Confusion abounded yesterday when the Federal Budget Director David Stockman announced that funding for education, specifically financial aid, would not be cut as previously proposed and expected.

First Choice of Tickets May Go to Students

The end of long lines for NMU Hockey Tickets may be in sight, according to Gil Canary, head of NMU Athletics.

seats. This way, said Canary, the students could all stand in the reserved areas and have a better view of the action.

Figtree said that as most of the Marquette tickets holders were "little old ladies who want to see blood on the ice," they (the blood-crazed biddies) couldn't be expected to stand throughout the entire playing time.

Canary said that he, along with Lakeview Arena officials, has been working on a plan that would give students first chance at all reserved tickets for the 1981-82 hockey season.

Figtree, did however, have an alternative proposal. He said that he was proposing an expansion at the Arena.

Figtree, however, does not support the proposal. "Even if there are additional bleachers put in the East end for general admission seats (as the proposal calls for), the injustice done to the Marquette residents would be irrevocable."

Figtree's plan would call for doubling the size of the Donor's Room to accommodate additional drunks as well as providing a haven for what he calls "Northern's demented inmates."

This last year, additional reserved seats were removed, making the already inaccessible tickets virtually impossible to obtain.

Khomeni Dies in Strip Joint

The Ayatolla Khomeni, fearless Iranian revolutionary leader, was pronounced dead on arrival at a Paris hospital, after he had suffered a series of heart attacks at a strip joint Wednesday night.

An Iranian government spokesman told reporters Khomeni came to Paris, his former exile, for some heavy RR, which he desperately needed after the American hostage ordeal had ended in January.

"The hostage issue drained his energy more than anybody ever imagined," the spokesman said. "All he got from the rest of the world during the crisis was a lot of human waste."

The Iranian government is now looking for a new ideological leader, whose first task it would be to end the inner unrest which has stirred Iranian domestic politics for quite some time. "We have already contacted Bormann, Goebbels and Stalin, because we think they are the only possible worthy successors for the Ayatolla," the spokesman said.

National

CIA To Have 'Open House'

Odd circumstances force the CIA to have an open house next Saturday. Assistant CIA director James Slime said the planned budget cuts forced the CIA to give up on ideas of renovating the CIA headquarters in Washington.

The renovation had become necessary after KGB agents in Washington had given up their good behavior and switched to breaking in through windows, damaging door locks and taking down entire walls.

Slime said the CIA therefore decided to make it a little easier for the Soviet intelligence agency by giving the open house. "It's simply a measure to avoid further damage to the building," Slime said. "The CIA just doesn't have the money to constantly replace windows, door locks, walls, and broken alarm systems."

El Salvador Is Only PR Stunt

State Secretary Alexander Haig yesterday announced that the U.S. involvement in El Salvador was in fact only a State Department publicity stunt to "make the citizens of the U.S. politically more responsible by trying to have them get really pissed off at the new administration."

"There is no god damn El Savador, man," Haig said, slapping his knee while enjoying the totally confused looks on the faces of those reporters who were attending the press conference.

Some political scientists, however, had doubts about the content of Haig's statement since the State Department had earlier tried a similar trick during the Vietnam War, when it was saying that Vietnam was only a code name for Iowa.

Tough Times for Speeding Drivers

Michigan driver's will have to learn to obey speed limits signs a lot more than they used to in the past, after the House of Representatives decided to take drastic measures against drivers violating the speed law. The House voted yesterday to borrow a guillotine from the French embassy in Washington for violations over 70 miles per hour.

Drivers going between 60 and 70 mph, will be sentenced to at least 10 years in a state prison, while those travelling between 55 and 60 will be sent into exile to Marquette County for a maximum of five years.

According to some state officials, the U.P. exile should have been reserved for the worst category of speeders, since it is definitely the hardest punishment. "Somebody there got the priorities wrong," one official said.

