Hoffa Given Go-Ahead To Press Suit

Kennedy, then counsel for the Senate Rackets Committee, when Kennedy appeared on a Jack Paar television show on the NBC network July 22, 1959.

School Board To Sell Nestor School Building

Marquette Board of Education members agreed at a regular meeting yesterday afternoon that the old Nestor School property on W. Bluff St. should be sold.

April 23 was set as the date to open bids for the sale of the property.

The five-room wood frame building, where many Marquette residents attended elementary school classes, was vacated in the fall of 1956, when the Sandy Knoll Elementary School was occupied.

The building has been leased to Michigan State University for its Upper Peninsula Extension Center. MSU's second three-year lease expires Aug. 1 this year.

Board President Herman E. Olson introduced discussion of the old Nestor School by saying, "The question is: Are we in the renting business?"

Board members noted that the six-room addition planned for Sandy Knoll makes the use of the old Nestor School in the immediate future unnecessary.

Inadequate For School Site

The main objection to holding on to the property, Secretary Paul J. Kinville pointed out, is the inadequate size of the site for a school building. The property is slightly less than one-half acre, far too small for the schools and playgrounds being built today, he said.

Superintendent of Schools Henry J. Bothwell said that if the building were used as a school, it

would have to be remodeled to meet standards set by the State Department of Public Instruction and the state fire marshal for school buildings. "This would be very costly," Bothwell added.

School Attorney George T. Kendrick suggested that an appraisal be made of the property so that the board will be assured that it is selling at a price fair to the taxpayers.

At its March meeting, the board will hear a report from Bothwell concerning alternate procedures which can be taken in the selling of the old Howard-Froebel School site.

The property, at Pine, E. Arch and E. Ridge Sts., includes eight platted lots, and Bothwell indicated yesterday that the board could sell the property either as a whole or in individual lots.

Last year the board decided that selling the Howard-Froebel property and returning it to the city tax rolls would compensate, at least in part, for removal from the tax rolls of the new high school site.

Board members have also previously favored selling the Nestor School property, but they felt the most advantageous time for sale of both pieces of property would be in the spring.

May Delay Bid Date

At yesterday's meeting, the school board also discussed the possibility of delaying the bid date for the three main contracts for the new high school to allow time for consideration of additions to the final plans approved by the board Jan. 22.

Trustee Charles W. Niemi said that because a 22-page addendum had been made to the final plans, approval of the changes might be necessary.

Such a meeting might mean a postponement of the March 14 date for opening bids, he added.

Bothwell said that the changes are minor and are a result of the school board's "pushing the architect" to complete the final plans as early as possible. When the final plans were approved, it was noted that minor changes would probably be made.

Bothwell said this morning that Architect Malcolm Williams of Warren Holmes Co., Lansing, will be in Marquette Tuesday to look over the addendum in informal meetings with interested persons.

Eye Hockey Program

The board also received a pro-

posal for the inclusion of ice hockey in the high school sports program.

A. L. McLain, 339 E. Arch St., representing a group of persons interested in the adoption of high school hockey, presented to the school board a study of the group's reasons for interest in high school hockey.

To Meet With Citizens

After the report is studied and discussed with the high school physical education department staff, a meeting will be scheduled with the citizens' group, Olson said.

McLain said that the group has investigated costs of setting up a hockey program, facilities that would be needed, and gate attendance at schools in which the sport is new.

The board also approved and ordered paid invoices totaling \$41,998.71.

Fire Destroys Bar In Skandia; Loss Set At \$25,000

Fire this morning completely destroyed the Idle Time Bar building, located just south of the Yalmer Road, in Skandia Township.

The blaze, which was spotted at 4:40 a.m., had enveloped the entire one-story building, measuring 40 by 44 feet, by the time firemen were summoned.

Owned by LeRoy Blondeau of Harvey, the building had served as a tavern for many years, but years ago it was a school building. The loss, including stock and building, was estimated at around \$25,000, partly covered by insurance.

