**#100,000
CUTBACK...**

A total of approximately \$100,000 has been cut from the gross budget of Northern Michigan University for the fiscal year 1970-71 by two acts of Michigan Legislature, stated Dr. Lowell G. Kafer, Dean of Students last Wednesday.

Dean Kafer explained that the first cut came last December totaling one percent,

totaling one percent of the net University budget of \$7.9 million. The net budget, being as Dean Kafer explained, "the money granted the University by the Michigan State Legislature for its operations and maintenance."

of a Readers Digest article,
 "When College Dorms Go
 Co-ed" were distributed to
 Hunt Hall Council members,
 judiciary members, and
 resident assistants. Seeds
 of question that had lain
 dormant for many years began
 to germinate. Perhaps in the
 same sense that people come to
 the realization that black and
 white segregation, or simpli-
 fied good-bad-type thinking,
 is not the best way, male
 students began to ask why
 women were over there and they
 were here.

Last evening, several
 other Hunt residents and I
 witnessed what ordinarily might
 have been a strange phenomenon.
 Down the hall an apparition-
 like figure appeared for a very
 brief moment and was gone. It
 wasn't anything supernatural
 (in most men's eyes), however,
 only a woman in a nightgown
 zipping legally across the hall.
 The idea of successful co-ed
 living had captured the minds
 of a number of Hunt residents,
 women in over crowded living
 units, and the gentlemen in the
 Dean's Office, and they had
 done something positive about
 it.

The facts were that Hunt
 had several open rooms and a
 number of oneman rooms, and at
 the same time over 100 women
 were required to live in three-
 woman rooms. The resolution
 seemed easy enough: put women
 into rooms as they became avail-
 able. However, a realistic ap-
 praisal of the Powers that be,
 as well as the life styles of
 Hunt residents, precluded this
 possibility. Yet, if a few
 individuals would agree to move
 down the hall or upstairs arrange-
 ments could be made. Thanks to
 the understanding and empathy of
 a number of residents and the
 administration, 18 grateful wo-
 men were checked into Hunt on
 Monday, March 8. They were pro-
 vided rooms at one end of a cor-
 ridor also occupied by men.

The history of co-ed housing
 in college residence halls has
 not been a long one. To seriously
 suggest this possibility ten
 years ago would have been in the
 eyes of many morally irresponsible
 or at least impractical. How-
 ever, time have changed. Today,
 noteworthy experiments in co-ed
 living at many respected uni-
 versities such as: Stanford,
 Oberlin, Rochester, Radcliff,
 Connecticut, etc. seems to have
 gotten beyond the rhetoric of.

is to provide an intellectual
 environment. In the same breath
 Northern realizes that the per-
 sonal, social and physical devel-
 opment of the individual is of
 equal importance. Various groups
 within this university, such as
 MAHE (Michigan Association for
 Higher Education at Northern)
 and Free Students Now are trying
 to demonstrate that they want
 Northern to live up to these
 statements. These assemblies
 feel that three-man rooms,
 limited off-campus living, and
 the curriculum of Common Learning
 are part of the university's
 responsibilities to the student.
 One of the MAHE strongest pro-
 poses is "shared authority!"
 This proposition holds that they
 back faculty involvement in
 decision-making on institutional
 objectives, academic programs,
 appointment of administrative
 officers, and standards of
 admission.

The role of Northern is to
 introduce students to scholarship
 and liberal learning, and make
 them sensitive and tolerant
 citizens. A university educa-
 tion must help students relate
 to different types of people and
 to the realities of life; not
 shelter and isolate us from them.
 Earlier this year a study group
 of the American Academy of Arts
 and Sciences stated that:

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Rap

Last November, a group of concerned students and the Dean of Students Office joined efforts to create a means of communicating help and guidance to people in need in the Marquette area. This group subsequently formed RAP which means if you're in trouble or need some assistance call and talk it over. Consisting of some 45 volunteers who have attended training sessions along such lines as drug education, birth control advice, and personal conflict, the RAP people are well able to either help you or refer you to someone who is more qualified to handle special cases.

By January, of this year, RAP began to execute their program on an experimental basis. A telephone answering service was installed and on the average two people a week end began to take advantage of this opportunity. Then as publicity began to be circulated RAP began to receive more calls. By February, measures were taken to install the program on a full time basis. Support from such organizations as the Kiwanis Club of Ishpeming, concerned citizens from Marquette, the A.S.N.M.U., and R.H.A. was forth coming. From the average of two calls a week, RAP is now receiving over twenty calls and fast establishing itself as a needed community service. According to Lynnae, one of RAP's coordinators, they hope to extend the service to cover 24 hours a day and seven days a week. Anyone wishing to volunteer their services call Lynnae at 7-1443.

