
by the Liquor Control Commisston to sell at retall by the glass

nellude tayerns, Class C licensees, hotels of Class A and Class sees, hotels of Class A and Class B designations, restaurants of Class A, Class B and Class C designations, beer gardens, and any other licensees duly authorized to sell to the general public. Said phrase shall not include clubs which are natoinal features.

ARTICLE II. LIMITATION OF DANCING 2.1 Prohibited Premises

Dancing in premises licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverag-es to the general public is prohib ited and declared illegal, 2.2 Prohibited Persons

No person, partnership or cor-poration holding a license for the sale of alcoholic beverages to the general public shall, dir-ectly or indirectly, sponsor or conduct any public dancing or dances in the City.

Notice To Dog Owners? City Of Negaunee

Effective Friday, July 1, 1955, provisions of the Municipal Dog Ordinance, approved by the City Council, will be placed in effect.

According to provisions of this Ordinance. dogs will be picked up by the Dog Warden when they are found creating a nuisance and running at large on City streets.

All dogs must be confined to premises of the owner, except when they are accompanied by the owner on the street, or in the immediate area where he has control of the dog, and it is not causing a PUBLIC NUISANCE or threat to public safety.

This Ordinance further provides that licensed dogs only, collected by the Dog Warden, will be confined for a three-day period at the Municipal Dog Kennels, during which time owners may retrieve the animals after paying \$1 per day Kennel Fees. If they are not claimed during this time, they will be disposed of in accordance with terms of the Ordinance.