State Police Troopers William Hodges and Eugene Weiler, who are conducting the investigation, said the blaze apparently originated in the bar storeroom, immediately east of the bar.

Base firemen.

Marquette's firemen were the first to arrive at the scene, with the other departments getting there moments later.

"We realized it was impossible to halt the bar building fire," said John Myhrall, fire chief for Sawyer Base, "so we concentrated our efforts on saving the residence adjacent to the bar."

State police and firemen said the big problem in combatting the blaze was a lack of water. The base's 1,000-gallon water tanker was hooked up to the Marquette department's 750-gallon high pressure pumper, after its load was emptied. The prison had a 500-gallon pumper at the scene.

Marquette's pumper had to be driven about three miles away, to the Chocolate River, to get reloaded. However, the fire departments succeeded in saving the residence, located 10 feet from the bar.

The house also is owned by Blondeau, although being unoccupied at the time.

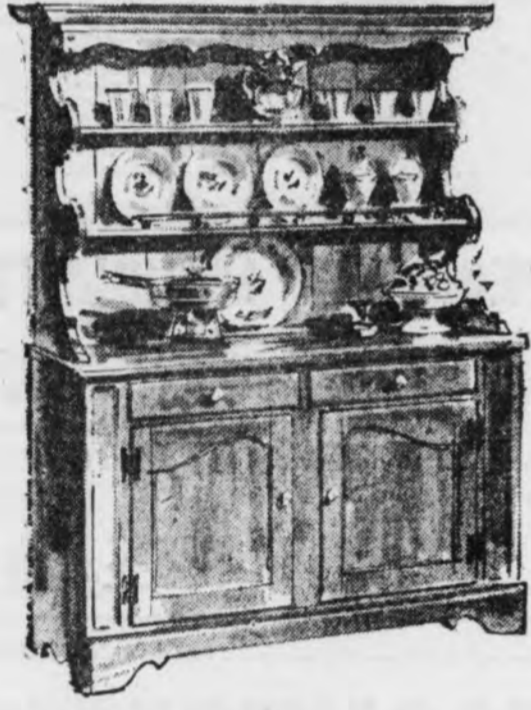
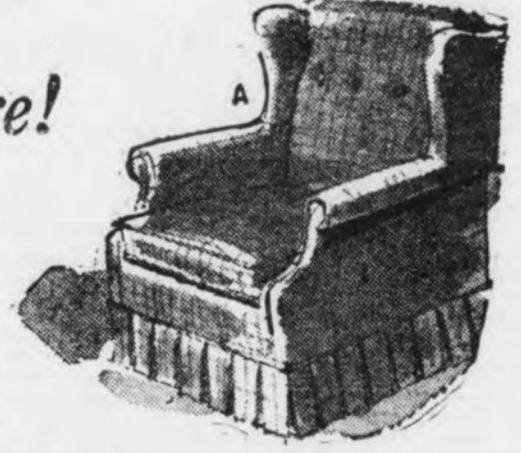

It almost seemed like a spring day yesterday, but sunshine, longer days and a high temperature yesterday of 23 can be deceiving.

This winter, the coldest ever in Marquette, isn't over yet. In fact, it's expected to turn colder tonight.

The mercury playfully soared up to 23 degrees at 3 p.m. yesterday, but with a minimum of -7 at 3:30 in the morning, it was the 36th day this winter that the temperature has been zero or below.

Apparently the sunshine hasn't had much effect on the temperature, because the monthly average was eight degrees below normal today.

After the high of 23 in mid-afternoon, the temperature dropped to 20 by 5 p.m. and 13 by midnight. Overnight low was 11 at 3 a.m.

There was no precipitation yesterday, but snowfall between midnight and daybreak totaled one-tenth of an inch. Windy Period Here

Strong winds last night whipped up the sand that has accumulated on streets and sidewalks, and snowfall between midnight and daybreak totaled one-tenth of an inch.

