Icy Air Mass Hits Midwest, Moves East

(By the Associated Press) A vast mass of icy air, powered by brisk northerly winds, stung the nation's midsection today and headed into Eastern and Southern states.

Subzero cold spread from Montana across the north central region into Ohio. Temperatures plunged to nearly 30 degrees below zero in northern Minnesota.

The weather bureau posted cold wave warnings for most states from western New York south to Virginia, Tennessee, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas and northeastern New Mexico.

The mercury dropped to near 30 below in International Falls, Minn., this morning after a high of -22 Wednesday. In other Minnesota cities, it was -25 in Hibbing, and -22 in Duluth and -15 in Minneapolis.

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Four Of Family Die In Kalkaska Restaurant Fire

KALKASKA (AP)—Four members of a family of six perished today when a fire destroyed their roadside restaurant and home on U.S. 131 south of here.

Two teenage daughters escaped the blaze, running a block in their bare feet and night clothes in 6 below zero temperatures to give the alarm.

The fire swept a combination restaurant and filling station operated by Cecil Birmingham and his wife, Ovidia.

The parents died with two other children, Donald, 14, and Valerie, 13, when all were trapped in the basement living quarters.

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U.S. Believes Soviet Troops To Exit Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. sources report some Soviet troops—perhaps as many as 8,000—may ship out of Cuba within days. And American officials hope some of the Soviet weapons will be leaving too.

The forecast of the early departure is partly based on the arrival in Cuban waters of four empty or lightly loaded Soviet ships. One already has docked, sources said Wednesday night, and the three others are approaching the island.

The ship movements were disclosed barely a day after word circulated from a congressional and diplomatic sources that the Soviet government had promised Monday to withdraw several thousand of its troops from Cuba by March 15.

Should Junior Be Spanked By Teacher?

(By the Associated Press) Should junior be paddled when he becomes unruly at school? Educators over the nation have varying opinions, but generally they don't consider it as vital an issue as the superintendent of schools in Washington does.

Supt. Carl F. Hanson has asked permission of the District of Columbia Board of education to spank young troublemakers. Hanson said immunity from paddling encourages insolence on the part of some children.

William C. Hinkley, superintendent of Aurora, Colo., schools, said that while there is no state law restricting corporal punishment, "We certainly do not recommend this (corporal punishment) as a means of discipline—certainly not in many cases."

The New York State education commissioner, Dr. James E. Allen Jr., said, "The exercise of corporal punishment is authorized in New York state. Local school boards have the power to prohibit it in their districts, however. It boils down to a question of what is reasonable."

In New York City, the spanking of pupils by teachers is not permitted.

Irving Breyer, attorney for the San Francisco Board of Education, said California law permits corporal punishment, administered only by a principal or his assistant. Use of the practice is left to the discretion of each school board.

A Montana statute says teachers may administer corporal punishment if it is witnessed by another teacher or principal, but not with undue anger or without notifying the parents.

John W. Letson, Atlanta, Ga., school superintendent, said, "We do not officially have authority for corporal punishment. We have what I consider complete leeway to maintain order. Certainly we don't feel we have any serious problem."

Corporal punishment can be justified only as a last resort. Dr. Owen B. Kernan, Massachusetts commissioner of education said, "The teacher oftentimes must act in place of the parents. The test of corporal punishment is whether it is reasonable and moderate."

Three Nurses Hike To Nahma From Escanaba

ESCANABA (AP)—Braving zero temperatures, three nurses from Saint Francis Hospital in Escanaba completed a hike of 35 miles from Escanaba to Nahma in Upper Michigan. The nurses—Mrs. Thomas Ellegret, Sally Frizzell and Virginia Trenary—staged the hike to help the Delta County Association for Retarded Children build a new school. They took collections and pledges along the way totaling \$2,500.

Navy Expands Tender Fleet For Polaris

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy is enlarging its fleet of tender ships and floating drydocks to provide more floating overseas bases for its Polaris submarines.

Included in the new shipbuilding program submitted to Congress in the defense budget is a request for funds to construct a fifth tender and to convert another floating drydock capable of servicing the larger, 425-foot long Polaris submarines.

Details were disclosed in testimony Wednesday before the House Armed Services Committee by Vice Adm. Charles D. Griffin, deputy chief of naval operations for fleet readiness.

For the planned fleet of 41 Polaris submarines, the Navy estimates it will need six tender ships with accompanying craft. Two tender ships are now in commission. A third was launched last month, and a fourth is under construction.

In his testimony, Griffin explained the Navy's need for a fifth ship and the conversion of another drydock.

When the concept of the Polaris submarine-missile system was first presented, it was argued that such a system would not need foreign bases. This view still is expressed. But the original thought has been modified to the program of floating bases which can provide routine supply and minor repair needs, and a change in crews without a submarine having to make the long cruise to the United States and then back to its station at sea.

Interceptors View Firing; No Injuries

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two MIG fighter planes from Cuba fired rockets in a flight over a U.S. shrimp boat in the Florida Straits Wednesday, the Defense Department announced today.

The boat and its two-man crew were not hit, the department said, but the rockets were understood to have come very close to the boat.

The MIGs flew away as U.S. planes approached.

The department said U.S. jet interceptor planes took off when unidentified targets appeared on the Key West radar station screen.

The U.S. planes reported two MIG fighters made rocket firing passes at the shrimp boat, the Ala. A Pentagon spokesman said the U.S. planes saw the rocket

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. policy makers held urgent meetings today on a tension-creating new Cuban incident—the firing of rockets by Soviet-built MIG planes in the vicinity of a U.S. shrimp boat in the Florida Straits.

President Kennedy was reported discussing with advisers the possibility of new countermeasures to tighten defense against Communist power based in Cuba.

