Detroit Man Admits Killing Three Women

DETROIT (AP) - A hospital kitchen worker today admitted the slayings of three young women within a 14-month period, police reported.

Assistant Wayne County prosecutor John Dodge said the slayings were admitted by William Lugrand, 23, kitchen helper at the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital


Dodge said Lugrand declared he suffered from headaches that were accompanied by "uncontrollable sex urges." He said he committed all the killings when the women resisted his advances. Dodge said. The third victim, Vernice Scott, 21, was found stabbed to death in her apartment Wednesday.

Dodge said Lugrand, first freed, admitted Miss Scott's saying when re-questioned upon discovery that Joann Crum, 22, strangled at her home April 6 last year, was his cousin. Lugrand then admitted he also killed Miss Crum and Mrs. Barbara Ray, 18, who was strangled at her home Jan. 26 last year.

LANSING (AP) - Gov. George Romney today declared he will fight a federal contention that the ADC-U bill passed the legislature is illegal.

Blizzard Subsides, **But Snow Removal Task Here Remains**

Only a trace of snow fell after 1 p.m. yesterday, but fantastically powerful winds didn't begin to diminish until midnight. The result was a ravaging blizzard - and trouble on streets and roads.

In the 30 hour period which began at 8 Tuesday morning and ended at 1 p.m. yesterday, 12.7 inches of heavy, wet snow was dumped on the area.

It was the biggest snowfall since the heaviest December snowfall on record here, Dec. 11 and 12 of 1961, when 14.2 inches of snow fell.

It also was the heaviest March snowfall since March 14 and 15. were blowing the sand away, 1939, when the area was immobilized by 16 inches of show. Costa Rica Declaration

By JAMES MARLOW Associated Press News Analyst

WASHINGTON IN - What the seven presidents did at Costa Rica was so obvious it had been predicted. They issued a declaration of intention to stop the spread of communism in this hemisphere. What is less obvious is what they may have

agreed on privately, if anything. But even the success of what they publicly announced depends on how thoroughly they carry it out. After two days of talks President Kennedy and the presidents of Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala and Panama-said they agreed: 1. To make a real effort at social and economic progress in Latin America.

This, if really pursued, would deprive communism of some of its argument it can do more for the Latin American people faster. 2. To halt the flow of Communist agents,

arms and propaganda between Cuba and the Central American countries.

The United States, according to the declaration, will give special help in this with additional air and sea surveillance and interception within territorial waters.

Strong U. S. Opposition

But while the presidents were meeting the State Department in Washington announced strong U. S. opposition to hit and run raids on Cuba by refugees.

Lincoln White, State Department press officer, said this country "has stated repeatedly that such raids do not weaken the grip of the Fidel Castro regime in Cuba. Indeed, they may strengthen it."

If the United States-which backed the disastrous Bay of Pigs invasion in 1961-intends to be firm against hit and run raids it may depress the morale of anti-Castroites in-

The reason for White's statement seems to be not concern for the Castroites in Cuba but ers it will mess up American-Russian relations even more.

The Russians would then do the obvious: Claim the raiders came from U.S. bases and had American instigation and support.

In Miami this week anti-Castro Cuban refugees sources said two refugee groups shelled a Soviet military camp and a Soviet

No. 1 Mystery

The seven presidents' declaration raised no threat of armed intervention by any of their countries against Castro but expressed their conviction Cuba would soon be free of him.

How they're going to do this without direct action against him, since he is getting Russian help, backed by perhaps 15,-, 000 Russian troops in Cuba, is the No. 1 mystery of the Costa Rican conference. So, as far as the public is concerned, it's no nore enlightened on what direct steps can be taken against Castro than it was before the meeting.

Common Market Arrangement

The declaration did indicate earnestness on the part of the Central American presidents to push their social and economic programs through more cooperation and integration.







Just 13 geese made up the contingent of early arrivals, but their numbers will continue to increase to several thousand as spring progresses. Many of the geese will continue on to more northern nesting grounds, but approximately 800 will remain, for Seney Refuge is their home.

The geese this year, as every year, returned to find the refuge still in winter's grip. Within several weeks, as the snow melts and the pools thaw, about 200 pair of geese will select nesting site on the islands and begin the age-old process of bringing another generation of geese into being.

The March 16 arrival is about average. The earliest arrival on record was March 1. 1961, and the latest, March 27, 1960.


