Thanks to the understanding and empathy of a number of residents and the administration, 18 grateful wo-men were checked into Hunt on Monday, March 8. Rap

Last November, a group of concerned students and the Dean of Students Office joined efforts to create a means of communicating help and guidance to people in need in the Marquette area. This group subsequently formed RAP which means if you're in trouble or need some assistence call and talk it over. Consisting of some 45 volunteers who have attended training sessions along such lines as drug education, birth control advice, and personal conflict, the RAP people are well able to either help you or refer you to someone who is more qualified to handle special cases.

By anuary of this year, RAP began to execute their program on an experimental basis. A telephone answering service was installed and on the average two people a week end began to take advantage of this opportunity. Then as publicity began to be circulated RAP began to receive more calls. By February, measures were taken to install the program on a full time basis. Support from such organizations as the Kiwanis Club of Ishpeming, concerned ettizens from Marquette, the A.S.N.M.U., and R.H.A..was forth coming. From the average of two calls a week, RAP is now receiving over twenty calls and fast establishing itself as a needed community service. According to Lynnae, one of RAP's coordinators, they hope to extend the service to cover 24 hours a day and seven days a week. Anyone wishing to volunteer their services call Lynnae at 7-1443,

HANG UP ON WAR

One effective way of saying NO to the endless loss of lives, Vietnamese as much as American, in what is now the longest war in U.S. history, of resisting a gorernment that ignores serious social deterioration and that is becoming progressively more elitist and repressive at home, is by joining thousands of Americans who have already refused to pay Federal telephone tax.

Congress in April of 1966 passed a law raising Pederal telephone tax to 10%. "It is clear, that Vietnam and only the Vietnam operation makes this bill necessary (Rep. Wilbur Mills, Congressional Record, Feb. 23, 1966).

ation makes this bill necessary (Rep. Wilbur Mills, Congressional Record, Feb. 23, 1966). Paying this tax means volunteering your efforts to the atrocities in Vietnam. ARE YOU OPPOSED TO THE WAR AND WILLING TO ACT ON YOUR BE-LIEFS?

The telephone comapanies usually treat the refusal to pay Federal excise tax as a matter between the individual and the Internal Revenue Service. In virtually every case the telephone companies have assured the refuser that he will not lose his telephone service They then refer the issue to the IRS.

ECOLOGICAL BACKLASH

"Suppose the ecological observations and predictions are wrong, and that humans turn out to really have a high tolerance for DDT, Mercury and Radiation, and smog doesn't really kill people. Suppose that Lake Erie was a freaky example and that it really isn't dead, it's just sleeping, and. that the earth is really an infinite fountain of resources and, that people in India aren't really starving because there are to many of them, and that there is no danger in overpopulating the earth. Even if these dire observations are erroneous and that there is no real biological danger fro pollution and over population. How much are we still going to suffer by being conservative and assuming that we should stop our flow of poisons and various other pollutants into the environment." This was the observation pointed out by Dr. William L. Robinson, Professor of Biology, N.M.U. in discussing the problems of environmental pollution, population control, and the current "Ecological Backlasst."

In discussing an environmental backlash Dr. Robinson contends: "People are getting sick of hearing about Ecology and the environment. People are now looking for someone to say 'Forget it, it was all just a case of mass hysteria.' Let's get on with building the SST, and increasing the GNP and re-electing the GOP."

Dr. Robinson believes that since "Earth Day," last April, Boology has been humber one of the hit parade of the news programs, and now were all ready for some new fad to entertain us.

It is Dr. Robinson's argument that this backlash is coming with more force each day. As a "welcomed . . . relief from the environmental pessimists."

Dr. Robinson claims that the Industrialists' machine will be mounting a greater campaign contending, "How can we build a bigger and better America when these ecological crape hangers keep blocking our progress by insisting that we filter our smoke, clean our exhaust, treat our sewage, control our noise, and slow down our rate of population growth? Who wouldn't support a good strong environment CUTBACK three fourths of one per cent of the gross budget \$13.0 million less the one per cent of the net state budget for the Uni-versity. Three fourths of one per cent of \$13.0 million being approximately \$100,000, less the \$80,000 equals \$20,000. The \$20,000 added to the original \$80,000 cut equals a total of approximately \$100,000.

