

Tigers Don't Have Real Leadoff Man

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP)—"The best batter for Detroit..." Well, somebody has to be the Tigers' leadoff batter and it's a good guessing game as to who it'll be.

The Tigers just don't have a regular who possesses all the qualifications of a good leadoff man. What they need is someone who draws walks like Eddie Yost, runs like Maury Wills, is a tough target like Albie Pearson, or hits often enough like Bobby Richardson.

Unless Jake Wood breaks into the starting lineup—and it's unlikely—the Tigers will be hard put to find a successful leadoff batter.

"It's a tough one," said Manager Bob Scheffing. "I'm going to start off trying Bubba Phillips there."

Phillips? He drew 20 walks in 148 games for Cleveland last year. The year before it was 29 walks in 143 games. And the year before that 14 in 113 games.

"Last time I led off was at Buffalo," said Phillips.

That was 13 years ago.

Chico Fernandez, who led off last year after Wood was benched, will be dropped to the No. 7 slot in Scheffing's current planning.

"Chico didn't walk much either," said Scheffing. "Only 42 times." Phillips' speed is better than Chico's and Chico hits more homers, so his power is needed lower.

"Phillips always has been hitting eighth and he's not going to get many bases on balls there. He has to protect a rally with the pitcher up next, so he's swinging at everything instead of waiting for bases on balls."

If Phillips doesn't work in at leadoff—and he promises he'll learn to start waiting out pitchers—Scheffing will try Billy Bruton, the No. 2 hitter most of his career in Detroit because of his hit-and-run ability, batted leadoff several years with Milwaukee.

"I might end up with Bruton there," Scheffing said. "But I'd rather not. He's a better second man."

BOSTON (AP)—Bob Cousy sat pale and weary on the trainer's table long after the most thrilling, emotion-draining experience of his 34 years.

"The worst is over now," Cousy said Sunday after the monumental Boston farewell to the all-time great who is ending an Basketball Association career.

"The playoffs will be nothing."

In a moving prelude to retirement, the unshakable athlete, always steady in the clutch, was wracked with sobs.

He was not alone. Many a grown man cried.

Few saw the final minutes of a game in which Boston defeated Syracuse 125-116.

Celtics coach Red Auerbach, who gave Cousy a tearful hug before a standing-room Boston Garden crowd and a regional television audience, reflected in the dressing room: "I've never seen anything like this as a tribute to an athlete."

Cousy admitted he had dreaded the moment of this final game in his last season. "How do you say thank you?" he had asked.

For an hour he received accolades, gifts and a message from President Kennedy while he wiped his eyes, wrung his hands, bowed his head, shuffled his feet and waved to the crowd during the many ear-splitting ovations.

President Kennedy's message, read by Auerbach during the pre-game ceremonies, said Cousy's "record is an eloquent testimony to your ability as a basketball player. I know you will set the same high standards as a coach that you have as a player. It is a pleasure for me to join the sports world in this tribute to you."

Oh, yes, the game. Cousy scored eight points, passing the 1,000 point mark for the fifth consecutive season, and he had nine assists.

NAIA Toughens Tourney Rules For Small Schools

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The National Association of Interscholastic Athletics has taken two actions to strengthen its hand in its rivalry with the NCAA over championship events for the nation's small colleges.

The first action, announced today by the NAIA executive committee, provides:

"If any conference with more than 25 per cent of its football or basketball games against teams officially classified as the major level of competition, that team will be ineligible for NAIA district or national competition."

This rule has been in effect for basketball and the action extends it to football. The NAIA said schools generally classified as major in The Associated Press poll would be considered as major level, but in borderline cases the NAIA would decide.

