

Interview with Marilee Ruona-Johnson

January 2nd at Marilee's house, Kim Racine interviewing
Marilee Ruona on the airport. In Ishpeming, establish where it is!

Me: Who started the airport and how?

Mrs. Ruona: (chuckles) Ed Johnson started buying the land ~~for~~ for the airport in 1968, and had required most of the land in 1970 and that's when they actually started construction on the airport, himself and three of his close friends. and the three people who helped him build the airport initially were Steve "Bongo" Carlson, George "Babe" Reich, and Ace ^{Windsor} Windsor, a famous pilot from Ishpeming.

Me: Where and when was Mr. Johnson born?

Mrs. Ruona: Ed Johnson was born in 1933, May 11 in his parents home on Gold Street in Megaukee and his full name was Edward Fred Johnson.

Me: Did he have any brothers or sisters?

Mrs. Ruona: Yes, he had 2 brothers Carl Johnson and Wilbert Allan Johnson, and one sister Anna Marie Johnson. Wilbert died when he was 11 years old they think he died from pneumonia, he just died at home.

Me: Did they ever want to learn how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona: Ah, no not any of his brothers or sisters were interested in flying.

Me: Did he have a family background on people who flew airplanes?

Mrs. Ruona: No, he was always interested in flying just a ^{young} boy and he used to go watch Hartley Haines. ^{Haines!} part of the name? ^{just a} ~~young~~ ~~boy~~ ~~Hartley~~ about one of the only people who

were doing and flying in the early days in Negaunee. Hartley used to fly glider planes off of Teal Lake.

Me: Do you know who the person who got him interested in flying was?

Mrs. Ruona: Arved ~~Hemala~~^{Avoid} ~~Nomila~~ was his instructor and Ace ~~Windsor~~St had a lot of ^{early} interest in flying. These were two of the people who ~~were~~ gave him his start in flying.

Me: Where did he go to learn how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona: I think he went to Iron Mountain first, and then of course from I don't know if Marquette County's airport was there then, I think they were flying out of H.E. Sawyer at that time. And he did do some flying up where the 41 dragstrip used to be, it was like a little airport up there, and later it was made into that dragstrip, and now I think the dump is up there. The Ely Township dump is up there.

Me: How old did he have to be to learn how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona: At that time I don't think there was age restriction, now you have to at least be 16 to get a student no to get your license you have to be at least 16, but anybody can get ~~a~~ student pilot license, as long as you can reach the pedal.

Me! What kind of airplane did he fly?

Mrs. Ruona! The first plane I'm not real sure but,
I'm pretty sure that the first plane he
learned to fly in was Piper Cub a J-3,

Me! Did he have any kids?

Mrs. Ruona! Yes, Edward and I had 2 children Anna
Marlene Johnson, and Sara Marie Johnson.
Anna was born in 1979 and Sara born
in 1981. 1978, 1978, Correction, correction.

Me! Did they ever want to learn how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona! Yes, they always like to go for rides with
their father, in fact I remember one of
the first times Anna went in the Bi-plane,
which is an open cockpit airplane, and Ed
took her up and he used to always go
up with the plane and do loops, and he just
flew around the airport and came in and
landed and I went and got her out of
there. She was crying, I said what's
wrong didn't you like it, and she said
he didn't go upside down, he didn't do a
loop, she was madder than heck. She
was only four years old at that time. So
they both have shown some interest in
flying, and I am sure they'll be ace
pilots by the time their 18.

Me! Is the airport private or public?

Mrs. Ruona! The airport is a class-C commercial airport registered by the state of Michigan and it's public open to the public and they just have to check the Note-ams with the Marquette County airport to see if it is, if the runways been mowed, or plowed.
We have a sawed runway + half a mile long and we have 3 taxi-ways and windsaw we have all the state requirements to make it a Class C commercial airport, and we are inspected every year to make we are up to our standards.

About how many people fly there?

Mrs. Ruona! Now let me see now, there's I think there's 12 airplanes and 9 pilots out here because a couple of guys have 2 planes and let's see, there are 10 pilots that fly out of the airport on a regular basis, and we have 2 aircraft that are based here although one of the airplanes, which is my late husband's, Eddy's, has gone done for complete reconstruction and that's the Meyers O-1-W, and it is finished and will be coming back this spring.

