deep, so that the accurate number of bodies interred at these places cannot be determined. The belief that the actual number of Union soldiers who died in Confederate hands exceeds the number shown by the annexed table. By reference thereto it will be seen that the cause of death in 12,121 cases is not of record in this office. Future investigations will probably, to a certain extent, elicit the cause, and thus diminish the number appearing under that head. A corresponding increase of other classifications would naturally follow. It is, however, fair to assume that the aggregate result will not hereafter be materially altered.

The period represented by the phrase "during the late war," in the caption of the latter embraces, in the case of the Regular Army, the time comprehended between April 15, 1861, and August 1, 1865. For the volunteers of all descriptions, it covers the period from date of muster in to the date of muster

of each organization, excluding prisoners of war who died after the discharge of their commands. These, so far as known, are counted. The greater portion of the volunteer army was disbanded during the summer and fall of 1865, but the subsequent gradual reduction of the force was not fully consummated until late in 1867. The last white organization was disbanded November 18, 1867, and the last colored regiment December 30, 1867. The last officer of the volunteer general staff was mustered out July 1, 1868.

CASUALTIES OF THE CIVIL WAR.

SHOWING A GRAND TOTAL OF 359,496.

We have elsewhere alluded to the following letter and the table of statistics accompanying it, which explain themselves. They are a most valuable contribution to our military records.

A. G. O., WASHINGTON, May 22, 1885.
 Brig. Gen. R. C. Drum, Adjutant-General U. S. Army.

Sir: I have the honor to report the completion of the statistical statement of deaths in the U. S. Army, during the late war, compiled in obedience to your order of June 2, 1884. In the prosecution of the work the records of this office affording information upon the subject have been thoroughly and carefully examined. The table herewith submitted exhibits the result. The aggregate military within the Union lines, as shown thereon, is the nearest approximation to the real loss now attainable. With the deaths occurring among prisoners of war the case is different. Unfortunately the records of Southern prisoners in possession of the Department are very incomplete. In fact, the death registers of some of the principal places of confinement for Union soldiers, have not been secured. Notably among these are the following: Americus, Ga.; Atlanta, Ga.; Augusta, Ga.; Camp Ford, Tyler, Texas; Camp Ogethorpe, Macon, Ga.; Charleston, S. C.; Lynchburg, Va.; Marietta, Ga.; Mobile, Ala.; Montgomery, Ala.; Savannah, Ga., and Shreveport, La. Besides these, only partial records were obtained from the following named important prisons: Cahawba, Ala.; Camp Asylum, Columbia, S. C.; Florence, S. C.; Miller, Ga., and Salisbury, N. C. It is true that evidence of death was often communicated to the proper military authorities by surviving comrades, and the report of burials in National Cemeteries, or "Roll of Honor," supplies a large number, but these sources of information, together with the Confederate Records, obtained by the Government, have proved greatly deficient. As to the imperfections of the interment record report prepared in the office of the Quartermaster General in 1869, says: "It is well known that at many places, as for instance, at Salisbury, N. C., and at Florence, S. C., the bodies were buried in trenches, often two, three, sometimes even four

The statisticians of the War are indebted to Brigadier-General R. C. Drum, Adjutant General of the Army, for the most complete record of the casualties of our Civil War which has yet been published or which is likely to be ever published. One year ago, on the 10th of June, 1884, General DRUM

nor any one else, were immediately present with the claimant at the time. The Commissioner holds that as claimant, at a time when his recollection of the date, place and manner of the receipt of said wound must, from the very nature of the disability, have been clear and distinct, repeatedly asserted that the same was received in action with the enemy, and after being informed that the record shows accidental wounding, made oath to a state of facts in direct conflict with his former allegations. He has thrown discredit on his own statements, and as the record and the testimony of his company officers show that the wound was accidentally received, the application is disallowed on the ground that claimant is not shown to have been in the line of duty when said wounding occurred.

Desertion no Forfeiture of Rights Preventively Acquired.

Enlisted in Co. E 67th Pa., March 4, 1862; wounded in action June 16, 1863; mustered out March 5, 1864, to date March 1, 1864; re-enlisted in the veteran volunteers March 3, 1864, in same company and regiment; deserted August 10, 1864, and never rejoined his command.

Held that his discharge from his first enlistment contract perfected his rights thereunder, which were not forfeited by his failure to comply with the terms of a subsequent enlistment.

Held to be a Deserter.

Enlisted in Co. C 28th Mich., Sept. 1, 1864, "Deserted Sept. 20, 1864, at Kalamazoo—supposed to be in Canada." Continued to be a deserter until taken up on the roll for Maryland, June, 1865, when noted present with the remark "reported at Kalamazoo, Mich., under President's Proclamation, April 7, 1865." He remained with his company and was mustered out with it June 5, 1866.

Under date of Oct. 22, 1885, the facts were submitted to the Adjutant-General "for his consideration as to whether the charge of desertion should be removed." Nov. 18, ultimo, the Adjutant-General replied that the "charge of desertion cannot be removed, as it is not considered that the soldier returned from desertion within a reasonable time within the meaning of the Act of Congress approved July 5, 1864."

Held that the War Department has jurisdiction over the question and its judgment is final thereon. The records still showing that this man deserted from the service, his claim for pension will be rejected on that ground.

