Postmaster Urges Early Yule Mailing

Negaunee residents were urged yesterday by Mrs. Ragan Rgan, local postmaster, to mail Christmas greeting cards and packages early in order to insure delivery not later than Dec. 24.

Volume of early Christmas shopping is holding up volume on a nation-wide basis, and, as a result, postal department officials are advocating use of the mail to speed up delivery of packages, letters and cards, as well as stressing placement of zone numbers on mail sent to metropolitan centers.

"Patrons should allow at least two weeks for a package to go across the United States during the holiday rush," Mrs. Rgan said. "However, by using an airtel post this period can be reduced to four days," she pointed out.

For rush purposes, Mrs. Rgan advocated that patrons use special delivery service, which she emphasized that using special delivery does not guarantee promptness in case of loss or breakage and that it is still necessary to insure or register packages.

There are other ways in which mailing can be facilitated, according to the postmaster, including sending packages in cartons in bundles of 10 or more, sorting cards so that those going to a common destination are grouped together and by checking weight and size of large parcels before presenting them for delivery.

Residents are urged to nake and use tags which will enable this year which were "All Out of Town Delivery" or "All for Local Delivery". These tags can be obtained at the post office.

Post office restrictions pertaining to size of parcels provide that domestic parcels must not have a combined length and girth exceeding 100 inches.

Mrs. Rgan stressed the necessity of patrons checking to be sure their mailings carry sufficient postage. "If people are in doubt regarding weight of articles, they should have them weighed at the window," she said.

Attention of residents was called to the regulation, which provides packages sealed with tape should contain a fourth class sticker, or that they must be sent first class. These are in effect a permit opening of the parcel for postal inspection, if necessary.

Postal regulations also prohibit placing of seals or of Christmas seals on the addressed side of packages and letters.

Regarding mailing of greeting cards, Mrs. Rgan advocated that at least those being sent out of the city go first class, which requires a three cent stamp.

Approval Given Two Advisory Proposals At Election Monday

With 1,287 residents casting their votes in a referendum at year ago, advisory propositions of the City Council and Board of Education were approved, a pair of incumbents returned to office and two new councilmen named in the annual municipal election Monday.

Voters approved by nearly a two to one majority the proposition on which the school board was seeking guidance—whether or not the City of Negaunee School District Number One should annex school districts in Richmond and Neenah Townships.

"By vote prevailed in all of the six precincts with the final tally showing 828 votes in favor of the proposition, while 460 residents were opposed to it.

As a result of the advisory ballot, the board of education is expected at its meeting Dec. 10 to take action on the proposition which is to be divided into two separate districts to become annexed to the city district. JACOBEtti HITS GOP SENATE COMMITTEE FOR FAILURE TO ACT

Rep. Dominic Jacobetti, Negaunee Democrat, Wednesday morning faulted the Republican Senate bloc will not accept any reasonable plan for taking care of mentally retarded children. He blamed the GOP group for failure of the sixth House-Senate Conference committee to reach any agreement.

"Senate leaders," he said, "rejected a proposal by Rep. Harry Bellmon of Michigan that would have simply appropriated \$1,500,000 to be mental health department, and let it decide, in the light of expert opinion, where to direct the bulk of the money."

"It seems to me," the Negaunee Democrat commented, "that Senate Republicans are willing to take nothing except their own program. That program will not provide any substantial relief for the parents of their children from four to six months."

Rep. Phillips and Rep. Louis Mezzano, Wakefield Democrat, were House members on the latest conference committee, which tried to resolve differences between the House and Senate.

The House has been insisting that the program include purchase of the Farmington Mental Hospital on the grounds that, only by the purchase of any considerable number of children be given immediate care. The Senate has indicated a program providing for care of 600 of these children at day hospitals and foster homes. It has unanimously approved purchase of Farmington, and various plans to "leave the hospital have fallen through."

