me - Did you bring your lunch or did you have hot lunch?

Mr. S. - Well in the winter time we brought our own lunch in the summer time we ran home and ate.

me - What kind of food did you eat?

Mr. S. - Well in them days it was pretty poor so we mostly had peanut butter sandwiches.

me - Ok, Did you ride a bus to school?

Mr. S. - No, I walked even when I was in kindergarten. It was over a mile.

me - Were you in any organizations or clubs?

Mr. S. - (coughed) Yah I belong to a couple of clubs, UFW, a small club, the Brownstone