HANG UP ON WAR

One effective way of saying NO to the endless loss of lives, Vietnamese as much as American, in what is now the longest war in U.S. history, of resisting a government that ignores serious social deterioration and that is becoming progressively more elitist and repressive at home, is by joining thousands of Americans who have already refused to pay Federal telephone tax.

Congress in April of 1966 passed a law raising Federal telephone tax to 10%. "It is clear, that Vietnam and only the Vietnam operation makes this bill necessary" (Rep. Wilbur Mills, Congressional Record, Feb. 23, 1966). Paying this tax means volunteering your efforts to the atrocities in Vietnam. ARE YOU OPPOSED TO THE WAR AND WILLING TO ACT ON YOUR BELIEFS?

The telephone companies usually treat the refusal to pay Federal excise tax as a matter between the individual and the Internal Revenue Service. In virtually every case the telephone companies have assured the refuser that he will not lose his telephone service. They then refer the issue to the IRS.

ECOLOGICAL BACKLASH

"Suppose the ecological observations and predictions are wrong, and that humans turn out to really have a high tolerance for DDT, Mercury and Radiation, and smog doesn't really kill people. Suppose that Lake Erie was a freaky example and that it really isn't dead, it's just sleeping, and that the earth is really an infinite fountain of resources and, that people in India aren't really starving because there are too many of them, and that there is no danger in overpopulating the earth. Even if these dire observations are erroneous and that there is no real biological danger from pollution and over population. How much are we still going to suffer by being conservative and assuming that we should stop our flow of poisons and various other pollutants into the environment." This was the observation pointed out by Dr. William L. Robinson, Professor of Biology, N.M.U. in discussing the problems of environmental pollution, population control, and the current "Ecological Backlash."

In discussing an environmental backlash Dr. Robinson contends: "People are getting sick of hearing about Ecology and the environment. People are now looking for someone to say 'Forget it, it was all just a case of mass hysteria.' Let's get on with building the SST, and increasing the GNP and re-electing the GOP."

Dr. Robinson believes that since "Earth Day," last April, Ecology has been number one of the hit parade of the news programs, and now were all ready for some new fad to entertain us.

It is Dr. Robinson's argument that this backlash is coming with more force each day. As a "welcomed . . . relief from the environmental pessimists."

Dr. Robinson claims that the Industrialists' machine will be mounting a greater campaign contending, "How can we build a bigger and better America when these ecological crape hangers keep blocking our progress by insisting that we filter our smoke, clean our exhaust, treat our sewage, control our noise, and slow down our rate of population growth? Who wouldn't support a good strong environment

three fourths of one per cent of the gross budget \$13.0 million less the one per cent of the net state budget for the University. Three fourths of one percent of \$13.0 million being approximately \$100,000, less the \$80,000 equals \$20,000. The \$20,000 added to the original \$80,000 cut equals a total of approximately \$100,000.

What this would amount to, said Dean Kafer, would be a large cutting back on office supplies for the administration. Furthermore, all traveling expenses would be drastically impaired for administrative personnel. There probably would be an end to sabbatical leaves for University professors, Dean Kafer also said.

Dr. Kafer blamed as cause for this, "a general loss of faith in higher education among the general public," and the reaction of elected officials to this sentiment.

If anyone has been wondering, the campus radio station should be broadcasting by the 19th of April. This is still only a tentative date, but barring any more unforeseen circumstances resident hall occupants should be listening to some good music shortly.

Talking to Ed Knab, a member of the radio board, we learned that there have been two major setbacks. Sometime ago when a proposal for a student operated radio station went before Northern's Board of Control it was deemed as unacceptable. This proposal failed to pass on two consecutive occasions but on the third attempt it was met with recognition, conditions were finalized and the go ahead was given.

The second major problem having arisen in connection with this project is that of remodeling the old radio room in Lee Hall to prepare it for its new role. Most of the equipment needed for broadcasting operations has arrived but is in need of installation. Mr. Fassended of operations maintenance is in charge of this remodeling and the necessary contracts are supposed to be out.

A progress report will soon be published which will explain the station's functions. This report will cover the radio station's organization, tentative hours of broadcast, functions of board members, radio board meetings, how the station will operate within the dorm complex and a tentative record plan in which organizations will be able to buy records at a discount for the station.

