M.B. = I was born in National Mine, April
the 4th, 1898

C = OK, and do you remember the stock
market crashing?

M.B. = I remember, ya... some ~~about~~ about
it, but not
much

C = How did it hurt you and your family?

M.B. = Well ^{said} (smiley) little hat
~~now~~ ~~well~~ can I say

C = Well, um, did it cut back on anything?

M.B. = Well, . . . my husband was out of work

C = OK

M.B. = That's during the depression isn't it

C = mmhu

M.B. = He worked on W.P.A.

C = mmmhm

~~now~~ C = OK, how many children were in your family

G.B. = in my immediate family? Bryton

C = yah

G.B. = I had 3 brothers and 3 sisters

C = OK, you were a parent during the depression right? ^(and to be) were you an adult during the depression? right?

M.B. = yes, I was married

C = How many children did you have?

M.B. = I had two

C = OK, ^(mumble among question) and did you play, where did you live at that time?

M.B. = Well, in the beginning we lived in Salsberry, and then I lived in National mine of course, until I was married, and then we lived in, ah, Salsberry, and after Rosemary was born, I had to have another bedroom (laugh) so we, ah... went back to National mine and lived

C = mmhm

C = Do you blame Hoover for the Depression or the Stock Market crashing?

M.B. = ah, I don't, ... I didn't follow politics

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M.B. very much, (laughter). I didn't blame anybody

C= Were you working at that time?

M.B.=now what? (said uncertainly)

C= Were you working at that time... during the stock market and the depression?

M.B.=ahh, I started to work, . . . well before I was married I ~~started to~~ worked at the bazzard, ~~and~~ and after Rosemary was born I quit, ~~but~~ I didn't exactly quit & had to have time off, then I went back to work, and I don't know what year

C= OK, well um . . . , Do you remember anything about the "New Deal"

M.B.=the New Deal? that was . . . Roosevelt had something to do about that

C= yeah

M.B.=well isn't he the one who started the (said wrong word) the Depression, . . . the W.P.A.

C= yeah

M.B.=Well yes I remember lot about that

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C= what do you remember about it?

M.B.= Well, I had to find a nursemaid for Bob and Rosemary and they lived right in, they were live ins, and da, uh my husband got a job on the W.P.A., look at it snow

C= oh yeah

M.B. that's when I, that wasn't enough to keep the family going and I got a job back at the Bazzard, and as soon as before I got my first paycheck, he was laid off ^{of} the W.P.A. but we had cows, pigs, chickens and gunny sacks.

C= what did you think about the W.P.A.?

M.B.= Well, ah. it was a godsend till I got a job, so it helped a lot.

C= umm, what did your husband do while he was working in it?

M.B.= he was night watchmen at different locations (and that's what he did)
said softly

C= Did he take part in the CCC

M.B. = no
M.B. pardon C=repeated

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C= Was he a farmer?

M.B.= Well we had cows and the different animals, but ah, not really a farmer

C= Did you, ah, grow crops?

M.B.= We made our own hay and ah had a big garden all of the time, vegetables

C= Well, ah, did you go AAA and take Subsidy - (repeated then)

M.B.= no

C= Were you familiar with Huey Long in Louisiana, Father Coughlin or Francis Townsend? remember any of them

M.B.= what was it? (said quizzily)

C= Francis Townsend?

M.B.= no

C= Did your family take part in The Share-the Wealth or Social Security Acts? were you in any of those?

M.B.= Social Security acts?

C= or the Share the Wealth plan

M.B.= I don't know (mumbled)

C= Okay!

C= What type of food items were hard to come by?

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M.B= sugar and butter

C= were there any help in your area to get the food - (repeated) like any lines or anything?

M.B= I dont know, I don't think so.

C= Okay, Did your family have an radio

M.B= long silence no.

C= What kind of education did your children have?

M.B= highschool and Bob my son was drafted, but he was aloud to finish school because his grades were such that they allowed him to finish high school and graduate, and then at 19 he entered the service

C= where did they go to school do you remember?

M.B= National Mine

C= Well do you remember what the name of the school was?

M.B= Well, National Mine High School

C= Did they have any basketball teams or choirs in the school?

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G.B. = yes my son played in the basketball team?
C. But the I went to, had no indoor plumbing, the janitor had to haul all of the water from a well down in the bottom of the school yard, we all drank out of the same dipper, and whatever water we drew from this crop we had to drink, we weren't aloud to drink part of it and throw the rest away because he had to hard of a job to haul it, and I used to take two 10-gallon water ~~buckets~~^{pails} to school with me, morning and night, and haul water from the well, drinking water for home.

