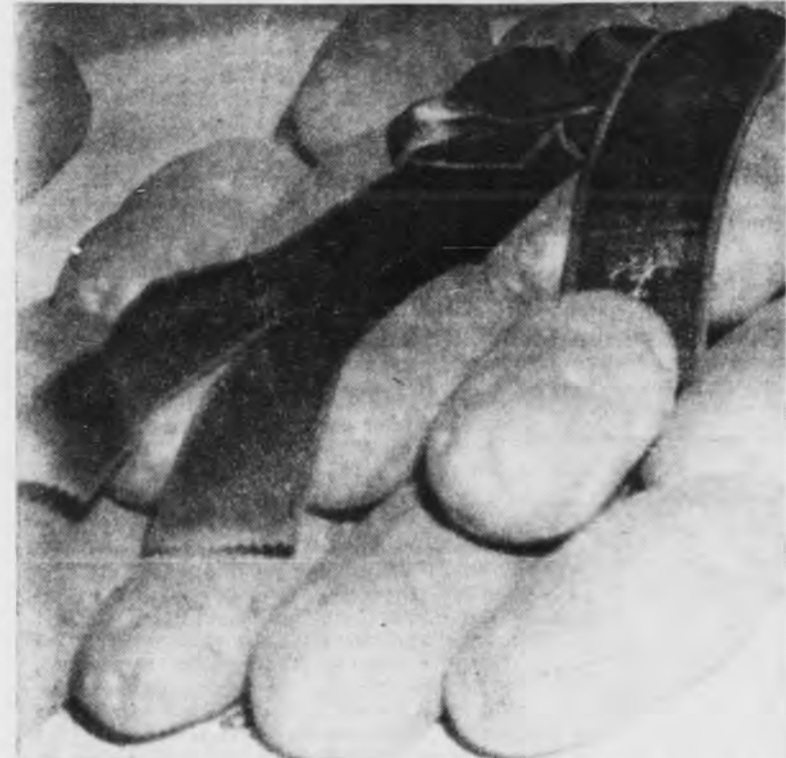

Russet Burbank Potato Holds High Consumers' Preference

(Award story on Page One.) Russet Burbank potatoes, named today as Michigan's agricultural product of the year for Michigan Week, and grown extensively in this area and elsewhere in the Upper Peninsula, have a very high consumer preference rating. Some producers have been growing the potato for several years but the major development has come within the past year. This has included rapid expansion of acreage seeded and production per acre — much new equipment for special handling and storage — marketing programs to reach the housewife that's shopping for a fancy baker. The U. P. potato crop was estimated at around two million bushels last year and already, rural leaders say, the Russet Burbank production represents about one third of the total. Most Russet Burbanks are

currently produced in Marquette, Delta, Dickinson, Alger, Houghton and Iron Counties but rural leaders are expecting production to expand also in other counties. Outside interests have already investigated sites for producing and processing the variety on a large scale in both Dickinson and Delta Counties. To adequately prepare for the future expansion, the Upper Peninsula Committee on Area Problems has asked the U. S. Soil Conservation Service to survey the U. P. and report on available acreage for production. This report shows the total U. P. acreage of potentially available land for Russet Burbanks to be 2,257,900. Of this total 256,900 acres have already been put in cropland, 70,100 acres are in pasture and 1,530,900 are in woodland. The Russet Burbank bak-

ing potato calls for production and handling methods somewhat different from those used for white skin potatoes. Supplementary irrigation is often needed on light soils. Heavy fertilization programs result in yields up to 800 or 900 bushels per acre. This is more than yields obtained in other states producing baking potatoes.

Potato vines are killed two weeks before harvest. This gives the potato skin a chance to "set" and helps to reduce the number of bruised and skinned potatoes. Diggers are operated slowly to assure top quality and special grading equipment has been installed in many of the area's new potato storage houses to assure that a uniform, high-quality product reaches the consumer.

In a help-your-neighbor program to boost this potato variety, Dickinson County growers recently traveled to Houghton County to share their experience in producing and selling these bakers. They compared returns per acre from the Burbanks and some of the tablestock varieties they did produce. Based on current prices and identical yields, they said they were receiving a gross of \$250 more per acre for Russet Burbanks.

