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SEAFARER CORRIDOR ANALYSIS IS RELEASED

Houghton - During a briefing on Project Seafarer for Houghton County Commissioners at their recent meeting, Capt. Charles Pollack, Seafarer project director, released a map outlining the proposed Upper Peninsula cable lay-out for the antenna grid.

Pollack said that because it is now estimated that 2,400 miles of cable will be needed for the antenna an area of approximately 4,000 square miles will be required to lay the cables in a checkerboard pattern. All or parts of Marquette, Baraga, Iron, Dickinson and Menominee counties are included in the grid.

Spokesmen for People Against Sanguine/Seafarer pointed out that the 2,400 mile figure given for cable length represents a 20% increase over the figure given in Capt. Pollack's May visit to the Upper Peninsula and that the May figure was double the previous estimates. At that time the required grid area was estimated to be 3,500 square miles.

HIGH RIDERS 4-H HORSE CLUB WILL SPONSOR RIDE FOR RESEARCH

High Riders Family 4-H Horse Club of Ewen, Michigan, will sponsor a 10-mile horseback ride on Saturday, September 11, in conjunction with the second annual Ride For Research, a project of the Morris Animal Foundation, Denver, Colorado.

The 10-mile trek will begin at Sunny Side Inn in Agate Falls and end at Bond Falls. Posts will be at William Kananen Corner, Jarvi's Farm and Lundwall's Camp.

Ride for Research is an event designed to bring horsemen together for a day of enjoyment while benefiting horses everywhere. Participants obtain sponsors who pledge funds for each mile ridden. The money is used by the Morris Animal Foundation, a public, non-profit foundation, to fund scientific studies at veterinary schools into health problems of horses.

Actor James Brolin, co-star of the television series *Marcus Welby, M.D.*, and star of the new movie *"Gable & Lombard"* is the national chairman of the 1976 Ride for Research. Brolin raises Appaloosas for the show ring and race track on his 230-acre ranch near Paso Robles, California.

The 1975 Ride for Research involved over 2,000 riders from 28 states, and raised more than \$36,000. Proceeds from the 1975 Ride for Research are financing studies of equine colic, the leading killer of mature horses, at Cornell University and the University of Pennsylvania.

The High Riders Family 4-H Horse Club was one of the 86 groups participating in last year's Ride for Research. They collected \$533 and 17 cents from their sponsors.

TROOPER KITZMAN RECEIVES AWARD

Michigan State Police Trooper Thomas W. Kitzman, formerly of Matchwood Township, has recently been commended by the Department of State Police Board of Awards for his successful investigation into a series of property crimes in Wayne and Monroe Counties. Together with another State Police Trooper, Kitzman was commended by the Department of State Police for "services characterized by outstanding ability, alertness, and devotion to duty in their diligent investigation of vandalism, larceny, cruelty to animals, and other crimes in Wayne and Monroe Counties in the fall of 1975."

In the recommendation submitted to Colonel George Halverson, Director of State Police, Trooper Kitzman was particularly commended for diligent investigation which finally broke the case through his work with contacting reluctant witnesses and obtaining written statements from suspects. Trooper Kitzman was also reported to have worked many hours of his own time, beyond his regular shift of duty, in solving these cases. Convictions and imprisonment at Jackson prison resulted from the investigations.

Al Taro of Greenland, formerly a Deputy with the Ontonagon County Sheriff's Department under Sheriff Donald Powelson, initially advised and trained both Trooper Kitzman and present Deputy Jerry Kitzman.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE CONTINUES TO INVADE WESTERN UPPER PENINSULA

The past two years have seen a rapid increase in the spread of Dutch elm disease in the western Upper Peninsula, according to M. K. Lauritsen, Supervisor of the Ottawa National Forest. Samples taken from dying elm by the U.S. Forest Service have confirmed the disease in the Ironwood-Wakefield area, also along the Presque Isle River from Marenisco to M-28, Military Hill and Bruce Crossing area, Kenton and Prickett Lake west of L'Anse.

