Plat Hearing Scheduled On Thursday

In addition there has been evi-dence of the annexation idea in the Richmond Township school district. Both of the districts send pupils into Negaunce, those from Negaunee township begin-ning at the third grade level, while high school pupils are transported from the Richmond district.

Following this report, a preliminary meeting to discuss the question was held with representatives from both township school boards by the Negaunea Board.

A second session was held last week, which was attended by school boards, administrators and the county superintendent of schools at which representatives from the state department of public instruction explained leg-al steps that were required for annexation and formation of a single school district.