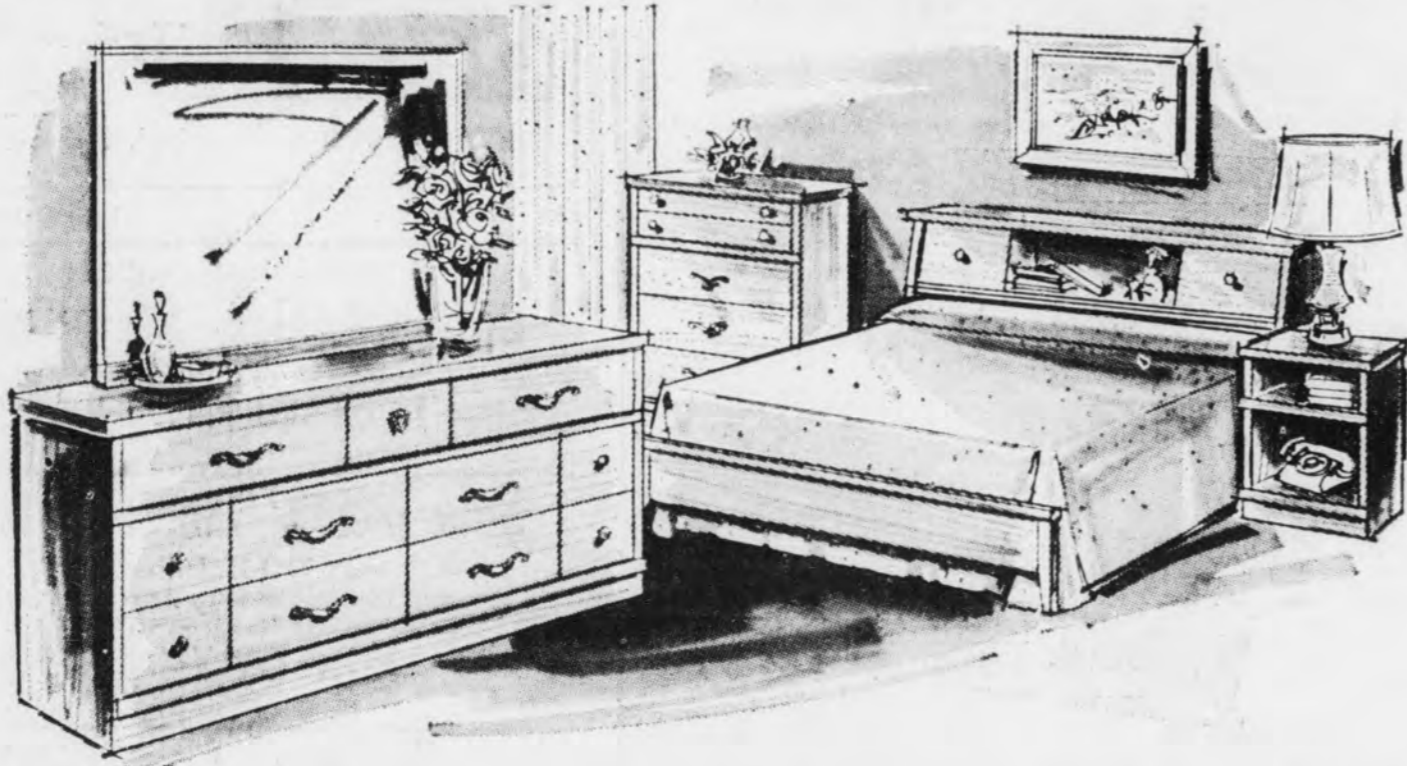

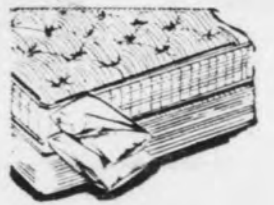

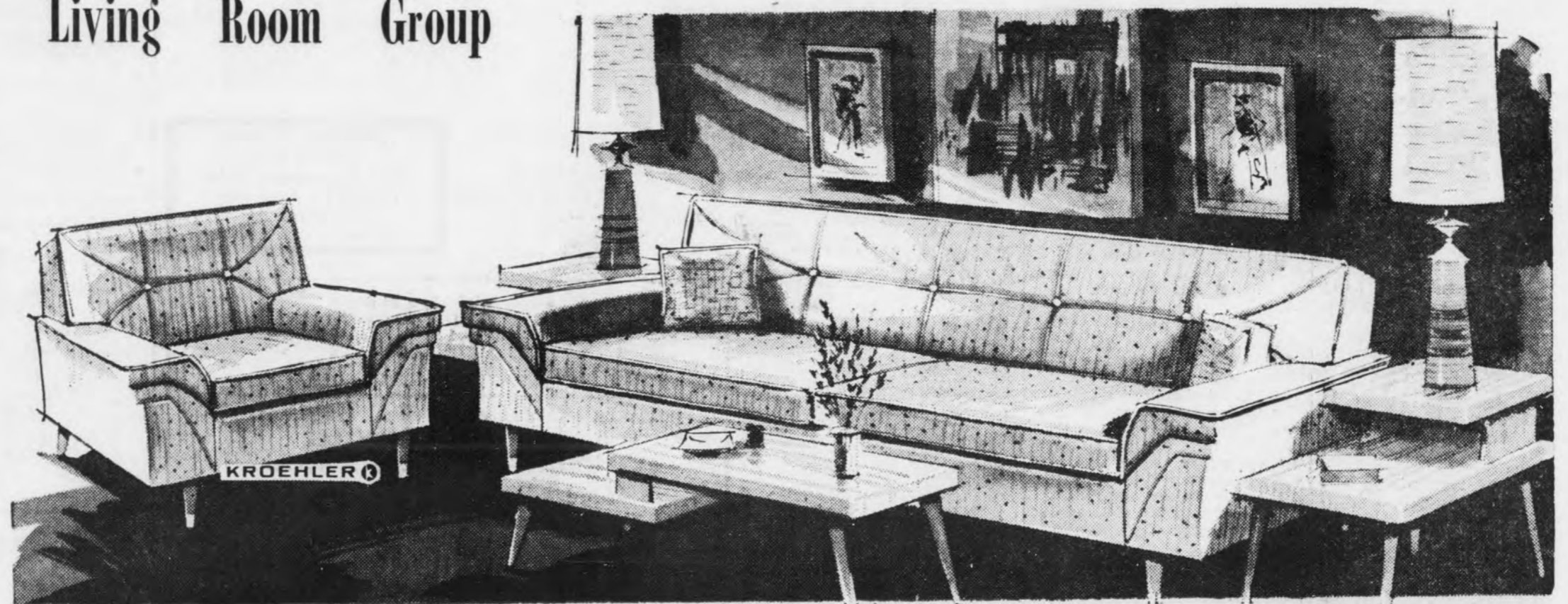

Detroit Man Admits Killing Three Women

DETROIT (AP) — A hospital kitchen worker today admitted the slayings of three young women within a 14-month period, police reported.

Assistant Wayne County prosecutor John Dodge said the slayings were admitted by William Lugrand, 23, kitchen helper at the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital.

Dodge said Lugrand declared he suffered from headaches that were accompanied by "uncontrollable sex urges." He said he committed all the killings when the women resisted his advances, Dodge said.

The third victim, Vernice Scott, 21, was found stabbed to death in her apartment Wednesday.

Dodge said Lugrand, first freed, admitted Miss Scott's saying when re-questioned upon discovery that Joan Crum, 22, strangled at her home April 6 last year, was his cousin. Lugrand then admitted he also killed Miss Crum and Mrs. Barbara Ray, 18, who was strangled at her home Jan. 26 last year.

Gov. Romney To Fight U.S. Over ADC-U

LANSING (AP) — Gov. George Romney today declared he will fight a federal contention that the ADC-U bill passed the legislature is illegal.