Special control efforts to stop the spread of the disease in woodlands is not practical. Current policy on National Forest lands is to include in timber sales all elm sawtimber and pulpwood products the markets will accept.

"The Ottawa National Forest is currently formulating a short-term action plan with the intent of salvaging those stands where elm is a major component," Lauritsen said. Priorities and scheduling will be largely dependent on the wood-using industries ability to absorb and market this material in the next few years.

Lauritsen stated that the Ottawa National Forest's most recent volume estimates indicate that approximately 70 million board feet of elm sawtimber and 142,000 cords of pulpwood products are included as a part of the growing stock. It is urgent that these "raw materials" be utilized for man's fullest consumption and use before mortality and deterioration occurs.

The disease spreads rapidly along lowland and river drainages where elm is concentrated. The culprit is a bark beetle that carries the disease from infected to healthy trees. The disease is also spread by the summertime shipment of infected logs and pulpwood which probably accounts for its rapid introduction into new areas. By 1980 most elm stands in the western U.P. are expected to contain the disease.

There is much more hope of controlling the disease in cities and towns. An active sanitation and removal program to remove diseased trees will limit the increase in beetle populations. Also, new chemicals show promise of saving both healthy and diseased trees if applied in a timely manner. A community-wide effort is necessary.

**ONTONAGON MAN CHAIRMAN GOGEBIC-
ONTONAGON COMMUNITY ACTION GROUP**

An Ontonagon man has been selected as chairman of the Gogebic-Ontonagon Community Action Agency, and three Gogebic county residents named to the other offices of the agency at its election held last week.

Allen R. Briggs, an attorney, was named chairman of the organization following several years of participation in the activities of the organization, which is dedicated to providing services to the less affluent citizens of the two-county area.

Michael Semenak, an Ironwood city councilman, was named vice president, and Mrs. Marjorie Osterman was selected as secretary of the organization. Lawrence Peterson will be the organization's treasurer for the coming year.

Esther Geroux, of Bergland, was also named to serve on the executive board of the agency.

The Gogebic-Ontonagon Community Action Agency is one of 29 such agencies in the State of Michigan, and operates the Head Start program, senior citizens nutrition program, SELLS tourist guide program, Adult and Youth Work Experience programs, and a program for winterizing homes of the disadvantaged, as well as numerous other programs throughout the two-county area.

Thomas Vizanko of Ironwood continues to serve as executive director of the organization.

The organization has a governing body consisting of 27 persons, 18 from Gogebic County, and 9 from Ontonagon County, consisting of 1/3 representing the poor, 1/3 from a cross-section of the community, and 1/3 public officials. In addition, the agency is guided by its executive board of nine persons, including the four officers, Mrs. Geroux, Fortunato Del Pra, John Fitzgerald, Mrs. Anton Raykovich, and Ontonagon County Commissioner John Strancel of Bergland.

IRON RIVER YCC CREW WORK ON SKI TRAIL

Construction and maintenance of a cross-country ski trail at Lake Ottawa is one of the many projects set up for the non-resident Youth Conservation Corps crew at Iron River according to Dist. Ranger Orville Lind. These young men and women, ages 15 through 18, report to the Iron River District headquarters of the Ottawa National Forest every morning, Monday through Friday, as non-resident enrollees of the YCC.

The trail system these YCC'ers are working on is about 3.5 miles long. About half of it will be improved this summer. The work consists of widening the present hiking trail system to allow for use by skiers. In some places, that are not suitable for winter use, new trail sections are being built.

One of the benefits of this work is the experience provided to the YCC'ers in the proper and safe use of many tools. A side-benefit is that the trees being cut will be available for use as firewood at the nearby Lake Ottawa campground.

"The feeling of accomplishment the YCC'ers get will be reinforced many times in future years when they revisit the area," stated Ranger Lind. "Also, the YCC program provides manpower to do projects that could not ordinarily be done," he continued.

Non-resident YCC programs are carried on at all Ranger Districts of the Ottawa National Forest.