Withheld During Non-Dependence.

In this case it appears that claimant and her husband were possessed of a small estate valued at about \$1,000 that having sold one-half of it, they deeded the remaining half to one Stafford, in consideration of a life-maintenance of the claimant and her husband by the said Stafford. This contract was entered into June 22, 1858, and the declaration for pension was filed Jan. 4, 1883. While it is not definitely stated, it appears that this contract remained in force until about September, 1883. The question arises as to the right to pension during the period for which maintenance was furnished by Stafford; for the consideration therefor being held by some to have been insufficient.

The Commissioner holds that the insufficiency of the consideration does not enter into the question, so long as the contract was complied with by Stafford; it not appearing that he was bound by duty and affection to assist this claimant, but that the transaction was purely a business one and the pension, if granted, should be withheld during the period of said non-dependence.

Desertion and Subsequent Re-enlistment.

In this case the examination of the evidence shows that Capt. Berry left his command when it was approaching the enemy, being at the time a member of the 2d N. Y. Cav., commanded by Capt. Harris; that for punishment for such an act of desertion (so-called, but really cowardice), he was dishonorably discharged the service Feb. 11, 1863; that subsequently thereto, on the 19th of October, 1863, he re-entered the service of the United States, Captain of Co. G, 10th Pa. Cav., that while in said service and while in line of duty, he received the injury for which he now claims pension. The question presented for consideration is, whether the record of desertion from his command at the moment it was approaching the enemy, and of his subsequent dismissal, so taints the second enlistment as to bring the claimant within the inhibition of law as to pensions to deserters.

In ruling on this point the Commissioner holds the execution of the sentence of his dismissal from the first service was the completion of the punishment for the offense wherewith he was charged; that his admission by the Government into its service for a second term was an independent undertaking; that if the case is otherwise proved, the fact of the record of dismissal from the first service would not destroy his claim to pension arising under the second.

Payment of Attorneys Fees.

Whereas, under the several statutes governing the fees of attorneys in pension claims, and the payment of same by pension agents, of date, and the payment of the Commissioner of Pensions or called for by fee agreements, it has been the practice of pension agents to deduct any sum alleged by claimants to have been paid by them to their attorneys, and

Whereas, such deductions have been made upon the naked statement of claimants as to amount only, without reference to the time or manner of payment or the exhibit by them of evidence of such payment, and

Whereas, these statements made by claimants as to prior payments are often met by denial on the part of the attorneys, and from the loose and irregular prac-

tice in these cases great delay is involved in the equitable adjustment of the questions thus opened before claimants and attorneys, and

Whereas, further, this office has, under the present practice, no method for the preparation of data upon which to base intelligent action in such premises, and appeals are taken, as a matter of course, by which obstructions arise to the public business.

Now then, to remedy the evils, and that justice may be done in the premises, as well to faithful attorneys as to claimants for pension, as well also to relieve this office from the burden of unnecessary correspondence and the appeal docket of a great number of cases.

It is ordered, that from and after the 1st day of January, A. D. 1886, all pension agents whose claimants allege payment by them of any sum or sums to their attorney of record shall request said claimants to make affidavit to the amount of payment, the date of payment, under what certificate made and as far as may be in their recollection how such payment was made, and that the said affidavit shall be in manner and form substantially as the blank form hereto annexed marked exhibit "A," and made a part of this order as though fully incorporated herein, and

It is further ordered, that each and every of such affidavits shall be executed in duplicate, one to be retained by the pension agent as his voucher and authority in the premises for deducting the amount sworn to have been paid, and the duplicate thereof to be promptly forwarded to this office for filing with the record in the claim, wherein such affidavit purports to be made, and

It is further ordered, that where claimants cannot make such affidavits as herein prescribed and set forth, with reasonable certainty, that the pension agent shall pay the fee certified by this office or called for by the fee agreements without deduction. Provided, that if, in the opinion of the pension agent reasonable doubt exists as to the fact of said payment, and yet the said claimant be unable to make such affidavit as herein prescribed, said agent shall certify said case to the Commissioner of Pensions for consideration and decision. (See Sec. 4764 R. S.)

PENSION CLAIM OF FRANKLIN KNAPP, DECEASED—THE WIDOW COMPLETING.

Section 4718 provides upon the death of "any person entitled to a pension having an application therefore pending, * * * his widow * * * shall be entitled to receive the accrued pension to the date of the death of such person. Such accrued pension shall not be considered part of the assets of the estate of the deceased, * * * but shall accrue to the sole and exclusive benefit of the widow or child ren."

By construction, the provisions is held to confer title to the accrued pension upon other than the pensionable relatives of the deceased claimants, viz. upon the wife of one claiming as a dependent father, she not being the mother of the soldier's children of those claiming as dependent, etc. Under this construction it is clear that the beneficiaries under Section 4718, Revised Statutes, take as quasi heirs at law, and not as meritorious assertors of an independent right. It makes a testamentary provision and not one conferring original title. A widow may take under this provision, although not entitled to pension in her own right.

The provision of Section 4705, Revised Statutes, deny a pension to a widow because of her immoral conduct or her abandonment of the soldier's children; her title being held in abeyance during the latter's pensionable minority, when it revives by force of law.