Partly cloudy skies and colder temperatures, with a high from five to 10 above, are predicted for tomorrow. The outlook for Friday is snow flurries and continued cold.

Precipitation in the five-day period is expected to total one-tenth of an inch or less in light snow or flurries Friday and Saturday.

Two vehicles were badly damaged and a motorist was issued a summons, but no one was injured, in a traffic smashup at 8:05 last evening in Marquette.

City police said a car being driven north on N. Third St. by Robert L. Oja, 217 Spooner Hall, Northern Michigan University, smashed into a car which was parked on the east side of the street, just north of the W. Ridge St. intersection.

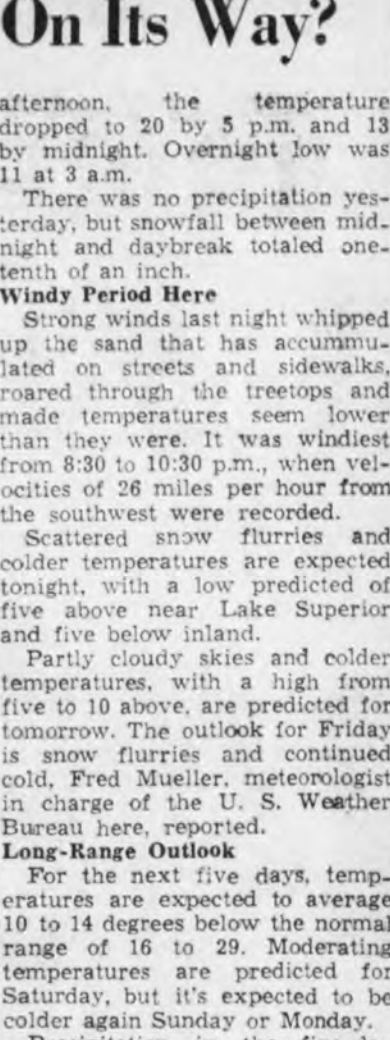
Oja told officers he had just reached the crest of the Third St. hill when an unidentified vehicle going in the opposite direction forced him to swerve to the right, into the parked car.

9 From Base Assigned To USAF Schools



Nine members of the 410th Bombardment Wing (SAC) at K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base have been selected by the United States Air Force to attend three military schools which begin in the next 16 months.

Six of the men are in the 644th Bombardment Squadron, one in the 46th Air Refueling Squadron, and two are officers in the scheduling division under the deputy commander for operations.

The percentage of men chosen from the unit to attend the schools is considered high by wing officials, according to Col. William B. Kyes, commander. He added that the figure is well above the USAF average.

Restricted To Officers Nominations for the schools were restricted to officers having consistent records of top-quality performance and indicated high potential.

Five of those named will attend the Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell AFB, Ala., which begins in September. They are Maj. Thomas J. Donnelly and Maj. Daniel E. Guidice, both radar navigators in the 644th; Capt. Darr L. Goss, an aircraft commander in the tanker squadron; and Capt. Francis E. Reynolds and E. L.

Smith, both from the scheduling section. Class 35 of the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Va., will include two aircraft commanders from the bomb squadron. They are Majors Richard E. Hansen and Russell H. Smith. The class begins in February, 1964.

RAF Academy Assignment The only officers chosen from USAF to attend the Royal Air Force Academy at Andover, England, are aircraft commanders in the 644th. They are Capt. William G. MacLaren Jr. and Henry D. Rauchenstein.

Kyes said the naming of two men from the same squadron to represent USAF at this school reflects highly on both the wing and the squadron, as well as the individuals concerned. The RAF Academy class begins in May of next year.

Sears Foundation Presents Northern Grant Of \$60,000

Announcement was made today that the Sears-Roebuck Foundation has awarded a \$60,000 grant to Northern Michigan University, to help support community development efforts in the Upper Peninsula.