"I'm happy to learn," Jacobetti said, "that the Senate conference committee is offering to be considered for by this method. That, plus their insistence that it be needed for mentally ill at Northville should be turned over to retarded children, were most objectionable to us."

The Department of Mental Health has repeatedly said it cannot find any more places than 100 in private hospital beds, and to provide home care is not a good thing unless and hospitals aren't built. "We've got to have these last year's enough children who have been out of the system for this year."

"I do not ever hear any more of the money 400 have the Senate has been proposing to pay for. And I hope we never hear of a similar proposal to send more children to treatment facilities at Northville. To do that would be to meet one emergency by creating another."

"I don't know what will come of this, but I know I am going to continue to fight. It is the duty of House members to pass a program which will give children the relief we do not get summer, but right now."

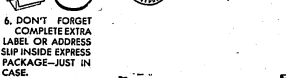


1. Mark "From" and "To" addresses on both top and one side. Crayon direct on wrapping or carton is best.

will be forwarded in case of a change of address. Otherwise in the event letter carriers are unable to deliver them, they go to the dead letter office, she explained.

"I also wish to caution residents against sending money in letters during the holiday season," she stated. "It is a bad practice any time during the year, but particularly during Christmas season. If you are mailing currency as a gift, send checks, money orders or a postal note."

As a result of a new post office ruling adopted in time for Christmas mailing this year, it is now permissible to include personal messages in packages and second class mail, the postmaster revealed. However, the person sending the parcel must still pay the extra postage.

Heretofore, putting a letter inside a package made the sender liable to as much as a \$100 fine. The new arrangement provides that the person mailing the package note on the outside of the parcel that a letter is enclosed and put an additional stamp on the package.

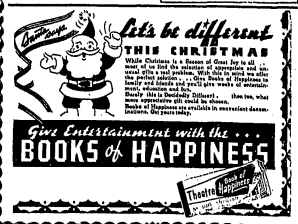

and its population, with consideration of such physical, geographic, social and economic factors as bear directly on the community

recreation program.

The Managing Authority for Recreation. An appraisal of the management of public recreation services together with recommendations for direction as may be needed.

Recreation Areas and Facilities. An inventory and appraisal of publicly owned recreation areas and facilities, indoor and outdoor, and a determination of need for further property acquisitions and developments. This would include a priority arrangement of such developments.

The Community Recreation Program. An inventory and appraisal of recreation services which may be currently offered by the public and major private agencies of the community, together with recommendations for additional services necessary to a balanced year-round program of community recreation. This would include a quantitative inventory and analysis, but no qualitative appraisal nor recommendations with regard to private agency services.

Recreation Personnel. An inventory of the numbers, classifications and general qualifications of the recreation personnel which

may be required to carry out the long range recreation program. Appropriate recommendations will be made regarding desirable policies relative to such recreation leadership.

Recreation consultants making the survey in Negaunee included C. E. Brewer, J. J. Collier and G. Leslie Lorch.