Is the airport open in the winter?

Mrs. Ruona! Ah we register it as closed with the

Marquette County airport because the weather
is so unpredictable up here, but the guys
in the past have been plowing the runway
and flying, and if the runway hasn't been
plowed a couple of the guys fly on this,
Mac Windom and a couple of the other
guys have flown on this on occasion

Me:

I understand that Mr. Johnson had an airplane that was used during World War II. Could you explain how?

Mrs. Ruona: Yes, that's the Meyers O-T-W and it's a 1941 airplane there were a 100 of them built, they were built in Tecumseh, Michigan. Ed, in fact worked at the factory for a while before flying for United Airlines and he worked with the man who designed and built them Al Meyers he is passed on now, but the plane was built in the early 40's and they used it for a trainer for some light ^{reconnaissance} in World War II. There are only 92 of them left flying now, and I had Ed's brought down like I told you easily they have completely rebuilt it at the original factory in Tecumseh and it will be coming home in the spring, it should be really something to see.

Who got you interested in flying?

Mrs. Ruona: Well my Uncle Pauly Kaminen had already

had his license and had taken us flying a few times, and I always thought it was something I wanted to ~~try~~, and I just went down to the County airport and took their \$5 introductory flight, and I just loved it. and I started flying once a week after that and paying for it as I went. And that's when I heard about this old bi-plane that Mr. Johnson had and I went out to see the airplane and that's how I met Ed and he got me interested in what they call tail-draggers.

Me! Where did you live when you were born?

Mrs. Ruona: Ah, I was born in Ishpeming at Bell Memorial and we live in National Mine just down from the school there until 5th grade and then we moved out south of Ishpeming by the S&I store because my mother and father owned the store.

Me: Did you have any brothers or sisters?

Mrs. Ruona: Yes, there were 5 of us in the family, I have 3 brothers Marvin, Michael, and David (Fleck), and one sister Melissa (Harmala).

Me: Did they ever want to learn how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona! Not that I know of, they didn't show any interest in it,

me!

Was there anybody else in your family that flew airplanes?

Mrs. Ruona! Just my Uncle Pauly that I know of, Paul Hamner.

Me!

Where did you learn how to fly airplanes and who taught you how?

Mrs. Ruona! Well, after taking that introductory flight at Marquette County Airport with Northern Air Motives, and I had, my first instructor was Hartlines Hanes who Ed had known years back as a pioneer aviation in the area. And he was a very good instructor and I had a couple instructors a few years after that Darrell Spalding, and, well Ed then himself taught me how to fly the Bi-plane, or not the Bi-plane the cub, he had a J-3 Piper Cub and it's a tail dragger, and I had learned in a Tri-gear airplane which is a lot easier to fly than a tail dragger.

Me! How old were you when you learned how to fly?

Mrs. Ruona! ~~let's see, when I learned how to fly that would have been Ah! 18; 19 by the time I got my license I was 19,~~

Me! ~~What kind of plane do you fly?~~

Mrs. Ruona! ~~Well, I fly a single-engine land is what my license is rated for and I can fly a tri-gear airplane which sets up on 3 wheels and a tail dragger which the backwheel drags.~~

Me! ~~Do you still fly?~~

Mrs. Ruona! ~~Ah) since my husband died in a accident (car) in 1985 & haven't done very much flying & I do still have my license, and I have to get my medical renewed, you have to renew your medical every 3 years if you have Class C, i think it is, 3rd grade medical Ah, so I want to get back into flying maybe this summer & will have ~~to~~ fine to get back and start flying again.~~

Me! ~~What year did you get your license and who was your instructor?~~

Mrs. Ruona! ~~When I finally had qualified to take my check ride with the ^{F.A.A.} examiner it was August, 15, 1977 and the examiner at~~

the time was Harry J. Simmons the same
Mr. Simmons who later went on to build
Simmons Airlines which was flying out of
Marquette County for a few years.

After the death of Ed, Marilee then
went on and got married to a man
named Durrell Ruona, and had another
child Amy Martha-Jo Ruona.