Therefore, upon the death of an invalid claimant entitled to a pension, his widow will become entitled under the provision of section 4718 Revised Statutes, to the pension accrued under the invalid right regardless of any immoral conduct or the abandonment of soldier's children.

Not in Line of Duty.

In this case it appears that the soldier—an artificer in Co. B., U. S. Eng. battery—on the eve of Nov. 3, '66, while in what is styled in the evidence "the post billiard-room," at Willet's Point, N. Y., received injuries from burns incurred through the explosion of a lamp. It is alleged and sought to be proven that his death in 1874 was due to these injuries.

It does not appear whether the billiard room where the accident occurred was maintained in whole or in part at the expense of the Government; but the Commissioner does not regard the question as material. The soldier was not at the time engaged in the performance of a military duty, but in the exercise of a privilege; he was there for his own amusement and at his own risk, and the Government was in no wise responsible for the injuries he received under these circumstances.

The claim will be rejected on the ground that the soldier was not in the line of duty when he incurred the injuries alleged to have resulted in his death.

Accrued Pension.

The provisions of Section 4718, Revised Statutes, govern in every case in which the direct beneficiary under a pension certificate has deceased.

Alleges wrong and neglect upon the part of a Pension Office or Pension Agencies do not give use to title not otherwise conferred by law.

The Government is not responsible for the torts or laches of the Pension Agents.

Only One Pension Allowed.

No more than one pension can be allowed to any person. When a claim under the general law has been rejected, and a special act granting a pension to the claimant has subsequently passed, and the

commencement of such a special act pension is fixed, either by its terms or by Section 4720, Revised Statutes, and such determination of "the date is evidence of the legislative intent, that in such case the pension shall not commence at an earlier date, and therefore it is held that the pensioner is not entitled to further relief under the provisions of the general law.

Dependent Parents.

It appears that the soldier was but 19 years old at enlistment, and that he worked at home for his parents up to the date of his enlistment, and that he also sent them money while in service and that such contributions were necessary, the claim will be allowed, deducting for the period the husband was engaged in mercantile business in Fairfeld, from 1855 to 1857.

Claim of Minor Child.

Soldier died Oct. 16, 1874, having claim pending. He had married in 1859, separated from his wife, and she on March 13, 1874, went through the ceremony of marriage with another man, with whom she has lived ever since as his wife. A minor child of the soldier now claims a pension in its own right and also the accrued pension in the invalid claim. The Commissioner decides that when the facts set up in any case, bring it within the operation of the rule deduced by Bishop, 1 Marriage and Divorce, Sec. 1520, as governing the condition arising under the marriage relation with a legal impediment thereto has been removed, in such case there is no period of widowhood entitling the former wife of the soldier either to a pension in her own right or to the accrued pension unpaid in the invalid claim. Where in such case the soldier left a child or children entitled, their pension will commence from the date of the widow's remarriage, which, under the circumstances named, would be the date of the soldier's death. Also such minor child or children will be entitled to receive the accretment of the invalid pension under the provisions of Sec. 4718, R. S.

In Regard to Deserter.

A person enlisted on the 18th day of December, to serve three years in the 11th N. Y. Cav. On July 28, 1863, he deserted from his command. Thereafter, on Aug. 4, 1863, under another name, he enlisted in Co. B, 1st N. Y. Mounted Rifles; again deserted from Camp Parole, Annapolis, Md.

June 2, 1888, a declaration for invalid pension was filed, alleging the incurrence of certain injuries on the 17th of May, 1863.

Under these circumstances, has claimant any standing before the Pension Office to apply for pension?

Ruling.—Where a charge of desertion still exists upon the records of the War Department against an applicant for pension, under these circumstances an applicant has no status before the Pension Office to apply; nor will the Commissioner assume jurisdiction in such a case. (See Decision appeal of John Myers, Vol. 12, p. 123, Commissioner's Ruling, Sept. 4, 1885.)

Where there are two distinct terms of service and the disability for which pension is sought is incurred in the completed term, perfected by discharge or the execution of a sentence imposed by a court of competent jurisdiction, a legal status is established and the application will be recognized, and jurisdiction assumed by the Commissioner of Pensions. (Commissioner's Ruling in re Hafie Kimball; Commissioner's Ruling in re Jefferson Fox, No. 276,743; Commissioner's Ruling in re Benj. C. Berry, 363,670.) A contract of enlistment cannot be a valid contract where it is made in defiance of law. The present 29th Article of War; United States R. S., page 230, old Article number 22 U. S. Stat. at large, Vol. 2, page 358, provides as follows:

"No non-commissioned officer or soldier shall enlist himself in any other regiment, troop or company, without a regular discharge from the regiment, troop, or company in which he last served, on the penalty of being reputed a deserter, and suffering accordingly."

"And in case any officer shall knowingly receive and entertain such non-commissioned officer or soldier, or shall not, after his being discovered to be a deserter, immediately confine him and give notice thereof to the corps in which he last served: the said officer shall, by court-martial, be cashiered." (Signed) JOHN C. BLAKE, Commissioner of Pensions.

Pensions Decisions.

Dishonors of Dismissal Removed.

No. 231,615—Widow of Silas J. Garnett, Captain, Co. K, 118th Ill.

