My dear Dorothy:

Dorothy being a favorite name with me I am writing this letter to you for the Manitowish Daily News. First of all we plan to leave for France next Monday and will be settled in a few days - address unknown for now but the place will be in a part near where I was last year.

The English & the weather have combined to make our stay here a wonderful combination. There

have been teas, receptions etc
and it is beautifully warm.
officially we called on Sir Alfred
Keogh Director general of the British
Medical Services then later had
tea with Lord & Lady Godlee
- he being President of the Royal
College of Surgeons etc. There
I met my old friend Sir W.A.
Lane and had a fine talk with
him.

Monday night I journeyed to
Sunderland to have dinner with
my favourite cousin - Marjorie
Her husband has just got
his commission after being
turned down by the medical

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offices 14 times. He is a good
fellow you can imagine.

Over here they use the Daylight
Saving time - that is clocks are
pushed forward one hour - and
as you know from your geography
the northern latitude in summer
gives more hours of daylight -
consequently it is daylight
in London now until 10³⁰ P.M.

Have been twice to dinner at
the Trocadero - a beautiful res-
taurant. Our uniforms attract
a little attention - principally

on account of the U.S. and the
fact that our officers wear no
belts. Last night with officers
I saw Chen-Chin. Chow at
this Majesty's Theater ^{Haymarket}.
It was beautifully staged & the
music is extremely attractive.
On the whole I like London as
much as ever. This being the
height of the season time in
non-war times there are
more theaters open. Taxis are
scarce. I can see a great dif-
ference since last fall in the
amount of food allowed. Today
at 5 we go to tea with Mrs Page
- at the Embassy.
