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## Jeremy Skrenes's interview with Lois Toy

This is Jeremy Skrenes and I am going to interview Lois Toy on the 12th of December, 1970. She is a student of National Mine.

Me: Where were you born?

Lois: I was born in Ishpeming.

Me: Did you have any brothers or sisters?

Lois: I have two brothers, Burton & Robert

Me: Did you marry?

Lois: No

Me: When & where were your parents born?

Lois: They were born in Ishpeming around 1894

Me: When did you graduate from National Mine School?

Lois: I graduated in 1944

Me: Do you remember the names of any of your grade school teachers?

Lois: Miss Herring, Miss Solka, Miss Millanaki, Miss Gleason, They were always willing to send homework home when I was out of class because I had an ear infection and was in a bad automobile accident & they were always very helpful.

Me: Do you remember any of your junior high & high school teachers? Could you describe them?

Lois: Mr. Gleason, Mr. Annala, Mr. Lynn, Mr. Gleason taught geography & he was always interested in everything we did. He was kind of fat & jolly; he also was the coach, Mr. Annala taught spelling & penmanship, helped a lot with writing. Mr. Lynn taught Home

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Me! Do you have any interesting or humorous stories about your high school years?

Lois: I can't think of any right now.

Me! What was the first day of school like?

Lois! Sad, people were crying

Me! Were they nervous?

Lois: Yes, Miss Gleason was our kindergarten teacher, we sat around her & she told us stories, later we worked with peg boards & played games.

Me! About how long was the school day?

Lois! I think about an hour and a half.

Me! How far were you from school? Did you live in this house all your life?

Lois: Yes, I lived next door to the school.

Me! What kind of subjects were taught in school?

Lois: Reading, history, spelling, arithmetic, geography, algebra, biology, chemistry, general business, typing, shorthand, & geometry.

Me! What was your favorite subject?

Lois: Music, Because I liked music & all my relatives were interested in music, so I became interested.

Me! What was your most difficult subject?

Lois: I didn't like biology, I didn't like cutting up frogs and things like that.

Me! How were the kids expected to act & behave in school?

Lois: We were expected to behave, to sit quietly, no running in the halls, no whispering.

Me! What kinds of punishments were given?

Lois: You got sent to the office, or you had to stay after school, sometimes, you got the ruler on the knuckles.

Me! Were there any special facts or sayings when you were young?

Lois: I know we had some but I can't think of any right now,

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Me: What kind of music did you listen to?

Lois: I liked classical the best, popular too. My favorite singer was Bing Crosby, I liked opera, I used to listen to the opera on Saturday afternoons, sometimes, when I wasn't skiing.

Me: What kinds of extra curricular events were offered?

Lois: Girls glee club, high school mix chorus, we had a string group for a while, Terencies, school paper, we had a newsletter.

Me: Were there any sports?

Lois: Basketball was about the only sport

Me: Which ones did you participate in?

Lois: All of them, I guess.

Me: Did any of the teams win a trophy or a tournament?

Lois: Yes, we had some good basketball teams, I remember we lost the U.P. tournament by one point, people were pretty sad, crying.

Me: Did they have any major effects on the school?

Lois: We were really interested in basketball, today I'm struck by the lack of cheering in basketball,

Me: Did the teams travel a lot?

Lois: Yes

Me: How far did the teams travel?

Lois: Marquette, Negaunee Naima, Amason

Me: Who was the principal when you were a student?

Lois: Mr. Annala

Me: Was he strict or lenient?

Lois: He was strict but fair

Me: What were the textbooks like?

Lois: Your math books seem to jump into algebra quickly, but ~~we~~ we had algebra & geometry in 9th grade. Some students would take advanced math, we didn't have as much local history as we do now, there was more spelling

Mei: How much homework did you have?

Lois: We had lots of homework.

Mei: What was lunch time like?

Lois: I went home for lunch. Kids on the bus took their own lunch.

Mei: Was there hot lunch

Lois: No

Mei: Did you have a lunch recess?

Lois: We had lunch recess.

Mei: How long was it?

Lois: I'm not sure, maybe 20 minutes.

Mei: Did you have any special plays in National Mine?

Lois: Yes, we had Christmas operettas, operettas in the spring, class plays,

Mei: What were they like?

Lois: Miss Gleason put on some really nice operettas we had costumes & it was a big thing / Christmastime.

Mei: Did you participate in them?

Lois: Yes, I used to sing.

Mei: Do you remember any humorous or interesting stories about them?

Lois: I remember I was singing to Scrooge, who was Jimmy Moody, and chased me away.

Miss Gleason wrote an operetta & later when I became a teacher, I put on that same operetta.

Me: What was the graduation ceremony like? ⑤

Lois: It was on Sunday evening, the minister spoke  
the senior class usually voted on who would  
speak, later in the week we had commencement  
teachers & board members attended, we had songs  
by the glee club, a presentation of a senior  
memorial, the presentation of diplomas by Mr. Bath  
& then the valedictory & then the recessional, I  
had special memory of this because my  
father was on the school board & signed my  
diploma.

Me: were you able to maintain contact with childhood  
friends?

Lois: Yes, I still see most of the people I went to school  
with

Me: Did you have any teachers that had an impact  
on you?

Lois: Mr. Annala impressed me by his excellent teaching,  
Ms. Brown taught me a love of literature, Ms.

Gleason taught me music.

Me: Were there any yearly outings?

Lois: There weren't a lot, but I remembered going to the fish  
hatchery when I was in third grade, we used to  
go out to plant trees, we had girls' conferences, we went to  
other schools, I remember we went to Negaunee.

Me: What happened when you went to Negaunee?

Lois: We had readings, business meetings with advisors, dancing, there  
was a tea dance.

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Me: Did any tragedies happen while you were in school?

Lois: When I was in the grades, Karol Brown Died. We were awfully sad about that. I remember watching the funeral from her grandmother's house, we stood on the hill where the flagpole is now.