The record shows that the officer was, on June 1, '63, summarily and dishonorably dismissed the service for rendering false and fraudulent accounts against the Government. On March 3, 1865, the disability to re-enter the service resulting from such dismissal was removed by competent authority, upon satisfactory explanation of the charges.

Dishonorable discharge is a bar to pension; but in this case the Commissioner holds that the removal of incapacity to re-enter the service, by competent authority and apt time, substantially relieved the officer from the onus of this dismissal and removed in him all right to pension, which he might have had if honorably discharged.

The claim being otherwise established, will be allowed.

Discredited His Own Statements.

John O'Connor, Jr., Co. 3, 10th N. Y., claim for loss of right index finger from gunshot wound. The original declarations (one informal and the other formal) distinctly set forth that said wound was received in a skirmish with the enemy at Calliet's Station shortly before the second battle of Bull Run. The same statement was made by claimant to the first Examining Surgeon who examined him. The records show, however, that the soldier "accidentally shot off a finger August 25, 1861, and since in hospital."

This was just before the second battle of Bull Run. The claimant, upon being informed that the record was in conflict with his allegations as to the manner in receiving the alleged wound, filed an affidavit setting forth that he was wounded accidentally by the discharge of his own gun while clearing it in a wagon alone. The testimony of the Captain and Lieutenant of the company is also to the effect that the alleged disability was accidentally incurred, although they

NOTE-1. Double rations are allowed by law to the General-in-Chief Commanding the Army of the United States; to each general officer commanding in chief a separate army actually in the field; to each general officer commanding a geographical division embracing one or more geographical departments; and to each officer commanding a military geographical department. [Act August 23, 1842, Sec. 6.] In the above table the rations of the General and Lieutenant General are doubled.

2. Every commissioned officer of the United States Army, including retired officers, is entitled to one additional ration per day for every five years' service. [Act March 2, 1867, Sec. 3.]

3. The rations of surgeons and assistant surgeons are doubled after ten years' continuous service in the same grade. [Act June 30, 1834, Sec. 2.] This is in addition to the longevity rations to which they would otherwise be entitled.

NOTE-4. Subaltern officers, employed on the General Staff, and receiving increased pay therefor, are not entitled to the additional or fourth ration provided by the Act of March 2, 1867, Sec. 2.

5. Officers retired from active service are entitled to the pay proper of the highest staff or regimental rank held at time of retirement and four rations per day. [Act Aug. 7, 1861, Sec. 16.] Officers retired from active service for disability from wounds received in battle, upon the full rank of the command retired pay of that rank or grade. Retired officers assigned to appropriate duty by the President are entitled, while so assigned and employed, to the full pay and emoluments of the grade upon which they may have been retired. [Act July 17, 1862.]

6. Ten dollars additional pay per month is allowed to each "Company officer" in actual command of a company. [Act March 2, 1867, Sec. 2; June 15, 1864, Sec. 1.]

NOTE-7. If a fixed salary has been given by law to any military employe of the government while in active duty, and a defined military rank, either actual or assumed, has also been conferred upon him by law, his rank and not his salary will control his pay on retirement. [Decision of the Second Comptroller of the Treasury, October 13, 1857.] This decision is applicable to all chaplains of the army, holding the military rank of captain of infantry, under the provisions of section 7, act of March 3, 1867, when retired from active service.

8. The forage allowances to mounted officers for their horses are required by law to be drawn in kind from the quartermaster's department; but whenever mounted, because the quartermaster is unable to furnish in kind, the commutation value for each horse actually kept in use and allowed by law is eight dollars per month. [Act April 24, 1816, Sec. 12; July 17, 1862, Sec. 1.]

WHAT MICHIGAN DID.

OVER 15,000 BRAVE SOUS WHO DIED IN THE CIVIL WAR.

From the Michigan War Record, 1899

Norm G. Cooper, now a citizen of Brooklyn, but formerly well known as editor of the Coffee Cooler, in a recent letter to the National Tribune, gave some interesting figures on Michigan's contribution to the civil war. He wrote:

In these times of war and growing over persons it will be well for the young men of to-day to post up on the horrors of war. I have carefully compiled from the book "Michigan in the War" and from "Regimental Losses," by Fox, the facts given herein. The United States credited Michigan with 50,000 soldiers, but it is likely that 50,000 gallant patriots helped to make the name of the state glorious on over 800 occasions where Old Glory needed strong heroes to defend its honor.

It is well also to keep in mind the fact that thousands of martyrs returned home with disease that came to them from the cruel blasts and the frozen bed, and died in early youth; thousands are to be pitied in misery caused by the starvation diet of prison life and thousands are not manufacturing, with a pension and light labor, to keep out of the soldiers' home.

