Supt. Ray Beling reported to the White Pine School Board at their Dec. 18th meeting that the local District will lose \$17,244 in State aid monies as a result of the State's budget cut approvals.

The funds will be cut from aids for transportation, reading specialists and special education. Beling stated that this loss of funding means that the White Pine District receives no state aid of any kind. A study will be made to determine how to compensate for the loss of money.

Other action taken at the December meeting included a review of the final copy of the athletic code of conduct and its approval; the nomination of Gary Crocker as the representative from White Pine to the Intermediate school district to sit on the County Allocation Board; approval for the Superintendent to attend the Mid-Winter School Administrators conference; discussion of the flouride rinse program proposed by the Western U.P. Health Department for students in the second, fifth and eighth grades; and approval for use of the school for two days during the Christmas recess to accommodate a youth group as requested by the White Pine Community Church; also, approval was given for a student work program trainee.



These classes are <u>college</u> level classes and are offered through the Gogebic Community College in Ironwood.



FOREST GRANTS RECEIVED BY MICHIGAN

Fifty-five Michigan counties are receiving grants in excess of 270 thousand dollars, through legislative appropriation from the Department of Natural Resources to fulfill tax-aid requirements for privately owned commercial forest lands.

Private holdings covering 1,083,090 acres are involved through enrollment in Michigan's Commercial Forest Program.

The state payments are made at a rate of 25 cents an acre and supplement those made by the landowners. Under the terms of the law, land placed in the Commercial Forest Program is not subject to general property taxes. Instead, landowners pay the local governmental unit 15 cents an acre and the additional 25 cents per acre is paid by the state.

When timber products are eventually harvested, the owner pays the state a fixed percentage of its value. All commercial forest lands are open to public hunting and fishing, and are managed solely for timber production.

Upper Peninsula counties received the largest grants. Amount of grant and acreage involved for the counties is as follows:

Iron, 192,980, \$48,245; Gogebic, 147,383, \$36,846; Baraga, 134,598, \$33,649; Marquette, \$29,787; Ontonagon, \$18,505; Menominee, \$17,605; Delta, \$15,497; Dickinson, \$14,328; Chippewa, \$12,717; Schoolcraft, \$9,992.



COUNTIES RECEIVE DNR PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF LAND TAXES

Over \$1.9 million has been mailed to 81 Michigan counties by the Department of Natural Resources as payment in lieu of taxes on 3.5 million acres of state owned land.

Appropriated by the Michigan Legislature, the state pays 54 cents per acre directly to county treasurers, who in turn prorate the funds on to local school districts and townships.

Thirty-seven per cent of the funds are allocated by law to school districts, while counties and townships each receive about 31.5 per cent of the total.

Payments which amounted to about \$1.75 million in 1974, cover "tax reverted recreation and forest lands under control and supervision of the DNR and any and all other lands held by the DNR, except certain lands purchased for natural resources purposes, according to legislative action.

Within the next few weeks the state will supplement these payments by funding counties with approximately \$2.6 million, covering DNR lands throughout Michigan that were purchased after 1933. These later taxaid grants are scaled to prevailing local millage rates.

Ontonagon county with 33,572.40 acres qualifying will receive a payment of \$18,129.10.

COUNTY ONE OF TWENTY-NINE IN STATE TO QUALIFY FOR SNOW AID

Recording more than 80 inches of snow during the 1974-75 winter has qualified Ontonagon County as one of 29 counties out of the 83 in the state to receive snow-removal funds. The funds come from state gas and weight taxes.

Receiving the largest apportionment of funds was Keewenaw County, which will receive \$33,463 as a result of its 224.3 inches of snowfall last year. Baraga County was second highest with 199.6 inches and a payment of \$87,198.

Ontonagon and Houghton counties tied for third position with snowfalls of 193.4 and 193.2 inches respectively. Their shares will be \$98,661 for Ontonagon County and \$153,012 for Houghton County. The difference in payments between the two is a result of total road mileage in each county.

In all, \$1,840,820 will be divided between the 29 qualifying counties.

MANY SOURCES OF BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO VETERANS

The Veterans Administration is the primary Federal agency serving former members of the nation's armed forces but there are a number of veterans' benefits and services available from other government sources.

The director of the Detroit VA office, Frank J. Kilcullen, Jr., lists the following benefits available to qualified veterans and their families.

FHA Home Mortgage Insurance up to a maximum of \$45,000. A minimum cash investment is required: 10 per cent of the dwelling's value between \$25,000 and \$35,000, and 15 per cent of the value above \$35,000. The maximum interest rate is 9 per cent plus a mortgage insurance premium of one-half of one per cent.

