ME: were there any certain people (short) leaders  
for them?

Gr: well they were individuals and they just  
made it and sold it from their own homes

ME: were there any choirs' or bands' then?

Gr: no not that I know of

ME: did you go <sup>to</sup> church all your life?

Gr: yes I did

ME: Were neighbors real helpful then?

Gr: as much as they could be.

ME: Do you think Hoover was the cause  
of the depression?

Gr: yes

ME: Did ya know anybody who lived  
in a hooverville

Gr: no

ME: were you working during the depression?

Gr: no

ME: how did the depression affect the  
farmers?

Gr: oh well it was as hard for them as  
anyone else

ME: Was one of the reasons of the great depression from our production of manufactured goods?

Gr: yes

ME: were there any food programs for the needy?

Gr: yes there were

ME: were there special names for them?

Gr: County aid

ME: Were you burdened with having to raise a family during the depression?

Gr: no, my mother was (sort of laughing)

ME: Did your father have a full time job or a part time job?

Gr: part time

ME: What school did you attend?

Gr: St. Johns Catholic

ME: What mines were working during the depression?

Gr: there weren't any

ME: Were there strikes during the depression?

Gr: no, not in my town

ME: Who was the principle at your school?

Gr: Mother Superior
