Rockefeller's **Prospects**

WASHINGTON - From now on Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, because of his divorce and remarriage, will be a controversial figure in American politics at a time when voters seem to prefer placidity to controversy.

Some people, for various reasons of their own, will now turn away from the New York governor, even though they liked him before and thought he would make a good President. This reaction may or may not be strong enough, by the time the Republicans pick

In short, Kennedy's presidency, like Eisenhower's, has been far more placid than pugnacious, which is what voters at this time in American history seem to want, judging from Eisenhower's high

popularity and Kennedy's, too. They haven't shown enthusiasm for embattled figures when it meant choosing one for the White House.

A Knack For Antagonizing People

Despite the tremendous leadership he proided, if President Truman had run against Eisenhower in 1952 he would have had small chance against the war hero who was noted for pouring oil on troubled waters. For by then Truman had been in fierce disputes in many directions, particularly with Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, by the time he ran against Kennedy in 1962, had been a controversial figure for years. He had a knack for antagonizing people with the personal twists he gave his conflicts. Nixon's controversial history was the major factor in his defeat. Kennedy, who barely edged him out, was as mild as Eisenhower
