NEW MANAGER ASSUMES POST HERE DEC. 1

Earl F. Wagner is scheduled to arrive here Thursday, Dec. 1, from Wrayzeta, Minn., to assume his duties as City Manager of Negaunee, post to which he was appointed by the City Council the last week in October.

Wagner, who becomes the third manager here since Negaunee adopted the manager-council form of government in June, 1950, was appointed to succeed George E. Msholik Jr., who resigned to accept a similar position effective Nov. 3, at Marquette.

City Manager at Wrayzeta for the last five years, Wagner is a native of South Bend, Ind., where he attended Central High School. He enrolled at the University of Minnesota, where he received his bachelor of arts degree with a major in political science and his master's of arts, majoring in public administration.

Wagner served in World War II with the Army as a first lieutenant in the tank destroyer Corps.

His wide public service background includes experience as research assistant for the International City Managers Association, visiting lecturer on municipal administration at the University of Denver, the assistant membership at Golden, Colo., membership on the research staff of the Colorado Municipal League, and the manager's post at Wrayzeta.

He is a member of the Lions Club and National Chamber of Commerce. Wagner is 38 years old, married, and has two daughters.

Selection of Wagner as Negaunee's manager was made from a list of 23 candidates, three of whom were called to Negaunee for personal interviews by the Council.

Absent Voters Ballots Are Now Available

Absent voters ballots for the annual municipal election, scheduled for Monday Dec. 5, are now available at the office of City Clerk Jacob H. Anderson, it was announced today.

Residents desiring to obtain absent voters ballots may do so by making application to the city clerk and that ballots must be returned to the Clerk's office not later than 5 p. m. on election day.

Offices to be filled as a result of the December 5 voting include three positions open on the City Council and one on the county board of supervisors.

There are seven entries in the Council race including G. Vance Hilly, incumbent, Andy Wexley, David Gordon, John Bessolo, Frederick Bath, Ernest Ronn and Tom Ross. Three candidates are seeking the seat from Negaunee which is open on the county board. They are Arthur Bockland, incumbent, Richard Salm and Lawrence Campbell.

Voters will also have an opportunity to cast ballots on two proposals on which advisory opinions are being sought by governing bodies. One is the question of whether or not the Council should pass overboard an ultimate bond issue vote by the electorate on the construction of an elevated water storage tank by expanding reservoir tanks for plants, surveys and other preliminary work.

The second is designed to furnish the Board of Education with the feeling of local residents regarding a proposal that the City of Negaunee School District No. One annex school districts in Negaunee and Richmond Townships.

Absent voters ballots for the city proposal may be obtained from the Clerk, and for the annexation question from the Board of Education office in the Negaunee High School.

Advises Air Mail Use For Overseas Christmas Parcels

With the November deadline for use of regular mailing to overseas points already passed, Mrs. Agnes Regan, Negaunee postmaster, this week advised local residents that Christmas packages to boys in service stationed overseas should be sent air mail.

According to information furnished the postmaster, it is still possible to mail packages to overseas destinations and have them arrive there in time for Christmas delivery, provided air mail service is used. Deadline for air mail has been set at December 1.

Attention of persons desiring to use this facility is directed to regulations pertaining to air transportation, which provide a weight limit of two pounds and overall dimensions not in excess of 30 inches.

Mrs. Regan reported that postal officials advise the December air mail deadline should be observed for sending Christmas greeting cards to men in service. Cards mailed after this date will not be guaranteed delivery by the Yule Holiday.

Negaunee's ninth annual Christmas Carnival gets underway here Monday night, with a record number of merchants participating in the event, featuring scores of values for persons who do their holiday shopping in the city this year.

A harpsichord is making a name for itself among students in humanities class popular in universities in Germany for use in humanities classes.

Report Made On Alumni Conference

Negaunee High School graduates appreciated most the high school teacher, who was scholarly, careful in the use of English in recitations and written work, and who made them work, according to a report made by Henning J. Anderson, faculty member, on his recent conference with alumni now attending Northern Michigan College of Education, Marquette.

Anderson's report, submitted to Supr. E. W. Born, pointed out that nearly every alumnus stated it is

following factors should be strongly emphasized in high school English classes, and especially in compulsory English courses for high school seniors who are on going to college:

1. Review grammar by frequent diagramming and oral and written expression; increase the number of themes and papers to be written, checked and rewritten.