One serious possibility was that U.S. fighter aircraft would be given definite orders to destroy any Russian planes which endangered the shipping in the Cuban area.

Firings as they were screaming out across the straits to check on the unidentified targets, which turned out to be the MIGs.

The passes apparently occurred as the MIGs were headed back toward Cuba. A spokesman said he was unable to say whether the MIGs had been frightened off by the approaching U.S. planes.

The department said the incident occurred in international waters 60 nautical miles north of the Cuban mainland and 78 nautical miles east-southeast of Key West.

The MIG fighters left the area of the shrimp boat when contacted by U.S. aircraft dispatched by the Air Defense Command in southern Florida, the Pentagon statement said.

State Senate Passes Bill To Aid Docs

LANSING (AP)—The Senate has decided doctors who stop at the scene of an accident to render aid should not be subject to later suits for malpractice.

By a 29-4 vote, the Senate passed and sent to the House Wednesday a so-called "Good Samaritan" bill which its sponsors said would free physicians from the fear of legal harassment.

The 65-word measure declares: "A physician who in good faith renders emergency care at the scene of an emergency, where a physician-patient relationship did not exist prior to the advent of such emergency, shall not be liable for any civil damages as a result of acts or omissions by the physician in rendering the emergency care, except acts or omissions amounting to gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct."

In debate, Sen. Charles Blundy, D-Detroit, attacked the bill as phoney, special interest legislation designed to protect insurance companies issuing malpractice policies to doctors.

Proponents of the bill defended its provisions by citing cases where doctors reportedly were the targets of unjustified suits after they treated emergency cases.

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'Ziggy' Maps Course For Trip To Mars

EAST LANSING (AP)—When man takes off for Mars he won't go in a straight line.

He'll loop around the Earth and describe a goose neck curve toward Mars, then loop around our sister planet.

A Michigan State University professor of engineering has taken two years to make a "map" of the projected journey. It is contained in five volumes.

Faculty members call the professor "Ziggy"—his full name is Bill Marie Zbigniew from Krzywoblocki.

U.S. Resumes Search For Lost Tanker

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)—An unidentified flare and flotsam lettered "Sulphur Queen" stimulated a search south of Key West today for traces and possible survivors of a freighter that vanished after sailing Feb. 2 with 39 men aboard.

The flare was seen Wednesday night in the Straits of Florida, between Key West and Cuba. The Coast Guard had no assurance that the light had anything to do with the 523-foot ocean vessel—or with a private plane that disappeared Wednesday.

A patrol boat checked out the flare and reported it found nothing. A two-engine Beechcraft Bonanza listed only as "Loudner" was overdue on a flight from Miami to Great Inagua, Bahamas, and officials thought the ocean flare might have come from the plane.

The patrol boat's flare mission delayed its trip to Miami with articles recovered from the sea Wednesday and believed to be from the missing freighter Marine Sulphur Queen.

Powell Charges Race Bias

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Adam Clayton Powell has accused Sen. John F. Williams of racial bias. But Williams says how government money is spent—not race—is the issue in his attack on the Negro congressman.

Powell accused Williams, R-Del., at a news conference Wednesday in purchasing property that the New York Democrat said is under a restriction limiting resale to "Aryans." Asked if he felt there was a racial motive to Williams' criticism, Powell declared emphatically, "Yes."

The senator swung back at Powell Wednesday night. "I never have and never will refer to any man's race, religion or nationality in discussing a case on the Senate floor or off it," Williams told a newsman.

"I do intend to see that anyone, whether a member of Congress or not, gives a proper accounting of how government money is spent," he said. "We're going to keep right on the issue and will not be diverted."

Pierre's Prize

Powell, who was in Puerto Rico when Williams leveled his blast, fired back Wednesday before a battery of newsmen. He said a Williams charge that the Housing and Home Finance Administration had lent Powell or groups associated with him \$10.8 million for three housing projects was incorrect.

The HHFA deals in mortgage insurance, not in loans. Powell said, and the transactions Williams referred to were handled by a foundation he started in honor of his father. He said he got out of the foundation a year ago.

"I have always paid my taxes promptly," said Powell. The years in question, he said, are the subject of pending court action and it cannot be determined what, if anything, he owes until the court decides.

As for last summer's trip—according to Williams a "European vacation for Mr. Powell and two lady friends where he attended all the night spots of the European capitals"—Powell said the women with him were staff members of his House Education Committee.

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# Senate's Action Gives University Status To NMC

The Legislature has approved university status for Northern Michigan College, and the official name of the 64-year-old institution soon will be Northern Michigan University.

The Senate passed the university status bill yesterday afternoon by a vote of 33 to 0. Earlier in the month, the bill passed the House by a margin of 96 to 2.

The bill now goes to Gov. George Romney for his signature. It will take effect as soon as it is signed by the Governor.

A similar bill approved yesterday will change the name of Ferris Institute to Ferris College.

Dr. Edgard L. Harden, president of Northern, said "the faculty, students, alumni and people of the Upper Peninsula appreciate this vote of confidence by the Legislature. With this kind of support, and with the encouragement given us by the State Board of Education, Northern will continue to grow in service to the Upper Peninsula and to the State of Michigan."

**Fastest-Growing Institution**  
Dr. Harden said "the support of Rep. Dominic Jacobetti of Negaunee, author of the name-change bill, and the Upper Peninsula senators and representatives has been particularly gratifying."

Northern, established in 1899, has become the fastest-growing state-supported institution of higher learning in Michigan according to a study made by the Citizens Research Council.

**Increased Opportunities**  
"Northern has grown," Dr. Harden said, "because the people of the Upper Peninsula have wanted it to grow. The real significance of university status lies in the increased educational opportunities and public services that will be made available."

