J. D. Pierce Rooms Are Rearranged This Year

Dr. Dewey And Dr. Goltry Write Work Book For Teachers

Those students at Northern who are gaining practice in elementary school teaching at John D. Pierce will be using a guidebook which has been written especially for their benefit.

Work on the original guidebook began in 1931 and the book is now in its second revision. The book is, on the part of both authors, the result of more than twelve years of experience as directors of education in various colleges.

GLIDER PILOTS JOIN NAVY MEN IN NEW CLASS

Twenty-two Army And Eleven Navy Aviators Begin

A new session of Civilian Pilot Training began on September 7 when ten Navy men arrived in Marquette. These men are now completing their fourth week of school.

The program followed by these fliers is a most rigorous one. They attend on the average of five hours of ground school classes a day for six days a week and starting at 5:30 each morning, besides the actual flying which is done seven days a week.

The total of 240 ground school hours will be covered in eight weeks' time. This is exactly double the load being carried by regular college students.

On completion of the course, the Army men will be sent to one of several large gliding schools and some of the Navy men will be sent to Madison, Wisconsin for secondary training and others will go to Iowa University for a ninety day "toughening program."

The faculty for ground school consists of: Mr. Hedgecock who teaches Regulations in addition to being Coordinator; Mr. Wilson, Service of Aircraft; Mr. Stock, Mathematics; Mr. Bottom and Mr. Thoren, Physics; Mr. Parker, Aircraft Identification; Mr. McCollum, Navigation and Meteorology; Mr. Hurst, Physical Training; also Military Science and Discipline; and Mr. Cole, Code.

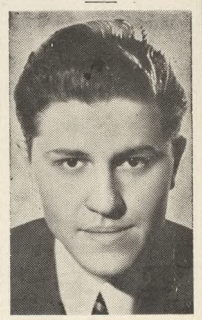
Dance Friday Night Will Arouse Needed Spirit For Game

The school's job in this war will be the chief interest of teachers of the Michigan Education Association's Region Seven, when they convene in Marquette Thursday, October 8, for the annual two-day Regional Conference.

Programs for the Region's 2,404 teacher-members will include addresses by a famed woman diplomat and a radio commentator with deep understanding of the world situation. Sessions will be held at Northern Michigan College of Education.

Region Seven embraces all the counties of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Ruth Bryan Owen Rohde and Dr. Richard Struna are the featured speakers for General Sessions of the Conference, and there will be, as well, division and section speakers and programs of wide professional interest.

"New Horizons for Victory" is to be the title of Mrs. Rohde's address, and Dr. Struna has chosen "I Saw the Gestapo Work" as the subject of his comments.

A. J. Phillips, executive secretary of the Michigan Education Association, and G. Robert Koopman, assistant superintendent of public instruction, will likewise address General Sessions.

Enrollment will be at Northern Michigan College of Education, starting at 8:00 a. m. Thursday, October 8.

The Gravenet High School band, directed by Martin Johnston, and the Northern Michigan College of Education Girls' Glee Club, in charge of Ruth Craig, will provide the music for the General Session programs. Three division programs, twenty-three section meetings, and three topic-discussion groups are scheduled for Region Seven.

Dr. Richard Struna, director of the rural education department, State Teachers College, Buffalo, on the subject "The Rural Schools in the Emergency," Dolores Olson, Kingsford Schools, Iron Mountain, will serve as chairman for the Elementary group, while Ed Johnson, principal, Grand Marais High School, performs a similar function for the Rural part of the division meeting.

For the High School division, Clifford Erickson, professor of education, Northwestern University, will discuss "The Role of the Teacher during the War." The division will be chairmanned by Edward Edick, principal, Senior High School, Escanaba.

Mrs. James C. Parker, president of the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, will speak to the Parent-Teacher Division on "Not By War Alone." Dr. Albert H. Burrows, department of sociology and economics, Northern Michigan College of Education, will address the division on the subject "Your Job Now: The P. T. A. and Community Orientation of Education 1942." Mrs. A. G. Lindstrom, Edna Johnson, chairman of publications, and Mrs. E. L. Church, Grand Rapids, secretary of Michigan Congress, will speak.

## Hurst Squad Confident Of Thrashing Plumbers In Traditional Battle

### In Spite Of Injuries The Wildcats Are Set For Tide Tilt

The last home football game of the abbreviated season brings the Wildcats and the "plumbers" from Michigan Tech together this Saturday. After suffering from a defeat by Central last week, the Wildcats are more determined than ever to redeem themselves by defeating Tech.

Coach Hurst and the boys are confident they will take the engineers to camp in the gridiron battle. Northern came through the tussle with Central with few physical mishaps and should be in good condition for the coming game. Benny Montcalm, who was a headache to the Tech football team last year, is still handicapped by a bad knee. This injury slowed him up in the Central game, but it is hoped that he will be in tip-top shape by Saturday. The Tech players of the last year will long remember how the stifty quarterback ran circles around them, when the Teachers took the Plumbers 25 to 0 in the last game of the season.

The Northern battle will be the first for the engineers this season. They had a game scheduled with the Northland team last week, but Northland dropped football for the duration. Although little is known about the potentiality of the Tech team, we are assured that a real battle will take place. Coach Sherman has a large group of men to draw from and expects to have a good team. In the past, regardless of the record of either team against other opponents, both teams have fought hard against one another.

There should be a large crowd at the game with the M. E. A. meeting in Marquette this week-end. Many alumni of Northern will get a chance to see what should be a real battle.

### Northern Squad Is Satisfied With 1st Quarter Lead 12-0

The hopes of Northern fans for a successful season soared after witnessing the manner in which a strong versatile Wildcat team defeated the Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Teachers' eleven in their season's grid opener, 12-0.

Both touchdowns were scored by Munising high school alumni. Benny Montcalm, quarterback and sparkplug of this year's team, scored the first touchdown on a five-yard quarterback sneak, after advancing the ball from the forty yard line. Northern made the next and final score in the second quarter, on a pass from Montcalm to Harold (Babe) Anderson.

Throughout the entire game the Wildcat line held the invaders to little or no gain, displaying superior strength and defensive strategy.

Rain during the second half was responsible for numerous penalties and fumbles on both sides, and backfield play was considerably slower.

A powerful and much heavier Central eleven blanketed the Northern Wildcats by a score of 21 to 0 at the Northern field Saturday.

The snappy Central squad started in the beginning of the first period to pile up their score. Starting on their own 8-yard line, the Chipewas, by a series of end runs and through tackle plays marched down to the Northern 3-yard line. Here the ball was easily pushed over for the touchdown.

On receiving the ball again, the Central men came up to the 50-yard line where by means of a penalty and a tricky pass-lateral play the ball was carried over for the second score of the period.

In the third quarter, the fighting Wildcats put on their only big push of the game. Upon receiving the ball, they marched down to about the 25-yard line. Here again the Central men proved their power and stopped what looked like a touchdown drive.

Again in the third period, Harold Kazyrski, 191 pound fullback, climaxed a two touchdown lead by diving over the goal line by two successive plunges.

On October 10, Saturday, the Northern men will meet the men of Houghton Tech in their annual gridiron classic.