The Governor took his stand after Anthony Celebrezze, secretary of health, education and welfare, wired Romney to contend that the bill, as now written, does not conform with federal standards.

The measure is aimed at bringing Michigan under the federal program for Aid to the Dependent Children of the Unemployed.

"I'll go to Washington myself, if necessary," Romney said in announcing his intention to appeal the ruling. "If I can go to New York to try and get the Olympics for Detroit I can go to Washington to try and get this aid for the children of our unemployed."

Meanwhile, Romney said, he is seeking bi-partisan support from the Michigan congressional delegation to back his stand. He also said he wanted Republican legislators to stall off an attempt by Democrats to recall the ADC-U bill to either amend it to conform with agency standards or substitute for it.

"I don't find any legal basis for their wish to tell Michigan how to define those eligible for aid," Romney said. "The law clearly states the definition of unemployment is to be as defined by the state."

Foreign Aid Report Ready For Kennedy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Total U.S. foreign aid since World War II will climb above the \$100 billion mark this year.

How well the giant overseas assistance program promotes U.S. security—and how it could be refashioned to do a better job—is the subject of a controversial report by a presidential advisory committee headed by Gen. Lucius D. Clay.

Aides said a final version of the Clay report was made available to President Kennedy today. The report is expected to be made public this weekend.

Figures furnished by the Agency for International Development, which administers U.S. aid, list \$97.7 billion worth of military and economic help to 111 countries and foreign groups from July 1, 1945 through mid-1962.

Though detailed statistics for the current fiscal year have not yet been worked out, the over-all total is certain to push past \$100 billion. That's because Congress last fall voted another \$3.9 billion in new aid funds and other items like surplus food disposals abroad have been topping \$2 billion a year.

France, with \$9.4 billion, and Britain, with \$8.7 billion, still rank 1-2 as the largest total receivers of postwar American aid. The Western allies got the bulk of their U.S. financial help in the early postwar years when the Marshall Plan focused on European recovery.

Today, the aid pattern is different. With Europeans now prospering and dispensing aid themselves, U.S. aid now focuses on underdeveloped countries and poorer lands pressed by the Communists.

Thus, far more American assistance has gone to nations like India, Korea, South Viet Nam and Turkey since the end of the Marshall Plan in 1952 than to West European countries.

American aid has undergone other changes too. In the 1949-52 Marshall Plan years, all but \$3 billion of the \$19 billion in U.S. overseas economic help went out as grants, or gifts. By 1962 the emphasis had changed to cash terms loans aimed at stimulating economic development.

Of the \$97.7-billion cumulative total, \$66.6 billion has been in economic aid of which \$42.7 billion was grants. Military assistance totaled \$31 billion, all except \$279 million in grants.

Russ Launch Cosmos 13

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union launched an unmanned satellite today.

The satellite was named Cosmos 13. The Soviet news agency Tass announced.

The Soviets began launching the Cosmos series a year ago and said they were measuring radiation and other phenomena. Cosmos 12 was launched Dec. 22.

Tass said Cosmos 13 had been placed in orbit with an initial time to circle the earth of 89.77 minutes. The equipment installed on board the satellite is functioning smoothly, Tass said.

Last year, Antara said, Communist Chinese doctors treated Sukarno for a kidney ailment.

Authorities Ponder Over Food Deaths

DETROIT (AP)—Health authorities still seek positive answers today to whether contaminated tuna caused two food poisoning deaths and, if so, how many cans from the same batch still are on pantry shelves.

If any of the 3,760 cans shipped to Detroit area A&P food stores were contaminated, was there more than one? Were there others among the 26,400 cans of Japanese tuna packed the same day by the same West Coast packer?

Experts say the answers may be several days away.

Type E Botulism

Two Detroit women died of food poisoning tentatively diagnosed as "type E botulism," a rare type generally associated with marine life from extreme cold waters.

Ralph Johnson, U. S. Food and Drug Administration bacteriologist at Detroit, said "we have some toxic (poison) cultures" from the can from which the women ate, and that "preliminary indications make us very suspicious." But he was not ready to say whether it was type E or whether the tuna could have been responsible.

FDA Tests

About a dozen cans from the suspected shipment, taken from store and pantry shelves proved negative in FDA tests.

Milton P. Duffy, chief of California's food and drug inspection, said at San Francisco he was confident a full checkout would show no tuna botulism involved. He said that the canner is completely new and modern.

Margaret McCarthy, 39, died in Detroit Tuesday, three days after her neighbor, Collette Brown, 37, with whom she had shared a tuna fish snack late last week. Both developed symptoms resembling type E botulism.

120 Cases

The tin from which they ate was traced to a consignment of 120 cases to Detroit area A&P food stores. The 6½-ounce cans bore the A&P label and were from a coded shipment with markings of WY3Y2 over 118X.

When health authorities first voiced suspicion, A&P withdrew all the WY3Y2-118X shipment. Wednesday it ordered all A&P brand tuna withdrawn temporarily from its 4,400 supermarkets across the country.

JFK Reports On Costa Rica Trip Tonight



PRESIDENT KENNEDY

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy reports to the nation tonight on the Costa Rica conference which produced a seven-nation agreement to speed economic development of the hemisphere and curb Cuba-based subversion.

Shortly before Kennedy left the Costa Rican capital of San Jose late Wednesday, he announced he would open a 6 p.m. Washington news conference with a statement on his Monday through Wednesday talks with the chief executives of Panama and the five Central American republics.

Satisfaction

The President was certain to express satisfaction with the outcome of the San Jose meetings, which brought him personal acclaim and agreement on a detailed statement of policy to guide the United States in its dealings with Panama, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Nicaragua and Honduras.