The new name will be the fifth in Northern's history, reflecting the broadening scope of the institution's purpose.

Originally established as the Northern State Normal School, the name was changed to Northern State Teachers College in 1928 after four-year programs leading to the bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees had been adopted.

In 1941, Northern became Northern Michigan College of Education. The "of Education" designation was dropped in 1955 when the official name became Northern Michigan College.

**Three-Fold Program**  
Northern's greatest growth has occurred during the past 10 years when enrollment rose from 586 to 2,600, the number of buildings increased from seven to 27, and the size of the campus grew from 70 to 160 acres.

Northern has developed a three-fold program of instruction, research and service, and this is the program upon which the university will build, Dr. Harden said.

Curricular revision and expansion, the acquisition of outstanding faculty, new research developments and greater public service have strengthened Northern for its role as a university, he added.

**Student Reaction**  
NMC students welcomed university status as a "significant step that will mean greater advantages for students and faculty."

James Surrell, Newberry senior and student council president, said the action represents "another significant step in the growth and betterment that we have experienced in recent years. It will better equip us to meet the challenge and demands of modern education."

Jane Piirto, Ishpeming senior and editor of the Northern News, saw the new status as "enabling the increasing student body to have greater advantages scholastically and facility-wise, advantages that must increase their potential for the future. To me, university status means intellectual and social progress for the young people of the Upper Peninsula."

Jane Wilson, Marquette senior and student leader, considered the step "an achievement that will not only benefit the students and faculty of Northern, but also the people of the entire Upper Peninsula."

Accompanying the frigid blast was a bitter northwest wind, which ripped away at pedestrians like a whip. 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# -8° In Marquette; 32nd Subzero Day Here This Winter

Upper Michigan's worst winter ever raged on today, with the mercury plunging below zero in Marquette for the 32nd time this season.

It dropped to two degrees below zero last night and hit eight below this morning in Marquette, marking today as the 32nd day of zero or below, and practically all of those days had subzero readings.

The average number of zero or below days a season here is 10.

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Visibility became low last evening during the stormy periods, and many area motorists were forced to slow down to a crawl or even stop their cars.

**Plowing Situation**  
State trunklines and primary roads in Marquette County are generally bare, but drifting on isolated spots created a big cleanup job for county road commission crews. If no more heavy drifting occurs, secondary roads will be cleared by tomorrow, H. L. Shroeger, Marquette, road commission superintendent-engineer said.

The road commission had received no reports of blocked roads this morning, but there were several isolated spots with deep drifts, including some side roads in Sands Township and north of Champion.

Howard L. Coppens, Marquette, public works superintendent, said the main problem in Marquette was heavy drifting on the outskirts of the city, but added that there were also a few large drifts in town, he said.

The main plowing crew was out extra early this morning to help the night crew tackle the cleanup job. Coppens said they would work all day to clean up the heavy drifts, followed by street widening operations.

**Highway Report**  
State police said that Calumet, Munising and Newberry were among the most hard hit areas by the storm. In the Copper Country, where the temperature was 15 below at 7 a.m., schools were closed and snowing, blowing and drifting was reported.

Munising had high winds, drifting and poor visibility and at Newberry many side roads were blocked and main roads were snow covered and slippery.

**Much Colder Tonight**  
Marquette's high yesterday (recorded early in the morning) was 16 and the mean temperature seven, which was 13 below normal. For the month it's averaging 3.5 degrees below normal, and only three days (5th, 6th and 17th) have had above normal "means."

It was not expected to get above zero today and tonight it will be even colder, being 10 below along the lake and around 20 below inland, according to Meteorologist Emil Ellingson. Tomorrow's high will be five or 10 above zero.

Only 1.3 inches of snow fell yesterday and during the night, but there were drifts hip high in many places in the city this morning.

Snowfall for the month is 11.9 inches, three below normal, and for the season it's 60.6, or more than a foot below normal.

Ellingson said it'll be fair and continued very cold tonight, with mostly cloudy and light snow tomorrow. Occasional snow flurries and cold is the outlook for Saturday.

## Airport Aid Plan Approved By County; Work Described

Marquette County is scheduled to receive \$64,500 from the United States Government this year, through the Federal Aviation Agency, for a construction project at the county airport in Negaunee Township.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the county board of supervisors, held in the courthouse here, the supervisors approved of the contract agreement, and authorized Board Chairman Carl W. Corneliuson, Ishpeming, and County Clerk Lloyd LeVasseur, Marquette, to sign it on behalf of the county.

The project, explained H. L. Shroeger, Marquette, superintendent-engineer for the

county road commission, will enable the widening of the north-south runway (25 feet by 2,890 feet), construction of a taxiway (approximately 50 by 680 feet) and construction of turnarounds on the north-south runway and the west end of the east-west runway (approximately 4,730 square yards).

## City Firemen Called Out Two Times

Marquette's fire department was called two times yesterday afternoon, but no major damage resulted in either case.

At 1:40 p.m. firemen were called to the residence of William Cleary, 315 S. Seventh St., where a hot poker which was hung on the coal bin wall started a fire.

A hole about eight inches square was burned in the wall, firemen said. They extinguished the blaze by use of the booster hose off the service truck.

Eight on-duty firemen and six off-duty men responded to the call, which was placed by phone. They also drove the Nos. 3 (1,000-gallon) and 4 (750-gallon) pumps to the scene and returned to the station at 1:49 p.m.

### Put Out Chimney Blaze

The other fire was at the residence of Wilfred Croisellere, 621 S. Fifth St. Firemen extinguished a chimney blaze there by use of the booster hose off the service truck. Damage was minor.

