**Five World War Two veterans** and wives of two others whose husbands were in hospitals, visited the office during the month. One World War One veteran was also in for information. Emergency food orders and help in paying hospital expenses were requested in all cases.

Applications were taken and emergency help given in five cases.

Three referrals were made to the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund Board, two to the Department of Social Welfare, one to the Bureau of Social Aid, one to the Amvets Service Officers and one to the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Commission.

Two meetings of the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund Board were attended during the month.

## ROAD COMMISSION REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1935

The total rainfall for the month was 1.43 inches.

**State Trunk Lines**  
In repaving damaged and alligry surface section of the State Trunk Lines, 2,600 gallons of tar, 485 gallons of sand, 240 tons of cover stone, 1,482 tons of blacktop, 13 cubic yards of sand and 49 cubic yards of gravel were used.

180 tons of State Trunk Line shrouders were mowed, 2.4 miles of guard rail posts were painted and 200 feet of guard rail posts were repainted. 80 cubic yards of gravel were placed on low shrouders, 4 new concrete tables were placed and weekly cleanup of all roadside table sites were carried out.

## County Roads Construction

On road 480 between US-41 and road 553 in Sandus and Chocoma Townships, 5,800 gallons of iron heavy materials were removed from the road and replaced with 4,546 cubic yards of gravel and 2,690 cubic yards of gravel. 22 feet of 18 inch concrete pipe extension was installed and 2,035 tons of crushed gravel were placed over the concrete sections of road.

On the streets of the Village of Harvey and road 315 in Chocoma Township, 387 cubic yards of iron heavy materials were removed and 315 cubic yards of sand and 426 cubic yards of gravel were placed. 7,000 cubic tons of asphalt were used in placing a bituminous tack coat on these streets and road surfaces. This work is being done in cooperation with Chocoma Township.

On roads M1 and NP in Sandus Township, 5,000 gallons of asphalt tack coat and 1,773 tons of bituminous aggregate were placed in paving 1.56 miles on road surfaces. This work was done in cooperation with Sandus Township.

On roads M1 and NW in Richmond Township, 5,800 gallons of asphalt tack coat and 2,870 tons of bituminous aggregate surfacing were placed in paving 1.6 miles on these roads. This work was done in cooperation with Richmond Township.

On road 112 and 113 in Marquette Township, 140 cubic yards of road surface was placed, requiring the use of 3,450 gallons of

asphalt tack coat and 1,384 tons of bituminous aggregate surfacing. This work was done in cooperation with Marquette Township.

On other construction and roads located in Ely, Marquette, Negaunee and in the townships 1.6 miles of relocation was graded, 64 feet of No. 16 arch, 30 feet of No. 18 arch, 10 feet of 24 inch 10 ft. of 18 in. 114 ft. of 24-in. and 112 ft. of 30-in. metal culverts were installed. 500 feet of guard rail was erected.

During the month the crushing plants ground 11,400 tons of crushed gravel.

## Maintenance

Road surface patching required the placing of 140 tons of blacktop, 742 gallons of asphalt, 10 tons of cover stone and 393 cubic yards of gravel in repairing damaged road surfaces.

Dust control operations and maintenance of the placing of 742 tons of calcium chloride and 1,000 gallons of No. 5 fuel oil.

## Department Heads Must Attend Future Meetings Of Council

Heads of City of Negaunee departments will be required to attend regular meetings of the City Council in eight weeks. The City Council in the future, it was decided by the governing body at its August meeting.

Action was taken to have executives available for consulting in the event Council desired information after Councilman Bertin commented on the type of reports submitted by the police department and municipal court.

Acceptance of monthly reports by department executives has been heretofore practically a routine procedure with the council. However, when the matter arose on the agenda Thursday night, Agnoll commented that he thought reports of the court and police department were too brief and not complete.

"I don't get a whole lot out of these reports, the way they are presented," he said, pointing out there was a difference in the revenues for the month listed in the municipal court report and the fines listed in the monthly statement of receipts by the manager.

City Manager George Moholick, Jr., explained that his report listed fines which were then turned over by the municipality to the county, while the statement by Judge William Haupt represented costs in those cases which were retained by the city.

The manager further explained that often the number of arrests listed by the police department and number of cases filed by the court did not jibe, because of the fact that cases were often carried over in court for a month or longer.

