interview with Verden Greenwood

Mr. G: Born on May 7, 1921 in Caspian Michigan

ME: What are the names of your parents?

Mr. G: Lucilla & Louis Greenwood

ME: What do your parents do for a living?

MR G: My dad was a foreman for men for the county

& also for the city of Caspian caspian

ME: How long did you work in the iron industry?

Mr G: About 30 years

ME: Why did you chose to work in this iron industry?

Mr G: I had a opportunity to be employed by the C.C.I after coming to this area to do the office work for a (prox) construction of Iron River at the Tracy Mine in Negaunee

ME: Please Name those relative who who have worked in the Iron Industry?

Mr G: Bruce Greenwood who is my son Ronald Smutana my son-in-law

ME: What are the names of the various mines or buildings you have worked in?

Mr G: I worked at the Loyd Mine, the Humbolt Mine and the District Office in Ishpeming.

ME: Over the years what kinds of duties have you performed for C.C.I?

Mr. G: Accounting, Personal assistant, Assistant Employment Supervisor, Employment Supervisor and Supervisor of Employee Benefits

Me: In as much detail as possible please describe the main duties of your previous job.

Mr G. As supervisor of Employee Benefits I administered the pension, insurance and workers comp programs for the area regarding the pension program the necessary paper work was done at our office for anyone interested in retiring we gave them all the information that was necessary so that he would be aware of what to expect in his retirement. Regarding the insurance program that covered the health and the life insurance programs that the Cleveland Cliffs had for our employees we did a lot of information work for people who had retired who had come in for insurance information and the men/women that worked in our office would handle that situation for the most part and they would help them as much as they could regarding the workers compensation program we weren't notified of all the accidents that happened at all the different properties.

Mr.G: And if there were any lost time accidents payments were made through our office we dealt with lawyers quite a bit in this area because of litigation different things that might of happened

ME: Did this job require any special training or higher education?

Mr.G: Yes, I believe knowledge of industrial relations matters very helpful accounting backgrounds helped because I dealt with our accounting department often especially in regards to ~~cont~~ worker comp. So a higher was really ~~preact~~ pretty necessary.

OK now ME: What was the most challenging or difficult part of your job?

Mr.G: Probably the most challenging part of my work involved the workers compensation part of the program for the most part there were no questions about necessity for lost time due to an accident but once in a while there would be questions whether person should be away from work so long this sometimes would cause great difficulty and maybe sometimes even litigation

ME: thinking back over the years what was the most challenging or difficult duty you have to perform and explain why.

Mr G: Well the most difficult part well one of the most difficult part of the job that I had was to notify the surviving spouse in case of an accident which caused death I never could get to enjoy that one very much it was very difficult to go to a door and to tell a person that her spouse had been injured and so badly it caused death.

ME: Over the years what have you enjoyed most about your job?

Mr G: As a supervisor of employee benefits I had to meet a lot of people and I think I enjoyed that the most. Most of the people that came in were very pleasant very kind and I enjoyed talking to them and of course the most happy people that came in were those that were planning

Mr G: ON retiring and of course that was  
a pleasant thing and I enjoyed giving the  
information that was necessary cause  
they were always very pleased at any  
thing they could get so they  
know what was going to happen  
later so I guess to say that I  
just enjoyed meeting people and  
that was the part I enjoyed most

ME: What was the biggest responsibility  
of your job?

Mr G: Well of course our job employee  
benefits involved a lot of money going  
out and my responsibility was to  
do it as <sup>economically</sup> equitably as possible without  
hurting anybody so I believe it was  
the greatest responsibility to do  
economic job as possible

ME: Please describe your working  
conditions.

Mr. G: Of course working in an office  
I had good working conditions  
and my <sup>colleagues</sup> congenial were very  
congenial so I enjoyed my working  
conditions.

MRG: NOT Having for several years as  
I am retired I don't feel I can  
ANSWER 17 or 18 and 19

ME: During your career, were you involved  
in any special projects or have  
you implemented any new programs?

MRG: Our company was a self insure  
of workers compensation <sup>compensation</sup> claims  
and I was concerned we were  
not reserving ~~enough~~ money  
to cover claims that might  
~~occur~~ occur I wrote a letter to the  
person in the accounting section  
who would be involved he  
excepted the concern after  
consulting with Cleveland he  
~~excepted~~ accepted the concern I had  
after consulting with Cleveland  
so he and I worked several  
weeks developing the program  
and it was very successful

Mr G: Well I never won any awards in my job performance, but I got several <sup>Promotions</sup> in the Industrial Relations department so I felt that maybe that was an award in its self OK
