He worked 8 hours a day allowing 20 minutes for coffee breaks.

He didn't have a car when he first started working.

They had drills for drilling the ground for blast, and they had buffers to scrap the dirt, and motors for pulling the cars.

Mining is dangerous work to a certain extent. You had to be careful at all times. They had ceiling grounds, and lots of drilling accidents.

If he decided to retire because the Mother B closed down.