City School Census Begins Tomorrow

Superintendent of Schools Henry J. Bothwell announced today that the annual school census will begin tomorrow.

The enumeration is required by law to be taken in each school district during the last 20 days in May. All children from birth to 20 years of age are counted.

Bothwell noted that additional information is required for children for whom special educational provisions should be made. These children would include the crippled, mentally handicapped, and the blind or deaf. Information Confidential This additional information is confidential and is used to project the needs for special facilities, Bothwell said. Census enumerators will carry letters of identification. MARQUETTE CITY COMMISSION PROCEEDINGS

A special meeting of the Marquette City Commission was duly called and held Monday May 6, 1963 at 7:00 o'clock, P. M. Present: Mayor Rydholm, Commissioners Carlson, Fine, Johnson and Smith. Absent: None.

Mayor Rydholm called the meeting to order and stated that the purpose of this meeting was to complete the business before the Commission at this time and to have the reading of the resolutions to be adopted setting forth the amount of all expenditures which will be required in the fiscal budget for 1963-1964.

Mayor Rydholm then directed the Clerk to read the resolution of estimated expenditures as indicated by the Manager's proposed budget.

MOVED BY: Commissioner Carlson. SUPPORTED BY: Commissioner Smith. That the following RESOLUTION be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That this Commission hereby make and adopt the following estimates of all expenditures which will be required to be made from the several funds of the city during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1963, and for the payment of interest and indebtedness to fall due during the year for the following Departments and purposes respectively, viz:

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission has estimated the revenue which will be forthcoming during the current year and has determined the amount necessary to balance the budget to be the sum of Five-hundred-eighty-two thousand, Three-hundred-thirty Dollars, (\$582,330) of which Five-hundred-thirty-five thousand, Nine-hundred-thirty Dollars (\$535,930) is hereby fixed as the amount to be raised for general city tax purposes, and Fifty-six thousand, Four-hundred Dollars (\$56,400) is hereby fixed as the tax to be raised for the Peter White Public Library.

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 20, 1963 at 7:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said estimates and for the passage of the Annual Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish said estimates and notices of said hearings as required by the City Charter.

MOVED BY: Commissioner Smith. SUPPORTED BY: Commissioner Johnson. That the following Resolution be, and the same is hereby unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, That on February 13, 1963, The City Commission received a Resolution adopted by vote of the Board of Education of the City of Marquette requesting a School Tax Levy of Eight-hundred-eighty-one thousand, Six-hundred-ninety-one Dollars and twenty-five cents, (\$881,691.25).

AND RESOLVED, That the Board of Education has estimated all of the revenue which will be forthcoming during their 1963-1964 budget year and has determined this amount necessary to balance the school budget of Six-hundred-fifty-five thousand Dollars (\$655,000) was determined for current operation expenses and Two-hundred-thirty-six thousand, Six-hundred-ninety-one Dollars, and twenty-five cents, (\$226,691.25) was determined for payment of bonded indebtedness of school construction.

AND RESOLVED, That this Commission do meet on Monday, May 20, 1963, at 7:00 P. M. o'clock Eastern Standard Time for a public hearing upon said School Tax Levy and for the passage of the Annual School Tax Appropriation Bill; and that the City Clerk publish same estimates and notices of said hearing as required by City Charter. A communication from Rev. Glen G. Weber, Chairman, Marquette County USO Formal Opening Committee was read wherein he requests permission to hold a parade in the City of Marquette on Saturday May 25, 1963, between the hours of 1:00 and 1:30 p.m. On motion of Commissioner Smith, supported by Commissioner Carlson and unanimously adopted this matter was referred to the City Manager with power to act. 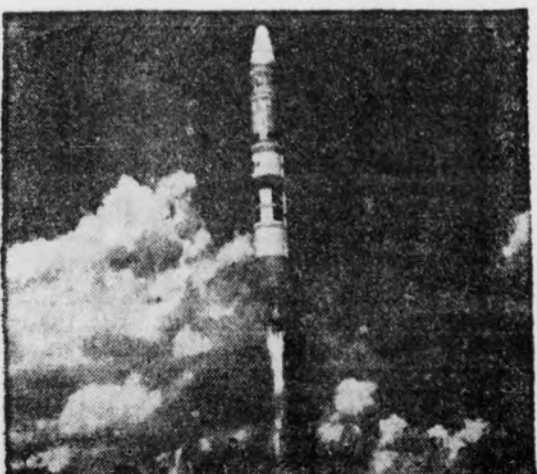