Hoping to attract a large television-radio audience for the news conference, Kennedy postponed for two hours the 4 p.m. starting time of the session originally announced more than a week ago.

Radio, TV Coverage

The news conference will be carried live on NBC, CBS, ABC and Mutual radio networks. It also will be carried live on television by NBC and CBS. ABC planned live broadcasting except along the Pacific Coast, where a 4:30 p.m. PST rebroadcast was scheduled.

Kennedy, who left Washington last Friday for a weekend in Palm Beach, Fla., before going to San Jose on Monday, returned to the capital late Wednesday night.

Communism's Failure

Before leaving San Jose, Kennedy told a cheering crowd of university students that Cuba is an example of communism's failure to provide for its people. Contrasting the progress of Costa Rica with that of the Communist-controlled Caribbean island, Kennedy said Cuba now produces 25 per cent less food than it did five years ago.

"The myth of the 1950's — the claim that communism can build a better system — has collapsed," Kennedy said.

"It is our adversaries who must build walls to contain their people," he said.

Wagner Maps Plans To End Press Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—Mayor Robert F. Wagner charted a new course today for settlement of the 104-day-old New York newspaper shutdown.

He announced that negotiators for the publishers of eight closed newspapers and for the striking Mailers Union reached tentative agreement on terms for a new contract.

Sister Union

The Mailers are a sister union of the printers, whose strike against four newspapers last Dec. 8 led to the shutdown of the city's major newspapers.

Wagner urged that members of Local 6 of the International Typographical Union reconsider his formula for settling their strike.

Wagner, who has been trying for almost two months to end the shutdown, announced the Mailers Union settlement and his proposal to speed a printer settlement in a statement at 2:30 a.m. Negotiations involving two other newspaper unions were in progress at the time.

Recommendation

The mayor recommended that Bertram A. Powers, president of Local 6, call a meeting in Madison Square Garden so as to provide larger accommodations for the men to hold a second vote on his settlement formula which the publishers have accepted.

Algiers Waits For Reply On N-Test Edict

ALGIERIA (AP)—The Algerian government waited uneasily today for an answer to its demand that France end nuclear testing in the Sahara.

Premier Ahmed Ben Bella and the Algerian National Assembly made the demand Wednesday in calling for revision of the agreements giving France military bases in Algeria and its Saharan territory.

Tunisian Demand

Trouble is sure to follow if French President Charles de Gaulle ignores the plea, as he did Tunisia's demand in July 1961 for French evacuation of the Bizerte base. The Tunisians attacked the base, and 3,000 Tunisian lives were lost.

There was no official comment in Paris on the Algerian demand.

Ben Bella's demand for revision of the military agreements was prompted by an underground atomic explosion which the Algerians said France set off in the Sahara testing ground Monday. The Algerian Assembly approved his stand by a near unanimous vote.

'Direct Menace'

The French test violated the sovereignty of newly independent Algeria and was "a direct menace against the population," Ben Bella told the assembly.

Women Show Too Much Leg!

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Gen. Wilfred Kitching, the Briton who heads the Salvation Army, says women show far too much leg.

"Nowadays, skirts are much too immodest," he said in an interview today.

"How low would you like to see our skirts!" asked a girl reporter in a knee-length skirt.

"Better ask my wife," answered the general, smiling. "But I would say a skirt which came halfway between the knee and ankle would seem modest enough."

The general is visiting Australia for three weeks.

SING SING EXECUTION SCHEDULED FOR TONIGHT:

Killer Doesn't Want 'Do-Gooders' To Save His Life

WASHINGTON (AP) — Justice Harlan of the Supreme Court was asked today to stay the execution tonight of a New York state prisoner who has fought off efforts of attorneys whom he calls "do-gooders"—to save his life.

Frederick Charles Wood, 31, condemned slayer of five persons, is scheduled to die in Sing Sing Prison's electric chair at 10 o'clock tonight.

"I really want to ride the lightning," Wood has said. "I do not welcome any intrusion into this sinking case of mine."

Petition

Norman Dorsen, a New York University associate professor of law, filed with the Supreme Court clerk a petition asking that Harlan grant a stay to permit a hearing on Wood's sanity.

Dorsen, who was a law clerk to Harlan about five years ago, said he contended in the petition

that Wood "may well be insane now." Dorsen said there is enough evidence of insanity in Wood's history to show that he now deserves a hearing at which he would be represented by counsel.

No Indication

There was no indication when Harlan would act.

Dorsen filed his request for a stay of execution after state and federal courts in New York had rejected a similar request by other counsel. Two lower federal courts already have turned Dorsen down.

From death row, Wood has declared he wants no interference with his execution.

"I have had three stays of execution thus far, one automatic (beyond my control) and two effected by well-intentioned lawyers as 'do-gooders'."

'I Want No More'

"I want no more."

Wood, who even mocked the judge who sentenced him to die, was sent to the death house for slaying two elderly pensioners during a wine drinking spree in Queens in 1958. He was then out on parole after serving 17 years for beating a man to death in Elmira, N.Y., in 1942.

Later Wood confessed to having killed a 16-year-old girl in 1926 and an Elmira woman in 1932,

Blizzard Subsides, But Snow Removal Task Here Remains

Area residents began this morning, the "official" beginning of spring, to dig out from under the heaviest March snowfall in 24 years.

Only a trace of snow fell after 1 p.m. yesterday, but fanatically powerful winds didn't begin to diminish until midnight. The result was a ravaging blizzard — and trouble on streets and roads.

In the 30 hour period which began at 8 Tuesday morning and ended at 1 p.m. yesterday, 12.7 inches of heavy, wet snow was dumped on the area.