Seven on-duty firemen responded to the call. The No. 3 pumper also was driven to the house. Firemen returned to the station at 1:32 p.m.

Houses in residential areas have been given numbers and streets and roads have been given official names.

The old system, with Route 1 for the mailing address and letters or numerals for county roads, made life difficult for delivery boys, repairmen and the fire department.

**Began Work Year Ago**  
It complicated voter registration and billing of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

Many residents on county roads knew only the informal name for their road and not the official letter or numeral, and chances of a stranger finding "the third green house on the left" were fairly slim.

About a year ago, Chocoley Township Supervisor Albert Jacobson, along with James Clem, assignment engineer, and Edward Hudson, plant engineer, of Michigan Bell, began work on house numbering and street and road renaming.

**Signs To Be Put Up**  
As soon as weather permits, signs with the new names of roads and streets will be put up by members of the Chocoley Township Lions Club. House numbering runs from U.

S. 41 at the Marquette city limits as far south as the Mangum Road and as far east as the end of the newly named Lakewood Lane (formerly Lakewood Road).

As much as was possible, street names were made according to the commonly used name, or names found on an old Harvey plat in the township office.

Jacobson said that a map is on file in the township office showing house numbers and street names.

### Advice On House Signs

Until mail deliverers become acquainted with street and house numbers, people have been asked to use the route and box number for mailing purposes.

If house number signs are purchased, they should not be placed on mailboxes, which is illegal, but on the house or a place which can be seen from the road, Jacobson said.

### Major Road Changes

Major road name changes include: Silver Creek Road (formerly known as Honor Camp Road), Cherry Creek Road (County Road BA), Lakewood Lane (Lakewood Road), Old Little Lake Road (County Road EC), Main St. (County Road BAA) Green Bay St. (the part of County Road BAA which crosses the bridge in Harvey), and Quarry Road (the road from Whispering Pines Location into Sands Township).

## Watershed Program's Need Technique Told At U.P. Meeting Here

A watershed conference at Marquette yesterday focused new attention on an old problem -- the answer to which will demand maximum cooperation between farmers and city people.

Nearly 100 soil conservation district representatives, agency workers and Michigan State University Extension Service agents met at the Northwoods Restaurant to discuss watershed development needs and techniques.

**No Boundary Lines**

Farmers and their city cousins have long worked together on projects such as economic development and school programs, but reports at the conference indicate that concern for water control and conservation may soon be the strongest influence to cement rural-urban relations.

It's mainly due to the fact that water has no respect for boundary lines, emphasized a panel of conference speakers.

Included on the program from East Lansing were: MSU Specialist Russel Hill; A. J. Collins, state conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service; the deputy director of the State Department of Agriculture, Stanley Quackenbush; the assistant state conservationist, Earl Fenton, and the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation representative, Ray Locher.

**Runoff Problems**

The speakers explained problems created by water runoff and discussed community watershed control measures that could be taken. Pointing out the importance of controlling water from the time it hits the ground as a raindrop, they said water can take the eroded soil from damaged cropland and carry it downstream to spoil community facilities, recreation sites and fish and wildlife habitat.

A poorly-managed watershed will also damage highways and cause serious flooding in residential areas, said Hill, who pointed out that new or expanding industries

also check the quantity and quality of available water, even before they investigate the labor-supply picture.

**Key To Recreation Industry**

Speaking to an audience that's aware of the importance of tourism, Hill noted that "water of high quality is the key to the future of the recreation industry in most any area."

Hill, who is also executive secretary of the State Soil Conservation Committee, said roadsides are frequently the source of stream and lake sedimentation, instead of the farmer's field.

He said too many housing and camping facilities are being built on flood plains that flood every five or ten years and said there is need for more zoning as well as watershed control measures to protect home buyers. "Such areas," he noted, "should be used for county or township parks."

**Technique Reviewed**

Defining a watershed as an area that has common surface drainage into a defined stream, the speakers reviewed techniques such as overflow structures, dams, soil and crop management, channel improvements and reforestation that can be used to "walk water down a watershed drainage area slowly so it will do no damage."

Agencies such as the SCS, the ASC, U.S. Forest Service, FHA Extension Service, highway departments and the State Department of Conservation were represented at the meeting. All propose to work more closely with industry and communities to attack the water problem.

Hill pointed out that the top 12 inches of a good soil will sponge up and hold about three inches of water, whereas the next 12 inches will absorb only a half inch.

"That's why it's important to take good care of the top soil," he said, listing contour and strip farming, grass waterways, diversion terraces and land leveling

## Adams, In Speech Here, Calls For Removal Of Bridge Tolls

"Bridges are extensions of highways and they should be toll free," Paul L. Adams, Sault Ste. Marie, former Michigan Attorney General and Supreme Court Justice, said here yesterday.

Adams is a candidate for supreme court justice on the non-partisan judicial ballot in the April 1 election. He was nominated by the Democratic Party.

He appeared at a luncheon meeting yesterday afternoon in the Northland Hotel, while on a campaign tour of the Upper Peninsula.

Adams believes that tolls should be abolished on the Mackinac Bridge and the Soo International Bridge "to help accelerate communication and trade between the Upper Peninsula and the Lower Peninsula and between Michigan and Ontario."

In pointing out that in Michigan "freeways are free" and that the toll roads found in other states are in deep disfavor with tourists, Adams said that he believed it would "only be a matter of time" before toll bridges on major traf-

fic arteries would be a thing of the past.

"If everybody in Michigan insists on this as a basic policy for bridges and highways, we should soon have action," Adams said. "The Blue Water Bridge between Port Huron and Sarnia is now toll free, and there is no reason why we shouldn't have the same treatment in the U. P."

