b-having a large family and only my dad working 2 days every other week my mother and dad had to go in debt for what little he made couldn't take care of all our bills.

me-did your father and mother work during the depression?

b-Yes! my mother worked hard washing clothes for people and she didn't have the conveniences that we have today, she had to heat her water in a boiler on the stove which was a wood stove and she scrubbed the clothes by hand later she did have a conventional ringer type machine and when she did ah, the only wages she would get was about a dollar for a real big wash load.

My father worked at the Holmes mine in Ishpeming and the working conditions in the mine ~~then~~ then were really poor

me-did your father ever hunt for deer or rabbit at any time?

b-Yes he went rabbit hunting and deer hunting which helped us through this time and we also went and picked blue berries & strawberries which we ~~were~~ preserved.

time?

b - No, we didn't have a car for we couldn't afford
to have a car, and they had street cars for people
who wanted to use them and farmers that did live
north of Ishpeming in the winter would have
slays with the horses for their transportation
and in the summer they would have wagons pulled
by horses

b - Ah, yes our family life did improve for

b- was "Pinky the Bum," he wear about 4 layers of coats all the time but, when he died they found close to \$1,000 in his coat or in his coats you know, and hobos ah, got together by the tracks where the low income housing is right now, they would build bond-fires and cook what ever they could get a hold of and they would wash their clothes in a creek near by.

me- Do you remember anything about temperance and prohibition?

b- I remember that Ishpeming did have a temperance society who really worked hard for prohibition.

me- Do you rember anything about Blind Pigs?

b- I don't think ~~Ishpeming had any~~ there were any in the Ishpeming area but maybe in the bigger cities.

me- where there many moonshiners around here?

b- Oh yes, there were many moonshiners in our own neighborhood there were quite a few

me- Do you remember Mid-Summers Day?

b- Yes that was a special day in our family my mother used to decorate the house she would get tree boughs and branches and

b-and she would put them around the pictures and the mirrors and we would have flowers all over and vases on the tables with flowers and there would be a big picnic and ah, this came from finland this day moreless the finish People always used to celebrate Mid-Summers Day and groups used to get together and oh, and we would have a lot of fun.

me-Do you remember any railroads around in this area?

b-I remember 2 railroads the Duluth South Shore and the Chicago Northwestern
me-where there many mines closed during the depression?

b-Yes, all the mines were closed and there wasn't a lot of iron ore mined then.