The grant represents a new approach to community improvement by the Foundation which has worked closely with the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Grange, 4-H Clubs, and other community and educational groups.

In this instance, the foundation will support the on-going work of an educational institution. To demonstrate what can be accomplished through the effective use of educational and community resources, the NMU projects will be evaluated and publicized nationally.

Dr. Edgar L. Harden, president of Northern, said the grant will enable the college to "provide greater service to communities and leaders who are working with problems and opportunities facing the people of the Upper Peninsula. Northern and the Upper Peninsula appreciate the interest the Sears-Roebuck Foundation has demonstrated in the potential of our region."

Dr. Claud A. Bosworth, NMU vice president in charge

of public services, said Northern will work with local leaders and groups in such areas as economic development, problems of youth and the aging, recreation, health, urbanization and vocational and adult education.

Bosworth, past chairman of the community development division of the National University Extension Association, discussed the U. P. project with Foundation officials while conducting leadership seminars for the General Federation of Women's Clubs and again while serving as one of three national judges of community improvement projects sponsored by the Federation and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

Over Three-Year Period

The foundation grant of \$20,000 a year for three years was approved by James T. Griffin, president; Robert V. Mullen, executive director; R. C. Hillier, vice president for the midwestern territory; and John D. Austen, mid-west representative.

The grant will provide funds for staff and other resources necessary to carry out community development activities which will emphasize local participation of civic leaders, service clubs, and various volunteer and official groups concerned with community development.

Long Lines Forming Here As Motorists Purchase Licenses To Beat Car Plate Deadline

Long lines are forming at the Michigan Secretary of State's branch office here, as motor vehicle owners purchase licenses before the deadline tomorrow night.

Gertrude M. Jandron, who is in charge of the branch office here, said today that about 800 less auto licenses have been sold to date this year than had sold by this time last year, indicating a big rush will be on tomorrow.

For the convenience of last-minute purchasers, she said, the office has been open during the noon hours this week and will remain open continuously from 9 tomorrow morning to 7 tomorrow evening.

Ticketed After Thursday
After tomorrow's deadline, drivers of cars bearing outdated 1962 plates will be ticketed.

Mrs. Jandron said that 5,700 persons have purchased 1963 tags for passenger cars to date, as compared with 6,506 passenger plates sold by this time in 1962.

Man Jailed For Breaking Glass Door

Eino Gustafson, 51, Marquette Township, was sentenced to spend 60 days in the Marquette County Jail by Marquette Township Justice George J. Fezzy on a charge of malicious destruction of property.

Alternative sentence to the 60-day jail term was to pay a fine of \$100 and costs of \$4.30. Gustafson also was committed for drunkenness for a 30-day jail term, in default of a \$25 fine and \$4.30 costs.

Passenger, 5,700 (6,506); commercial, 371 (321); pickup trucks, 316 (362); farm vehicles, nine (16); small trailers, 228 (362).

This year, owners of passenger vehicles are receiving license plate tags only, while owners of all other vehicles are receiving full plates.

Mrs. Jandron reminded Marquette residents and others who will be purchasing licenses through the office here that they must present their titles when applying for license plate tags. The only exception applies to owners of small trailers, who need not show a title.

However, any person can pick up plates for another, if they present a Michigan certificate of title in the vehicle owner's name.

Weight Slips Requirement
Weight slips dated no earlier than Sept. 1, 1962, must be presented by all truck owners applying for license plates.

In addition, all trailers weighing more than 450 pounds, with the exception of house trailers, must have been weighed since Sept. 1. The Marquette license bureau office is located at 309 W. Washington St.

State Approves Of Two ARA Training Programs In U. P.

