

Tori Sodergren Interview  
with

Judy Anderson

ME: This is Tori Sodergren December 9, 1990 and I am interviewing Judy Anderson who was a student at National Mine. The interview is taking place at her house on the county road 581 south of Ishpeming.

ME: When and where were you born

Mrs. A: Well, I was born in National Mine on April the 20th, [REDACTED] Do you need the year.

ME: ya

Mrs A: 1939

ME: Err, Do you have any brothers or sisters.

Mrs. A: Yes I have 2 brothers & 1 sister

ME: Errm, what are there names & ages

Mrs. A: Well my brother michel he's 55 & he lives downstate on Sterling Heights MI. & I have a brother roger who will be 54 & he lives right out here on county road #2 not too far from here.

ME: Errhm

Mrs A: & I have one sister julie who was born 18 years after me so shes 33 & only one year older than my oldest son

ME: Really?

Mrs. A: And she lives on ninth street in Ishpeming

ME: Errhm, jezz

Mrs. A: So we all live except for you know my oldest brother

ME: Yup, so does all my dad's sisters & brothers

Mrs A: that's nice

ME: They all live like on the same road

Mrs A: Emhm

ME: Em, Do you know when & where your parents were born.

Mrs A: Well my mother was born in Republic MI & my dad was born right in National Mine & he still lives there & he's gonna be 82

ME: Really woo

Mrs A: So he's probably one of the oldest residents you know

ME: Emhm

Mrs A: That oh has lived there

ME: Cool, lets see, ok how I'm gonna start with the National Mine stuff. Ah what years did you attend national Mine.

Mrs A: Right from Kindergarten through twelve

ME: like in the 19's or what

Mrs A: Well lets see I graduated in 1957 so 12 years from there

ME: 1945

Mrs A: 45, 46

ME: Do you remember the names of any of your grade school teachers

Mrs A: Oh sure, um, I had Mrs Gleason, she was the music teacher & I was trying to think of when I was in kindergarten I don't remember exactly the name of my kindergarten teacher I don't

Mrs. A. I don't know if it was Mrs Gleason then it might of been her then

ME. Uhuh

Mrs. A. First grade I had Mrs. She was Ms. Mason at the time

ME. Emhm

Mrs. A. She's Mrs. Magnuson now

ME. Somebody's doing her, but he always used her,

Mrs. A. She was a nice lady

ME. Yeh, Mr. Annala always used her as an example in class

Mrs. A. Oh, oh

ME. I think that's the one.

Mrs. A. Very good teacher

ME. Yeh.

Mrs. A. + second grade I don't know I think it was Ms. Wineburg maybe in the second grade, oh 3, 4 + 5.

ME. All those years

Mrs. A. All those years, I think, there were other teachers there but I can't remember exactly who they were. 6<sup>th</sup> grade I believe was Ms. Millimaki, Phany B. Millimaki, & she was real strict, probably the most strict of the lady teachers that we had.

ME. Uhuh.

Mrs. A. I think I had Mrs. Hart for awhile probably in the 4<sup>th</sup> grade, than um, she married & she was Mrs. Nault afterward.

ME. Emhm

Mrs A. and, lets see teachers I remember the best were in those grades

ME. Yeah, did you have a favorite one

Mrs A. I liked all my teachers really

ME (a little laugh) me too

Mrs A. I never had any problems with them so I, I would have to say I like them all really

ME. I like all mine too

Mrs A. Good

ME (little laugh) Did you remember like anything funny about your grade school teachers.

Mrs A. lets see I don't know teachers in those days didn't cut up as much as maybe they do know, ya know they were teachers so they really didn't joke around too much or anything

ME. Em hm

Mrs A. Oh I don't know if I remember any particular things like that

ME. Em hm

Mrs A. that would of happened we used to, you know how kids are, we used to give Mrs. Gleason such a hard time when she was working so hard on the program, she put on beautiful programs

ME. Em hm

Mrs A. uh Christmas plays for everything. For every holiday She came up with a play

ME. Uhuh.

Mrs A. All the grades were in it, & she used to get maybe

Mrs A. a little prank gift

Me: umhu

Mrs A. of course the kids gave her a harder time then  
but um we were all pretty, you know  
there wasn't much fooling around in those days  
like maybe now,

Me (II) ya wo fool around a lot (little laugh)

Mrs A. (little laugh) well we didn't do that too much

Me (little laugh) do you remember the names  
of some of your junior high high school  
teachers.