It was the biggest snowfall since the heaviest December snowfall on record here, Dec. 11 and 12 of 1961, when 14.2 inches of snow fell.

It also was the heaviest March snowfall since March 14 and 15, 1939, when the area was immobilized by 16 inches of snow. On those dates, all highways were impassable and only single tracks were open on main streets in town.

Wind gusts were recorded at velocities up to 48 miles per hour at the Marquette County Airport in Negaunee Township last night.

Fred Mueller, meteorologist in charge of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Marquette, said winds here reached the velocity of 37 miles per hour. Winds averaged about 30 miles per hour from 1:30 to 11 p.m. yesterday and dropped to 15 or 20 MPH this morning, in downtown Marquette.

Many Side Roads Blocked

Although county road commission plows covered most of the roads in the county yesterday, blowing and drifting last night plugged some main roads and many side roads during the night.

Only one lane was passable at times on U.S. 41 between Marquette and Negaunee and there were still a few narrow spots this morning.

Drifting was extremely bad on County Road 480 and County Road 492 near Eagle Mills was closed early this morning. Both were opened late this morning.

Road commission crews, fighting continuously against drifting, expected to have all secondary roads open by tonight.

Sidewalk Plowing Curbed

In Marquette, many people left their cars at work last night and fought the wind on foot. However, with snow packed too hard for the sidewalk plows, walking was very difficult.

Howard L. Coppens, public works superintendent, said the tractor plow was out this morning, but it will be some time before all sidewalks can be cleared.

Wilson, Island Beach Rd. Blocked

Although street crews worked

rapidly to keep ahead of the storm, drivers last night were often forced to take "the long way around" to avoid steep hills or streets blocked by drifting snow or cars in trouble.

Both Wilson St. near Fisher St. and Island Beach Road were blocked early this morning and, with drifts piling up as soon as plows got through, cars were still barely able to get through late this morning.

It was clear downtown this morning, but drifting still created a big problem on the outskirts of town. Big drifts were piling up along Lake Shore Blvd.

Although south U.S. 41 was clear this morning, it was extremely icy from the Camp River Bridge south. Crews worked to keep the road sanded, but strong winds were blowing the sand away, Coppens said.

10-Foot Snowbanks

"Snowbanks are so high that the plows don't do any good anymore," Coppens said. Sno-Go's were out this morning cutting down the banks, which were 10 feet tall in several areas.

The cleanup job should be completed by tomorrow, Coppens said.

27-Inch Snow Depth

Snow depth reached a maximum of 27 inches yesterday, but settled overnight and stood at 25 inches this morning.

Water value of the 12.7 inch snowfall was 1.13 inches, including .76 of an inch Tuesday and .39 of an inch yesterday.

Between 8 a.m. and midnight Tuesday, 8.1 inches of snow fell. Two inches of snow fell overnight and the remainder fell yesterday morning.

During most of the blizzard, visibility was one-sixteenth of a mile at the airport and about one-fourth of a mile in Marquette.

Winds Diminishing Tonight

Winds were steadily diminishing today. Light snow flurries were expected today, along with variable cloudiness. But clearing is predicted for tonight.

Board Cites Registration Requirement

Selective service registration is a continuing requirement for all young men as they reach 18 years of age, Paul A. Ameen, Ishpeming, chairman of the Marquette County Draft Board, noted today.

Executive Department Setup Kindled Long Con-Con Debate

By GENE SCHROEDER
LANSING (AP)— There was little disagreement at the Constitutional Convention that Michigan governors should be handed the keys and a four-year rent-free lease to a house in Lansing when they are sworn into office.

But the question of what kind of executive department structure the governor should have to work with kindled lengthy debate among the convention delegates, and the arguments have continued since.

Strengthened Or Weakened?
The Democratic Party, officially opposed to adoption of the proposed new constitution, contends that among other things the document weakens the executive branch by taking away the right of the people to elect a state treasurer, auditor general, superintendent of public instruction and highway commissioner.

But Republicans and other proponents insist that the revised constitution is intended to strengthen the executive.

John Martin's View
"We have tried to reduce the highly fractionated, dispersed and divided character of Michigan's present governmental structure by providing appointive rather than elective positions which can be filled by the most competent people who can be found," says John Martin, GOP national committee man who was chairman of the convention's executive branch committee.

Both supporters and opponents of the document generally agree that the governor should be provided with a suitably furnished executive residence and that his term and that of other elective executive officers should be extended from two to four years.

'Balanced' Viewpoint
Because of the controversy raging over many of the other features of the revised constitution, and inter-University Faculty Committee on Constitutional Revision was created to present a "balanced" viewpoint to the Michigan voter.

The committee is composed of 31 professors from six Michigan colleges and universities.

'Reasoned Analysis Imperative'
The question before the Michigan voter is so fundamental to our lives that a reasoned analysis and careful deliberation is imperative," they declared.

The professors, mostly political scientists, deplored what they described as the unequivocal and categorical positions taken by the

leadership of the political parties. These positions, they said, are "supported by unsound and one-sided reasoning" and are "virtually blind to opposing points of view."

The educators added: **Ideal Or Reactionary?**
"It is our feeling that the new constitution is neither the ideal document the proponents would wish to persuade the voter to believe, nor is it the reactionary document its detractors claim."

Examining the executive article of the proposed constitution, the faculty committee found that it adopts a great many—but by no means all—of the doctrines of an ideal, or model, article.

Provision Praised
For example, the committee said, the change of language from "chief executive" to "executive power is vested in the governor" makes it clear that the constitutional intent is to make the governor THE executive officer of the state.

The committee report also praised a feature expanding the governor's powers of enforcement so that he has authority to inquire into the condition and administration of any public office and remove any state officer for cause regardless of whether the legislature is in session or not.

