Final Rites Held Here Monday For Mrs. Rose Maas

One of Negaunee's most prominent residents, Mrs. Rose Maas, died following a long illness at her home last Saturday morning.

Mrs. Maas was the widow of George J. Maas, one of Negaunee's early mining executives, who developed the Maas mine, a property which has been one of the city's most consistent iron ore producers. Mr. Maas later transferred the property to the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company.

Mrs. Maas was born May 4, 1871 in Milwaukee and came to Negaunee in 1901, after her marriage to Mr. Maas, and has resided here since then. She was a member of St. Paul's Catholic Church and its Altar Society. Prior to her illness she had been active in the Negaunee Women's Club and the Wawonowin Golf Club.

Survivors include one son, William G. Winicko, Ill., and two sisters, Mrs. Camille Maas and Miss Ida Sues, both of Milwaukee; two grandchildren, Peter and Karen, Winnetka.

Funeral services were held at 10 Monday morning in St. Paul's Church, the Rev. Robert Condy officiating. Burial was made in Negaunee Cemetery.

North Of The Straits

GLADSTONE — A barrage of telephone calls and personal protests against the greatly increased school tax levy brought quick action from the board of education. At a special meeting, the board voted to refund an un-audited portion of the increase to those who had already paid, and to issue new bills at the reduced rate to those who have not paid.

A. Hanna Co. If Iron County succeeds in meeting its goal, approximately \$60,000 for building costs will come from National Guard allocations and other sources.

Recreation Commission, Superintendent Advocated By National Association

Negaunee should have a recreation and park commission, plus a trained and competent superintendent of parks and recreation, according to a report of the National Recreation Association, based on a survey made here last summer, which has been presented to the City Council and Board of Education.

Members of the municipal and school governing bodies have copies of the report in their hands for study and starting in January will hold a series of joint meetings to determine what portions of the plan laid out by the Association can be placed in effect here.

Major recommendations, which the survey states "should be acted upon at once," are as follows:

1. That a Recreation and Park Commission of five leading citizens be established as provided for by the suggested ordinance.
2. That the first major business of the new commission be the appointment of a trained and competent executive with the title of Superintendent of Recreation and Parks.
3. That about 36 acres of vacant land adjoining the Lakesview School site be acquired, and that this area, plus the present school site, be planned as a school playground to include a playground, high school athletic field, community playfield and park.
4. That the city and Board of Education cooperate in building an addition to the Lakesview School as a community recreation center to meet all of the indoor recreation

needs of the people, including special requirements for youth.

5. That the "Recreation and Park Board and the Board of Education draw up a written agreement providing for the equitable use of the space and responsibility in the acquisition, development and maintenance of recreation areas, in the building of a recreation center, and in the operation of a recreation program."
6. That the recreation program be "broadened in scope" and strengthened in every way, in order that the recreation interests of all ages may be reached, and that a program of indoor and outdoor activities be provided for the fall, winter and spring, as soon as possible.

Major recommendations need in importance, which should be acted upon as soon as possible, according to the report, include the following:

1. That a park area be acquired in a proper location within the city limits and large enough to bring the total recreation and park area to at least 75 acres, that a forest reservation of at least 100 acres, including a lake if possible, be situated just outside the city limits, and that in either case facilities for passive recreation for the winter season be provided.
2. That the area now leased for baseball or softball continue to be used for such purposes as long as leased, but that small scattered sites not be provided except where they are of a size and location that target sites are not available.
3. That the Recreation and Park Board collaborate with the Board of Education in the planning of all future school buildings, in order that the indoor recreation needs will be adequately met and each building will be a school-

recreation center;

4. That a major summer playground be conducted at the Lakesview School site when the addition of land is secured and the site is properly developed, that a minor playground program be conducted at Jackson Park, and another one at the triangular area in the northeast part of the city, if found desirable and necessary.

5. That greater emphasis be given to music, arts, and crafts, and social recreation in planning the program, and to providing activities for women and girls, young adults and older adults.

6. That the Superintendent of Recreation and Parks be given sufficient freedom to select staff members who measure up as nearly as possible to the highest standards.

7. That all or at least the major recreation areas be designed by a competent landscape architect who is experienced in the planning of recreation areas.

According to the study, a recreation program is important to Negaunee for the following reasons:

It provides wholesome and constructive activities for the leisure time of the people.

It gives assurance that children can play in safety.

It is a medium for character building. Participants learn to obey the rules of the game, to cooperate and become good team members, thereby developing attributes of character which are so needed in adult life and in work.

It gives an opportunity for parents, children and team-agers to participate in clean, wholesome activities, which tend to offset the influence that often lead to delinquencies.

It stimulates intellectual growth. It attracts new business. Industry always considers what the community provides in recreation, when selecting a new location.

It is now considered an essential function of city government.