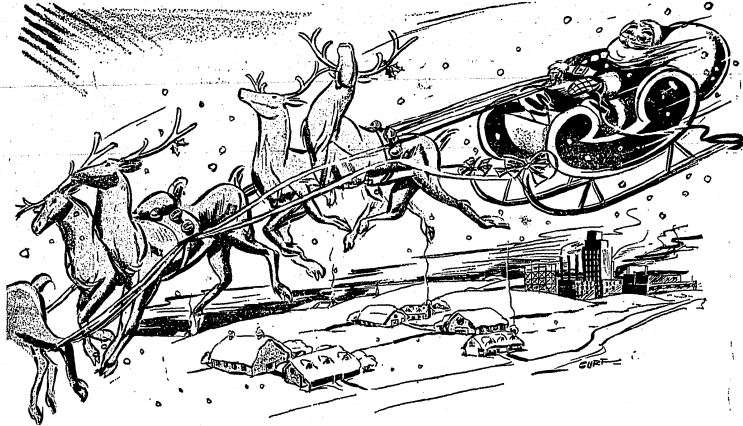

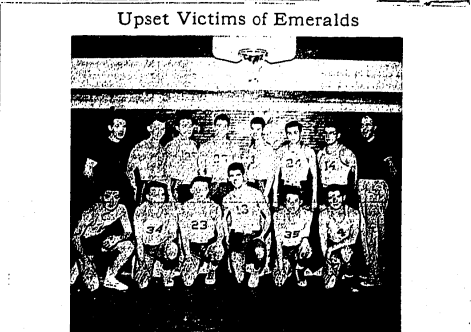
Chief Warns Drivers of Parking Rule

As a result of difficulties encountered by plow crews in clearing city streets following two snowfalls, Chief Arno Finnen this week warned local residents that the overnight parking ban rating is now being enforced.

Emeralds Drop Favored L'Anse From Ranks of Unbeaten 52-47

There's an old adage to the effect that "a team that won't be beat can't be beat."

It is true at Memorial Gymnasium Wednesday night as St. Paul High School came from behind in the last two minutes to hand L'Anse a 52-47 defeat and knock the Hornets from the ranks of undefeated Upper Peninsula scholastic cage teams.

Twice the Emeralds fell behind by better than 10 point spreads, trailing 41-20 near the end of the third quarter, and 43-32 shortly after the final period opened.

But, the Parochials refused to concede defeat, finally knifing the count at 45 all and again at 47, before hitting for five quick points in the last minute and one half to win going away.

Both teams exhibited good defenses and were not hitting on the few good shots that were available in the first quarter, which ended with the score tied at eight all.

In the opening half of the second period they traded points with L'Anse finally going into a slim lead. Then the Hornets hit four quick buckets, three of them by Nate Taylor to level the floor with a 23 edge. L'Anse outscored the Saints 18-16 in the third quarter to widen the gap to nine points, holding a 41-20 lead as the final period opened.

After J. Taylor boosted the margin to 11 points on a defree throw following a foul by Martetti, the Emeralds started to whittle away at the lead. Phil Campin made good on one of two charity tosses and then hit on a jump shot from the foul

circle. Miljour dropped in a 45 degree angle shot from the right side to cut the L'Anse edge to six points. N. Taylor fouled Campin, his fifth personal, and was also charged with a technical as he left the ball game. Campin dropped both of his free throw attempts, but Miljour missed on the technical attempt, and the Emeralds were down four points with the ball in their possession out of bounds at mid-court.

Lesqua dropped in a beautiful shot from the left corner and the Parochials trifled 43-41. Brown drove in for a lay-up to put the Hornets ahead by four points. Baskets by Lesqua and Miljour tied the score at 45 all before Sirard hit on a jump shot to put L'Anse ahead for the last time. Jandron converted one of two charity attempts and Campin hit on a jump shot from the right of the foul circle to put St. Paul out in front 48-47.

Lesqua, fouled by Sirard, hit on both free throws and Campin wound up the scoring by intercepting a L'Anse pass and driving in for a lay-up.

Pacing the L'Anse attack were the Taylor brothers with "J" hitting 19 points and Nate, 15; while Campin and Lesqua led the St. Paul offense with 17 and 15 respectively.

The Parochials in winning remained in the ranks of undefeated clubs and ran their victory string to three straight. St. Paul plays its second game of the week tonight when the Emeralds travel to Republic.

At Champion last Friday night the Emeralds experienced little

difficulty in winning their second game of the season 52-21.

St. Paul took a 10-4 first period lead and increased the margin to 12 points at the half, holding a 27-15 edge. In the last two periods, the Parochials continued to widen the gap, despite the fact Coach Dick Pelton used his starting five sparingly.

Red Lesqua hit seven times from the field and added five charity tosses in six attempts to take scoring honors with 19 points, while Tony Miljour hit 14 on four baskets and six free throws.