TREATY FOR PEACE

The following nine point peace plan has been submitted to Governor Milliken. On March 20th, the citizenest for peace action in the Marquette area are asking the governor to reply to this proposal at his inauguration.

JOINT TREATY OF PEACE BETWEEN THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES, SOUTH VIETNAM AND NORTH VIETNAM

BE IT KNOWN THAT THE AMERICAN AND VIETNAMESE PEOPLE ARE NOT ENEMIES. The war is carried out in the names of the people of the United States and South Vietnam but without our consent. It destroys the land and people of Vietnam. It drains America of its resources, its youth and its honor.

WE HEREBY AGREE TO END THE WAR ON THE FOLLOWING TERMS, SO THAT BOTH peoples can live under the joy of independence and can devote themselves to building a society based on human equality and respect for the earth. In rejecting the war we also reject all forms of racism and discrimination based on color, class, sex, national origins, and ethnic groupings which form the basis of the war policies, present and past, of the United States.

1. The Americans agree to immediate and total withdrawal from Vietnam and publicly to set the date by which all United States military forces will be removed.
2. The Vietnamese pledge that as soon as the United States government publicly sets a date for total withdrawal: They will enter discussions to secure the release of all American prisoners, including pilots captured while bombing North Vietnam.
3. There will be an immediate ceasefire between United States forces and those led by the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam.
4. They will enter discussions on the procedures to guarantee the safety of all withdrawing troops.
5. The Americans pledge to end the imposition of Thieu-Ky-Khiem on the people of South Vietnam in order to insure their right to self-determination and so that all political prisoners can be released.
6. The Vietnamese pledge to form a provisional coalition government to organize democratic elections. All parties agree to respect the results of elections in which all South Vietnamese can participate freely without the presence of any foreign troops.
7. The South Vietnamese pledge to enter discussions of procedures to guarantee the safety and political freedom of those South Vietnamese who have collaborated with the United States or with the United States-supported regime.
8. The Americans and Vietnamese agree to respect the independence, peace and neutrality of Laos and Cambodia in accord with the 1954 and 1962 Geneva conventions and not to interfere in the internal affairs of these two countries.

9. Upon these points of agreement, we pledge to end the war and resolve all other questions in the spirit of self-determination and mutual respect for the independence and political freedom of the people of Vietnam and the United States.

BY RATIFYING THIS AGREEMENT, WE PLEDGE TO TAKE WHATEVER ACTIONS ARE APPROPRIATE TO IMPLEMENT THE TERMS OF THIS JOINT TREATY AND TO INSURE ITS ACCEPTANCE BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Report on the Open House-Visitation Committee

On March 24th, the Resident Halls Association and the Committee for self determination of student resident hall visitation hours will present the results of the in-dorm student questionnaire and the parent questionnaire to the Board of Control along with the committee's recommendation of change. This meeting will represent the culmination of efforts by this group to implement a desirable visitation settlement.

As stands, a majority of the resident hall body are in favor of a policy of complete self determination of visitation hours for the opposite sex. But, because there are students that do not desire such a policy, a multiple housing arrangement will most likely need to be established. This means that there would be space available for those wishing to have 24 hour open visitation and space available for those wishing either a limited visitation policy or no visitation policy at all. Whatever policy one wishes to choose however, will be decided by the residents living in that particular area.

The proposal for changes in the visitation policy for the remaining Spring semester) that will be presented before the Board of Control, will read as follows:

- A. The university will make available, if the affected students agree, sufficient space in the residence hall to accommodate students who:
1. desire a total self-determination policy, as it is outlined in the amended provisions of the Student Code, and, 2. are 21 years of age or older, OR, 3. are under 21 years of age but have the permission of their parents or legal guardians on file in the Residents Halls Programs Office.
- B. In order for these provisions to be implemented in any housing unit on campus this semester, the following conditions must be met:
1. The living unit must consist of at least 2/3 eligible students according to the policy stated in "A" above. (The remaining 1/3 or less will be allowed to remain in their unit UNLESS a written request is made by the students' parent or legal guardian for his/her transfer to a "non-self-determining" living unit.)
 2. The residents of the eligible unit must conduct a vote, as defined on page 7 of the Student Code, in which 2/3 of the residents agree, by secret ballot, to adopt a new visitation program.
 3. Other provisions included in the present visitation regulations must be specified.

NOTE: In the event that an "undegraded" Students' parent or legal guardian requests his removal from a "Self-determined" living unit, space will be provided for that student in another living unit.