Mrs A. oh well lets see Some of um aren't with us  
anymore & I feel real bad about that

Me mhm

Mrs A. & Mr Bath was the super intendant at the  
time & he was good did you know, took care  
of a lot of things on his own & Mr. Lindberg  
Ken Lindberg was principle.

Me ! Mhm

Mrs A. and, lets see, ok & um oh probably Mr.  
Thomas

Me mhm

Mrs. He was our um home teacher well we  
had in 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade we had the one  
room where you started off in the morning  
before you change classes ya know

Me. I said rembm, really, em hm we don't have that any more  
at that  
when she  
was still  
talking

Mrs.A. Oh well in those days we didn't change classes until the 7<sup>th</sup> grade + I think most schools they change earlier than that

Me - 6<sup>th</sup>

Mrs. + we didn't so that was kinda nice, so he was our homeroom teacher, Mr Tontin was the band teacher but we had him for um oh, English + things like that and music he was good at that

Me - emhm

MrsA - and mr. Ogea he was a was a couch boy he also taught arithmetic + stuff like that

Me - yah like

MrsA. - the um some of the junior high teachers did the same things as the high school did

Me - emhm

MrsA - had the same ones I don't know things like that any more Mr Gleason was the gym teacher and Ms Ranta was the girls gym teacher

Me - emhm it was separate

MrsA. Pardon me

Me - you were separate

MrsA. Emhn

Me - really  
MrsA. and she was also the Home Economics teacher  
So she was girls gym and home ec.

Me - ya

MrsA. - (little high)

Me - we have coed, is coed where the boys + girls  
are together

Mrs A. - oh see we were always separate we didn't have  
coed in those days

Me - (little laugh) that's neat

Mrs A. - ~~\$~~ and a I think those were you know  
those were the teachers we had

Me - emhm (little laugh)

Mrs A. - that made up the whole high school + everything

Me - ya (little laugh)

Mrs A. - covered you know everything from Junior  
high on.

Me - others like lots + lots up at west coon and  
national mine was about (I don't know about  
12)

Mrs A. - All kinds of teachers now hey

Me - ya. did you have a favorite high school teacher  
or why or why not?

Mrs A. - Oh + one I forgot now how could I forget  
him Mr. Annala the one that I was telling you  
about that must be his great Uncle the  
teacher you have now,

Me - emhm ya

Mrs A. - ya, he was 7th + 8th all sorts of stuff

Me - what did he teach

Mrs A. - Oh English, very stern with that good teacher

Me - emhm

Mrs A. - Good, we should have more teachers like him  
now everything together the kids really  
took him off all he had to do was look

Mrs.A at you he didn't have to open his mouth

me - yeah

Mrs. All he did was look out

me little laugh

Mrs.A like right there, um he didn't smile too much  
but he was good

me enhm

Mrs.A but a I don't know I liked all of those ~~the~~  
teachers too

me enhm

Mrs.A - They were all good teachers yup + probably  
mr thomas + mr. um think you could  
kinda fool around with them a little  
more then with the others

me - little laugh

Mrs.A ya know we would kinda do things like  
that.

me - uhuh

Mrs.A So I could say maybe they were my  
favorites then

me - yeah.

Mrs.A they were easy to talk too

me yeah.

Me. Do you have any funny stories about your high school teachers

Mrs. funny stories about high school teachers, oh well the funny thing about me one time was you know how when your gonna change classes that was the big thing of course kids are always ready to move

Me - ya

Mrs A - Um we didn't have lockers or anything in those days

Me - really

Mrs A - So we'd come right in the room all the time in wintertime, you'd have your boots on or wet shoes or whatever

Me - emhm

Mrs A - + you hung everything right in the same room

Me - Where did you get all your books

Mrs A - stuck um in your desk everybody had their own desk + otherwise you just piled um somewhere

Me - emhm

Mrs A - no lockers at all, oh  
me - we have lockers + gym locker

Mrs A. So I was in my seat and I was waiting  
for that bell to ring

me ya

Mrs A. (little laugh) + the floor was slippery +  
I come out of my seat fast + right  
down I fell oh I felt so embarrassed

me (little laugh)

Mrs A. + you know how kids laugh

me - ya (little laugh)

Mrs A. - + when I went right down + the  
teacher said well that's what you  
get for being in a hurry to get  
out of there,

me - (little laugh) I know all the kids, he  
usually gives us 1 minute to get our  
stuff + we all just sit there