The Grand Army has no desire to shield an unworthy illegal pensioner but it stands firm as a rock in favor of just treatment. We get tired of hearing the pension roll called hard names, and we believe there is still cause for growing. Lead the following record of heroism: I am proud of it although I was not a Michigander:

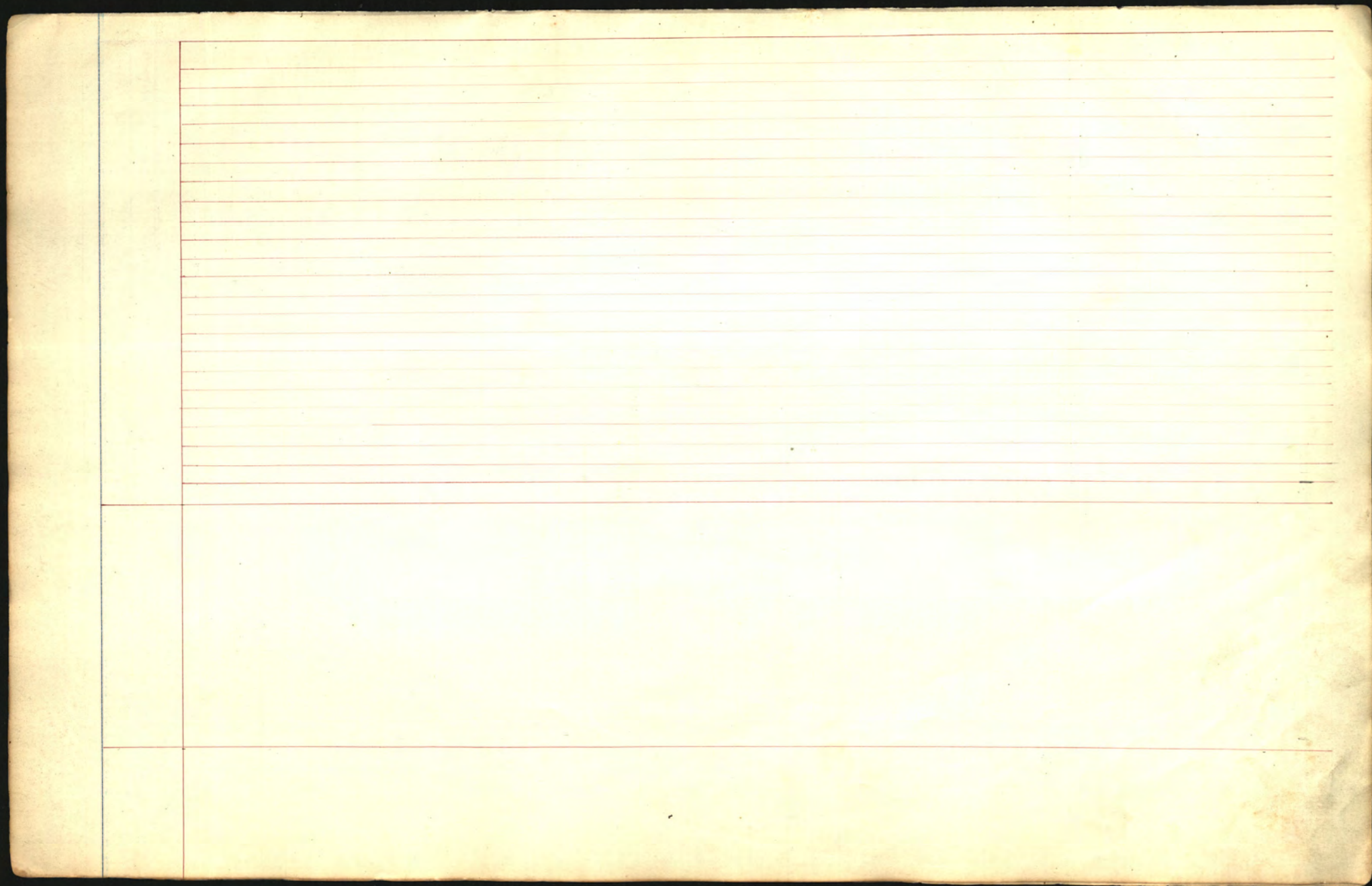

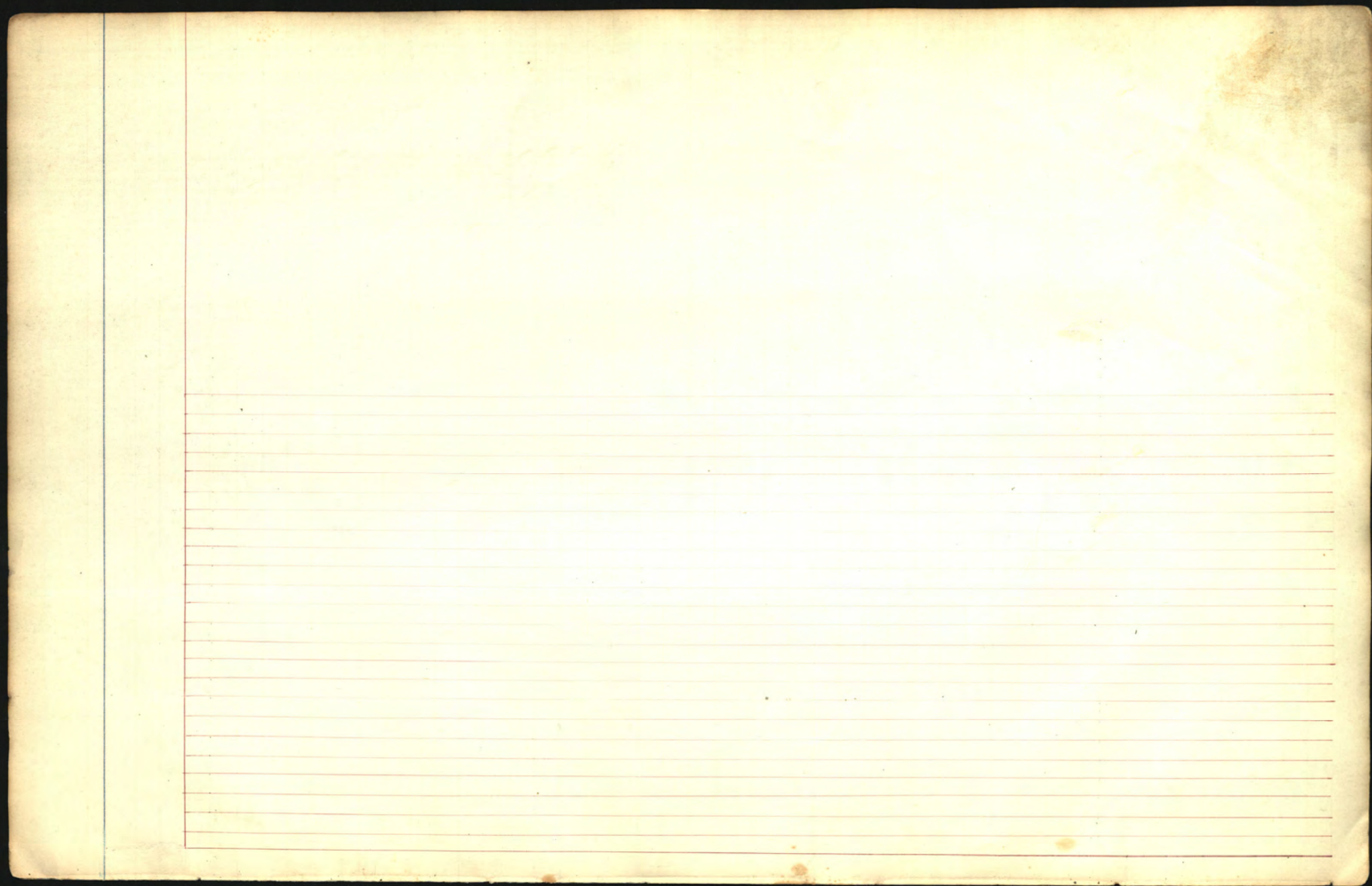

BOUNTY TABLE.

Showing the Bounties Allowed by the General Government to Men who Served in the Volunteer Army during the late War.

In determining the amount of bounty due in any given case, observe first to which class it belongs according to date of enlistment; then to which number according, first, to term for which enlisted; second, length of time actually served, and, third, cause of discharge. Observe also whether anything is said under the head of "exceptions and other conditions," or under the head of "remarks," that seems to have any bearing on the case.

From this table the amount of bounty due every man who enlisted into the volunteer service almost without exception can be determined. If any doubt whether they have received the amount it shows to be due them they should investigate the matter. As a general rule, the bounty of soldiers who died in the service was payable to their heirs.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT, MICHIGAN,

Lansing, Feb. 18, 1887.

To the Speaker of the House of Representatives:

SIR—In compliance with the resolution of the house of the 16th instant, requesting a statement as to whether the legislature or the executive of this state did during the years 1862, 1863, 1864 or 1865, make certain promises to pay certain bounties to parties who would enlist in the Union army, but failed to fulfill their promise.

I have the honor to make the following statement:

A careful examination of the orders and letters on file in this office, and also of the laws, fail to show that there were any promises made, either by the legislature or executive of the state, to pay a state bounty to soldiers enlisting in 1861 and 1862, nor at any other time except as follows:

That on March 6, 1863, an act was approved to take immediate effect, authorizing the governor in his discretion to pay from that date a uniform bounty of not exceeding fifty dollars to each volunteer, including veterans, who might enlist and be mustered in the service of the United States in any regiment, battery, or company heretofore mustered from this state into the military service of the United States, or then organizing in this state for such service: *Provided*, That no such bounty should be paid to any person enlisted previous to the time when the act should take effect.

The quartermaster general of the state to pay to each volunteer mustered into the service as aforesaid, as soon thereafter as practicable, such bounty as the governor should have directed to be paid.

That on February 5, 1864, an act was approved authorizing the payment of one hundred dollars to soldiers, including veterans, who should thereafter enlist and should be mustered into the military or naval service of the United States, and be credited on the quota of the state, or any military district thereof, under any call or order of the president or military authorities of the United States, or of this state, made or issued since the first day of January 1864: *Providing*, that none of the bounties provided for in the act should be paid to any volunteer, being a resident of this state at the time of enlisting, who should be credited to any sub-district, township or ward, other than that in which he was enrolled, or, if not enrolled, where he resided at the time of enlistment.

The payment of this bounty was continued until May 14, 1864, when the appropriation became exhausted and the payment thereof was stopped by virtue of the following published order of the governor:

GENERAL ORDERS, {
No. 3. MILITARY DEPARTMENT, MICHIGAN,
ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,
Lansing, May 14th, 1864. }

The bounty heretofore paid by the state to men enlisting in Michigan regiments, batteries or companies, or in any arm of the regular service, is hereby discontinued from this date, except as to those re-enlisting as veterans in the field after having served two years, and who are properly credited to the state, to whom it will continue to be paid until further orders.

