GB "Well there have more ladies working in the plants & in the pits & they do a good job. They can do any job that the guys can do out there."

GB "Well wouldn't plan on working for CCI around here someday, cause I think it would be the wrong place to go. The mines only have a life expectancy into the first quarter of the next century & then they could possibly be all done here then what?"

Me "Please describe what you enjoy doing in your spare time."
GB "Fishing hunting."
Me "OK. If you had to do it over again would you make the same career choices?"
GB "I don't know. Maybe I would have gone into the service first so how I would have liked that."
Me "Looking back over the years, what impressions stand out most in your mind concerning your association with CCI?"
GB "Well they pay us good but we are just being used for the company you know."
Me "Well are you in the union?"
GB "Ya"
Me "Well here some other questions we would like to ask you about the union are you now or have been a member of the Steel Workers Union?"
GB "Yes, and a member now. ~~and probably be all done here then what~~
Me "Have you ever experienced being on strike & if so how many times?"
GB "I have been through four strikes."
Me "How were those?"
GB "How were they? One was a fairly long one over four months. It is hard on the family & the pocket book, but they were all worth it."
Me "How does a strike actually begin?"
~~It depends on the size of the strike starting at the 100 person level.~~
GB "It's when the company & the union can't come together to get a collective bargaining ~~agreement~~ ~~settled~~ settlement. It is when the union's right to strike to get what we want or try to better ourselves."



Me "OK. How many employees does the strike usually involve?"

GB "It depends on the size of the place striking at the mines there are what 1200 hours people suppose"

Me "What is the purpose of a picket line & describe what happens there?"

GB "Well the picket line is to stop actually too cap it stop anyone from going into the mine outside on the edge & the workers are to go there to let people know we are on strike & to stop the company from making production if possible, more or less just to show who we are & what we are doing."

Me "In general what is the most interesting or unique story that you can remember from many times that the workers were on ~~strike~~ strike?"

GB "Well I think it makes better solidarity as the people are all in it together & have become better friends with each other."

Me "What places are union meeting or union rally?"

GB "At a union meeting they first go through the minutes ~ You have your regular agenda or it starts out with swearing in the officers then the regular minutes & then you bring up different subjects & talk about them & if the union is going to send any one to special meetings or projects or a donate to places, Every body votes on it to see, they let you know how much money & left in your kitty."

GB "You have to have the union before we end the interview if you want to have any gains in this world to make a better life?"

Me "OK Before we end the interview if there anything else to conclude that you would like to add?"