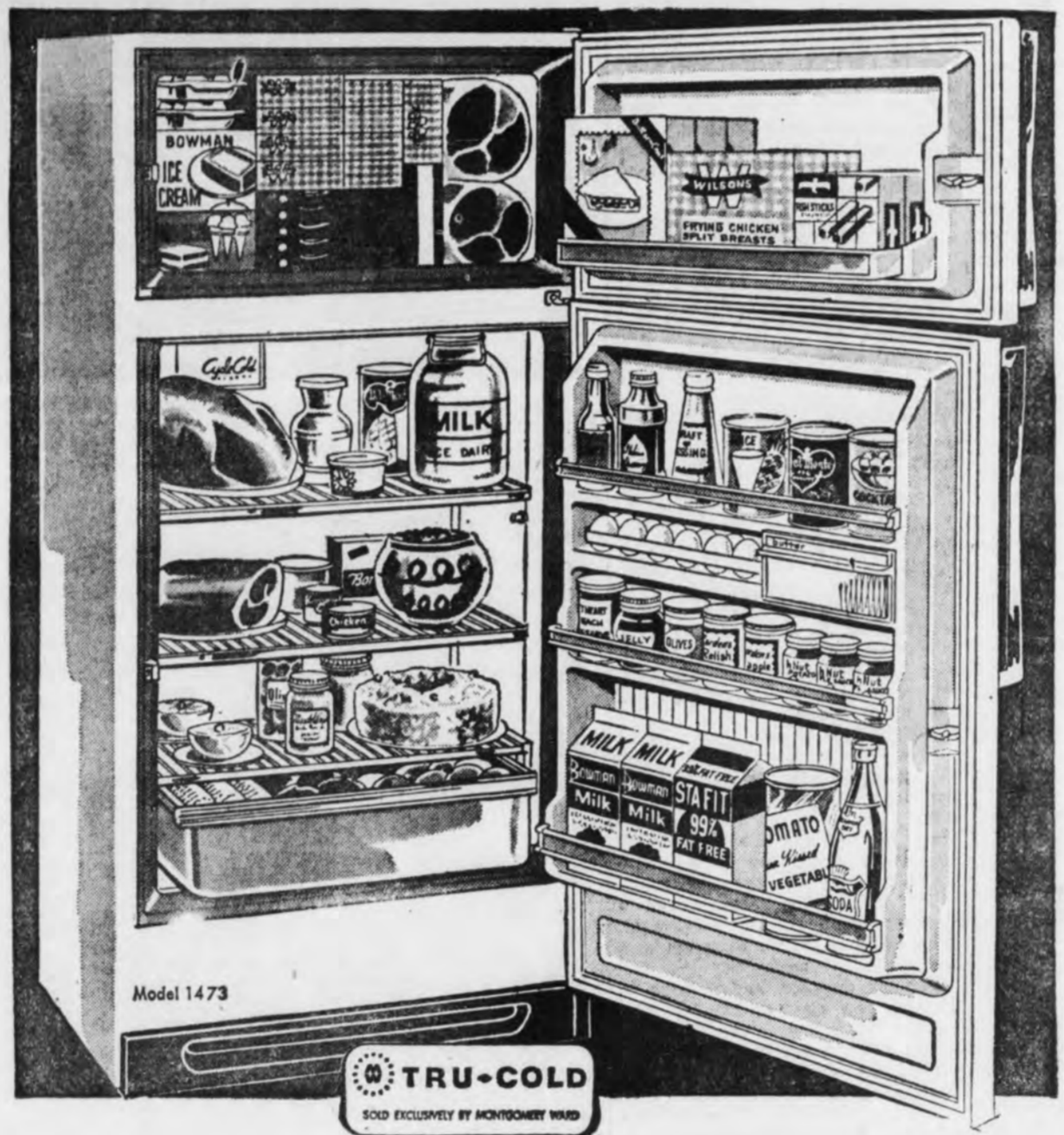

School Board Budget Request Received For Tax Purposes

Marquette's city commission, in regular meeting this week, referred to City Manager Thomas Moore, for inclusion in the coming fiscal year's budget, the taxpayers' share of the public schools' budget for the coming fiscal year. The board of education requested that \$665,000 for operating expenses and \$256,691.25 for the payment of bonded indebtedness for school construction be spread on the tax rolls to be assessed upon the taxable property of the city. Commissioners also discussed the need for a storm sewer at the site of the new high school. Moore informed the commission that Superintendent of Schools Henry J. Bothwell has requested that a storm sewer be built at the corner of Birch St. and Fair Ave. Would Cost \$12,352. A tentative study made by City Engineer M. J. Keranen estimates the cost of the proposed sewer at \$12,352. Moore was instructed to discuss the matter in meetings with pub-

lic school and Northern Michigan University officials. County Gets \$142,764 In Vehicle Fund

Marquette County will receive \$142,764 in the distribution of fourth quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages. The city of Marquette will receive \$29,424, the State Highway Department announced. All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go into

the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund. Amounts distributed to other cities in this area include Ishpeming, \$13,704; Negaunee, \$12,190; Baraga, \$2,202; L'Anse, \$4,351; and Munising, \$7,342. **U. P. County Figures** Receipts for counties in the U. P. are: Alger, \$53,148; Baraga, \$52,990; Chippewa, \$116,113; Delta, \$106,706; Dickinson, \$84,015; Gogebic, \$72,025; Houghton, \$107,542; Iron, \$72,332; Keweenaw, \$32,528; Luce, \$46,965; Mackinac, \$65,835; Marquette, \$142,764; Menominee, \$112,075; Ontonagon, \$61,153; and Schoolcraft, \$51,739. State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund from October to December of 1962 amounted to

\$46,177,670, a decrease of \$1,339,825 from the same period of 1961. **License Sales Dropped** The major reason for the decrease was that sale of 1963 license tabs fell off considerably compared to license sales during the same period in 1961, when motorists were issued their first new license plates in three years. After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways Commission's share, state law provides that 47 per cent of