CANDIDATE WICKER ISSUES COMPLETE PERSONAL FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE

Charles Wicker, a candidate for State Representative for the 110th District, kept his first campaign promise by making a complete financial disclosure of both his and his wife's personal income, assets and debts at a recent fundraiser held in Hancock.

During the evening, Wicker reported a total family income of \$24,969 that included a salary of \$24,843 as Executive Director for the Michigan Education Association's Region 18-A, a Midland Coop dividend of \$41, and a home-grown vegetable sales by the children of \$85.

The Wickers listed property assets in terms of State Equalized Valuation as follows: a 100.25 acre farm valued at \$13,676; Mrs. Wicker's grandparents' homestead being purchased, valued at \$8,850; a 1975 Chevrolet 1/2 ton pickup truck and a 1972 Chevrolet Vega. They also have \$800 coming from the sale of property in Laurium. Wicker stated they have no stocks, bonds, savings or other investments other than \$25,000 of life insurance through Northwestern Mutual Life and \$10,000 of government life insurance through the Veterans Administration.

Wicker listed his debts as: \$2,200 owed on the truck, \$4,500 owed on the 50.25 acre homestead being purchased, \$4,121 owed on life insurance policy loans and \$424 annual life insurance payments.

Mingling with Democratic supporters of all ages, Wicker said he was "pleased with the turnout" at the event which raised the contribution to date to \$477 - a bit short of the \$12,000+ the incumbent has raised. Those in attendance seemed pleased too, not only with the refreshments, but also with the Wicker's financial disclosure. "It should be done by every politician" noted one observer, "now I'm wondering if Rusty Hellman will follow suit." Wicker is opposing Hellman in the Democratic primary on Aug. 3.

NON-SUPPORT SUBJECT AT SOCIAL SERVICES BOARD MEETING

At the regular Social Services Board Meeting on July 19, 1976, the Ontonagon members held a discussion on obtaining support from absent parents. The Friend of the Court, Robert Seid, informed the Board members that there are currently 52 Support Orders in effect in Ontonagon County and that about 15 to 20 of these are currently paying support. Investigations are being made to bring current information to bear on the approximately 27 unpaid orders. The Support Specialist, Kenneth La Berge, of the Department of Social Services, reported to the Board members the actions he contemplates taking to obtain support from the absent parent in all current and newly processed ADC cases in Ontonagon County. The Board members were pleased to learn that in so far as it is locally possible, child support is being paid into the State Department to defray some of the taxpayers' expenditures for the ADC program.

OUTDOOR REPORT - By J. Magnuson, MDNR

Even though we did get some rain in the past week, the pattern of high temperatures, low humidities, and some strong winds has remained the same for the past several weeks. The weather has been excellent for all kinds of outdoor recreation, but most people would gladly give up a couple days or so in favor of a good, soaking rain. Not only are people hoping for rain, but lawns, gardens, forests, and fields all need the benefit of an extended rainfall to renew the green of leaf and needle that has been missing for quite a while.

The local TV station recently added the fire danger rating to their weather report and it has been showing some results. Several people have asked me how the rating system works and what the various rating terms mean. Most of the questions came from friends of mine who knew I was involved in computing the daily report. As more people get a better idea of what the various terms mean, the inclusion of the daily danger rating in the weather report will be a valuable fire prevention tool because of the number of people it can reach.

Again, most of the activity on the inland lakes is concerned with finding some means of keeping cool instead of fishing. A few dedicated fishermen are still looking for some walleyes in the late evening and early dark hours and some others have managed to find some spots for perch and crappies. Bond Falls Basin again topped the list of lakes where some fair to good success could be found for all three species mentioned. Inland lake fishing should improve if and when we get a good rainfall.

Fishing on the inland streams is very poor, particularly the brook trout streams. Some fishermen are taking brown trout on flies on the Middle Branch of the Ontonagon River and Paulding Pond, but these streams still have a fair amount of water in them to work with. A few scattered reports of brook trout were received, but you have to be very knowledgeable about your fishing areas to take any fish.

