Me: How old were you when you got your first job?

G: I was sixteen My first job was in the Gobard factory, then my second job was I worked in a gift shop Don Rena shop in Falmouth for 5 years, then I bought them out and I took the staff down to my husband's store then I worked there for two years and then I stayed home.

Me: What did you do at the Gobard.

G: I did mostly single seaming, but I did binding, overcasting, stitching I did lots there. I worked there for six years.

Me: Do you remember anything that happened there.

G: Yes I remember when barns and Hecker disaster that's when 52 men drown in that mine.

Me: How did you manage to buy out the store you were working at I ~~coaxed my Husband~~ and son into it

G: I coaxed my son and husband into it so they did.

Me: What did you sell at the store?

G: Mostly hats and yarn.

Me: What type of hats did you sell?

G: Many kinds, they were beautiful hats.

G: Oh about from a dollar up.

G: Well after I was married it was a must if it was depression. It was a must to go back to work.

Me: Tell me about the depression.

G: Oh gosh..... Well my husband was working 2 days a week. Another thing I remember was we had a Ford sedan, and we couldn't afford to buy gas any more so then we tied it up for 2 years. Then we started to run the car again after he went back to work 5 days a week.

Me: How did you get around for those 2 years?

G: Well he used to walk to work because we lived in North Lake location, and I used to get a ride from the other women. Sometimes if we got of early we'd walk home from Edgemere to North lake.

Me: At the Gozard did you have to get any training.

G: They just sat us at the machine and we caught on pretty soon.

Me: How many hours of work did you have a day.

G: We sewed in bundles. Once we finished we'd mark it down and then get paid for that. We didn't make much money and you could never live off of that today. If there was a lot to do then they would keep us after. If there wasn't much they'd let us go early. We ~~would~~ start sometimes at seven or eight and sometimes work to 11 & five.

Me: Did you have any challenges or anything during your jobs.

G: No we just sewed lots of blazers, corsets, panties, and night gowns.

Me: Did any other family members work in the Gozard?

G: My sister Claire worked there for 12 years.

Me: When you were working what did you do with your leisure time?

G: I was a house wife. We used to go to parties, Weddings too.

Me: Have you ever been in any clubs?

G: I've been in card clubs where you play cards, and the Guild for St. Joseph's church. I joined that as soon as I got married. We work there for wedding, parties, funerals and things.

Me: After you retired what did you do with all your time?

G: I house cleaned, and we bought Peralta's house and made apartments out of it down on 5th street and that kept me busy.

G: Well when some body moved out I had to clean the apartment for somebody else to move in. I made a lot of friends with the tenants there. I lived in that house for 26 years, me and my husband. So that was ~~was~~ something.

G: Oh that when we went new York, when my husband was selling Electralux we won those trips, we went to New York 5 times. That was ~~a~~ a long time ago.