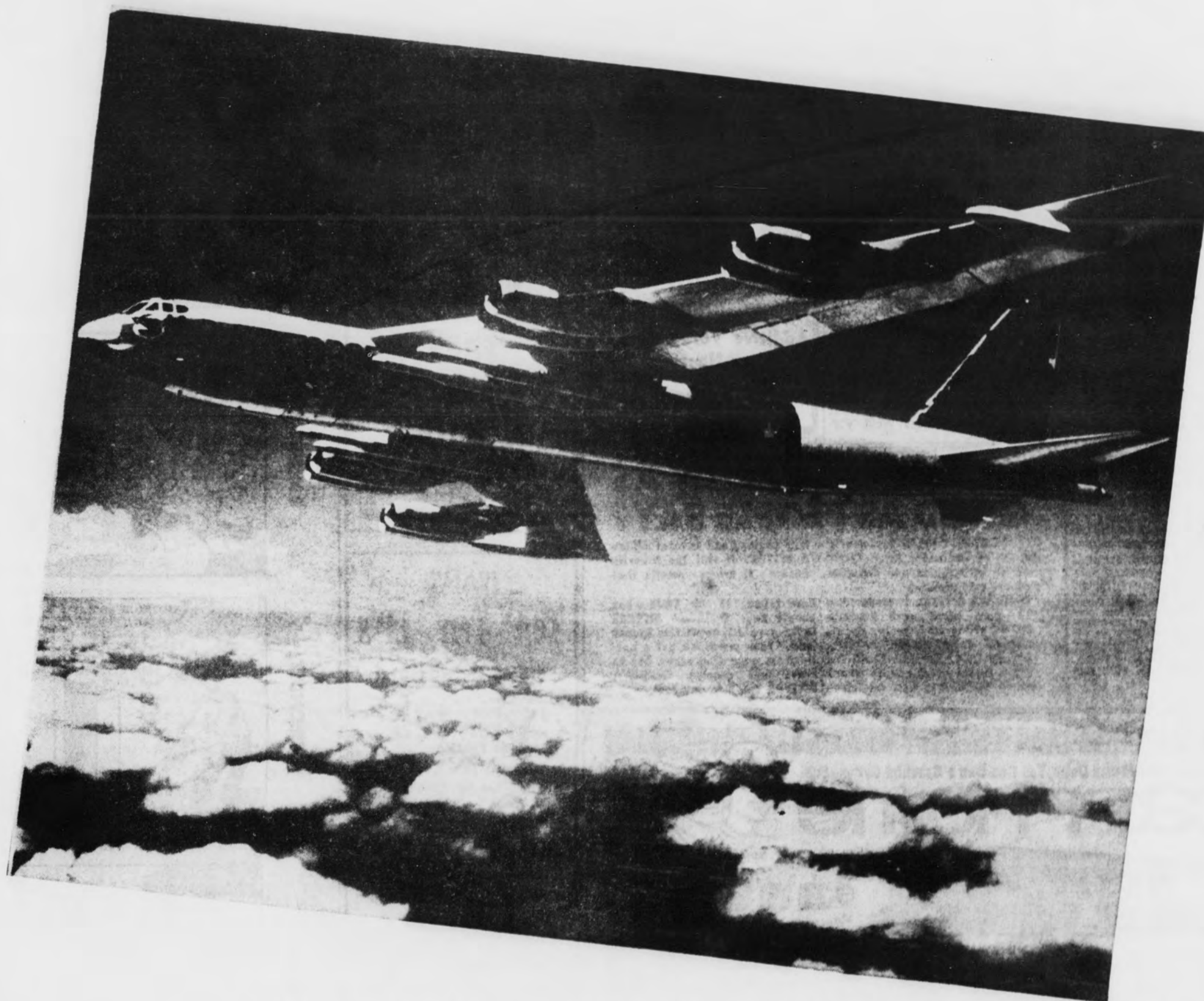