Adams believes that "what is good for the U. P. is good for the rest of Michigan." He indicated that he believes that studies should be made to check the feasibility of making the Windsor-Detroit tunnel and the Ambassador Bridge over the Detroit River "toll-free thoroughfares."

New stories from Windsor indicate that the owners of the tunnel and bridge have indicated an interest in selling these facilities to an Essex County (Ontario) group.

"If they are for sale," Adams

said, "the possibility that they could be purchased for free public use should be investigated."

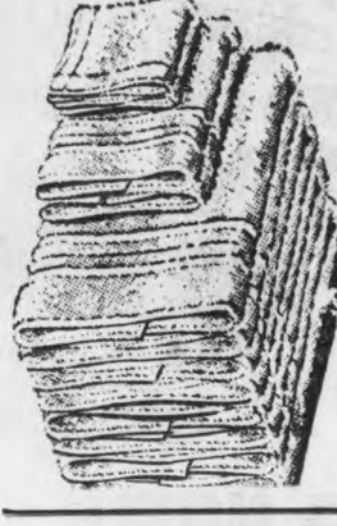

## Tech Asks State Funds For Research To Aid U.P. Economy

HOUGHTON — Michigan Tech has appealed to the State Legislature for additional funds to help boost the economy of the Upper Peninsula and to improve essential academic services.

Dr. J. R. Van Pelt, Tech president; Dr. E. T. Williams, vice president, and E. J. Townsend, controller, made the appeal at a hearing of the Senate Appropriations Committee in Lansing.

"No state educational institution is going to get enough funds this year. For this reason, Tech is asking only for its most urgent needs," Van Pelt said. "It is vital to the economic recovery of the U. P. and to the continuation of high standards of technological education which Tech is striving to maintain."

Ask \$5,576,592

The college has requested \$5,576,592 in operational funds and \$3,657,030 in capital outlay funds for the next fiscal year. Gov. Romney recommended an operational budget of \$3,527,095 and \$1,483,780 for capital outlay funds.

To improve essential academic services, Tech requested funds for completion of Fisher Hall, a mathematics - physics classroom building on the Houghton campus, and construction funds for a class-

room building on the Sault Ste. Marie campus to replace a building lost last year in a fire. Planning funds were also asked for a new library building. The five-year capital outlay request for the college totals \$21,083,290.

In order to improve the economy of the U. P. through research, the college is requesting planning funds for the addition of a wing to the Institute of Mineral Research Building, and for construction of a forestry and forest products research division building.

"All of the bright spots in the economy of the Peninsula today are directly traceable to Tech research," Williams said. He cited specific projects in mineral and forest products research which have resulted in establishment of new industrial plants in the area.

**'Budget Inadequate'**

State Sen. Charles McManiman and Rep. Russell Hellman attended the meeting to support the college's budget request.

The legislators were told that the operational budget recommended by Gov. Romney for Tech is inadequate even to meet the need for faculty salary increases, much less the critical need for equipment which the state has consistently refused to supply.

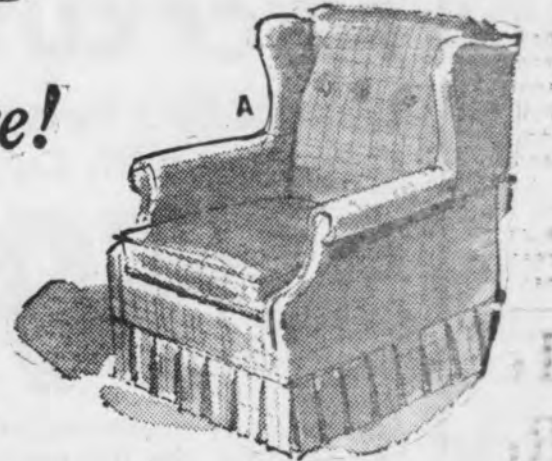

However, special delivery mail will be delivered tomorrow.

Mail will be distributed in all of the post office boxes and all outgoing mail will be dispatched as usual. Street letter box collections will be made on the holiday schedule. The post office service windows will be closed.

Stores, private offices and factories are closed on only six holidays during the year, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

The Mining Journal will be published as usual tomorrow.

### Thurber Cites Education's Role In State

Limitation of the financial resources of the University of Michigan is against the tradition of growth of Michigan, University Regent Donald M. D. Thurber, Detroit, said here yesterday afternoon.

Thurber spoke at an informal meeting of Marquette County Democrats in the Northland Hotel.

He and Regent Eugene B. Power, Ann Arbor, are seeking re-election to the U-M governing board as Democratic candidates in the April 1 election.

"The establishment of the University of Michigan in 1817 was a bold decision to lift the state by its bootstraps through education. Since then the university has grown with the state," Thurber said.

**'Budget Inadequate'**

He said that although higher education plays a central part in the economy of the state, the university's budget in past years has been clearly inadequate to do the

jobs traditionally expected of it.

The university's institute of science and technology is one of the brighter developments in Michigan because of the employment and economic opportunities it provides, he said.

The people of the Upper Peninsula, facing a critical economic situation, should make sure that the services of the U-M will be available to them in the future, Thurber said. He noted that the university must be prepared to accept an expected increase in high school graduates.

Those who want to limit the university's funds are radicals who want to change the traditional roll of the U-M, he asserted.

"Radicals say that no more money should be devoted to education until Michigan moves ahead, but education has traditionally been an important force in the economy of the state," he pointed out.

**Berates Fee Rise Plan**

He said the "radicals" argue that Michigan already devotes more money than Ohio and Indiana to public education, that the educational programs of the state are poorly coordinated and that too many students waste the time spent in college.

"No qualified student should have to forego the benefits of col-

lege because he doesn't have enough money to meet increased college fees," he said.

