### McClintock Praised By Navy Admiral

San Diego was the scene recently for the change of command of Submarine Flotilla ONE.

Capt. D. H. McClintock, formerly of Marquette turned over command of the Free World's largest submarine force in one port to Capt. F. J. Harflinger.

The \$1.8 million submarine pier was the site of the colorful ceremony. The pier was dedicated by Capt. McClintock only last September.

Several other former Marquette residents witnessed the ceremony. They included Navy Commander A. K. Bennett, Ned Watson and Mr. and Mrs. John Lautner. They were seated among the guests of honor on the deck of the giant submarine tender U.S.S. Sperry.

The commander of the United States Pacific Fleet Submarine Force, Rear Adm. B. A. Clarey, journeyed from his Pacific headquarters in Honolulu for the ceremony. He praised McClintock for the exemplary manner in which he carried out his assignment as Commander Submarine Flotilla ONE.

Adm. Clarey said: "Under your guidance, the operational efficiency of the submarines of the Flotilla has been outstanding." He added, "The performance of Flotilla ONE units during the recent Cuban crisis was commendable and is proof of the increased readiness of the Flotilla."

McClintock's new duty assignment is with the staff of the National War College in Washington, D. C.

### Lawmakers In Recess For Weekend

LANSING (AP) — The Legislature was in weekend recess today after routing a number of new bills to committees and taking action to seat its newest member.

Rep. Leonard Walton, D-Detroit was sworn into office Thursday when the House voted unanimously to accept a special committee's recommendation that he be seated with a "public censure" of Walton and his campaign committee for violations of state election laws.

In other action before the recess, the House sent to its rules and resolutions committee a proposal to postpone the legislative session until after April 1, when voters will pass on the proposed Constitution.

**Tax Rebate**  
A sales tax rebate for retired people and barring of discrimination in employment because of age were proposed today in bills filed for introduction in the House.

Both were among a series of measures to be introduced by Rep. Edward Michalski, D-Detroit.

In one, he called for a rebate on sales taxes paid by men over 65 and women over 62 who have retirement incomes of less than \$5,000 a year.

### Public's Attitude Toward Mental Ailments Changing

(EDITOR'S NOTE — More and more, the man who feels emotionally distressed seeks professional help and makes no secret of it. This, psychiatrists say, is a healthy development in the struggle to prevent and treat mental illness today. Here, in the last of a series of five special articles, is a report on how the public attitude toward emotional affliction is changing.)

NEW YORK — Recently, a man placed a personal notice in his hometown newspaper.

He said he'd be away for a time at a hospital, and urged friends to write him there.

His new address — a mental hospital.

**Straw In The Wind**  
He felt no embarrassment in admitting to emotional ailments, a need for treatment and expectation it would work.

It is one straw in the wind of public change to regard mental illness as objectively as heart disease or TB, without stigma, shame or fear.

People don't "catch" emotional illness just to be mean or because they are weak, or feel sorry for themselves, says Dr. C. Hardin Branch, president of the American Psychiatric Association. Their treatment calls for understanding by family, friends and the public.

**One Major Difference**  
Their sickness differs in one important respect — they don't seem to want to be helped, and thus don't evoke sympathy, the Joint Commission on Mental Illness and Health points out.

This expert group was authorized by Congress in 1955 to survey the nation's mental health needs, and it issued a report last year calling urgently for a vast buildup in facilities to treat mental and emotional ailments.

Neurotics — the man with a constant grudge, the woman always nit-picking at faults in everyone else — are simply hard to get along with.

One old fear is that the mentally sick usually go berserk. But the crime rate of discharged mental patients actually is lower than it is among the general population, the New York State Department of Mental Hygiene found in a study of more than 10,000 male patients.

**Emotional Checkups**  
How does one know if he needs help?  
Dr. William Menninger advises emotional checkups, such as sensible people have regular physical checkups. While there is no simple test for mental health, he lists some questions to be asked in an emotional checkup:

How do you get along with other people? When a situation gets really rough, do you lose your temper, become jittery or paralyzed, or so anxious you cannot function? How much fun do you get from constructive, creative giving of yourself?

How do you react to frustrations? By quitting? By realizing you cannot win all the time?  
How free are you from anxiety? What outlets do you have when you are tense or anxious? If you are troubled, do you really try to seek help?

**Common Disturbance Signs**  
"The essence of all these suggestions is the recognition that we have to have the courage, before we look at other people, to be