Lansing Celebrates Tisch's Death

The Michigan Legislature has finally gotten rid of one of their most consistent pains in the neck, after tax-rebel Robert Tisch accidentally drowned Friday in one of the drains he was supposed to be inspecting.

Gov. William Milliken uttered relief by saying, "Now we don't have to put up with that son-of-a-b— anymore." The Michigan legislature will celebrate the event, according to Milliken by throwing a "devastating orgie" at the cost of the taxpayers for all those faithful college administrators who wanted to make some brownie points in Lansing by helping defeat the Tisch amendment last November.

and had coffee and bagels with cream cheese and things like that. I never realized there was anything upstairs." (Ben obviously doesn't have anything upstairs either.)



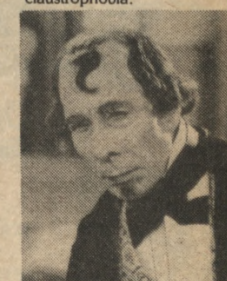

was likely that the result would have been hundreds of fewer students at NMU," Pecotte said.

"But with the funding coming back I'm sure we'll see even an increase of the students here, although mostly at the Skills Center and in the Military Science curriculum," he said.

NMU President John Jamrich expressed pleasure with Reagan's change of plans and noted with pride that federal monies would be line itemed to put the Skills Center in full operation.

"The reason we haven't put a lot of equipment together at the center is because we received word that our vocational training

areas would be fully supplemented if the center became oriented to research and production of military arms and equipment. We will discuss this in our closed board of control meeting tonight and I expect full cooperation from the board. Our news director will have the releases ready for you in the morning," Jamrich said.

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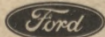

Jamrich Heritage Traced to Russian Tsar

Northern's Department of History confirmed Monday rumors about the heritage of NMU President John Jamrich and established evidence that Jamrich is in fact the great-grandson of the late Russian tsar, Nicholas II.

According to Ruthless Berens, specialist on Russian history, she and some of her colleagues traced back Jamrich's heritage, and found that he is the grandson of one of the tsar's children, who had not been shot by the Bolsheviks.

scientific experts, the sub-terra area referred to as Hades or Hell (slang, usually vulgar), is predicted to become trapped in the second coming of the Ice Age.

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


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Students Going With the Preppy Look

"Fortunately, the cook was not hurt very badly. After the carrot sticks were removed from her ears she recovered

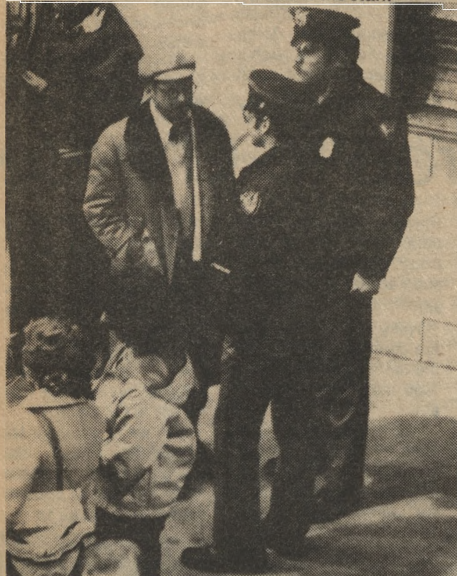
quickly," said VanNormal.

Comley Cited for Recruiting Violations

The world came tumbling down on NMU hockey coach Rick Comley yesterday afternoon. Under secret investigation by the NCAA since early December, Comley and assistant Bill Murray were cited for recruiting violations.

In a lengthy report sent to Athletic Director Gil Canale by the NCAA rules committee, it appears the investigation was initiated after the committee was forwarded a letter from an unidentified NMU student.

The student wrote the letter after overhearing Murray in the University Center tell two recruits that they were here to play hockey first and

study second. While hearsay is inadmissible in court, it was more than enough to send the NCAA sniffing for trouble, as they dispatched two agents to Marquette.

Performing like FBI veterans, the agents infiltrated the Pier Bar, a well-known hockey team hang-out to scratch up any leads. Posing as NHL old-timers, the agents soon had evidence flowing, about as fast as the Molson.