'Something Of A Hodge-Podge'
But the report described as "something of a hodge-podge" the selection procedure for other administrative board members. It added:

"The governing board-executive director arrangements for highways and education are likely to place any governor at a disadvantage, and it is apparent that this was the intent of the authors of these plans.

"Furthermore, unless the legislature abolishes or amends its structure, the ad board will include three members—superintendent of public instruction, highway director and auditor whose selection is neither by the governor nor by the electorate.

"It seems probable therefore that any future governor will have less control over the ad board than is presently the case. It appears that the more policy making the offices are, the less control the governor will have over them."

'Enormous Step Forward'
In the area of integration of administrative agencies, the committee felt the document takes "an enormous step forward."

The revised constitution places a limit of 20 on the number of principal state departments and requires that they be grouped by major purpose. Currently, there are some 120 administrative agencies.

Two Years To Act
The legislature is given two years to act under the proposed document, with failure of the lawmakers to carry out the program transferring the assignment to the governor.

On budget matters, the committee report frowned on a feature which requires a balanced budget and expenditure reduction by the governor with the approval of the appropriation committees when revenue falls short of appropriations.

Discretion Limited
"These requirements limit the discretion of the governor and in so doing are restrictive in terms of the usefulness of the budget as a device for assuring a strong responsible executive," the educators stated.

"Furthermore, this provision flies in the face of the advice of most economists that we not curtail expenditures in periods of recession or depression."

Confirmation Clause
Senatorial confirmation of executive appointments—the "advice and consent" doctrine—was changed from the current system which, in effect, has appointees serving at the pleasure of the senate.

Under the new provision, failure by the senate to disapprove gubernatorial appointments within 60 days carries with it confirmation.

In the past five years, the senate has failed to take any action on nearly one-third of the names submitted to it for confirmation.

Aid In Providing Leadership
"The effect of this," said the faculty committee, "is to reduce the potential interference with the activities of gubernatorial appointees by the senate.

"On the other hand, although few appointees in the past have actually been rejected, the new provision might increase the tendency of the senate to reject appointments."

He noted, however, that it would be necessary to build public acceptance for herring, cisco and other Lake Superior fish.

Perspective Needed

George McMannus, a Michigan State consumer marketing specialist, warned, "Although the Lake Superior fishing industry may look very large to us on the local level, compared to the industry on a national or world scale, we are just a small segment."

"Consequently it is imperative that we enter the marketplace with a quality product and one that can be readily identified through the use of only one label," McMannus said.

The specialists pointed out that an organization working collectively to market the fish would be needed to make an impact on selling.

Two Proposals

They suggested formation of a co-operative or a stock company which would have small branch processing plants in several communities and market under the same label.

Delegates agreed to seek an Area Redevelopment Administration grant for research on processing and marketing through three trade associations, the Michigan Fish Producers' Association, the Lake Superior Fish Producers' Association and the Wisconsin-Minnesota Fisheries Association.

If approved, the research would be supervised by Dr. Peter Tack of Michigan State in co-operation with the University of Wisconsin, the University of Minnesota and the Federal Bureau of Fisheries.

Anti-Trust Suits Not Likely To Alter Pulpwood Purchasing

The federal government's anti-trust suits against Lake States paper industries have drawn "blood" but are unlikely to make any changes in the methods of purchasing pulpwood in Wisconsin, Pulp & Paper Magazine says in the lead article of its February issue.

The trade journal of the paper industry has its executive offices in New York City and is published in Bristol, Conn.

Four To Fight Charges

An article by Albert W. Wilson, editor of Pulp & Paper, states, "While four companies — St. Regis (Rhineclander), Charmin Paper Products, Consolidated Paper and Green Bay Paper & Pulp — decided to fight the charges of conspiring to hold down pulpwood prices, 5 others decided to offer pleas of nolo contendere, apparently in order to avoid lengthy and expensive trials. These were American Can (Marathon), Mosinee Paper Mills, Nekoosa-Edwards, Wausau Paper Mills and Kansas City Star (Park Falls)."

"While they still protest their innocence of criminal or civil charges, by signing the consent order they enabled a Madison, Wis., federal judge to declare them 'guilty' and impose fines of \$50,000 each."

"Some of these same companies and in addition, Kimberly-Clark, Scott Paper (Marquette and Oconto Falls), Mead Corp. (Escanaba) and Badger Paper Mills (Peshigo) face similar charges in Milwaukee and a half dozen companies are accused to pulpwood pricing conspiracy in Grand Rapids, Mich."

Unfavorable Publicity

"Justice Department actions brought a great deal of unfavorable publicity to the mills, even before they were served notice, and therefore they were unable to strike back. Despite the government actions, there is no likelihood that there will be any change in the prices of pulpwood in the Lake States."

"There is far too much wood available and with the depressed conditions in the pulpwood markets, the mills are getting more wood offered to them than they want to buy. The law of supply and demand will certainly keep down the prices, the government contention that the alleged conspiracy was obstructing the operation of that law notwithstanding."

'Appalling Ignorance'

"The amazing statement of the Milwaukee grand jury foreman when the indictments were brought, to the effect that prices were held at a 'depressed' level in order to create an oversupply of pulpwood, indicates an appalling ignorance of conditions on both the pulpwood and wood pulp markets."

"Both Wisconsin and Michigan mills point out that their wood costs already are \$25 a ton (pulp) more than those in other regions of the United States — the South and the West — and if they want to remain competitive they cannot raise the pulpwood prices despite the Justice Department action."

Trend Toward Chip Buying

"With depressed pulp prices a point could be reached where it would be more economical for Wisconsin and Michigan mills to buy pulp or chips. In fact, there already is a strong trend toward buying of more chips from sawmills, instead of pulpwood."