quarterly collections for the fund is distributed to the State Highway Department for use on state highways, 35 per cent to counties for use on their roads and 18 per cent to 511 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets. State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund from October to December of 1962 amounted to Belgium has 11,779 square miles and a population of 9,153,000.

Constitution Pros, Cons Given Airing By Panel At PTA-Sponsored Meeting

Opinions of a five-man panel regarding the merits of Michigan's proposed new constitution were aired Monday evening at a meeting in the Negaunee High School Auditorium arranged by the school's Parent-Teacher Association.

On the panel, for which Dr. Claud Bosworth, vice-president in charge of public services at Northern Michigan University, was moderator, were Evald S. Erickson, president of the Negaunee Teachers Association; Leslie W. Richards, a member of the Negaunee school board and president of the Michigan School Board Association; Dr. Joseph Willard, associate professor of political science at Northern; Nicholas E. Bridges, Negaunee attorney, and Charles Follo of the University of Michigan Extension Service, Escanaba. Richards, a Republican, and Follo, a Democrat, were constitutional convention delegates.

Three Questions The discussion was centered around the following questions: (1) What is good about the proposed constitution? (2) What is bad about it? (3) How do we recommend that citizens vote and why?

Erickson, Richards, Dr. Willard and Follo were agreed that the constitution should be adopted, despite their objections to certain provisions, on the ground that the document is a decided improvement over the 1908 constitution, which has 59 amendments. Bridges said he is flatly opposed to the proposed constitution, on which the state's voters will decide April 1, chiefly on the reapportionment issue. The inequitable representation of voters in highly-populated areas compared to those in rural areas, he said, is "an invasion of civil rights."

Willard "Favorably Disposed" Dr. Willard said he was "favorably disposed" to adoption of the constitution in its present form and cited several proposed innovations he considered worthwhile, especially those effecting the court system and the executive branch. Erickson, who was the Michigan Education Association representative on the panel, pointed out the reduction in state agencies as one of the wisest actions the convention delegates had taken.