Mrs A. - that's how we were too we'll always  
be the same

me ya

Mrs A. - or it would probably ehm excuse me  
were a lot of fun + things but

me emhm

Mrs A. - I don't know when you knew everybody  
like that you know you did more things

me - yen

mrsA. but I always remember that because it  
was so embarrassing to fall on the floor

me - (little laugh) how did you get to school each  
day

mrsA - well starting from kindergarten I lived over  
a mile away from the school I lived  
what was called Sweet home location  
up on top of the hill on the other side  
of national mine

me em hm

mrsA - & when you first come in to national mine  
from town I lived on the first road that  
you go on

me - dc

mrsA - & I used to go on this walk right from  
kindergarten to walk to school

m - amile!

mrsA. over a mile it was & I'd go up behind my  
house & there was a trail that my brothers  
used to take & some of the neighbor kids  
used to, I was the youngest one upon the  
hill

me - (little laugh)

mrsA - and we walked & I don't know what year they  
or they started to have the bus then, I remember  
walking when I was just 5 years old

me really

mrsA. & by myself a lot

me - oh

mrsA - which I probably wouldn't do write now

me - (little laugh) I wouldn't either

mrsA. & I also walked in high school a lot from they didn't bus you for everything like they do now

me - jeez

mrsA - I I don't know if the kids on our end, I think we probably walked most of the time,

me - emhm

mrsA - until after I graduated then they started to have a bus

me - really

mrsA - but um we walked in many kind of weather I remember one time the longest we were out of school when we didn't have to walk to school is when we were off for 4 days because I don't know if it was because of a storm or because it got so cold.

me - emhm

mrsA - that time they just weren't having school so that was nice

me - ya emhm

mrsA - & I remember walking when I was in school same trail a lot of times & there were bears on that trail & everything

mrsA. people used to shoot back there but

me - ho ho ho noho

mrsA (little laugh) oh my god how long did it take you?

mrsA - um I don't remember, I used to make it here in time I probably had to leave really early in the morning to get there in time girls they take a lot of time gettin ready.

me - yeah (little laugh)

mrsA - many times I didn't wear boots that was bad we didn't wear boots

me - (little laugh)

mrsA. and we weren't aloud to wear any kind of pants we had to have skirts or dresses on

me (little laugh)

mrsA - no pants aloud so you had those bear legs ya know

me \_\_\_\_\_

mrsA - \_\_\_\_\_ well I guess you callum bobby socks now but we called them ankle socks

me - emhm

mrsA - and that's a that's what we wore

me - ya was there a dress code or how did you dress

mrsA - had to be dressed up

mrsA. there weren't any blue jeans or you could probably wear I don't know if they maybe after in high school maybe they let the boys wear some blue jeans.

me - emhm

mrsA - not the girls if you did wear any you had to wear them under your skirt or under your dress & there you were standing out there in the hall trying to get take these pants off

me ya

mrsA (little laugh) which was kinda hard

me - ya

mrsA - and a that's what we had too, like I said about the cheerleading you didn't wear skimpy little skirts

me - oh I do

mrsA - when they started to wear dresses for cheerleading it was just the um pants that we wore.

me - really

mrsA - emhm

me - we wear skirts

mrsA - we didn't wear skirts at all,

me - blue jeans that's all we wear to school

mrsA - nobody wore those on a oh some special thing maybe that you went to

me - emhm

me - even some of the teachers wear um

mrs A. really oh gosh the teachers wore suits & were dressed up all the time you never saw a teacher — without his suit jacket on even

me - really

mrs A. they had them on all the time, once in a while they take them off when they were on their own free time

m - emhm

mrs A. they always dressed up-

me - I think mr. Botts at our school is the only one that dresses up, he's been teaching along time but all the other ones

mrs A. I hate to hear that though that's a little too casual

me - but they dress nice like a nice sweater & a tie & stuff

mrs A. like sweaters

me - nice dress slacks

mrs A. emhm, I didn't realize that they were allowed dressing like that

me - ya

mrs A. thought it was different

me - & yo know the lady teachers can wear jeans pants

mrsA. Oh really

me - but they always look nice

mrsA - that would be hard to I don't know if it would  
be hard to see that

me - they look nice though

mrsA. - this is my dad I was telling you about who was  
born & raised in national mine,

me - (little laugh) where was I know

mrsA - & about that dress code again it was a  
always dress up

me emhm

mrsA - if you didn't wear um, we had saddle shoes ya  
know

me - oh ya we wore those for cheerleading last year

mrsA - saddle shoes & loafers otherwise you wore  
nylons there wasn't pantyhose  
(little laugh)

mrsA - they were regular nylons

me - ya

mrsA - hooked to garter belts & a you wore those  
when you wanted to dress up more  
me - emhm what kinds of subjects were  
taught.