C. = Did they have a hot lunch program?

G.B. = Oh no

C. = ok, did they have buses?

G.B. = no

C. = How did the schools get money to pay off everything if ~~all the people were~~ unemployed?

G.B. = that I don't know

C. = what were Christmases like for you, like what were the meals like, and the presents, do you remember

G.B. = the meals?

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C = the Christmases

G.B = the meals that we had?

C = for Christmas

G.B = Oh, for Christmas, we always had
goose

C = What was like, Christmas morning
like for you guys?

G.B = pardon

C = What was Christmas morning like?

G.B = Well there weren't too many gifts under
the tree, but we had two cows, and I would
scald the milk and sell the cream, the
scalded cream, and da, we'd buy something
to eat to with the money, cause I sold
to the A&P. store.

C = Did the teachers go to school, did they
go for nothing or a low salary, since
everybody was out of work did the
teachers go to school for a low salary
or something

G.B = at that time they could teach with
3 months school from the northern, what
was it called? (thinking) the normal at that
it was called then they were aloud to teach, but wages were
very low

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G.B.= and da one of my sisters had to walk
five or six miles to school and da light
her own fire ~~and~~ haul in her own wood
at school, so that the rooms would be warm
for the kids, and there were 8 grades in
this one school room.

C= Did you or your children ever go to
the movies

G.B.= very few

C= um, you said you did, you did have a
garden in your back yard

G.B.= Oh yes, we used to have a big, we, we,
planted potatoes, beans, peas, and da
pumpkins

C= Did you ever go pick berries?

G.B.= Oh yes, we used to pick berries and
walk three miles to town to sell them

C= For recreation did you ~~ever~~ go
ice skating or rollerskating

G.B.= no

C= Did they ever participate in ^{any} marathons
dances?

G.B.= no

C= What was the role of churches to you
what did it mean to you, the churches

G.B.= what did the church mean

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C=yah

G.B= Well, I wasn't, I always went to the methodist church, at that time, there was a church, a Methodist church ~~was~~ at National mine, SD.

C= Did you notice an increase in crime during the Depression

G.B= Somebody killed our cow (slaughter)

C= Do you remember anything about prohibition? (repeated word)

G.B= Prohibition, yes I remember when that came in, so many people turned to making moonshine

C= Were there any blind pigs in this area; national mine?

G.B= no I don't think so

C= did you or any of your family belong to the temperance? (repeated that word 3x)
repeat question

G.B= no

C= Okay, Did they have any railroads?

G.B= Well yes, there was the, I think it was the C.S. and I, that used to come out to national mine

C= Did the depression affect the railroad? (repeated question)

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G.B= As far as I know, there were very few people ~~that could afford~~ to go on the train

C= Were funerals any different then?

G.B= Were the what?

C= ~~were the~~ funerals any different then than they are now?

G.B= A little, to some, from some; they'd, had, they'd take the body to the methodist church for the service, but we would always walk, the children, would always walk from the house of the deceased, and da headd ~~head~~ the hearse down to the church

C= How about the wedding were they any different than they are now

G.B= Well, we, I was never allowed to go to a shivvy but everybody who ^{that} married and the rest of ^{the} kids and the young people all shivered or whatever you call it.

C= Did any of the businesses ^{have to} close ^(repeated) from the stock market or the depression

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G.B= I didn't get that (said quietly)

C= ^{said} Did any of the businesses have to close

G.B= the bases?

C= the business is, the businesses

G.B= ah, well there were very few, ~~and~~ there was only Annalas store and there was a little candy store and that had to close.

C= mm, did the mines have to close up during the Depression?

G.B= Let's see, yes

C= Do you remember which one?

G.B= Well National Mine, there was a, hm, my dad worked in the mine, but he died of silicosis, I forgot.

C= Well, that's O.K. um, were there any strikes during the Depression

G.B= I can't remember whether that one strike they had was during the Depression or not, but they didn't win the first strike they had.

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C = Well if everybody was unemployed
how did they get there money to buy there
G.B. = W.P.A.

C = Did you have an automobile?

G.B. = no

C = Did you think people were more
helpful to each other during the
Depression *← after those words*

G.B. = Yes, but they were also envious of
~~each~~ other, think one would get more
privileges than they had - (laughter)
C = Did anyone really lose faith in the
American way of life

G.B. = I don't know

C = Did you learn anything from the
Depression - repeated

G.B. = well, we had to conserve a lot,

C = hmm

G.B. = (short little) I don't know if I'm
^{laugh} much help to you or not

C = Well, ya, that's all, that was good
