LIFER-ARTIST PAINTS 200th CHRIST SMILE — The "Old-timer," an inmate-artist at Florida's Raiford Prison whose impressions of a "Smiling Christ" are sought by churches throughout the Christian world, completed his 200th painting last week. It will be presented at a revival group by the mayor of Phenix City, Alabama. "I took my first trip to Phenix City," the old artist explained, "and in time I became an acute alcoholic right there. My family shunned me in Columbus, Georgia, right across the river from Phenix City, and in time I hit bottom. Now that the Sin City is cleaned up, I'd feel proud to paint them the same Smiling Christ portraits to replace the

old gambling-salon signs." The old artist, serving life as an habitual criminal after his four-year felony conviction involving liquor with worthless checks, has continuously painted Smiling Christ portraits since the night, five years ago, he dreamed the Lord smiled at him. He gives them without cost to churches and religious groups requesting them. He prefers to remain anonymous on account of his children. In the above photo, Le F. New Course Approved on Trial Basis

Approval has been given by the Negaunee Board of Education to inaugurate a course in auto mechanics on a trial basis for a period of one year, Sept. 2, W. Born announced Thursday.

Arrangements have been completed by the Board to acquire facilities that formerly housed the Bellstrom Garage for the auto mechanics course. The Board had previously considered various ways of remodeling the industrial art building to make room for housing equipment required for the class.

Victor Tolonen, new industrial arts instructor, will teach the course, Sept. Born disclosed. Mr. Tolonen previously set up a similar program at the Manderville High School in Flint.

Addition of auto mechanics to the curriculum is the first step in a gradual expansion designed to install the trace school program in Negaunee. The class will be limited to juniors and seniors with facilities permitting accommodating only 10 students per semester.

Board members have approved extension of the insurance program for all students participating in interscholastic sports to provide them with a full coverage. This is being accomplished by supplementing the Michigan High School Athletic Association plan with the World Travelers Co. policy. Cost of the additional insurance will be defrayed from the athletic fund. Driver training will be instituted in the curriculum again this

year and the contract for providing the car has been awarded E. C. Moore State of Negaunee.

ORGANIZATIONS APPROVE FOUR LANE HIGHWAY

Two local organizations, the NPSA and Lions Club joined with municipal governing bodies and service clubs in Marquette and Negaunee by endorsing resolutions at their meetings this week requesting immediate construction by the Michigan Highway Department of a four lane highway between the two cities.

The resolution adopted by the Business and Professional Association members, who met at the East Main cottage, Mesh Lake follows:

Whereas, the construction of a four lane grade between Marquette and Negaunee, in the County Marquette on US-41 is most complete; and

Whereas, it is planned that construction of a four lane divided highway be completed in the future, when traffic warrants it, and

Whereas, traffic on this part of US-41 has increased considerably this year and increases to double or triple are expected within several years; and

Whereas, considerable savings would be effected by the construction of a four lane divided highway in one contract, rather than doing it piecemeal, Now therefore, be it resolved

that the Negaunee Business and Professional Association urges the Michigan State Highway Department to consider immediate construction of a four-lane divided highway between Negaunee and Marquette to eliminate this bottleneck and insure safety of travel for years to come.

An identical resolution was adopted by the Lions Club with both organizations stipulating that copies of their resolutions be forwarded to Governor G. Mennen Williams and Charles Ziegler, state highway commissioner.

Largest City Blacktop Program In Negaunee History Gets Underway

The largest blacktop program in Negaunee history got underway here yesterday, and, if favorable weather prevails, should be completed in approximately two weeks time, City Manager Gen. E. Meholick Jr., revealed today.

Approved by the City Council at its May meeting, the program for improving selected city streets will involve an expenditure of approximately \$40,000. It is part of a total project that included seal coating of other streets and construction of a new road to the Buffalo Hill location.

Youth Center Head Submits Resignation

Miss Anna Mitchell, director of the Negaunee Youth Center, at the last several years, submitted her resignation at a special meeting of the City Council held last night.

In her letter to the governing body, Miss Mitchell stated her resignation would be effective September 1.

Miss Mitchell has served as director of Youth-Center activities since the project was inaugurated at the old Jackson street school 10 years ago. Under her leadership the program has thrived at the Center was developed and participated by teen boys and girls showed a steady increase.

Seal Coat Completed in Record Time

Following completion of a major seal coating program in the record time of two and one-half days, municipal department of public works employes, under the direction of Supt. Arthur Anderson, this week turned their attention to the blacktop portion of the 1955 summer improvement program.

Completion of the double seal coating program resulted in im-

provement to the following thoroughfares:

Cemetery boulevards, the road in front of the cemetery, Grand and Vine streets, the alley at the rear of Priscoe Street between Baldwin and the Mass Mine road, the North Road from Monday to the city limits, Buffalo Hill location road, Dutch Louisa road from Buffalo Hill location to the Westman farm, one block on Tobin Street, and the road leading from MC-8 to the Jones and Laughlin mine.

All told a distance of approximately eight miles was seal coated by city crews in the two and one-half day period. Materials required included 20,000 gallons of MC-8 road oil and 1-

250 tons of pea rock. Cost of improving the thoroughfares was estimated at \$10,700.

Commenting on the program Friday afternoon, City Manager George E. Mohrke, Jr., commended the public works employes for a splendid job.

Praises Employees

"These employees are to be congratulated for accomplishing this task in such a short period of time," he said. "True, we had a break in the weather and worked until dark, but if we had not received such splendid cooperation from our public works department employees, it would have been impossible to complete those improvements in two and one-half days."

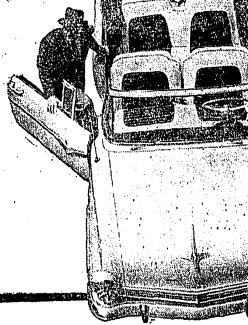