mrsA - more or less the basics, reading, writing,  
arithmetic, english, um we had music, biology,  
chemistry a some of the kids one time  
took a um correspondence course to learn  
another language, we didn't have foreign language  
of any kind

me - really (little laugh)

mrsA - will they show up on the tape

me - I don't think so

mrsA - let's see, algebra, geometry

me - emhm I couldn't get into algebra this year

mrsA - English we had to have 4 most we had to have 4 years of um math, 4 years of english 4 years of music, these were ya know you had to have those

me - did you have computers

mrsA - no never knew what a computer was

me - ha

mrsA - we were lucky we had typewriters

me - ahha we have computers in 8<sup>th</sup> grade now

mrsA - in Home Economics we cooked on little stoves with little burners individual things at each table

me - like bunsen burners, we have units now with

mrsA - a stove cubards, sink &

me - Oh it's probably very nice

ya

mrsA - but we had a good time

me - who what was your favorite subject

mrsA - oh probably oh I always liked um English, reading

mrsA. reading and that the lower grades penmanship + reading in those grades I suppose from Economics liked that music, really liked music.

me - ya we have chorus now

mrsA - & those were probably my favorites

me - what subject gave you the most difficulty.  
mrsA & why  
math

me - me too

mrsA - really

me I couldn't get into algebra because my  
math

mrsA - I had algebra, I had geometry, don't ask  
me how I got through them

me (little laugh)

mrsA - cause I wouldn't be able to work any  
of that right now I just drew a blank  
I could not get math in my head  
me - really I'm ok in math but I just have to  
stop & think

mrsA - I ya that's the thing if you think you  
can do it, but other things came real  
easy, reading, I could read anything  
could write anything I could spell  
anything.

mrsA - ya know no trouble there but math just had a hard time with that

me

(little hugh) were there any specials fads like

mrsA -

fads oh, well I guess in the 50's I, I had the first pony tail at national Mine

me - really

mrsA - I had long hair really long hair; I tied it up one day & pretty soon everybody started tying there hair up

me -

cool

mrsA -

so that was one of the first fads ponytails & I can say I started it.

me

yup

mrsA,

& of coarse we had our what they're doing know yo know they had saddle shoes — & a loafers, penny loafers always had to have shiny pennies in our loafers

me

emhm, we just have regular loafers

mrsA -

oh they had a, they called um at the time I think I wore one the girls wore almost like on almost looked like a arrow or bracelet band around there ankle if they were going with someone.

me - really

MISA - or whatever I was going with someone  
but I didn't wear one I forgot what they  
call them

me anklets

MRS A - I can't remember what they called them  
they had a name of coarse everybody  
wore there boyfriends graduation ring  
around there neck on a string, I did  
that

me - now we have merpaws there necklaces +  
you each get half + we were them now

MISA - + some of the lads wore their hair  
slicked back

me - with grease

MRS A - there white t-shirts with the sleeves rolled  
up + those that smoked used to carry  
them on their shoulder there was a few  
of them that did that

me - (little laugh)

MISA - So I guess ya the lads could wear some  
blue jeans like I said we couldn't but  
they could.

me - emhm

MRS A - + we wore a the skirts were down to your ankles

me - ya

mrsA - + they were long didn't really have any  
~~real~~ real short skirts everything was a  
 long, long, wore more flat shoes then  
 high shoes high heels & girls looked real  
 feminine, liked to dress up it was nice,

me - hardly anyone wears skirts, no one, like  
 when we half too shorts when we was um  
 or to church & stuff

mrsA - all kinds of um there must of been

me - ya

mrsA - I must of done them

me - how were kids like expected to laugh  
 mrsA - behave

well you had to like I said before they  
 were more strict they didn't fool around  
 that much

me  
 emhm

mrsA - you know otherwise you were sent  
 down to the office to the superintendents  
 office principles office & we had to  
 sit there for the rest of the after  
 noon

me  
 (little laugh)

mrsA - or down in the lower grades you went &  
 stood in the hall do they still do that?