He said that the board of regents has expanded its scholarship program to mitigate the effects of increased fees, but declared, "If fees are raised again, some potential students will be priced out of an education. The state can ill afford this."

**Cites 'Danger Signals'**

Danger signals for the U-M, he said, include the fact that the University of Indiana two years ago raised its wages higher than those

of the University of Michigan and the fact that some of the university's great professors are being lured to other institutions because of low salaries and inadequate research facilities in Ann Arbor.

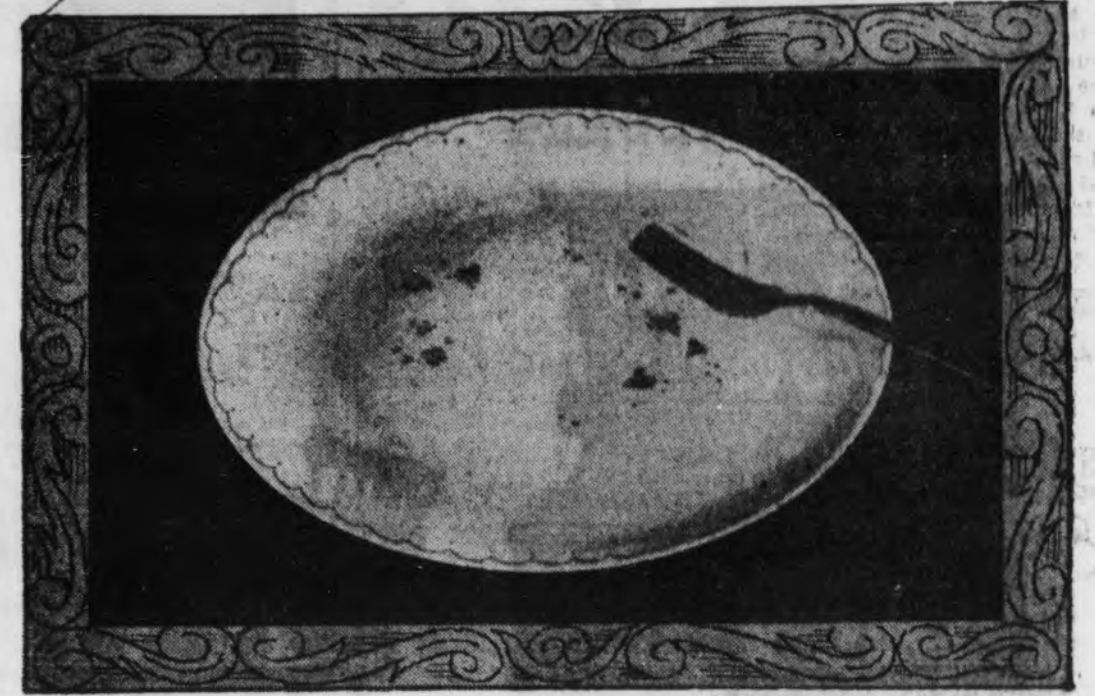

The supervisors ordered received and referred to the board's budget and executive committee a request from Austin Jackson, chairman of the souvenir program committee of the 1963 Upper Peninsula

American Legion Convention Corp. requesting that the board purchase some advertising in the program.

The convention will be held June 20-23 in Marquette and it is expected to draw upwards of 8,000 Legionnaires and members of the Auxillary in the Upper Peninsula to Marquette.

### Beer Industry Pleads For Tax Relief

LANSING (AP)—Spokesmen for Michigan's beer industry pleaded Wednesday with the House Taxation Committee for relief from an excise tax they contended has a disastrous effect on brewers.

They cited figures showing that while personal income and liquor sales have both been climbing steadily recently, beer sales have fallen off sharply.

The excise tax, which went into effect on July 1 of last year, is 48 cents on every case of 24 12-ounce bottles or cans, or the equivalent of \$6.61 per barrel.

**43% Hike**

Brewery officials said this amounted to a 430 per cent increase over the previous tax of nine cents per case, or \$1.25 per barrel. Tax collections jumped from \$3.36 million for the last six months of 1961 to \$13.51 million for the comparable period of 1962.

A union spokesman told a closed meeting of the committee of a number of layoffs in Detroit area breweries, with more expected as sales continue to fall off.

## Peninsula Perambulator

Drummond Islanders are driving a mile-wide ice bridge across the St. Marys River to reach DeTour on the mainland these days. The ice bridge is marked every 100 yards with small evergreens stuck upright in the snow. Adverse winds thwarted rescue operations by the icebreaker Mackinaw, leaving the Drummond Island ferry stuck in ice on the DeTour side of the river. The ferry has broken its rudder three times in recent weeks battling ice floes from 14 to 18 inches thick.

**Remember the Bukovich brothers** — Joe, Tony and Mike? Those old Copper Country favorites, aided and abetted by fellows like Fran Lowmyer, Ike Klingbeil and Curly Kolehmainen, put on quite a hockey show in Houghton's Dee Stadium the other day to teach the Laurin-Grove juveniles a 13-6 lesson. As he often did in days gone by, Tony Bukovich came up with the three-goal "hat trick."

**Six started**, but only one completed a long 17-hour walk from Houghton up the Keweenaw Peninsula to Copper Harbor. Footsore and weary, Kern Krapohl nonetheless bettered by an hour the time set by Gordon Haber in walking the 50 miles from Copper Harbor to Houghton. If he had to do it over again, Krapohl said, he would begin at Copper Harbor because he found the last 15 or so miles a lonely trip.

**An entertainment program** featuring "Miners, Loggers and Lakers, Their Ballads" was presented to patients of the Veterans Hospital in Iron Mountain this week by Carl Nelson, assistant director of the Marquette County USO. The ballads form one of several groups collected by Nelson and are set to his guitar accompaniment. The program was one of a series supplied by the Escanaba Amvets Post for veterans hospitalized in Iron Mountain.