On Campus Coffee House

For the past couple of years there has been a lot of discussion about getting a coffee house on campus. Up to now the only thing that has happened is discussion. Three weeks ago the Resident Halls Association contacted John Geuke, a student who successfully sponsored and managed a coffee house last year, to manage an experimental one this year.

John has set up a committee to study the situation. He has met with officials and has been offered several possible locations. Mainly, the recreation rooms in Magers, Meyland or Spaulding halls. All other places have been ruled out for one reason or another. The only thing that now stands in the way is the okay from one of the hall councils in any of these dorms. If the committee gets the okay, the coffee house will probably be in operation the weekend after Easter break.

The committee has set goals that they would like to achieve through this coffee house. First they want to have a place that serves the students needs, a place that the student can go to and enjoy live entertainment and unusual refreshments at minimum cost. A place that has incorporated the things the student enjoys. Secondly, the coffee house will be open from nine or ten o'clock to two on Friday and Saturday nights, a time when most places in Marquette have closed. They also want the student to have some say as to what is happening, any suggestions are welcomed, now or after the opening. immorality, and are pointing up the value of co-ed living. Dr. Joseph Katz, Director of the Institute for the Study of Human Problems at Stanford believes, "From all indications co-ed housing is one of the best things colleges can provide to foster in students the ability to make good relationships and good marriages." Many other professional testimonials are available lauding the opportunities for personal growth in a co-ed living situation. Some of the common conclusions reached are: 1) People tend to value each other more as persons and less as sexual objects. 2) Expectations of finding ones identity in marriage or a sexual partner rather than in oneself are changed. 3) Sublimated frustrations are resolved in person to person communication rather than in panty raids, jock raids, property damage, stag films, etc. 4) Manners and appearance improve, and noise levels are reduced.

According to Cathy Benningson who conducted a study at Stanford regarding co-ed living, students don't negate sexual attraction, they simply go beyond it.

The returns are certainly not all in and analyzed regarding co-ed living benefits vs. disadvantages, and co-ed living is not the panacea to Northern's residence hall ills; however, evidence indicates to this right that men and women belong together in society and in residence halls. Northern has had co-ed living arrangements for some time in Payne and Spooner halls with men and women on separate floors. However, it seems certain that in developing a residence hall system that will provide differentiated housing policies to meet the needs and desires of students, the Dean's Office will have a responsibility to recon with a much broader scope of co-ed living in the future.

Incidentally, much credit should be given to those who sacrificed and worked to help create our situation in Hunt Hall. We have only a token number of women but this was achieved thru a fair-from-token amount of work.

Ecological Backlash

backlash? Only those who understand the problem!"

In discussing how this Ecological backlash works, Dr. Robinson sited examples of mass media advertising. "For example, the T.V. commercial, sponsored by Standard Oil, for its' lead free Amoco gas, with the new parents bringing their child home from the hospital, would have you believe that the exhaust from Amoco is for your kids. Whereas the truth of the matter is that lead is only one of the many toxic pollutants in auto exhaust."

Another way this Backlash is manifesting itself is in the tourist trade industry. Dr. Robinson sited as an example: "Last summer many Wisconsin tourist agencies and the 'Wisconsin Tourist Council' suggested to the legislature of the State of Wisconsin, that too much publicity was being attached to pollution and not enough on the clean water. Because it was discouraging tourists. Also giving the impression that the pollution was being caused by the bad press."

Another example which Dr. Robinson stated: "On Earth Day, last April, Coca Cola and the Elson Bottling Co., took out a full page ad in the 'Mining Journal' claiming the 'Bottle of the age of Ecology.' My wife called to congratulate them and the person she talked to, knew nothing about this so-called return to returnable bottles

Dr. Robinson is all too aware what can happen if we continue to neglect checking our positive population growth throughout the world, including the United States. He is also painfully aware of the situation concerning the continual rape of our limited resources.

In part, through his experiments with putting transmitters on the Spruce Grouse, he has found evidence which underscored the importance maintaining a proper number of species for the resources available. His analogy to this is simple: If there is too many of a species for the natural environment there will be problems. He has found that if there isn't enough food for the species and a natural territoriality is not maintained, there will be either conflict within the species, or starvation of the majority of the species, or both.

The mild mannered, yet outspoken crusader for making the world a fit place to live in believes we must keep working and save the earth. He believes we must continually educate ourselves, and not let ourselves become subjected to ideas which might interfere with the preservation of our world. It's the only world we have.