mrsA - yup sometimes

mrsA - really k, well that's what they did then too

me

Stand in the hall or get detention

mrsA - um they still have signing in + signing out of large study hall

me

eh eh

mrsA - if you wanted to go to the bathroom you had to go up at the desk

me - emhm

mrsA. - to the study hall teacher & you had to sign your name & what time you left & then when you came back you signed it again & put the time you came back to make sure that you didn't go anywhere else

me - ya we just like can we go to the bathroom ok

mrsA -

no we had to do that and whenever you had to leave that main study hall you had to have an excuse from the other teacher if you wanted to go to the library or something + do some research

mrsA

mrsA - you couldn't just leave the room

me - our study hall is attached to the librarie.

mrsA - oh well we had to have this special note from the teacher that's why

me - hu

mrsA - So they kept watch everything was single file when we went down to we had to everyone had to go alphabetically

me - alphabetically in the lunch line holy -oh my gush

mrsA - it was strict

me - it would take me along time with the 5'

mrsA - I used to be with the P's they were pretty far behind too

me - ya

mrsA - so we were never aloud to just run down the hall or anything couldn't chew gum ever

me - emhm

mrsA - never were aloud having gum in school

me - neither are we but most kids do but if they get caught they have to right or something

mrsA - & you weren't supposed to talk in the halls passing classes pass from class

me - there's a roar in our halls

mrsA - we weren't aloud to be very noisy

me - It's roaring

me- it's really loud, lockers slam + everything.

MISA- See well we didn't have lockers so there wasn't that all that extra noise

me- ya em, lost my spot here oh, em, what kind of extra curricular activities were offered.

nrsA- not to much

me - really

MISA- we had our basketball games that was the only sport there was there weren't we didn't have track even or baseball we didn't have anything.  
" I can't think of any other, school parties  
we had school parties

me- school parties.

MISA- em hm in 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> & up thru high school yes how could I forget the school parties although I didn't go to many of them, we used to serve a nice lunch + we had dances in the gym

me- we have dances

mrs A - & they were nice

me - ya

mrs A - I you had to dress up no blue jeans not those you had to dress up

me - that's what we wear to our dances.

mrs A - guys had to wear dress pants  
girls had to wear their best dresses

me - um hm we don't have school parties  
we have dances

mrs A - yeah, well this was called a school party  
& they'd have um for the different  
holidays like the valentines dance,  
couple of them

me - um hm we have halloween &  
christmas dances, christmas dance  
is coming up this weekend coming  
up

mrs A - oh & yours were on the weekend

me - ya

mrs A - ours were during the week, school  
nights

me - ours our on the weekends.

mrsA - oh we had them on school nights

me - (little laugh) (the guys in the background  
our making noise so shes trying to  
signal them to be quiet) —  
were you or any of your friends  
suspended

mrsA - no, nope, never, not that I recall  
no of.

me - really

mrsA - I can't remember any of the kids I  
was close to — get suspended

me - at our school there been gettin  
stricter cause some kids been  
doin some bad stuff so like if you  
do somethin wrong you get suspended  
for a day or something.

mrsA. There might of been some kids who  
were but I can't remember

me - ya

mrsA. cause some kids might of got a little  
dassy with the teacher so maybe  
they were sent home, that probably  
did happen

me - ya em hm

me - do you remember any special moments  
when you were in sports events

mSA - well like I said all we had was the  
basketball was the big thing & there  
wasn't any girls basketball then  
you had your gym time & you  
played basketball then as an  
excercise

me - umm

mSA - they never had sports for girls if  
well like I was a cheerleader, ~~they~~

me - did you have to try out for cheerleading

mSA - yes we had tryouts

me - us too

mSA - I think the boys voted in those days

me - voted really

mSA - I'm pretty sure that was the way it  
was

me - oh my gosh

mSA - in our school it was that way any  
how

me - the cheerleading coach & some others vol

mSA - we didn't have any special coach, our gym teacher kinda got us together but we made up our own yells & everything

me - (little laugh)

mSA - there wasn't any such thing as a cheerleading coach

me - we have floor chars, & bench chars, & Sidelines

mSA - oh my gosh we didn't have any like that

me - (little laugh) oh did the basketball team win a trophy or a tournament ever

mSA. oh I think they did I don't remember but National Nine always did have a good basketball team

me - emhm

mSA. & I remember one year we lost the final by about 1 point oh & we cried

me - (little laugh)

mSA. oh we were sad that had to be when I was a freshman or a sophomore

MrsA. cause like I said I quit them with basketball

me aka we had our first game  
Thursday

MrsA - oh

me - we won

MrsA - & we always had beautiful basketball  
banquets for the whole for the Junior  
High.

