Dad: Salvador father was Salvador my mother was Rose

Dad: my father worked in the mine & my mother was a house wife

me: are you currently married

Dad: yes

me: what is your spouses name?

Dad: Julie

me: what are the names of your children?

Dad: I have one child Victor

me: How long have you been working in the iron industry?

Dad: 19 years

me: why did you choose to work in the iron industry?

Dad: for income & benefits

me: Please name those relatives who have worked in the iron industry

Dad: I had several uncles, nephews & cousins that worked for Cliffs include

me: what are the names of various mines or buildings you have worked in

Dad: I worked underground at the mather ~~Br~~ Republic Tilden, Brown stone shops & currently at the empire

me: over the years what kind of duties have you performed for CCI

Dad: ~~Labourer in the pit~~ Labourer in the plant various jobs in operations, I also

me: in as much detail possible please describe your main duties

Dad: my current job is an auto motive mechanic <sup>in your current job</sup>

~~I work on just about everything~~

ME: Did this job require any special training or special education?

Dad: I did take some mechanics training after high school.

ME: Could you describe any special machinery or equipment you use on the job?

Dad: We use a lot of <sup>hydraulic</sup> equipment. Hydraulic wrenches, etc. Everything you work on is big. There is all kinds of big equipment we use.

ME: What is the most challenging or difficult part of your job?

Dad: [The challenging part is trying to figure out what is wrong with something when you have a problem with it.] trouble shooting, [good quote]

ME: thinking back over the years what was the most challenging or difficult job you had to perform.

Dad: I don't know. I ~~haven't~~ seen a lot of difficult jobs in the maintenance department, hard to pick out a particular one.

ME: Over the years what have you enjoyed about your job?

Dad: the fact that it's different from day to day. You work on different things.

ME: What are the biggest responsibilities of your job?

Dad: Well, [You're working on all this expensive equipment + you've got the responsibility of the equipment itself, & the people that are running it.] include good quote

ME: Um if it applies to you describe the most dangerous situation you've been in.

Dad: Well you get yourself into some dangerous situations on a pretty regular basis just because of size of the equipment you work on.

ME: Have you ever been involved or witnessed an accident?

Dad: Yes, I've been involved a few myself. I've witnessed others & some are pretty serious.

ME: Could you describe anything that happened...

Dad: ya I don't want to describe anything but there are some serious accidents including deaths nothing that I'd care to get into at this time.

ME: Could you describe either the most unique or bumperous situations you've been in over the years?

Dad: Well, there are a lot of humorous situations where everybody tries to have a good time just to make the time go by. Try and do it on a downkeyed basis so nobody gets hurt.

ME: Could you describe your working conditions?

Dad: Our working condition we try to keep ~~it~~ in a safe manner & for the amount of equipment that goes in & out of the shop. Keeping it clean is probably one of the biggest safety factors.

me: have the safety standards changed or improved

dad: ya theres been improvements made on a regular basis all over the years different items that set taken care of to make job work a little easier & a little safer [good quote]

me: do you see any improvements that you see should be made in the future

Dad: I don't know what the future is going to bring as far as safety like I said the equipment just keeps getting bigger so there's a lot of safety factors that go come with the equipment

me: How have you seen the duties of your job change over the years

dad: [all the equipment keeps getting bigger & bigger your duties of a mechanic fixing it are becoming more & more strenuous because of the fact that all the parts are bigger.] good quote

me: could you describe what your coworkers are like

Dad: well I mean ya the coworkers some of um pretty much some characters all right

good quote But there all there with an education & a job to do try to do it best the can you learn & trust your partners to do the jobs safely & take care of themselves & you just like you try to take care of them & yourself

me: during your career were you involved in any special projects or implement in any new ones

Dad: I've helped out in making a few special tools that we use on the job other than that no nothing to special projects

me: have you ever won any awards or recognized in any way for your job performance

Dad: no the only awards I've ever won was safety awards.

me: at any time have you felt like changing your job or career

dad: I have changed my job within (I a couple different times some of it been voluntary & some of it has been involuntary but non the less the jobs have changed)

me: oh what do you think the future holds for the field or the emplro

Dad: I really don't know as far as competitive [our managers what they tell us is a we have to be competitive]

me: what does the future look like for the iron industry in general

dad: I think [we'll always need iron & steel & if we can get it out of the ground & produce a good product you know at a competitive price I think our future looks good.] good quote



me what do you feel must be done in the future for cci to remain competitive

dad produce a good product at a reasonable price good <sup>great</sup>

me what do you think has been the key to success for cci when other companies have failed

dad I think it's just that producing a quality product at competitive price

me looking far into the future how do you think history will remember cleveland cliffs iron company & its workers

dad: I don't know I think looking back at it will be like us looking back the cave men

me: How has the role of women changed in the iron industry

~~dad I pretty much think it's going to stay where it is~~

me: now have women working in the pit & the plants running equipment & we even have one or two women in maintenance

me: what direction do you think that will take in the future

dad: I don't know I think it's pretty much gonna stay where it is.

me: what skills do young people of today need to develop if they plan to work for cci someday

dad: Basically getting an education whether it be in maintenance electrical and a kind of a degree right now

me in a related question what advise would you give to general to students of today

dad: Get an education get degree in engineering electrical engineering mechanical engineering any of that is where the future is I think.] include

me ~~If~~ could you describe what you like doing on your spare time

dad I like working with steel ~~or~~ welding & fabricating machining hunting fishing

me If you had a chance to do it all over again would you make the same career choice

dad I probably would

me ah why

dad well I think it's been a good life I enjoy what I'm doing

me looking back over the years what impressions stand out in  
the most in your mind concerning your association with CCL

dad I don't know that's a tough one, I guess it's just the  
fact that [it is a good place to work] good quote

me Are you now or have you ever been a member of the  
Steel Workers Union

dad yes

me Have you ever experienced being on a strike

dad yes several strikes

me How does a strike actually begin

dad A strike is actually a labor dispute, between the company & the union

the union or company is making demands the other one doesn't want  
to meet & the try to negotiate to resolve their differences if  
they don't do it by contract date they end upon strike

me How many employees does a strike actually involve

dad all union employees

me What is the purpose of a picket line

dad [picket line shows support for the negotiations team that it runs  
to negotiate your contract & it also monitors what traffic goes  
in & out of the property] include & quote

me Do you know any interesting stories about an incident on the  
picket line

dad Well there's always interesting things happens on the picket line  
[its a bunch of people trying to make the best of a bad  
situation so you entertain yourself any way you can  
sometimes we have live music on little parties and get together  
even family get together] include

me What takes place at a union meeting or union rally

dad Well a union meeting is a discussion of all union business for the  
month you have a monthly it's going to a grievance if you  
filed an safety a lot of its safety

me In your opinion what is the Steel Workers Union so important to  
the workers

dad Well we have the Steel Workers Union doing us up as far as  
contracts & job evaluations on even all our wages & vacations  
all come from the union fighting bursening us a hard unit  
with the union to achieve these things for us

me Is there any thing you would like to add over what  
has just been said