By order of the commander-in-chief.

JOHN ROBERTSON,
Adjutant General.

This order was reinforced by the issue of a proclamation by the governor dated July 21, 1864, of which the following is an extract.

"As an inducement to enlist, the government of the United States will pay a bounty of one hundred dollars to recruits enlisting for one year, two hundred for those enlisting for two years, and three hundred for those enlisting for three years. Such local bounties will be paid as the people of the several towns, wards, and sub-districts may authorize in pursuance of law. No State bounty can be paid, for the reason that the appropriation made for that purpose is exhausted.

The number of men enlisting between May 14, 1864, the date of the foregoing order, and February 4, 1865, the date of the next act granting bounty, was 9,085.

And that on February 4, 1865, an act was approved authorizing the payment of one hundred and fifty dollars to each volunteer who should thereafter enlist and be properly credited upon the quota assigned to any military sub-district of this State.

By the committee on military affairs: *March 6, 1891*
The committee on military affairs to whom was referred the following resolution:

WHEREAS, During our late civil war several calls were made upon the people of this State by the authorities thereof for volunteers, coupled with various offers and promises of bounty to encourage enlistments; and
WHEREAS, Our citizens nobly responded to those urgent appeals, and by

their bravery upon the field and fortitude in trials and privations, won the admiration of the whole country; and

WHEREAS, It appears that a large portion of said bounties has never been paid to said volunteers; therefore be it
Resolved, That justice to our gallant soldiers, who survive, and to the wives and children of those who have passed away, demands that these sums be paid without further delay; therefore

Resolved, That the Quartermaster General, the Adjutant General, the State Treasurer and the Secretary of State, be hereby requested to give such information as belongs to their several departments pertaining to the number of men enlisted under said offers of bounties, the number to whom such bounties have been paid, the amount, if any, remaining in the treasury belonging to said bounty funds, and what causes, if any, can be shown why such bounties have not long since been paid to those suffering soldiers or their heirs.

Respectfully report that they have had the same under consideration, and have directed me to report the same back to the Senate, with the accompanying substitute therefor:

Resolved, That the Quartermaster General and Adjutant General are hereby requested to give such information as possessed by their respective departments regarding the number of men enlisted under the several acts of this State providing bounties for volunteers; the number so enlisted to whom bounties were paid; the number so enlisting to whom no bounties have been paid;

Resolved, That the Board of State Auditors are requested to inform the Senate what reason, if any exists why unpaid claims for enlistment bounties should not be considered and adjusted by them.

Recommending that the substitute be concurred in and that the substitute do pass, and ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

From the Quartermaster General's report it appears that 18,580 men received State bounty.

From a report of the Adjutant General dated Lansing, May 3, 1883, to the Senate, it appears that 9,085 men enlisted between May 15, 1864, and February 3, 1865, who did not receive the State bounty.

It is found that a large proportion of those enlisting during the years 1864-5 are not entitled to the bounty for reason of not being credited to the place of residence. The soldier taking advantage of the fact of larger local bounty being paid in other localities than at his place of residence.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit to you the following statement, relative to a claim which I deem it my duty herein to make on the Government, on behalf of the officers and enlisted men of the 1st Regiment Michigan Cavalry, recently mustered out of the U. S. service in Utah.

The Regiment referred to was composed of officers and men of the 1st, 6th and 7th Cavalry, then serving on the plains, consolidated under orders of Major General Pope, commanding the department of the Missouri, dated Sept. 1st, 1865; without, as it appears, authority from the War Department. The consolidation was carried into effect by Major General Dodge, commanding U. S. forces in Kansas and the Territories, under his order dated September 17th, 1865.

General Pope's order directed that only the men of these Regiments having two years or over to serve, should be consolidated. General Dodge ordered that all the men whose term of service would not expire before February 1st, 1866, be included in the consolidation, and they were so included, and in consequence thereof, twelve hundred and sixteen officers and men were retained in service, who should have been discharged under General Pope's order.

A circular was issued from the War Department, dated November 25th, 1865, directing the enlisted men of the 1st, 6th and 7th Regiments Michigan Cavalry, having less than two years to serve, to be discharged, but for some unexplained cause, they were not.

The consolidated Regiment was sent to Utah, where it remained until March 10th, 1866, when it was mustered out; but before the muster out was authorized by the War Department, a proposition is stated to have been submitted to the men, to either accept an immediate discharge and payment in Utah, or remain two months longer in service, and then be marched across the plains to Fort Leavenworth, a distance of over twelve hundred miles, without horses or tents. It appears that under this inducement, all the men of the Regiment except ninety seven, accepted the proposition, and were mustered out and paid in Utah.

Such a proposition must be considered as an improper one, and should not have been presented to them under the circumstances, having been wrongfully held in service for over six months, and not being aware of what their allowance of pay would be in consequence of such acceptance.

In their payment they only received commutation of mileage and subsistence, which only gave each about \$115 to bear their expenses to their homes, and that in consequence of the great distance they had to travel, and the exorbitant rates charged for everything on their route, it cost each of them over three hundred dollars to reach this State.

