





It is expected that the testing program will be started here the latter part of this week or the early part of next week, he added.

According to Dr. Cooperstock, he Marquette Health Department and the school systems are cooperating in a program to help determine the number of children in special education classes and training centers whose retardation may have been caused by a disease called phenylketonuria.

The study is sponsored by the Michigan Department of Health with the cooperation of the Department of Public Instruction and he Michigan Association for Rearded Children.

"Phenylketonuria, commonly referred to as PKU," Dr. Cooperstock explained, is an inherited defect in body metabolism which affects he development of the brain. If not found promptly, it will cause permanent mental retardation. However, if the disease is found promptly in infancy, mental re-

Disarmament Fantasy

WASHINGTON - One of the troubles with looking at a clock is that it seems convincing. The hands point to the very latest minute in the history of man.

But even as you look the second-hand is already moving into the next minute. The minutes melt into hours and the hours into days and years. Time begins to look unreal. French Testing Announcement

This has been the history of all the years of talking between the United States and Russia about disarmament and banning nulear tests. There has been an unreality about hem minute by minute from the beginning

Last week the Russians said they were a waste of time and, as if to prove it, the French two days later announced preparations to make the Tahiti Islands in the Pacific a nuclear testing center.

The fact that the United States and Russia since the war have been in a desperate contest to get ahead of each other in arms has been only a minor factor in the failure of their alks. The real one was and is distrust. Couldn't Agree On Inspection

There could be no disarmament that either side would accept without a foolproof inspection system. They couldn't agree on that.

And, even if the negotiators agreed, the U. S. Senate could never approve stripping this country of its arms while another Communist giant, not a party to the treaty, kept

An American-Russian agreement to ban nuclear tests could hardly work, or be approved by either side, if Red China and France were free to build and test their own nuclear weapons, which is what they're aiming at.

But if there was an American-Russian agreement to ban nuclear tests, the two sides would still keep all their nuclear weapons unless there was an agreement to disarm. So far disarmament has been a fantasy.

Appearance Of Willingness Both sides have tried to make some propaganda mileage, for whatever that's worth, by presenting an appearance of willingness to disarm and stop testing.