An estimated 100 persons, many of them high school students, attended the meeting.

Mine Values On Other U.P. Ranges Sliced

Like the Marquette Range, drastic reductions have been recommended for mining property valuations in Gogebic and Iron Counties by Harry J. Hardenberg, state geologist.

In Gogebic, the reduction amounts to \$7,317,500—from \$12,802,500 last year to \$5,485,000 in 1963. In addition to valuation slashes for active and reserve properties, several have been turned to local governing units for assessment purposes, including the Sunday Lake group which last year was valued at \$1,815,000.

The assessment table is a bit more complex for Iron County, since the State Tax Commission entered the picture to lower Hardenberg's figures last year following mining company protests. The state geologist's total in 1962 was \$28,280,000, which was reduced by the tax commission to \$22,876,800. Hardenberg's recommended valuations for this year amount to \$24,043,000.

While that figure is down \$4,237,000 from his 1962 assessments, it is an increase of \$2,156,200 over the State Tax Commission valuations allowed last December.

Outside the cities of Ishpeming and Negaunee, recommended valuations on Marquette County properties included the following:

Champion Township — Champion, \$530,000.

Ely Township — Greenwood, \$85,000.

Michigan Township — Champion, \$10,000.

Negaunee Township — Ore improvement plant, \$1,135,000.

Richmond Township — New Richmond, \$32,000; Moore, \$15,000; Old Richmond, \$8,000; Primrose, \$7,000; Star West, \$27,000; Maitland, \$10,000.

Tilden Township — Tilden, \$230,000; Section 21, \$705,000; Volunteer, \$25,000.

Specific taxes — the actual amount to be paid in contrast to the ad valorem levy on the above valuations — were set as follows:

Humboldt Township — Humboldt, \$68,938.17; Republic (tailings basin), \$1,015.69.

Negaunee Township — Eagle Mills pelletizing plant, \$35,362.17.

Republic Township — Republic, \$209,847.94.

Richmond Township — Empire, \$12,074.20.

Tilden Township — Empire, \$2,543.48.

Specific taxes also have been set on the Groveland mining property in Dickinson County, as follows: Felch Township, \$67,255.80; Norway Township, \$38,276.18; Sagola Township, \$1,325.02. Six other reserve properties, including one in Breitung Township and five in the city of Iron Mountain, are included in Hardenberg's recommendations for Dickinson. Total valuation of the six is \$58,000.

Olympic Ski Team To Be Picked In Ishpeming March 9-10

Nation's Top Jumpers Qualify For Two-Day Tests On Suicide Hill

ISHPEMING — Led by Gene Kotlarek of Duluth and John Balfanz of Minneapolis, the nation's top ski jumpers will be in Ishpeming Saturday and Sunday, March 9-10, seeking berths on the 1964 American Olympic team.

Members of the Olympic squad will be picked in competition on Suicide Hill. Each jumper will leap three times each day, with his best four rides counting toward his final rating.

The six scoring the largest number of points — awarded on both distance and form — will make up the U.S. team that will take part in the Winter Olympic Games at Innsbruck, Austria, next winter. A member of the 1960 team, Art Tinkle of Rockaway, N.J., will be their coach.

However, if enough money is available, the U.S. Olympic Committee plans to send the 10 men placing highest at Ishpeming to Europe for 1963-64 training and competition. If that is done, the final four competitors for the Olympic Games will not be picked until just before the Innsbruck jumping events begin.

Contestants for the March 9-10 trysts were selected from regional trials held during the past month at Salisbury, Conn.; Duluth, Minn.; Steamboat Springs, Colo., and Leavenworth, Wash. Ten from each regional event were named — making a total of 40 — but judges were permitted to pick additional entries if they believed their efforts entitled them

to a chance at the trysts.