me - really

MrsA. & the on high school level, the  
mothers would cook a meal.

me - en hm

MrsA - for the basketball boys & cheerleading  
girls & that

me - ya

MrsA. & we'd have those nice banquets  
that was on a weekend I think

me - a hah

MrsA. but they did have  
the regular basketball ones were we would get our  
letters & medals & we used to handout little

me - that's cute

MRA - that you could put on a chain

me - were you in any involved in any plays or programs

MRA - right from kindergarten everyone —

— you know we were in these plays + I remember one time I forgot I don't know if I was in the 5<sup>th</sup> grade of what I played the part of a teddy bear, I had what was called a teddy bear coat. They had these little fur coats for girls then

me - ya

MRA, + I had one of them I played a teddy bear + oh we were gosh we had, I think I was in most every play + then between singing + shows then in high school a they were beautiful Mrs. Gleason, had a all the girls wear formals all the time, you borrowed these from other people cause we never had proms

me - we have proms our junior + senior year

MrsA. It was just gorgeous, right down thru kindergarten, we would sing & then of course we had, that was the big one, when you were a senior you performed senior class play

me. Were you in it

MrsA. Yes I was in it, if you weren't in the play you did something toward it —

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me ya

MrsA. National Boro was known for their programs everybody came to see them & the auditorium was just filled to overflowing

me - our to, Mrs Bettis now, she's good too

MrsA. Oh that's good to hear,

me - do you remember any funny stories about the programs

MrsA. Stories well there were some, I don't remember any particular one but there was some especially when you had the little kindergarden kids up there ya know, I can remember people roaring in the audience but

most any particular one that I could talk about

me - what was lunch time like

MWA - lunch time was a lot of fun because we had good home cooked meals, they weren't smash meals like they have now, they had meat + potatoes + everything

me - oh my gosh

MWA - & my mother in law was one of the cooks who cook there so everybody waited for lunch time lot of kids ~~that~~ didn't have a good meal at home but they could depend on that & you could go back for seconds one big thing everybody really loved was the bread heels the cooks would take & butter these heels & put peanut butter on um & you could go & get as many of those as you wanted to get

me - oh boy

MWA - I still love peanut butter though

me - me too

MWA - & the kids ate them up too, really good good meals.

me- ahuh did it cost money & stuff

mrsA- yes, but not too much

me- really

mrsA- it was pretty cheap for what you got  
like I said it was a "Hot lunch"

me- \_\_\_\_\_

mrsA- in those days they didn't waste no much  
cause kids were hungry

me- yeah

mrsA- especially the kids who walked like  
I did, breakfast time was hours ago

me- yeah

mrsA. You sat in study hall & your stomach  
was growling.

me- (little laugh) like after you ate ~~or~~ did you  
go out & play

mrsA- yeah we were aloud to go outside couldn't  
leave, well lets see, yeah you could go  
out in that time but you had to be back  
at a certain time, I think you could  
leave the ground now I'm not sure  
if I'm ~~or~~ right or not, maybe we weren't  
aloud although some kids did go out noon & didn't  
come back.

me - really like skip it

Mrs A - skip it so but a otherwise you just hung around the school, they had a playground

me - ya

Mrs A - took walks + things like that

me - emhm

me. enhm

MWA. & there was one set of encyclopedias  
in the large assembly which we called  
it. large study hall, & you figure all the

to look up words in 1 set of encyclopedias

me - ya

MWA. cause most families didn't have um,

MmA. played "Russia" we called it,  
 me Russia?

me ( little laugh)

MmA. you know, you threw it & if it  
 went under your legs you close  
 your hands

me - yeh

MmA. & all those kinds of things played tag  
 & all kinds of things like that, fun things

me - yeh did you have a graduation ceremony

moA - yeah

me - what was it like

mxA - very nice ch, only the um, well the auditorium  
was small, so just you immediate family,  
everything was done on stage

me - enhm

mxA - & they used to have this scenery  
they'd put up & curtains, & everything