What this would amount to, said Dean Kafer, would be a large cutting back on office supplies for the administration, Furthermore, all traveling expenses would be drastically impaired for administrative personel. There probably would be an end to sabatical leaves for Iniversity professors, Dean (afer also said.

(afer also said. Dr. Kafer blamed as cause for this,"a general loss of faith in higher education among the general public,"and the reaction of elected officials to this sentiment.

TREATY FOR PEACE

The following nine point peace plan has been submitted to Govenor Milliken. On March 20th, the citi-zenst for peace action in the Marquette area are asking the govenor to reply to this proposal at his inaugration.

JOINT TREATY OF PEACE BETWEEN THE PEOA PLE OF THE UNITED STATES, SOUTH VIET-NAM AND NORTH VIETNAM

BE IT KNOWN THAT THE AMERA CAN AND VIETNAMESE PEOPLE ARE NOT ENEMIES. The war is carried out in the names of the people of the United States and South Vietnam but without our consent. It destroys the land and people of Vietnam. It drains America of its resources. its youth and its honor.

WE HEREBY AGREE TO END THE WAR ON THE FOLLOWING TERMS, SO THAT T BOTH peoples can live under the joy of independence and can devote themselvestto building a society based on human equality and respect for the earth. In re-jecting the war we also reject all forms of racism and discrimination based on color, class, sex, nat ional origins, and ethaic groupings which form the basis of the war pol-icies, present addypast, of the United States.

- 1. The Americans agree to im-mediate and total withdrawal from Vietnam and publicly to set the date by which all United States military forces will be removed.
- The Vietnamese pledge that as soon as the United States gov-ernment publicly sets a date for total withdrawalt They will enter discussions to secure the release of all American prisoners, including pilots captured while bombing North Vietnam.
- There will be an immediate cease-fire between United States forces 3. and those led by the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam.
- 4. They will enter discussions on the procedures to guarantee the safety of all withdrawing troops.
- 5. The Americans pledge to end the imposition of Thieu-Ky-Khiem on the people of South Vietnam in order to insure their right to self-determination and so that all political prisoners can be released.
- 6. The Vietnamese pledge to form a provisional coalition government to organize democratic elections. All parties agree to respect the results of elections in which all South Vietnamese can participate freely without the presence of any foreign troops.
- 7. The South listnamese pledge to enter discussions of procedures to guarantee the safety and political freedom of those South Vietnamese who have col-laborated with the United States or with the United States-supported regime.
- 8. The Americans and Vietnamese agree to respect the independence, peace and neutrality of Laos and Cambodia in accord with the 1954 and 1962 Geneva conventions and not to interfere in the internal affairs of these two countries.

9. Upon these points of agreement, we pledge to end the war and resolve all other questions in the spirit of self-determination and mutual respect for the independence and political freedom of the people of Vietnam and the United States.

BY RATIFYING THIS AGREEMENT, WE PLEDGE TO TAKE WHATEVER ACTIONS ARE APPROPRIATE TO IMPLEMENT THE TERMS OF THIS JOINT TREATY AND TO INSURE ITS ACCEPTANCE BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE

Report on the Open House-Visitation Committee

On March 24th, the Resi-dent Halls Association and the committee for self determination of student resident hall visitation hours will present the results of the in-dorm student questionnaire and the parent uestionnaire to the Board of Control along with the committee's recomendation of change. This meeting will represent the cul-mination of efforts by this group to implement a desireable visit-ation settlement.

As stands, a majority of the resident hall body are in favor of a policy of complete self deter-mination of visitation hours for the opposite sex. But, because there are students that do not desire such a policy, a multiple housing arrangement will most likely need to be established. This means that there would be space available for those wishto have 24 hour open visitation space available for those ing and wishing either a limited visitation policy or no visitation policy at all. Whatever policy one wishes to choose however, will be decided by the residents living in that particular area.