Agnoll replied that he would like to see included in the police report the disposition of the cases so that council would know what happened as a result of the arrests and added, "I don't see why the department heads can't be present at these meetings so that when a question like this arises they can give us the information. The only one that regularly attends our meetings is Fire Chief Melvin Johnson, and if he can take the time there is no reason why the others can't."

## Crews Make Progress On Buffalo Road

Following installation of four 36-inch I beams, which will provide a 27-foot freeway for traffic on the new road to the Buffalo Location, City Manager George E. Moholick, Jr., revealed this week that he was hopeful the second phase of the road program would be completed by

this weekend, making possible opening of the thoroughfare to traffic.

The second phase of the new road, made necessary because of mining operations, will include bringing it to grade, which will be lifts of four to five feet in places and installing gravel.

City Manager George E. Moholick, Jr., estimated this morning that the second portion of the program will be completed by the end of this week, following which the stretch will be open to traffic.

After gravel has been installed, the new Buffalo Hill road will be permitted to stabilize until next summer, when it will be

given a blacktop surface.

"Tempo of activities listed on the 1955 summer public works program is expected to increase sharply by the end of this week, particularly in regard to the street and highway program.

A second shipment of 10,000 gallons of oil is scheduled for arrival here, which will be applied to selected streets as part of the seal-coating program, and it is expected the blacktop program will be initiated on streets which have been designated for this improvement in 1955.

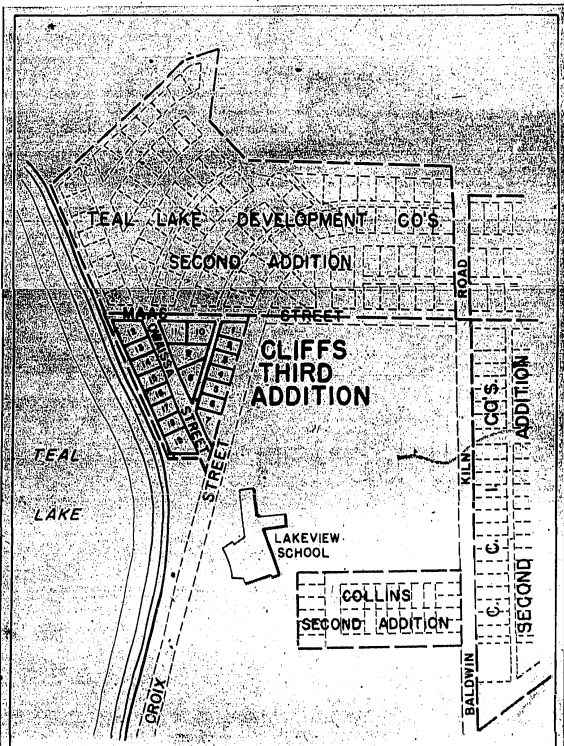

## Council Gives Tentative Okeh To Plans For CCI 4th Addition

Tentative approval was given the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Co. on preliminary plans and specifications for a proposed fourth addition to Negaunee by the City Council at its August meeting.

Intention of the company to begin work on a fourth addition was contained in a letter to City Manager George E. Moholick, from Stanley Sudebn, who pointed out it would be necessary for CCI to move five houses this summer from the Power House location because of mining operations.

Sudebn revealed that the houses would be moved, would be located north of the junction of Prince and Cherry streets. He pointed out that when the program providing for holding of

Masa Mine ore through the Bunker Hill mine shaft is placed in effect, it will eliminate the Masa stockpile in the area.

Following discussion on the proposed fourth addition, council instructed the manager to notify the company that, in addition to preliminary plans and specifications, the CCI should also include a "statement of purpose" for the area, as planning ordinance regulations are different if a plot is to be used for reconstructing homes, than if the area is to be utilized for constructing new dwellings.

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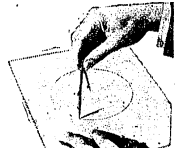

## Council Gives Support To Road Program

Members of the Negaunee City Council reaffirmed a previous stand by the municipal governing body on the new highway between Negaunee and Marquette by unanimously supporting a resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors at its July session requesting that the Michigan Highway Department construct a four lane thruway between the communities.

In brief discussions held prior to adoption of the resolution, it was pointed out that the Negaunee Council had previously made a request of the state department, regarding this matter. Mayor Fred Harris indicated that the initial proposal for a four-lane highway had originated in the Negaunee Council chambers and that the governing body had already sent a resolution to the highway commissioner requesting that the road when built be four lanes.

