Temperature Problem Complicating the problem the varying temperature of the fuel from 7 degrees in midwinter to 76 in summer. All incoming and outgoing fuel must be converted to 60 degrees to compute gallonage. Similar to a high grade kerosene, the jet fuel changes density with the temperature.

Of more concern to the men on the base and the pilots is quality control - "keeping chunks of coal," as they call minute particles of dirt, from getting into the Voodoo fuel system. Its filters are so fine they can be cleaned only with ultrasonic devices. Water Dangerous



nedy's announced intention to ask Congress for authority to bring more workers under the minimum wage law points up a major dispute on this issue between the U.S. Department of Labor and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Most frequently mentioned proposal is to provide Fair Labor Standards Act coverage to 500,000 hotel, motel, restaurant and laundry workers, which Congress refused to do in 1961. Other proposals have been made to extend coverage to over six million workers in retail and wholesale trade, local transportation, industrial and white collor work-

Next Sept. 3 - the day after Labor Day, incidentally - the minimum wage will advance from \$1.15 an hour to \$1.25 for some 24 million workers already covered. This will be the second advance from the \$1-an-hour rate authorized by 1961 amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Two million workers received the first 15cent-an-hour raise and 600,000 retail trade and construction workers not previously covered were brought under the act for the first time at \$1 an hour. These newly covered workers will have their wages raised to \$1.15 Sept. 3, 1964 and to \$1.25 an hour a year

No Inflationary Impact Found

They'll also be eligible for time-and-a-half pay for work over 44 hours a week after Sept. 3, 1963, for over 42 hours a year later, and for over 40 hours two years later.

All these increases were made applicable to retail and service industries with \$1 milion or more annual business receiving \$250,-000 worth of goods across state lines. For the first time, this broadened the act to cover industries not wholly in interstate commerce. Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz has ust sent to Congress an annual report on the effects of these 1961 amendments.

He finds that the 1961 raises had no inflationary impact on wages in general. Also, he finds that the raises had few detrimental effects on the levels of employment in affected industries.

Only in the southern sawmill industry was any drop in employment noted, but this merely continued a decline that has been going on for a number of years.

Of 36 industries affected by minimum wage increases in the South, prices dropped in eight and increased by an average of 3 per cent in nine. But living standards by all workers are reported to have been increased by about 10 per cent.

Employment has actually increased in all other industries covered since the 1961 minimum wage increase took effect, Wirtz reports. He finds that workers not covered by the act did not benefit indirectly from the increase. He uses this fact to underline the necessity for further minimum wage law coverage.

U.S. Chamber's Position

U.S. Chamber of Commerce, however, has announced its opposition to any further extensions of minimum wage law coverage until effects of the 1961 increases have been fully vould probably mean no action before 1966.

Employer arguments against minimum wage laws are principally that they tend to create unemployment among unskilled workers and that they reduce purchasing power by promoting inflation. Little evidence is offered to support these theories, however, and the assertions are in direct conflict with the report just sent to Congress by Wirtz.

Employers also advance the argument that government should have no part in setting wages in a free economy - even minimum wages. It is conceded by the chamber, however, that the \$3 billion increase in the national wage bill attributed to minimum wage raises is only 1 per cent of the \$325 billion total.

These are the main lines of argument that will be heard as the Kennedy Administration presents details of its plans for further expansion of minimum wage coverage.





Job Security Bill Proposed By Jacobetti

State Rep. Dominie J. Jacobetti (D-Negaunee), Marquette County District, announced today he has introduced a master employment security bill in the State Legislature.

Purpose of the unemployment insurance, Jacobetti said, is the provision of benefits for workers who are involuntarily unemployed. Michigan has a series of disqualification provisions which are very harsh. This bill proposes to redress these wrongs and extend benefits to workers unemployed because of circumstances over which they have no control."

In most cases this bill does not really propose new language, he said, but rather the restoration of old provisions which were in the law for many years before the Legislature adopted more and more restrictive amendments to impose new qualifications and more stringent tests of eligibility.

Requirements Lowered Jacobetti said these provisions can be justified by comparison with laws in a majority of other states as well. This bill would also increase the coverage of unemployment compensation to over 100,500 additional workers by reducing the number of employees in an establishment from four to one in order to receive benefits. Also, it is proposed that the level of benefits be raised so as to provide minimum benefits in order

Michigan began the payment of unemployment benefits in 1938. In that year the average weekly wage in covered employment was \$29.06. The maximum benefit was \$16 a week or 55 per cent of the average wage. The average payment was \$13.49 or 46 per cent of the average wage.

At present the average statewide wage is above \$110 a week. The basic maximum payable to workers without dependents is \$30, or 27 per cent of the average wage. The maximum payable to a worker with maximum dependents is \$55, which is about 50 per cent of the average wage, and lower than the \$16 maximum in 1938, when expressed in terms of the average wage. Average payment for a week of unemployment is \$36.86, or 33 per cent of the average wage. Would Hike Maximum

This bill would gradually increase maximum payments until they reached 50 per cent of the state-wide average weekly wage. Sixteen states have already established rates to this effect.

Jacobetti said: "This bill also would improve the financing of unemployment compensation so that the cost of unemployment is more nearly brought in line with the use by a particular employer so that some employees would not be carrying more than their share of the load, and so that the funding of unemployment compensation would be considerably more
