

# Ellen Lundin's interview with Francis Lundin



me: This is Ellen Lundin December 06, 1984 The person I am interviewing is Francis Lundin we are going to be talking about the Hercules powder mill

Q. my name and... Francis Lundin I live on the 3rd street north 3rd street in Ishpeming and retired

me: How old are you at the present time?

Q. 77 ~~years~~ of age right now In the spring if I make it I'll be 78. (he laughs)

me: Where were you born?

Q. National Mine

me: What year?

Q: 1904

me: (clear throat) Where did you live at where did  
you live in National Mine when the Hercules  
powder plant was in was operating?

Gr: Well, it was called Brooks Hill were we  
lived and an from there we moved to  
Mitchelle Hill above the Mitchelle spring  
and then from there close to the school  
that house is no longer there it was  
across the road from the to the old Town Hall  
and that's where we lived when my  
father got killed at the powder mill.

me: But what time was the plant put up?

Gr. What time was it blown up or put up?

me: yeah

G: Well you see there has been 4 times  
you know (he was mumbling) there was a  
First there was a black powder ~~black~~ plant  
it was just one building. And that building  
stood there for many years since it wasn't  
used to much you know. And then after  
that they started adding on. And they built  
a dynamite plant. and ah when I first worked  
there at thirteen that's after my father got  
killed. There was ah it was quite a large plant  
It they built it a lot bigger then and ah they  
put a new mix house Because that had blown up.  
and back house. Up No At that time that  
was growing new ~~buildings~~ were being put up oh  
no and Kayes house there was a box of houses  
and I worked in there too. (he laughs)

me: How long did your dad work there?

G: I don't know how long he did work

I ~~don't~~ know he worked in there when I was  
seven years old

G: But he worked there before that  
you see I had been living with my grandfather  
and ah oh ya after I started school well  
I I had went to school for most of my time  
in Kindergarten I was only 7 years old I lived home  
(he mumbled) and ah I used to like to go  
to school in National Mine because ~~I~~ was  
way ahead of the other children before I started  
school we were up at what we used to call  
the groove and there was a <sup>we used to</sup> bandstand  
there I was sitting up in the bandstand  
@ two small ~~woman~~ woman came up in the  
bandstand and one of them asked me if  
I was going to go to school and I said yes I'll  
be starting this fall that was in the summertime  
and she had an apron on and she took a  
notebook out of her apron pocket and wrote on  
a page one of the pages and gave it to me. She  
said bring that home and show it to your mother  
you know and she'll tell you who your teacher is going  
to be I looked at her and I said you wrote  
Emily Parks, Miss Parks. She said you read  
and write I said. And add and subtract  
ah ah so she got quite a kick out of  
that Oh she was a darling teacher  
a real little small girl and I I liked  
school but I had a long ways to

G: walk you know It was about 4 or 5 miles. I had walked to school and it was alright to go to school with my aunts and uncles but when went I went back home at night I had to go alone because they got out earlier see. that's how I got my love for animals.

~~me:~~ about how many men were employed at the plant?

G: hm

me: about how many men were employed at the plant?

G: oh let me think. I'll have to start from the beginning in the office up there was 3, 4 in the office laboratory, 2 in the Snell house 4 in the carpenters shop

6: 2 in the electrical shop, 4 firemen in  
the Boiler house & 1 in the acid house,  
1 in the dope house, 1 in the ~~pop~~ powder house  
and 1 in the Soda house. 4 men in the we  
then 2 men in the N.G. House, one in what  
called the Brine house. 3 in the two pack  
Houses. and in the King pack Houses. and they  
take (he mumbles) to the hand pack were they  
pack the big STUFF. Then there were two men  
up in the jelly what we called the jelly pack house.  
<sup>was the</sup>  
there were two in there 4 men in the casenouse  
where the powder was put in boxes. and one man  
hauling the powder down to the magazine. One  
man working in the magazine. the floor  
house it was called you know. And one man in the  
box print house. Besides that there was labor  
let see usually about 5 labors. and an I think  
I covered it. Oh yes one man like a store keeper  
you know. He would get supplies one out of  
the whole bunch was a women yeah she  
worked in the shell house

Me: How many men lost their  
lives when it blew up?

G: Oh, First time it was two, and when my father got killed there were 4. that's as many that got killed. there was no more explosions after that, see what time everything was connected pipelines and that. (he was mumbling) you know because of heating and all that stuff. There was a big space between the building there were baracades built up around the buildings there they built a plank

M: When your father died in the plant who took care of you & your brothers & sisters?

G: An there was a I had too take over my older brother went to work and my sister my sister went to work at the gazarl to feed DS kids and I went cutting pulp & cutting wood. And I had to supply the house. And I was in the woods a lot.

6: Because we used a lot of wood  
the heater I had to cut about 3 cords  
of ~~wood~~ wood a year. I sawed it up by  
hand with a buck saw. And then we  
always cut a year ahead. The wood  
had to dry you know. So it being  
grew we grew all our vegetables and  
everything my mother one year she  
wanted didn't want it. We had  
to replant. My mother didn't want  
to plant the potatoes out there that year.  
for one year. So she hired a man  
with a team of horses to ~~the~~ plow. That's  
when I was 13. He drove the horses and I  
had to handle the plow. And I was used to  
plowing with a single horse. And a half  
beaten plow he had one that hooked to  
the horse that would lift up the front  
end. You know. We planted 100  
ten bushels of potatoes in the front yard  
right across the road from the old town hall  
In National Mine. In the Fall we dug  
up a 100 bushels. We had cows & a horse.  
We always had pigs we butchered in the fall  
and kittens.  
Because at that time it wasn't like today  
you know.

G: If somebody cause a rust today you  
call them in ~~for~~ fit to them. We got a  
very small from the company when my  
father got killed. It didn't hardly amount  
to anything. Mother used to go out and  
work too.

\_\_\_\_\_ . She used to work.

Everybody had to work in them days.  
There was no gettin away from it.  
Yup.

Me: Did the plant <sup>being</sup> out there change National  
Mine Cinc?

G: Hm

Me: Did the plant being out there change  
National Mine Cinc?

G: No, There was many people in  
National Mine that worked in that powder  
plant. Most of them lived in town people  
came in from down south and all over  
to work there you know.

G; let see The Hercules Powder Company  
they worked other places for the first week.  
and they'd get transferred from one place  
to another. Mines up there you know  
the Upper shaft lower shaft and the  
man that owned the building were  
the gazzard was over here. That used to  
be \_\_\_\_\_ store he had a mine up there.  
and he had a store up in National Mine  
Right there across from where we played  
ball. over across the road. It was a big  
store you know I worked there tearing down  
them mine buildings. you know the shaft coverings  
\_\_\_\_\_ Oh there was the number #2  
pit where we picked apples & ~~pears~~ that.  
there used to be a.