Zeroing in on Canadians Steve Bozek, Dave Kanigan and Bruce Martin, all three products of Castlegar B.C., the agents acquired evidence that suggests the trio failed to complete high

school or its equivalent.

It seems that Martin told one agent that he spent his high school years locked away in a huge ice arena on the outskirts of Vancouver. While there Martin was forced to play hockey seven hours a day and sell programs at the Canuck games. Both Bozek and Kanigan gave similar stories.

"I thought they were just a couple of old hockey bums. I sure didn't have any idea they were with the NCAA. They just kept buying us beer so we were nice to them," said Martin.

Further study by the NCAA has substantiated the

agents' claims. After scouring the Vancouver area for days, the rink was found disguised as an old warehouse just north of the city limits. Inside investigators found thirty skaters going through drills under the watchful eye of Maurice Richard, one of hockey's legends. The Rocket refused to comment, but the NCAA had seen enough to support its agents' data.

A little digging in provincial school records turned up the needed information. All three had files that ended after their ninth year of schooling.

"Hey, we were given an

offer we couldn't refuse. The Rocket approached me when I was 15 and told me he could turn me into a star in the NHL if I dropped out of school and came to his training camp," said Bozek.

The NCAA also did some checking into NMU's athletic budget and found some interesting entries. One was in 1979 for \$20,000 marked for hockey sticks. But a check with all well known

hockey stick manufacturers turned up no record of dealings with NMU in 1979 for \$20,000. A tracer was placed on the NMU check, and it was eventually trailed to a Vancouver bank account under the name Rocket's

School of the Stars. The year 1979 was the first for Bozek and Kanigan at NMU.

Martin came to NMU the next year. The Rockets price 20 acres in Big Bay worth \$8,500.

The NCAA could find no other infractions and has ended its hunt. In two weeks the NCAA enforcement squad will vote on the penalty for NMU's hockey program. The talk around the CCHA is that NMU will be placed on a three year probation and be banished from the playoffs.

Comley could not be found for comment, but rumor has it he is being considered for a position with the Detroit Red Wings.

Computer Cat Big Winner

Myron Finndorfer led a fired-up team of computer Wildcats into quarter-final action last week against the Pepperdine Digits of the Western Collegiate Computer League, winning by a total point score of 2.6×10^9 to 4.9×10^7 .

Northern has counted heavily on Finndorfer's steady play in space invaders, and he pulled through again scoring a game high 13,450 points before succumbing to an eighth line alien's laser.

Myron quickly blazed through the first line of invaders as Marquette fans have become accustomed to seeing, before annihilating the second onslaught, barely giving the invaders a chance

to set up an attack. Myron got through the third round unscathed also and then lost his first galactic cruiser midway through the fourth period.

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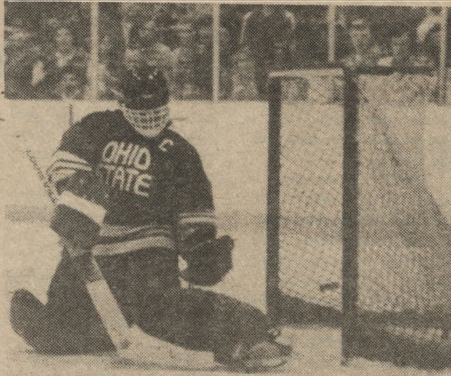
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OSU Coach Quits to Produce Movies

Badgering Defense Kills NMU Dreams

The score is 1-0, Wisconsin leading with five seconds remaining in the second period of the National Hockey semi-finals in Duluth, Minn.

Suddenly, after a face-off in front of the Wildcat zone, Badger forward John Johansson skates down the right side on a breakaway. Northern defenseman Jeff Tascoff, who was questionable for the game because of a bad knee, steps up to make his move. Out goes Tascoff's knee and in flies Johansson, who promptly fires in a wrist shot that skims off NMU goalie Jeff Poeschl's left pad and into the net.