The proposal for changes in the visitation policy for the <u>remaining</u> Spring semester) that will be presen-ted before the Board of Control, will read as follows;

The university will make available, if the affected students agree, sufficient space in the residence hall to accommodate students who:

1. desire a total self-determination policy, as it is outlined in the amended provisions of the <u>Student Code</u>, and, 2. are 21 years of age or older, OR, 3. are under 21 years of age but may the permission of their parents or legal guardians on file in the Residents Halls Programs Office. B. In order for these provisions to be implemented in any housing unit on campus this semester, the folling conditions must be met:

The living unit must consist 1. of at least 2/3 eligible students ac-cording to the policy stated in "A" above. (The remaining 1/3 or less will be allowed to remain in their unit UNLESS a written request is made by the students' parent or legal guardian for his/her transfer to a "non-selfdeter-mining" living unit.)

2. The residents of the eligible unit must conduct a vote, as defined on page 7 of the Student Code, in which 2/3 of the residents agree, by secret ballot, to adopt a new visitation program

3. Other provisions included in the present visitation regulations must be specified.

In the event that an "un-NOTE: NOTE: In the event that an "un-deraged" Students' parent or legal guar-dean requests his removal from a "Self-determined" living unit, space will be provided for that student in another living unit.

CO-ED LIVING FROM PASE 2 immorality, and are pointing up the value of co-ed living. Dr. Joseph Katz, Director of the Institute for the Study of Human Problems at Stanford believes,"From all indications co-ed housing is one of the best things colleges can provide to foster in students the ability to make good the apility to make good relationships and good marriages. Many other professional test-imonials are available lauding the opportunities for personal rowth in a co-ed living situation. Some of the common conclusions reached are: 1) People tend to value each other more as persons and less as sexual objects. 2) Expecta-tions of finding ones identity marriage or a sexual partner changed. 3) Sublimated frustra-tions are resolved in person o person communication rather than in panty raids, jock raids, property damage, stag films, etc. 4) Manners and appearance improve, and noise levels are reduced.

According to Cathy Benning-son who conducted a study at Stanford regarding co-ed living students don't negate sexual attraction, they simply go

beyond it. The returns are certainly not all in and analyzed regard-ing co-ed living benefits vs. disadvantages, and co-ed living is not the panacea to Nothern's residence boll illo however residence hall ills; however, evidence indicates to this right that men and women belong together in society and in residence halls. Northern has had co-ed living arangements for some time in Payne and Spooner halls with men and women on seperate floors. However, it seems certain that in developing a residence hall system that will provide differentiated housing policies of students, the Dean's Office will have a responsibility to

In discussing how this Ecological backlash works, Dr. Robinson sited examples of mass media advertising. "For example, the T.V. commercial, sponsored by Standard Coll, for its' lead free Amoco gas, with the new parents bringing their child home from the hospital, would have you believe that the exhaust from Amoco is for your kids. Whereas the truth of the matter is that lead is only one of the many toxic pollutants in auto exhaust."

Another way this Backlash is manifesting itself is in the tourist trade industry. Dr. Robinson sited as an example: "Last summer many Wisconsin tourist agencies and the 'Wisconsin Tourist Council' suggested to the legislature of the State of Wisconsin, that too much publicity enough on the clean water. Because it was discouraging tourists. Also giving the impression that the pollution was being caused by the bad press."

Another example which Dr. Robinson stated: "On Earth Day, last April, Coca Cola and the Elson Bottling Co., took out a full page ad in the 'Mining Journal' claiming the 'Bottle of the age of Ecology.' My wife called to congratulate them and the person she talked to, knew nothing about this so-called return to returnable bottles

Dr. Robinson is all too aware what can happen if we continue to neglect checking our positive population growth throughout the world, including the United States. He is also painfully aware of the situation concerning the continual rape of our limited resources.


In part, through his experiments with putting transmitters on the Spruce Grouse, he has found evidence which underscored the importance maintaining a proper number of species for the resources available. His analogy to this is simple: If there is too many of a species for the natural environement there will be problems He has found that if there isn't enough food for the species and a natural territorality is not maintained, there will be either conflict within the species, or starvation of the majority of the species, or both.

The mild mannered, yet outspoken crusader for making the world a fit place to live in believes we must keep working and save the earth.