"It is ironical that the forest development and conservation methods of the Wisconsin and Michigan paper companies apparently made them vulnerable to the attack by Attorney General Kennedy's Justice Department. In the first place these mills developed the technical methods of production that enabled them to use aspen, or poplar, which grows in abundance close to the mills, instead of the most costly and valuable spruce. Secondly, their vast tree planting programs which have literally brought about a new forest cover to those states and their

Sawyer Sergeant Wins Award For AF Suggestion

SSgt. Luther W. Benge, a member of the 410 Field Maintenance Squadron at K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base, recently received two \$25 awards for suggestions he made to the Air Force suggestion program.

The awards were for contributions he made while at Tachikawa Air Base, Japan.

The first financial award was for a suggestion adopted by the Air Force for replacing gear boxes while quick engine kits are installed on aircraft. The second was for the contribution he made on replacing servo pressure valve seals on fuel controls during periodic inspections.

The second suggestion resulted in a net saving to the Air Force of over \$18,000 in the first year, the USAF said.

Fellowship Chapter of the Order of DeMolay, which was founded in Marquette March 8, 1922, by Marquette Lodge 101, Free and Accepted Masons, now numbers some 200 members.

The chapter, which currently is observing DeMolay Week, meets in the Masonic Temple on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Chairman of the advisory council of the chapter is Westlie Johnson, Chapter "Dad" is Brodie Weston. The chapter has a Mothers' Circle consisting of DeMolay mothers, with Mrs. Charles Stobbe as president and Mrs. D. J. Seppanec as vice president.

Presenting Radio Series

Fellowship Chapter currently is presenting a series of programs over WDMJ, The Mining Journal station, on "DeMolay's Accent on Youth" (heard at 5:45 to 6 p. m.).

The International Order of DeMolay grew out of a hunting accident, a boy's need for companionship and advice and a young social worker's dream of teaching teen-age boys the principles of a good, upright life.

Family Left Fatherless

The hunting accident occurred in 1919 in Kansas City, Mo., and left fatherless a family in which Louis Lower was a teen-age boy. The boy went to Frank S. Land, the 28-year-old director of the Social Service Department of the Scottish Rite Temple in Kansas City for a job and to seek counsel.

Land gave young Lower a job, for he had been a friend of his father; and after frequent talks with Louis, he realized that the boy's predicament was not confined to him alone, but extended to countless other boys whether they had fathers or not. It pointed

out a need for a new youth organization — one that would provide the proper training and guidance to better citizenship that no other boys' group offered.

Named For Martyr

In February 1919 Louis Lower and eight of his friends met in the Scottish Rite Temple with Land to form a new boys' organization. Little did any of them dream that in 43 years the movement would be active in 12 countries and territories and would have initiated nearly three million boys.

The group was named for Jacques DeMolay, the last grand master of the Knights Templar, who died as a martyr.

The organization was formalized on March 18, 1919. Less than a year later the Mothers' Chapter of DeMolay in Kansas City grew to a membership of 3,000.

More Than 145,000 Members

Members of the Kansas City chapter traveled all over the country installing new chapters. Within 10 years there were over 1,200 chapters all over the world and over 100,000 active DeMolays. The number of chapters today totals over 2,300 and the active membership is more than 145,000.

DeMolay is an international youth organization dedicated to the principles of building better citizens out of teen-age boys.

DeMolay membership is open to any boy of good character who is between the ages of 14 and 21. Although DeMolay chapters are sponsored only by Masonic bodies or individual Masons, it is not necessary that a boy be a son or a relative of a Mason to belong to DeMolay.

The Order of DeMolay is a non-

profit corporation with the international office located in its own four-story building in Kansas City.

The youth movement is governed by an international Supreme Council composed of over 200 outstanding Masons located around the world. They meet in annual session to review and approve the actions of the staff.

Set Apart By Ritual

DeMolay's slogan is "building better citizens." Its ritual, which is divided into the initiatory and DeMolay degrees, is what sets the organization apart from other youth groups.

The initiatory degree is one of solemnity and consecration, during which the initiate dedicates himself to uphold the virtues of filial love, reverence, courtesy, comradeship, fidelity, cleanliness and patriotism.

Various awards are given to individuals for achievement. Merit bars are awarded for distinction in civil service, athletics, music, dramatics, religion and other fields. Special keys are also given for obtaining new members.

A program recently begun for DeMolays is one of career guidance. This program utilizes successful men in different fields of work to tell DeMolays what training is required and what rewards are received from a particular type of work. In addition, information on the cost and prerequisites for various universities and colleges is available from the Kansas City office.

Each chapter is supervised in all its functions by an adult advisory council. One man is designated as the official "Chapter Dad" to handle the supervision of chapter meetings and to counsel the members.

Another helping hand for most chapters is the Mothers' Circle. These now number 1,800. The Mothers' Circle primarily help the boys to raise money for their activities, and they maintain and repair robes and regalia.

'DeMolay Week' Proclaimed By Marquette Mayor

Mayor James R. Smith has proclaimed this week "DeMolay Week."

The Marquette DeMolay members, sponsored by the Marquette Masonic Lodge, are observing this week in celebration of the international organization's 44th anniversary.

The proclamation states: "Whereas the Order of DeMolay is composed of young men from 14 to 21 years of age who are seeking to become tomorrow's better citizens by developing character with boys of their own age; "I call upon our citizens to salute them for the fine example they set in contributing to the welfare and in the development and leadership of tomorrow."

Chicago meat counters reflect local marketings, which have dropped wholesale prices nine straight weeks. And one the West Coast, prices are generally 2 to 3 cents a pound lower than a year ago.

Pork Prices Plunge

Pork prices are also down in many stores. Pork loins are selling at a several-year low at some Chicago shops. Tenderloins, chops, bacon and ham are other pork attractions.