2. Development of greater vocabulary and greater consciousness of spelling by all English teachers.

3. Outlining and discussion of good reading as class assignment.

Other recommendations suggested by alumni, who are now enrolled in training by all teachers in the best method or methods of study in all high school subjects; required note-taking of lectures in courses where this type of teaching would be effective, often enough to provide some experience for the college preparatory students; raising the standards of scholarship in all areas of the curriculum, in order to provide a better background for college students.

Anderson reported that his conference showed all Negaunee students, who are now freshmen at Northern, have done a good job of adjusting themselves to college work and life. "However," he said, "I believe attention to factors mentioned would make their adjustment easier and happier, since they should be able to perform on a higher level and earn better marks."

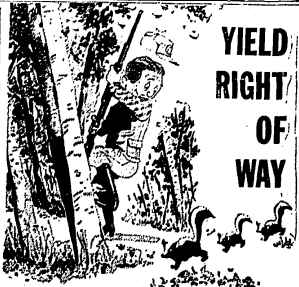

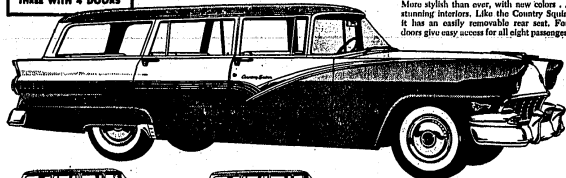

tax supported units once again were able to make reductions in their levies, which should prove a welcome surprise to taxpayers.

This marks the sixth consecutive year since property valuations were set by the state tax commission in 1940 that the levy has been reduced. The peak rate in that year was 22.38 mills.

Members of the Board of Education cut by two mills the levy for retirement of Lakeview School and Memorial Gymnasium bonds, while the city levy declined by a portion of a mill.

Total valuations on which taxes are due is \$20,211,075, which is an increase of \$1,138,010 over a year ago, when the amount was \$19,073,065. This gain in valuation will amount in a boost of revenue of approximately \$48,000 for the three units, city, school and county, which share in the tax returns.

Valuations are set by the city assessor and checked by the board of review, with the exception of mining properties, where the values are determined by the State Geologist.

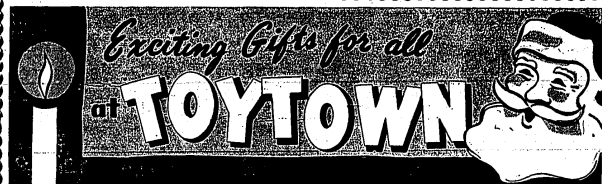

Miners Defeat Subborn Red Devils 67-57 In First Game

Couch Harry Borsari's Negaunee High Basketball team opened its 1925-26 season at Ironwood on Tuesday night with a 67-57 win over the Ironwood Red Devils in a trio of veterans playing an important role in the Maize and Blue victory over a suborn Gogebic Range club.

Roger Jennings, operating in the pivot spot, scored in nine different ways and five free throws for 23 points to pace Negaunee, and was ably supported by Dave Chihard, who hit five times from the court and nine from the free throw line for 18 points. Bobby Herwin, the third veteran, accounted for nine points on three buckets and three shot goals, plus playing an outstanding floor game.

Ironwood with Mayer hitting well from out court, and Newark, cashing in on three fast break opportunities that held the Negaunee defense napping, was in command most of the first half, at one time holding a nine point 26-17 lead.

The Red Devils outscored Negaunee 20-17 in the first period, and held a slim one point scoring margin, 10-9, in the second to leave the floor on the intermission out front 30-28.

Baskets by Jennings and Chihard quickly knotted the count shortly after the opening of the third quarter, but Ironwood refused to panic and regained the lead 22-20 on a field goal by Pol-

jack.
During the first five minutes of the third quarter the teams traded points, and it wasn't until there were two minutes and 40 seconds to play that the Miners went out in front 40-39, and baskets by Leliani and Herman increased the Negaunee margin to 44-39, and at the end of the period the Maize and Blue still enjoyed a five point 48-43 advantage.
