His budget message calls for foreign aid expenditures of \$3.75 billion for next year -\$100 million less than is estimated for this year. But new obligational authority of \$4.9 billion is asked, compared with \$3.9 billion appropriated by the last Congress. And the new total is too much for many congressmen.

Congressional hearings on next year's appropriations will begin about April 1 with new AID Administrator David E. Bell as principal witness in the hot seat.

He has already begun calling on key congressmen, after a quick trip around the world to find a solution that will guarantee the to visit some of his principal problem coun-

Bell has some ideas of his own on how the AID programs should be run. But he does not plan a complete reorganization-which every other administrator has made-unless the Clay committee comes up with some surprises in that line.

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

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