In consequence of the non-compliance with the order of General Pope, these men were not only compelled to serve six months more than they should have done, but they have been subjected to unreasonable hardship and pecuniary loss of over two hundred dollars each, necessarily expended by them for transportation, that should have been provided by the Government.

I therefore, in view of all the facts and circumstances connected with their case, most respectfully but urgently ask that an allowance as commutation of transportation be ordered paid to these officers and men so mustered out and paid in Utah; and that the amount, if allowed, shall not be less than that represented to have been paid by them on that account.

I enclose you herewith a report of the Adjutant General of the State containing a full statement of the matter, and embodying all the official documents and other papers in relation thereto, to which I most respectfully invite your attention.

In conclusion, I beg leave to assure you that the misusage of these men is much regretted by me, and I would be much gratified on seeing justice done them. It has created much sympathy for them throughout the State, and has justly engendered much dissatisfaction with those who have been instrumental in bringing it about, and a strong feeling prevails generally that officers who act so regardless of orders and the interest and welfare of men who have suffered every hardship and periled their lives for the country in its recent struggle for national existence, should not escape punishment or public reprimand, officially and severely administered.

BOUNTY TABLE

Showing the Bounties Allowed by the General Government to Men who Served in the Volunteer Army during the late War.

In determining the amount of bounty due in any given case, observe first to which class it belongs according to date of enlistment; then to which number according, first, to term for which enlisted; second, length of time actually served, and, third, cause of discharge. Observe also whether anything is said under the head of "exceptions and other conditions," or under the head of "remarks," that seems to have any bearing on the case.

From this table the amount of bounty due every man who enlisted into the volunteer service almost without exception can be determined. If any doubt whether they have received the amount it shows to be due them they should investigate the matter. As a general rule, the bounty of soldiers who died in the service was payable to their heirs.

quently thereto, was actually enlisted and employed in the army or navy of the United States, his services therein shall, in the administration of such homestead laws, be construed to be equivalent to all intents and purposes, to a residence for the same length of time upon the tract so entered. And if his entry has been cancelled by reason of his absence from such tract while in the military or naval service of the United States, and such tract has not been disposed of his entry shall be restored; but if such tract has been disposed of, the party may enter another tract subject to entry under homestead laws, and his right to a patent therefor may be determined by the proofs touching his residence and cultivation of the first tract and his absence therefrom in such service.

*SEC. 2309. Every soldier, sailor, marine, officer, or other person coming within the provisions of section 2304, may as well by an agent as in person, enter upon such homestead by filing a declaratory statement, as in pre-emption cases; but such claimant in person shall within the time prescribed make actual entry, commence settlement and improvements on the same, and thereafter fulfill all the requirements of law.

BOUNTY NOTES.

THE Bounty referred to in class "A" (see bounty table) is not payable to heirs under any circumstances.

MEN discharged for promotion are held to have forfeited all bounty except the accrued installments, in cases in which it was payable by installments.

MEN enlisted after July 5, 1862, and up to December 24, 1863, were paid \$25 advance bounty. Under the law, if discharged, before serving two years, for any cause except wounds or mechanical injuries the balance of their bounty was not payable. For a time Paymasters understood this law to authorize them to deduct the advance bounty from the final pay in such cases. This practice was improper and the \$25 so deducted can be again secured upon proper application.

THE Additional bounty Act of July 28, 1866, provides for additional bounty only to those two year and three year men who had previously received or were entitled to receive \$100 bounty and no more for any and all service. It is held, however, that it does not go to those who receive \$100 bounty under class "A," as per bounty table.

OTHER peculiar rulings are made under this additional bounty law. A soldier enlisted in 1861 and was discharged in 1862 because of wounds. He received his "original" \$100 bounty and had he never reentered the service would have been entitled to the "additional." He reenlisted in December, 1863, and received the \$25 advance bounty which, however, was subsequently deducted from his pay because of his promotion to Lieutenant. He claimed the additional bounty on the first service on the ground that he had received but \$100, but it was refused him, the Department holding that the \$25, advance bounty, paid him at time of second enlistment was voluntarily surrendered by him in order that he might accept promotion, and that such surrender could not be regarded as warranting the conclusion that it had never been received.

THE bounties of deceased soldiers are payable to the following heirs in the order of precedence in which they are named: The widow, the children, the father, the mother, and the brothers and sisters of the whole or half blood jointly. Exceptions to this rule are found in case of the Additional bounty Act of July 28, 1866, which is payable to the widow if she had not remarried before the act passed, to the children if they were minors at the date the act passed, to the father and mother jointly and not to the brothers and sisters in any event. The bounty paid for enlistments after July 18, 1864, (see class "E" bounty table,) is payable in full only to the widow, the minor children or the mother if she was a widow when the soldier died. If no such heirs exist the children over age, the remarried mother or the father may claim the accrued installments of the bounty only.

In all cases, except of widows and children of the soldier, the bounty is forfeited if the heir was a resident of a foreign country at the time of the soldier's death. In such event the bounty may be collected by the next heir who did reside in this country.

MEN serving in the regular army upon enlistments made before the war commenced are entitled to no bounty.

MEN who enlisted in the regular army between April 12, 1861, and July 1, 1861, and who served two years or were discharged for wounds could not claim the original bounty but are entitled to the Additional bounty, Act July 28, 1866.
