WINTER REVIEWS UNDERWAY BY SCS
The Soil Conservation Service uses
the winter season to plan and begin
its conservation plan reviews

its conservation plan reviews.
Thomas Immonen, District Conservationist and David Newkirk, Soil Conservationist, will visit as many district cooperators as time permits.

During these visits, last year's accomplishments will be reviewed with the land owner. Visits will provide an opportunity to air problems and questions the individual may have regarding Soil Conservation Service. Also, planning of next year's practices will be discussed.

In the case of significant changes in management or acreage, the conservation plan will be revised by the S.C.S. This plan includes aerial planning maps, soil maps with the descriptions of each soil type and recommended practrices and treatments for sound soil and water conservation.

Any person or group, cooperator or non-cooperator alike, desiring these services are welcome to contact the Soil Conservation Service on any facet of the service. The field office in Ontonagon serves both Ontonagon and Gogebic counties.

WUPDHD TALLIES DISEASE INCIDENCE

There was a "fairly substantial" outbreak of chicken pox in the Western Upper Peninsula late this past fall, according to a report from the Western U.P. District Health Department.

Dr. Kenneth Towe, the department director, said the district has had five cases as of the week ending Jan. 2.

He noted, too, that it is more usual to have chicken pox occur in the spring but that the incidence elsewhere in the state has also occurred this past fall and is also a little more than last year. There is no vaccine for chicken pox.

There was also an increase in measles in the district in 1975, compared to the previous year. But there is none going around now he noted. The 1975 outbreaks which were of some size occurred mainly in the Watersmeet area and Baraga County.

Rowe said the measles vaccine is ineffective in five of every 100 persons
and that the cases seen in 1975 were
among people who a) are now in their
teens and had never been innoculated,
b) were innoculated when very young,
10 to 12 years ago or more, and have
apparently outgrown the immunization,
c) those in whom the vaccine fails to
work.

On the brighter side of the ledger said Rowe, it was an excellent year for German measles or rather the absence of it. There were only 13 cases of it in the five-county area so it is reasonable to assume that the vaccine, has pretty much eliminated it as a serious problem.

The incidence of mumps is also down over that of a year ago and this he attributes to the introduction of a mumps vaccine in the past several years.

There was one case of whooping cough and none of diptheria or tetanus.

Venereal disease, meanwhile, continues to slowly, but steadily, increase in incidence.

There were 23 reported cases of gonnorhea, compared to 14 to 15 in the previous year. Three cases of syphilis were reported in the district. The director said that his department has reason to believe that for each reported case of venereal disease, another case goes unreported, though doctors are required to report to the de-

partment every case of VD treated. He said that 90% of the cases are in the under-25 age group in the Western U.P., while state-wide the age group is 15-19.

For comparison's sake, said Rowe, Genesee County had 30 reported cases of gonnorhea last week alone, more than were reported for the entire Western U.P. all year. For the year, Genesee had 2,800 cases reported.

He added, however, that there is the consideration of a great difference in population density between the two.

CHANGING TAX STRUCTURE SERIES CONTINUES AT ONTONAGON AREA HIGH SCHOOL

"Our Changing Tax Structure", second in the series of tax structure study, will be led by Dr. Alvin House, Michigan State University professor and extension specialist in economics at 7 p.m., Tuesday, January 27, at the Ontonagon Area High School.

Dr. House will discuss our dynamic tax structure and help us understand how rebates, sales taxes, income tax and property tax are interrelated; how changes in one affect another; and how each change affects us..the citizen.

The session is open to all interested persons without charge, according to Aune Nelson, Extension Home Economist for Ontonagon and Gogebic counties.



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MEDICARE PATIENTS WON'T FACE HIGHER HOSPITAL COSTS

Medicare patients with Michigan Blue Cross-Blue Shield "complementary coverage" won't be faced with higher hospital deductible and coinsurance costs in 1976.

Deductible and coinsurance costs are the patient's out-of-pocket expenses required under the federal government's Medicare program.

Starting Jan. 1,1976, the government increased the deductible for inpatient hospital care from \$92 to \$104. At the same time, the coinsurance charge for the 61st to the 90th day of hospitalization (per benefit period) will increase from \$23 a day to \$26 a day.

The deductible and coinsurance are both paid under the Blue Cross-Blue Shield complementary coverage.

Shield complementary coverage.

Approximately 950,000 persons in Michigan are covered by Medicare and about 60% have Blue Cross-Blue Shield complementary coverage.

The government also increased the coinsurance liability for Medicare skilled nursing facilities. The patient's expense will increase from \$11.50 a day to \$13 a day for the 21st through the 100th day of care.

Persons with Blue Cross-Blue Shield complementary coverage which includes benefits for skilled nursing facilities will have the coinsurance paid under the Blue Cross-Blue Shield policy.

Medicare was introduced in 1966 as part of the Social Security Act. It was designed for persons 65 and older and the disabled.

The latest changes affect the "Part A" portion of Medicare---basic coverage for hospital, post-hospital and nursing home care, plus diagnostic services, home care and psychiatric hospital care.

Part A is automatically available to persons who reach age 65. There is no cost for this portion of the benefit. "Part B" is a supplement which pri-

marily covers physician and medical services. This benefit supplements home care and covers diagnostic tests, surgical dressings, ambulance service, and the rental of medical equipment. It's optional and can be purchased for about seven dollars a month.

Blue Cross-Blue Shield offers complementary coverage for either or both benefits (Part A or Part B).

UPCCAS BOARD SELECTS NEW CHAIRMAN

William G. Lepthien of Escanaba was selected as the new chairman of Upper Peninsula Citizens Concerned About Sanguine (UPCCAS) at the board meeting held on December 18, 1975. Lepthien replaces David Lori of Iron Moun-

tain, who has been chairman since the inception of UPCCAS in 1973.

Lepthien retired from the Air Force in 1973, after 21 years of service. He and his family reside at 429 South 8th Street in Escanaba. His two younger children are students at Escanaba Area High School. Two older children are college students, one at Northern Michigan University and the other at the University of Wisconsin, Green Bay. His wife, Katherine, is active in the League of Women Voters.

Lepthien entered the Air Force in 1952, upon graduation from the United States Naval Academy. Most of his career was devoted to duty in the Strategic Air Command, several years as Radar Navigator on B-52 aircraft and the last ten years in Air Force Civil Engineering. He was the Base Civil Engineer at K.I. Sawyer A.F.B. for three years.

Retiring Chairman, David Lori, commented that it is necessary for UPCCAS to increase its efforts at this point to prevent the Navy from locating Seafarer in the Upper Peninsula. Lori stated: "It is necessary that a chairman be available on a full-time basis. UPCCAS can no longer be a part-time organization. We are glad to have Bill Lepthien available."

Lori commented further: "I am firmly opposed to the Sanguine/Seafarer project and will remain on the Board of Directors of UPCCAS. I can only hope that our increased efforts will demonstrate to Governor Milliken that he is not representing the wishes of the people of this area."

"We should participate in the business of government, not only in the limited sense of electing officials and reacting to measures submitted for referendum, but also in finding the goals for the common good and for living a servicable life...."
