Mr. A: on a school bus

Mr. A: the school was about 5 miles away and my dad drove the school bus.

Mr. A: the only thing we had was basketball, but then we did play baseball and football on our own at recess time

Mr. A: we were a class D school we only played the smaller towns

include champion, Mississinewee, Republic, we used to service Nequane city and Ishpeming during Christmas vacation other than that we only played the small schools

Me: did you have any special chores?

Mr. A: no

Me: how were the kids expected to behave?

Mr. A: we had strict teachers in school we didn't dare misbehave too much once in a while you could get by with something ^{clerk}
we had real good teachers and they kept you in line pretty good.

Me: what punishments were given if you misbehaved?

Mr. A: the worst thing probably would be you would have to stand out in the hall, but you would have to go to the superintendent office and he would talk to you, ^{should have asked what he did!} I only had to do it one time.

Me: how did the kids dress?

Mr. A: the boys were allowed to wear jeans but the girls had to wear shirts
if there were any student parties the boys had to wear dress pants

Me: what foods or sayings were popular?

Mr. A: the foods everybody wore crinkly haircuts especially those staying ^{include} ball.

Mr. A: lunchtime we always had a real good hot meal, and my mother was a cook at the national mine school when was there it was a regular meal it was a nice hot lunch

Mr. A: the biggest program was the christmas and spring but there was also a program for each holiday that were put on by Ms. Gleason and did a beautiful job of it