High winds on a couple days last week cut down on the fishing activity on Lake Superior and when any number of boats were able to get out, however, the success was at least fair. The lake trout appear to be heading for deeper water at this time and most trolling was done in depths of 90 feet or more. Some lake trout in the 10 to 18 pound range were taken in the west end of the District last week, but most of the fish were running from 4 to 8 pounds. In past weeks the lake trout fishermen in the west end were taking a good number of coho salmon and rainbow trout along with the lake trout, but this slacked off sharply last week.

A moose of un-determined sex and size was seen about three miles south of Watersmeet in the past week. Tracks on a sand road verified the sighting, but it would have been better had the animal been more cooperative and allowed a longer look at him, or her, or it.

About 30 Canada geese have been visiting the Baraga area for about a week. They have found the south end of L'Anse Bay to be a good place to dine. Quite a few people have been feeding the birds and they are now at the stage where the birds will take food out of their hands. When the winds build up some waves on the Bay, the geese just move across the highway to feed on the natural foods in the quiet sloughs. Traffic on the highway skirting the shore doesn't bother the geese, nor do the number of people there to feed them or to take pictures.

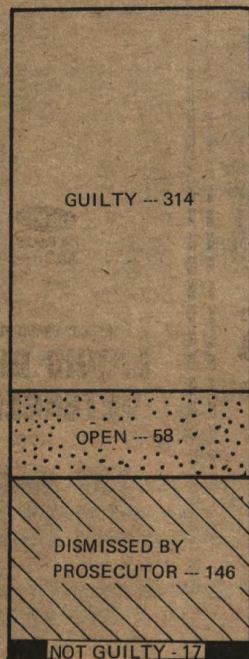

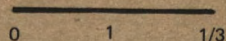

WELL KNOWN SCULPTOR'S WORKS TO BE EXHIBITED AT MINERAL RIVER PLAZA

Frederick Aman, northern Wisconsin sculptor who specializes in wildlife sculptures cast in bronze, will hold a one-man show at the Mineral River Plaza, White Pine, on August 5th and 6th.

The exhibit of Fred Aman's works will be held in the lobby of the Citizens State Bank in White Pine.

Hours of the show will be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the 5th and from 9 to 3 p.m. on the 6th.

Mr. Aman began doing sculpture about twenty years ago as a pastime, using clay as his sculpting medium. Gradually he progressed to model making for plaster then to wax sculpting for bronze and porcelain. Some wax pieces are cast direct but most are reproduced in molds for limited editions numbering ten to twenty. The molds are then retired and each purchaser is given a certificate of authenticity.

Aman is now doing the entire bronze process himself, including the design, original sculpture, moldmaking, replica in wax, spruing, investing, burn out, casting, chasing, welding, grinding, applying the patina, attaching the base and inscription. Except for the crucibles and pyrometer, he has made all the foundry equipment himself -- making his works truly original.

Aman points out that these bronze works are practically indestructible and can be enjoyed by handling as well as viewing. They are also not subject to deterioration as are most other art forms.

During recent months Mr. Aman has exhibited his work in the Wustum Museum of Fine Art in Racine, Wisconsin; at Nicolet College in Rhinelander, Wisconsin; and at the Lee LeBlanc Wildlife Art Gallery in Minocqua, Wisconsin.

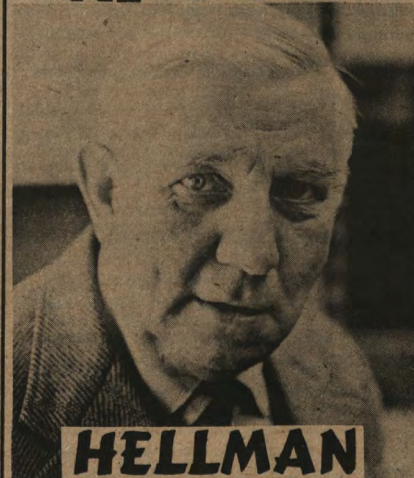
