When our forefathers set up the present system of government their general thoughts were for the freedom of the common man, whether that freedom be in speech, thought, or print. It seems ironical that at the very time our statesmen were drawing up the Bill of Rights, Negroes were working as slaves for the very men who proclaimed that all persons were entitled to an equal chance in the pursuit of happiness. Looking at the advance of history and present day news in the making, it seems that we have not progressed very far in those proclamations of equality. Certain sections of the country still deny people their equal rights because of their color and social standing; in certain sections of the country it is compulsory to pay for your right to vote; in some sections you are not allowed to vote at all unless your skin is white. Is this democracy-Government by the people?

I am not proud of this splendid record of undemocratic dis-plays, and I am sore that there are thousands, yes, perhaps millions, of other Americans who are ashamed of empty promises that pro-claim the social and political freedom of every citizen. The fact that our personal liberty has never been tampered with makes us blind to the fact that there are Americans who are denied the right to

exercise their rights as citizens because the section in which they live is afraid that old traditions and power will be lost if the dis crepancies in the present interpretation of democracy are corrected.

We own the most tremendous tradition of non-aggressive free dom in human history. The pattern and design for America ha-been drawn for us if we will only take the challenge and follow i