Tomatoes have slipped sharply in price in Southeastern and some other markets. The same shops offer radishes at season lows and green beans at bargain prices.

Alger County Crews Still Battling Worst Snowstorm Of Winter

MUNISING — Alger County's worst storm of the winter was continuing this morning, with county road crews battling huge drifts in an effort to keep traffic moving on main highways.

Strong northwest winds have caused considerable drifting on all highways in the county, in addition to making visibility bad for the last two days.

State police this morning reported that Highway M-28 was completely blocked by drifting snow from 6:30 to 10 last night at the Munising pumping station, AuTrain and Sand River areas. M-94 at Sundell and Dukes was still closed this morning by drifting snow.

Traffic was proceeding slowly on M-28 this morning, with one-way lanes being kept open by road

crews.

In Munising, visibility along old M-94, in the vicinity of the Munising Papermill, was very poor, and drifting had narrowed the highway there to one lane.

The snowfall for the last two days, according to Mrs. E. J. Mitchell, cooperative weather observer, was 7.3 inches, bringing the winter's total to 121.8 inches. The snow base this morning measured 24 inches.

Along with their task of removing snow, city crews are still working around-the-clock to thaw water line freeze-ups. To date, according to City Manager Walter Looney, 514 freeze-ups have been reported, in addition to six broken mains, eight frozen mains and 22 service lead leaks.

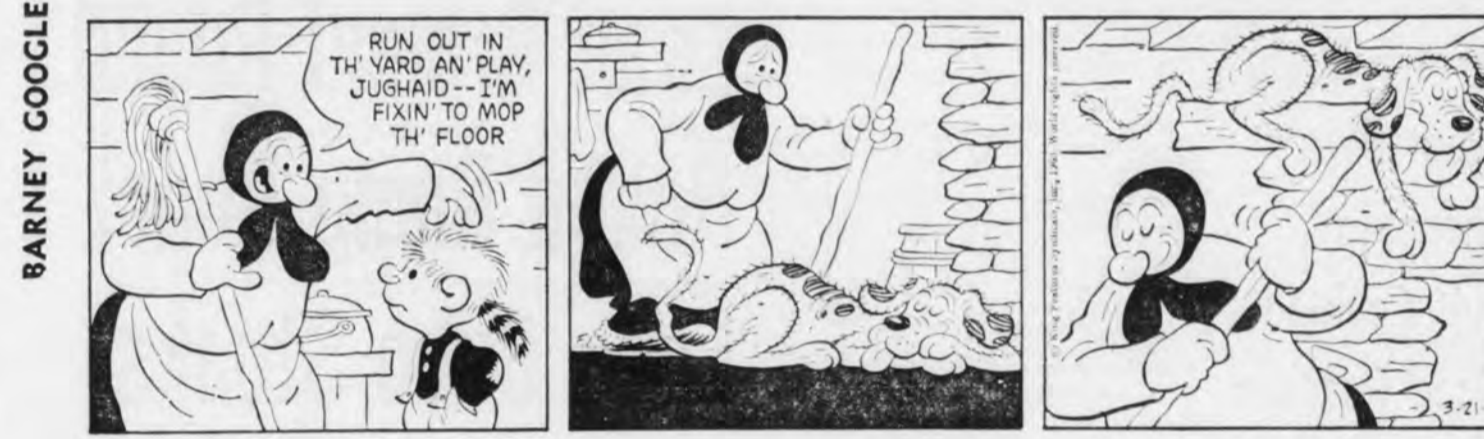

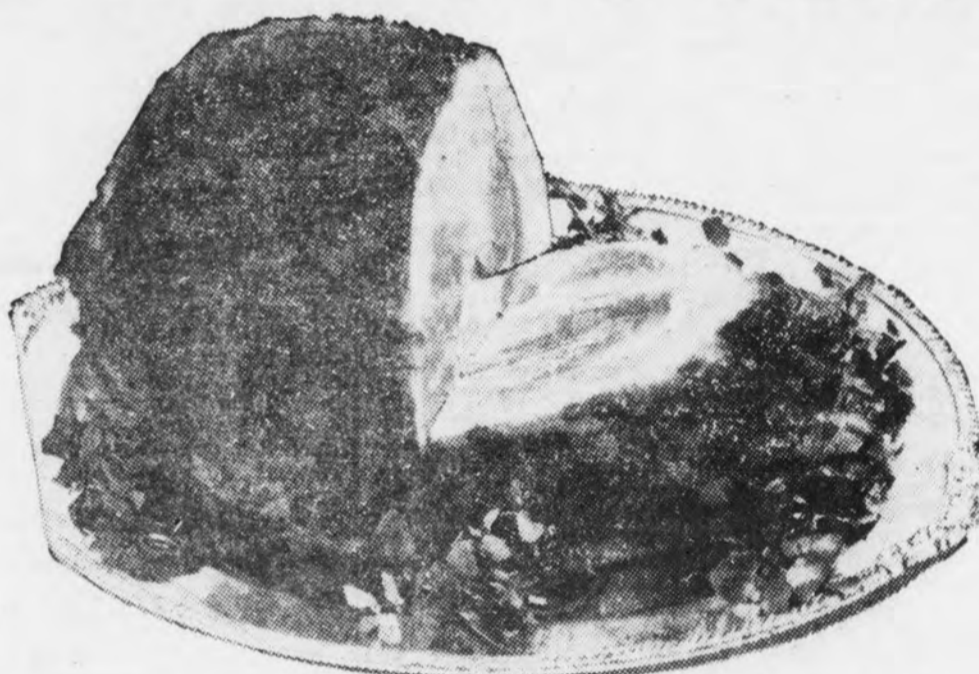