**The Iron Mountain News** received a second-place award for Class C newspapers (10,000-25,000 circulation) in the annual typography contest sponsored by Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism. Awards were presented at the winter meeting of Inland Daily Press Association in Chicago.

**About 55 per cent** of Sault Ste. Marie's residents voting on a public housing question favored a cutback to 50 units. The cutback, which will involve paying back to the federal government an amount of money already spent, carried in seven of the city's nine precincts. In effect, the voters rejected a 200-unit proposal on which the program had been progressing until a "citizens' revolt" flared last fall into a petition movement that ended in the vote.

**Because of a small drop** in the patient load, visiting hours have been resumed at War Memorial Hospital in Sault Ste. Marie.

**The Menominee City Council** directed its public works and city planning committees to study a proposal from the Michigan Highway Department that parking be banned on both sides of 10th Avenue with completion of the interstate bridge, which is on the state's construction calendar for the first quarter of 1965. The department plans to widen the bridge roadway to 48 feet by moving back the width of the two sidewalks on either side of the span. Tenth Avenue between the bridge and the Church of the Epiphany is wide enough for four-lane traffic provided no parking is permitted on either side.

**Voters in Newberry** approved sale of a park as a site for the new Tahquamenon General Hospital by a margin of 301 to 132. A second proposal, authorizing the village council to sell the Atlas Plywood property, also was approved, 392 to 40.

**Propositions to finance** an elementary school building improvement program and equalize the school debt of the Escanaba Area Public School District were rejected by 2-1 margins in this week's election.

nite industry in Minnesota of tax equity for at least 20 years. According to an Associated Press account, this would be done through an amendment to the state constitution after submitting the matter to voters in the general election next year. Polls have indicated it has a good chance to pass.

The obvious effect of the bill, if passed, would be to give Minnesota ores a distinct tax advantage over Upper Peninsula ores at a time when the Michigan underground mining industry is fighting for survival.

Developments last week indicated the precarious future of underground mining on the Marquette Range. The Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co. announced that its Bunker Hill Mine in Negaunee will be closed at the end of this year and that its Mather Mine in Negaunee and Ishpeming is not likely to be in operation beyond 1965 unless steps can be taken to upgrade ores from these properties and find new customers.

Cliffs emphasized the gravity of the situation in discussions with State Rep. Dominic Jacobetti of Negaunee and representatives of the United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO. Company spokesmen said a solution to the underground mining problems must be found within the next few months if this form of mining is to continue on the Marquette Range.

The union has shown every sign of cooperation with management in an attempt to find a solution that will guarantee the future of underground mining here. With this sort of teamwork, underground mining possibly may be extended indefinitely on the Marquette Range. No one expects deep shaft mining ever to return to its former prominence in Michigan's economic picture, but simply holding the line by keeping existing mines in operation would be a major triumph. The alternative is extinction.

### Building For The Future

From the earliest chronometers in the days of the sailing ships to the inertial navigation devices of today's globe-circling atomic submarines, technological progress has resulted in an expansion of man's intellectual horizons. Rocket fuels and electronic guidance circuits have undoubtedly provided the framework for a considerable intellectual broadening of the young people of today in terms of presenting problems involving the exploration of our solar system and beyond. The computer and nuclear reactor technology now under development will provide an even broader framework for the expanded horizons of the next generation. Engineering and the future are inseparably intertwined.

This is the message being brought to the American public by the National Society of Professional Engineers on the occasion of National Engineers' Week, Feb. 17-23. The society, in cooperation with many other engineering and industrial groups, is sponsoring the event to emphasize the broad contributions of the engineering profession to America's economic and technological development.

The observance has a particular significance for the Upper Peninsula, home of the Michigan College of Mining and Technology, which is one of the finest engineering schools in the world.

Theme of this year's observance is "America's Engineers Build for the Future." The theme was chosen to emphasize for young people now in high school how contemporary engineering knowledge and skill will shape the framework of much of the scientific and technological achievements of the future.

## Foreign Aid Policy Changes

By PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — A number of radical foreign aid policy changes are expected when President Kennedy's permanent Committee to Strengthen the Security of the Free World turns in its recommendations about March 1.

This blue ribbon panel of nine big business executives, former top government officials, university professors and AFL-CIO President George Meany will hold its second five-day meeting in Washington beginning today to write its first report. Chairman of the group is Gen. Lucius D. Clay.

Preliminary drafts now being circulated for comment from Kennedy Administration leaders concerned with foreign policy show much original thinking. The committee has asked Agency for International Development—AID—to justify its programs in every country and all its present policies.

**More Obligational Authority**  
How much the Clay committee findings influence Kennedy will be shown when his annual foreign aid message goes to Congress in mid-March.

His budget message calls for foreign aid expenditures of \$3.75 billion for next year—\$100 million less than is estimated for this year. But new obligatory authority of \$4.9 billion is asked, compared with \$3.9 billion appropriated by the last Congress. And the new total is too much for many congressmen.

Congressional hearings on next year's appropriations will begin about April 1 with new AID Administrator David E. Bell as principal witness in the hot seat.

He has already begun calling on key congressmen, after a quick trip around the world to visit some of his principal problem countries.

Bell has some ideas of his own on how the AID programs should be run. But he does not plan a complete reorganization—which every other administrator has made—unless the Clay committee comes up with some surprises in that line.

**Self-Supporting Status Sought**  
Among proposals that have been put to the Clay committee for consideration is one that the fundamental purpose of all foreign aid programs should be to make the receiving countries self-supporting as fast as possible.