The following proposition is made by the National Recreation

Association relative to the organization and functioning of the Recreation and Park Commission:

1. Members of the commission should be carefully selected, mature citizens, who are leaders in the community, but not paid or elected public officials, who are imbued with the desire to make Negaunee a better place in which to live, and who are free to give time and thought to the work of the commission.

2. The commission should have the responsibility of selecting a superintendent of recreation and parks, with the approval of the Board of Education and City Council, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Civil Service Commission.

3. The commission should adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of the recreation and park program. These rules and regulations should be, in a sense, the by-laws governing their activities and their relationships with the superintendent of recreation and parks and other personnel, with the city manager, council, mayor, superintendent of schools, school board and public.

4. The member starting his last year on the commission might be automatically elected a chairman each year, thereby assuring continuity of the office. The vice chairman might be the member whose term next expires.

5. The commission should keep its own set of books and check monthly with the city treasurer.

6. The commission should clearly define its responsibility in determining policies, not to interfere with the functions of the executive by attempting to dictate how details should be carried out, by interfering with personnel procedures, or by dealing directly in an executive capacity with subordinate workers.

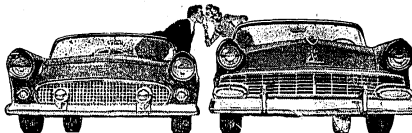
7. The commission should establish an office in the city hall or other place approved by the city manager.

8. At the designated time each year, the commission should present an itemized budget for the next fiscal year to the city manager.

9. The rules and regulations of the commission should include a clause relative to the budget and handling of finances. Public funds should be expended strictly in accord with the rules and regulations of the council. Deficits should not be incurred, nor should contracts be made, unless the money is in the budget.

10. The rules and regulations of the commission should also include rules governing the dates of regular meetings of the commission, attendance at meetings, and preparation of annual reports.

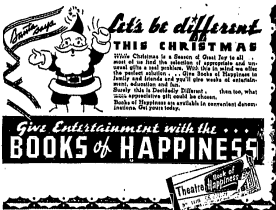

Death Takes Prominent Business Man

Final rites were conducted at 3 p.m., Wednesday, Dec. 7, in Chicago by Rev. E. J. Fishmann for Sam Lowenstein, prominent Negaunee business man, who died suddenly at his home on Monday, December 5. Mr. Lowenstein, a member of a well-known local business family, was a native of Negaunee and graduate of Negaunee High School. He later attended

Michigan College of Mining and Technology at Houghton, where he received two degrees, one in civil engineering and one in electrical engineering.

Following graduation from Michigan Tech he entered the firm of Lowenstein's, which had been founded by his father, the late Joseph Lowenstein, who died in 1928. After his father's death, he entered into partnership with his sisters and operated Lowenstein's Store.

Mr. Lowenstein was a member of Negaunee Lodge 202 F. & A. M., Francis Moore Consistory,

Aimed Temple Shrine, Negaunee Business and Professional Association. He was a member of the first Negaunee Chamber of Commerce, which preceded the present business and professional group, and he was instrumental in bringing a small clothing manufacturing industry to Negaunee.

Survivors include four sisters, Bertha, Rose and Leah, all of Negaunee, and Mrs. Sarah Lowenstein, Plum, Santa Monica, Calif.; and one brother, Aaron, of this city.

Burial was made in Rosemont Cemetery, Chicago.

KNOW YOUR FEET

By DR. WM. M. SCHOLL

Comedians tell almost as many jokes about bunions as they do about mothers-in-law. But those unfortunate persons who suffer from bunions, and there are far too many such people, find nothing humorous about them. Few things can be so extraordinarily painful as a bunion. A bunion, simply defined, is an inflammation and swelling of the "bursa" or fluid-filled sac which encloses the joint. It often is accompanied by a condition called "hallux valgus" or displacement of the bones of the great toe.

This frequently is so severe as to cause the great toe to overtake the second toe.

Primary cause of bunions is that the bones of the joint are not straight. Shoes that are too short, extremely pointed or of any material that force the toe backward and outward whenever pressure is brought to bear on the foot. Other causes are short or pointed stockings, which fall on arches, gait, and rheumatoid arthritis.

First step in the treatment is removal of the cause, or simply the shoes and hose that fit properly. First cases can be remedied by wearing the protective and corrective devices available in drug departments and many shoe stores.

In really severe cases, surgical operation may become necessary. Probably the world's best-known foot specialist, Dr. Scholl is the author of "The Human Foot, Anatomy, Deformities and Treatment."

Finalist of the VFW playing against the Eagles tallied a score of 1205, which is the highest score the Negaunee organization was rechecked in 1931.

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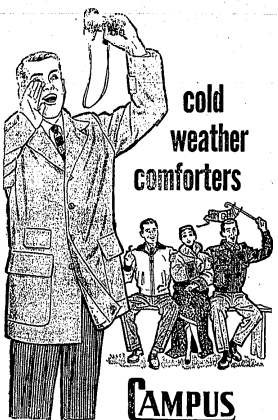
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