Balfanz and Kotlarek have been exceptional in ski jumping tournaments this winter. They'll be coming to Ishpeming from Iron Mountain, where they were scheduled to duel in an effort to break the Pine Mountain record of 317 feet. Balfanz has jumped that far, turning the trick at Westby, Wis., last year to tie the North American record which had been set at Iron Mountain.

This winter, however, Kotlarek leaped 322 feet at Steamboat Springs for a new American mark. One of Balfanz's better tournaments this year was at Duluth, where both his jumps of 231 and 233 feet broke the hill record.

Balfanz was in Europe earlier in the winter with an Iron Mountain jumper, Paul Johnson. The two were training under Tinkle and taking part in European meets.

Some of the better-known active jumpers who will compete in the Ishpeming classic, in addition to Balfanz and Kotlarek, are Jerry Goyan of Ishpeming, Ansten Samuelsen of Steamboat Springs, Larry Bergh of Eau Claire, Wis., Tom Peterson of Kingsford, Robert Wedin of Iron Mountain, David Hicks of Duluth, Robert Keck of Oconomowoc, Wis., Lyle Swenson of Westby, Wis., and Jon St. Andre of Ishpeming. The latter, then wearing the U.S. Army uniform, was a member of the 1960 Olympic ski jumping team.

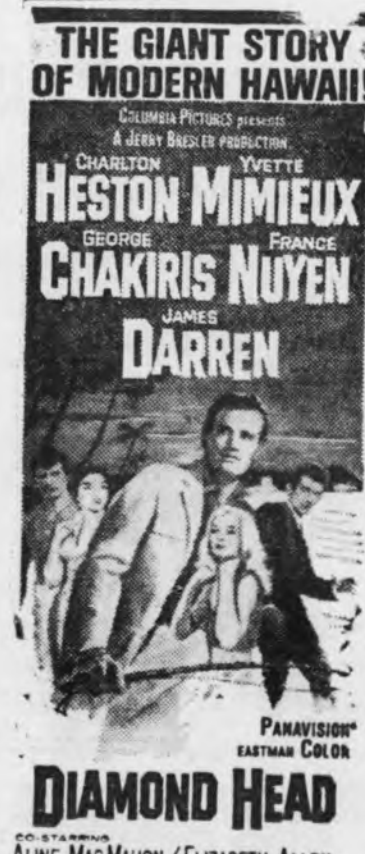

to draw upon, the tax collector would have slim pickings indeed," he added.

Hopes For Tax Revision

"Here in Michigan we are, I hope, on the verge of tax revision in the interest of equity; and there are many other states where chaotic tax structures are fully as much in need of reform. We demand too much of human nature if we ask that everyone should agree on the equity of taxes. But when you or your company feel depressed by the size of the tax bite, I hope you'll remember that Michigan Tech is supported in part, and on a truly minimal basis, by some of your tax dollars, and that under-financing a college of technology merely

chokes off its own service to the economy and thus defeats itself."

Van Pelt said some progress has been made toward a closer relationship between Michigan's peninsula through such things as the Mackinac Bridge and the frequent air service between the Upper Peninsula and downstate cities.

"But we need a much closer contact," he said. "I hope to see strong and continuing efforts on the part of the Legislature and Michigan business and industry to strengthen our statewide ties."

"To accomplish this, there should be frequent interchange of ideas and information between the peninsulas."

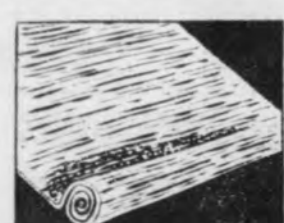

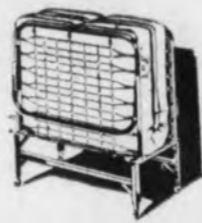

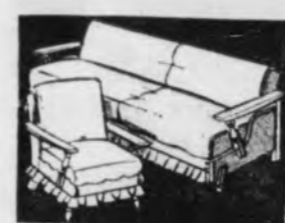