It was recalled that this action was taken in the fall of 1952, at which time the council not only passed a resolution but sponsored circulation of petitions drawn up by City Attorney Aaron Lowenstein requesting the four lanes. The petitions were signed by hundreds of local residents and forwarded to the state highway department.

In other business on the agenda, the council accepted the monthly financial report of the manager, and communications from the city librarian, Michigan Automobile Club, and office of civil defense; authorized Neal Corry, municipal defense commander, to attend a mass meeting on defense conducted by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense at Marquette or 35 at Iron Mountain; and accepted the monthly reports of department heads.

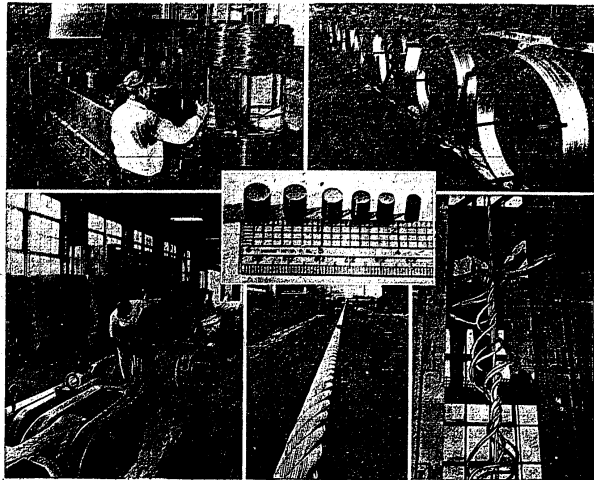

## MACKINAC BRIDGE WIRE AND ROPE IN THE MAKING



It's going to take fifteen thousand leagues of wire to bridge the straits of Mackinac. Highly specialized techniques and experiments are being drawn from a century of wire-making know-how by American Steel & Wire Division in fabricating the 46,000 miles of wire products for the suspension bridge being built for the Mackinac Bridge Authority there.

Above are sections from that U. S. Steel unit's Treston, W. L. plant, where the steel wire for the two 8,362 foot long main cables as well as for the 368 vertical hanging suspender ropes are being made.

Upper left: On this wire drawing equipment, almost 1,300 feet of special high carbon rods are reduced 70% in diameter and elongated over three times original length in just 1/2 minute.

Upper center: Here are actual axle cross sections of rod and wire showing diameter reductions after each drafting operation. Twice

thousand, nine hundred twenty wires of finished size on right, will make up each main cable.

Upper right: Protective armor of silver bright zinc has been applied to wires to protect them from weather and rust.

Lower left: Taking the stretch out of a suspender rope with 225,000 pounds of pull. This compacts the rope and removes structural instability in the rope will not stretch when installed on the bridge.

Lower center: A clasp of a rope under tension in the plant's "prestressing" beds.

Lower right: Break-testing suspender ropes. Specifications call for each rope to have a catalog strength of 205 tons—the tester adds over 100 additional tons to see how much more the rope will take. (At 320 tons it broke—note that two of the six strands still remain intact.)

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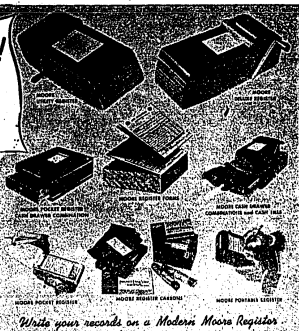

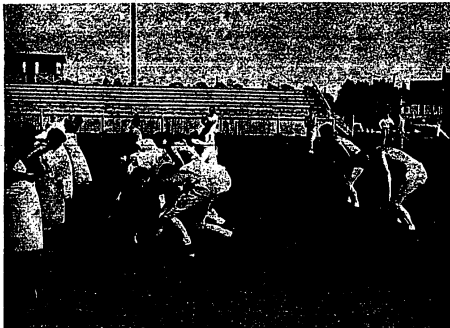

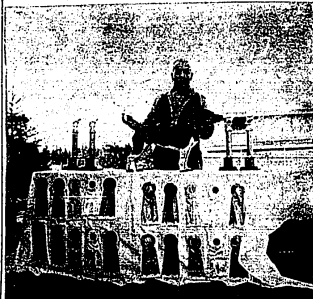
No announcement has been made to date regarding who will coach the reserves this year. Selection of a mentor will probably be made at a special meeting of the Board of Education scheduled Monday night.