That turned out to be the

score that ended the NMU icers from capturing the national championship last Saturday. Wisconsin whipped the Wildcats 5-1, killing off nine Northern power play attempts and protecting goalie Marc Behrend with strong defensive play. The Badgers went on to win the title, beating Minnesota 7-2.

All-American Steve Bozek scored NMU's only goal at 8:49 of the third. Bozek's tally seemed to spark the Wildcats, as they stepped up pressure on the Badgers with several scoring attempts. But Wisconsin scored two goals minutes later within a 30-second time span to clinch the victory.

Tascoff soon left the ice

after his fall along with another blueliner, Brian Verigar, who suffered a groin injury.

"I think it's a good characteristic of a young hockey club that'll play so hard as we did that late in the third," said NMU coach Rick Comley, who skated 11 freshmen. "It turned out to be an exciting finish and I'm proud of the fact that they did it."

"But that goal that they got with five seconds remaining killed us," added Comley. "When you're down by two it was hard to come back out in the third in a good frame of mind. But after Bozek's goal we had them in a panic and if we

could have made it 3-2 it would have been very interesting."

Bozek, who was named to the All-Tournament team, said the Cats were frustrated by their inability to score, especially during power plays.

"It was a frustrating first period," said Bozek. "Things just weren't going for us, especially on the power play. We tried to fight our inability to score but you have to be natural. They just capitalized on our mistakes."

The Wildcats came out storming in the first period, keeping most of the play in the Badger end. It looked like NMU was playing like its usual self. But Behrend

helped the Badgers stall away three Northern power plays. NMU outshot Wisconsin 11-8.

In the second, Northern was continually frustrated by their inability to score and the Badgers soon got their scoring machine going, much to the delight of a largely pro Wisconsin crowd of 5,681.

Wisconsin took the lead at 3:00 while Verigar was in the penalty box. Taking a pass from the right side, Badger John Lebler initial shot, out of the air and into the net.

Poeschl, along with captain Walt Kyle, protested the goal, saying the puck was knocked in with a high stick,

but referees agreed it was at shoulder height.

"He (Lebler) batted the puck out of my glove and his stick was high," said Poeschl. "I complained to the ref and as always, no answer."

In the third period, NMU had a chance to put some points on the board with a two man advantage. But seconds later, while Poeschl was attempting to clear the puck behind the net, WU's Bruce Driver picked up the loose puck and stuffed it home to make it 3-0.

Bozek saved face for the Wildcats with his goal minutes later. After deking out Wisconsin blueliner Pat Ethier, Bozek raced in and

AAUP Protesting High Education Costs

John Kiltinen, head of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP), has drafted a statement in protest of the proposed cuts to higher education made by the Reagan administration.

Kiltinen said that he wrote the statement to try to "shift the focus from cutting for the sake of the Federal budget."

Kiltinen said that many of the programs that Reagan wants to improve, the military, and industry, require educated people. He said that if cuts were made to higher education, it would hurt in the long run because of the lack of trained personnel.

NMU President John Jamrich echoed Kiltinen's feelings. "Education is an in-

vestment, not an expenditure," said Jamrich.

The statement would help point out "how important higher education is to those goals which President Reagan wants to achieve," he said.

Another purpose of the statement, according to Jamrich, was to "present not only the quantitative impact of the proposed Reagan reductions but also to propose and present a broader based philosophical approach."

The report states that "on the international front, a strong educational system is essential if we wish to re-establish our place as a leading world power."

Jamrich said that in addition to speculation about the military superiority of Russia over the United States, there has been re-

search done about the advancements that the Soviet Union has made in higher education.

But on the home front,

the report states, "Education represents the human capital formation which is essential to economic recovery in a technological society."

Jamrich said that the final draft of the statement is to be signed by administrative faculty, and student leaders before being sent to Senators

Carl Levin and Don Reigel as well as Congressman Bob Davis and other key legislative officials.