Several countries like Nationalist China, Israel and Greece have for several years been considered ready for a windup of U. S. economic aid. Nobody has had the guts to do it.

Other countries like Libya and Thailand are sized up as having the resources to become self-sufficient in a short time. The solution offered for such countries is to work out three to five-year programs to put them on their feet, then cut off the aid and let them go it alone.

Such a policy would in many cases require much internal political and economic reform in the receiving countries. The trouble is that too many developing countries show no inclination to change. The question then becomes whether to give any aid at all to governments showing no progress.

**Gallup Poll Findings**  
The Kennedy Administration has had the courage to cut off aid to Ceylon because it did not arrange compensation for seizure and nationalization of American-owned properties. Also, aid has been cut off from Haiti because of lack of cooperation from President Francois Duvalier's dictatorship.

No such action has been taken against a big country yet.

**AID officials were greatly encouraged** by the recent Gallup poll showing 58 per cent of the people approved foreign aid, as compared to 51 per cent in a poll five years ago.

One of the principal problems of the Clay committee is to improve the public image of foreign aid if it is found essential to the national security.

## 2 Homes Destroyed By Fire In Kenton

KENTON — Two homes were burned to the ground, a third badly damaged and a church threatened in a fire here yesterday afternoon. Two families were left homeless.

The Wallace Routhaux family, including the parents and five children, and Edward Toivonen, who lives alone, lost all of their possessions in the flames.

The fire is believed to have started in a defective chimney on the Routhaux house, which is owned by Keith Schinger. Fanned by strong winds, it quickly spread to the Toivonen home next door and threatened to ignite a third house owned by John Newlander and the Kenton Methodist Church, which is directly across the street from the Newlander home.

Fire fighters from L'Anse, Bruce Crossing and Trout Creek concentrated their water power on the Newlander home in efforts to keep it from catching fire and endangering the church. Although the third house did not burn, windows were broken and there was extensive water and smoke damage.

According to L'Anse state police, the flames quickly destroyed the two residences. Trout Creek and Bruce Crossing firemen were the first to reach the scene, but water pumps on their trucks were frozen. They used an auxiliary tank of water and hand pump, while local fire fighters set up a snow shovel brigade in efforts to control the flames.

The new L'Anse fire truck, with a 750-gallon capacity, was able to pump enough water on the Newlander home to keep it from burning.

No Equipment In Kenton According to L'Anse Fireman David Kelnhofer, the village of Kenton has no fire-fighting equipment of its own and does not have hydrant or water tank facilities.

"In the summer, they receive protection from the State Conservation Department, but in the winter they don't have anything," he said. "By the time we drove that distance, the two houses were destroyed and it looked like the whole block would go up in smoke."

Although firemen were able to move much of the furniture from the Toivonen and Newlander homes, it was ruined by water and smoke. State police this morning said that portion of Toivonen's loss was covered by insurance, but that the Routhaux family had no protection.

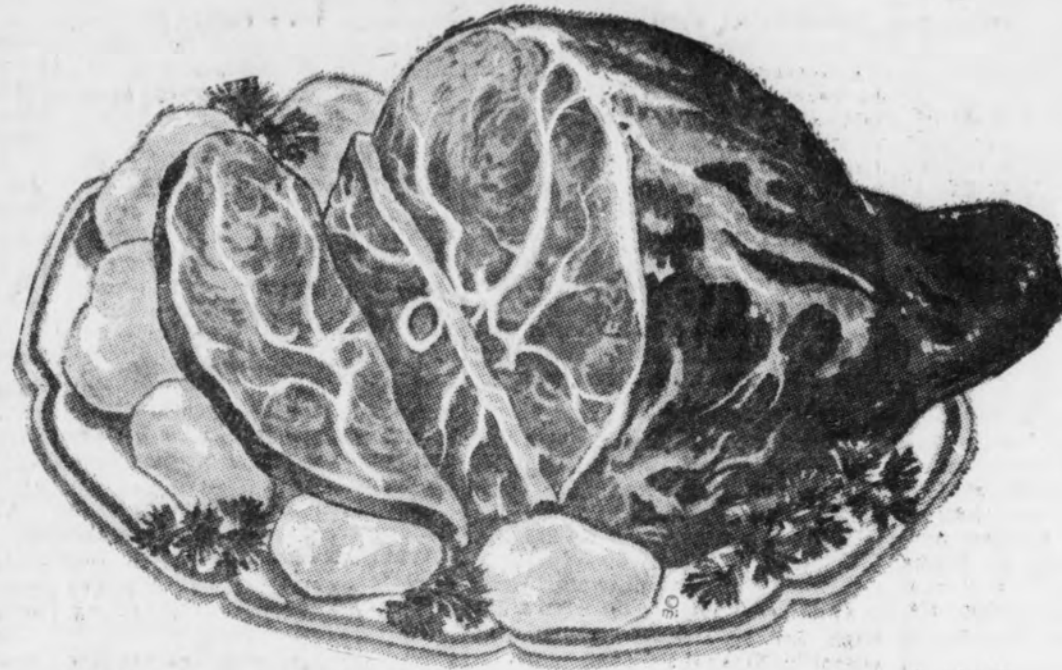

L'ANSE — A control-ball offense kept L'Anse Hornets buzzing around the Baraga Vikings for three quarters last night, but excellent free throw shooting enabled the Vikes to pull away to a 53-37 victory.

It was the eighth win of the season for the Vikings who play their 15th game Friday, hosting Dollar Bay, then take on top-ranked Ontonagon at the Baraga Armory, March 1, and go to Wakefield on the last night of the regular season, March 2. L'Anse winds up at Stambaugh Friday, seeking their fifth victory in the last of the CLASS B power of the Menominee Range.
