

Brad Helsten's Interview

Me: mom when and where were you born

Mom: I was born in Ishpemings in July of 1948

Me: what where your parents names

Mom: my mother's name was Lyle De Manikko and she married my father Walter Icetoo and they both attended school at Nation mine and my mother graduated from there

Me: How many children were in your family.

Mom: I have four brothers and one sister I am the fifth child I have one younger brother and all of my younger brothers and sisters attended national mine school and also graduated from there

Me: Where was your family originally from

Mom: my grandparents were originally from finland both my father and my mother's parents

Me: When did they come to America

Mom: they came to America before I was born I don't know when

me: where did you go to school?

Mom: I went to school at National mine I started  
kindergarten with Ms. Sesson and went right  
through to the twelfth grade graduated in 1966 our  
class was the 30th class to graduate from national  
mine high school and being the 30th class we  
were allowed to have senior caps and senior smocks  
the class in there was three adults that was roomed too  
with our class in 1968 making it 21 in total

me: how did you get to school?

Mom: I walked to school everyday I walked to  
school in the mornings I went home for  
lunch then walked back to school and at night  
walked home again and during special field  
trips and outings where we had to go somewhere  
as a class I was always so thrilled to be able  
to ride the bus well all the other kids that  
rode them everyday did not think it was very  
thrilling at all

me: what subjects did you have

Mom: I had all the subjects that the kids have today English history math just about everything except now I think the kids are lucky to have them more classes and block classes at Westwood than we had the opportunity to have.

Me: that's interesting

Me: did you play in any sports

Mom: I did not play in any sports because when I went to school there wasn't really any that much offered for girls like we didn't have basketball and so we could not go out for that like the girls can now but I did play in the band I played an instrument in the band and able to go on trips with the band to places like Escanaba and Iron Mountain on special band testing days.

Me: where kids punished in school?

Mom: Yes we were punished; we did some stuff

Me: did you do that at all?

Mom: no I don't think that I can ever recall anyone when I went to school being hit but if there was a reason for us to be disciplined we went to the office just like kids now and got suspended if that was necessary

me: How did you dress in school?

Mom: We had to dress in skirts or dresses so girls  
the boys were not allowed to wear blue jeans  
or boots they had to wear shorts and dressy pants

me: tell me about growing up in National Mine

Mom: growing up in national mine was great I can't  
think of a better place to be raised and to  
raise my own children we have the good  
schools national mine always had a good  
school / we had a great environment and its  
just nice to be here and for those that are  
away its a nice place to come home to

me: tell me some special things about you  
When you each child

Mom: really outstanding things I remember  
as a child is being called a little mascot &  
cheerleader for the boys basketball team  
when I was three and a half years old I even  
cheered in Negeune tournaments that floor to a  
three and a half year old she was big when I was  
~~big~~ in the middle of it my picture was in the paper  
every basketball season people still come up to me  
today and say I'm still there if I was there I was the cheerleader  
for national mine

I still have a sweater that was knitted for me when I was small just especially for me for when I was cheerleading

me: did you like school?

Mom: yes ~~in~~ <sup>in</sup> school I always had a good record that I can be very proud of through high school I think I only missed 3 days for my entire high school years cause I had the mumps.

me: did you get a job when you got out of high school?

Mom: yes I worked for a short period of time after school then I was married and started to raise a family which two of my children now have graduated from high school Brad you know is one in national mining which is continuing on which is something I did and now you are doing in June of 1991 it will be my 25th anniversary from leaving school and will be 75 years for national mining so I think that will be a great memory for everybody and I think for our 1966 reunion we will have one of my class mates have a room to work in many different jobs some are working in the mine some are just mom's some live in small cities some are away some live just not far enough away they grow up and I think growing up in a small town knowing your neighbors trusting the people that live with you is one of the greatest things that you can have

being here is one of the best things you could  
ever be  
me: what's different today when you're going  
to school

Mom: computers are really the in thing now teaching  
computers in school having the opportunity to  
use them and the mechanics courses and just  
all the extra things kids have the ability to know  
that is one of the best improvements that Deins  
is giving off for everybody

me: did you have a shop class when you were in  
school

Mom: yes we had a shop class but only the boys  
attended she says girls attended home work girls  
did not have to go into shop boy did not have to  
go into home work that was the way that was today  
girls and boys attended both classes

me: enclosing what advice could you give kids  
today.

Mom: I think the best advice would be get everything  
you can out of your school like go to school everyday  
listen and get good grades and just be good in school  
do the best that you can