A government guarantee of the premiums and interest due on eligible commercial life insurance policies not exceeding \$10,000 in any individual case for two years after discharge.

Unlimited commissary and post exchange privileges for honorably discharged veterans with 100% service-connected disability, their dependents and unmarried widows.

Supervised credit and management advice and loans for housing in rural areas or in towns of up to 10,000 population may be obtained from the Agriculture Department's Farmers Home Administration.

Preference in Federal Civil Service employment, including points added to passing scores in competitive examinations, waivers of physical requirements, restriction of certain jobs to veterans, preference for retention in case of reduction of force, and similar advantageous procedures for veterans, their unmarried widows and mothers of deceased veterans.

Preference in referral to training programs in private or public schools and for on-the-job training.

Small Business Administration assistance, including loan guarantees and management assistance designed to encourage veterans in owning and operating a variety of small businesses.

Social Security credits toward monthly retirement, disability and survivors benefits are available to qualified veterans and their families.

Veterans or their dependents should check with their VA office concerning their eligibility for non-VA benefits and assistance in applying for them.

FOOD STAMP GUIDE AVAILABLE FROM USDA
If you've heard that the Food Stamp
Program can help you stretch your food
dollar but don't know just how the program works or whether you might qualify
the U.S. Department of Agriculture has
a new publication that gives a complete
guide to this program.

For a free copy of the Food Stamp Program write to Consumer Information Center, Dept. 75, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

Included in the booklet is the following information:

Purchase food stamps by paying a sum of money based on family income. Then receive food stamps that are worth more than the money they cost. Spend food stamps like money at authorized food stores.

To find out if one meets regular eligibility standards for food stamps, the head of the household should go to the local welfare office. Take along papers that show the following: Where one lives; how many are in the household and how much money is received each month; how much the household is paying for doctor's bills and rent.

When the household is certified, the welfare office tells how much will have to be payed for food stamps, how many stamps will be received, and if you or members of your household must register for work. The total amount of food stamps received depends on how many people are in the household.

How do you use food stamps? Well, anyone in the household can take the food stamp book to an authorized food store and use the stamps like money to buy food. Food stamps may be used to buy almost any food or seeds or plants to grow food for your own use. They cannot be used to purchase liquor, beer, cigarettes, soap or nonfood items.

Persons 60 years old and over who receive food stamps and are physically handicapped or cannot prepare all of their meals can use food stamps to purchase meals delivered to the home.

"SNOWSHOE TRAILS & BEAVER TALES"

For the devotee of the sport of snowmobiling, one of the most enjoyable activities is a group ride at night.

Taking a nocturnal journey results in a change in atmosphere. The same old trails become magically transformed into a new riding experience. Add the moon, brightly shimmering stars, frosty breath, stillness of the air and it sums up to an invigorating evening of many moods.

Family riding or club safaris are

Family riding or club safaris are eagerly anticipated highlights of the season. Whether the event is scheduled well in advance or through impromptu planning, night riders are headed for the best of times. Most such ventures last several hours if the kids are along and some have been known to extend to daybreak. There's no need to hurry anywhere special because the chief objective is to ride at a pace that keeps everyone together.

Sometimes there is a planned stop for a campfire, warm drinks or just a brief rest. Some groups plan a special stop and pre-arrange firewood or shelter. Food, supplies and necessary equipment can be stocked in advance or towed along in a cutter. Those nightime campfire gatherings will be remembered long after the snow trickles away with the change of seasons.

The snowmobile experts suggest a few sensible rules for that jaunt through the dark, however.

Be sure that lighting systems are in top condition. Adequate trail lighting by headlight will keep you out of trouble. Don't outrun the limits of your lights. Good rear lighting is essential to keep the group together. It's also recommended that each rider try to keep the sled behind within sight to avoid separation of the group. Carry a flashlight and spare batteries.

Nighttime adventures are not the exclusive good fortune of the snowmobiler however. Cross-country skiis, snowshoes, or just an ordinary pair of warmly booted feet can carry an individual or a party on a wonderful, long-to-be-remembered trip over the snow. In fact, one of the more un-usual New Year's Eve celebrations we heard of was accomplished in just this way: Ingredients were simple! Four compatible people, four pair of cross-country skiis, a desire to welcome in the New Year in a special way, climaxed around a bonfire...complete with roasting hotdogs & a bottle of liquid comfort!
