







### Surveys Of Possible Steam Plant Site Made During Week

Additional topographic surveys and maps of the steam plant site at the east end of Hampton St. were made last week by the city engineer.

This and other information on the activities of municipal departments is contained in the weekly report of City Manager Thomas Moore.

Last week the engineering department also ran a survey on Fair Ave. from Lincoln to Garfield Ave., and another on Lynn and Birch Sts. from Waldo St. to establish street and curb grades.

The engineering department ran cross sections on Neidhart Ave. from Clark St. to Union St. to determine the quantity of fill required to bring the street to the final grade.

Excerpts from the reports of other municipal department activities last week follow:

**Water and sewage** — Changed defective meters and read commercial meters. Repaired a three-quarter inch service line on E Arch St. and also at the corner of Pine and Michigan Sts. The 10 inch main at the corner of Eighth and Center Sts. which had been lowered to accommodate the new grade from Northern Michigan University grounds to the area west of Eighth St. was replaced. During the week, 15,463,000 gallons of water were pumped. Installation of a six-inch back-flushing line was begun at the sewage disposal plant.

**Fire** — One chimney, one roof, one heating apparatus, one grass, three car and one city dump fire. Fifteen city buildings were inspected. Ladders are being painted and varnished.

### Frost Tonight, But Better Weather Due

Nice weather for ducks yesterday, but forecast for the next few days is nice weather for everybody.

A high pressure area is moving this way from the western Dakotas and clouds were expected to start breaking up late today. Meteorologist Emil Ellingson reports.

Hail yesterday totaled 20 of an inch, including 17 of an inch early yesterday. It was caused by a low pressure system which passed through the area yesterday. Along with last night's rain, patches of fog reduced visibility to one mile.

**Precipitation Below Normal**

Precipitation here this month is less than half the normal amount. Through today, precipitation has totaled .60 and normal is 1.31 inches. For the year, precipitation totals 6.62 inches and normal through today is 9.44.

Yesterday's average temperature was four degrees above normal, with extremes of 62 and 43. For the month, the average is 53 degrees above normal.

The minimum temperature in Marquette overnight was 43, the same as at the Marquette County Airport.

**Frost Tonight**

Cool temperatures are expected tonight, with lows in the mid and upper 30s, and scattered frost is predicted.

**Frost has been prevalent** both Saturday and Sunday mornings. Ellingson noted that frost isn't unusual this time of year and pointed out that the Marquette area occasionally has frost in the early part of June.

Following clearing skies tonight, tomorrow is expected to be fair and mild. Cloudiness is expected to increase Thursday, but mild temperatures are predicted.

### Porkies Park Road Project Strikes Delay

Creation of an important new segment of the scenic highway on the south shore of Lake Superior has been delayed briefly by the State Highway Department.

The department received bids at Lansing on a project to construct seven miles of county secondary road on the new site of the Porcupine Mountains State Park south boundary road. It announced that the lowest bid was that of G. H. Hocking of South Range at \$439,257, but said that all bids had been rejected and that the project would be re-advertised for June 12 bids.

The project calls for 21 feet of aggregate surface on the seven-mile stretch starting 13 miles west and three miles south of White Pine and running westerly in Ontonagon and Gogebic Counties.

Glenn C. Gregg of Marquette, U. P. regional supervisor of parks for the Michigan Conservation Department, said of the new park south boundary road that planners had conceded a little to demands for a scenic highway through virgin timber.

Original planning had called for the south park boundary road to run only one mile in 22 through virgin timber, but the new road will run through seven miles of it. The travelers will see areas of wilderness, blow-down timber and logged-off areas in an interpretive presentation that will show varying phases of forest management, Gregg said that the treatment planned would show travelers more than a road on the south shore of Lake Superior. There will be views of Lake Superior from high points on the new south boundary road. "In Canada," said Gregg, "travelers on the Lake Superior north shore highway see the lake less than one fifth of the time. The beauty of the lake is in getting views of it, not a straight diet of it."

### Chicago Firm Bid On Water Pipe Accepted

Following the recommendation of City Manager Thomas Moore, the Marquette City Commission, at its regular meeting last night, accepted the low bid of a Chicago firm on a quantity of cast iron pipe.

Proposals had been sought on 3,000 lineal feet of six-inch pipe and 200 lineal feet of four-inch pipe, for use by the water and sewage department during the current construction season.

Accepted was the bid, meeting all specifications, of James B. Clow & Sons, Inc., Chicago, in the amount of \$4,785 for the six-inch pipe and \$217 for the four-inch pipe.

Delivery will be made within two weeks and terms are payment within 30 days, with freight being allowed.

Other bids were:

- Alabama Pipe Co., Chicago, \$5,610 on six-inch pipe and \$268 on four-inch; American Cast Iron Pipe Co., Savage, Minn., \$5,250 and \$252, respectively; United States Pipe & Foundry Co., Chicago, \$4,800 and \$230, respectively; McWane Cast Iron Pipe Co., Chicago, \$5,535 and \$262, respectively; Glamorgan Pipe & Foundry Co., Chicago, \$5,880 and \$238, respectively; and Lynchburg Foundry Co., Forest Park, Ill., \$5,250 and \$250, respectively.

Preliminary Red Skirmish Won By Nikita

TOKYO (AP)—Premier Khrushchev has won a preliminary tactical skirmish in his ideological war with Communist China. The first peace talks will be held in Moscow, not in Peking as Communist chief Mao Tse-tung had hoped.

Chinese Premier Chou En-lai informed Soviet Ambassador S. V. Chervonkov Thursday that his government accepted Khrushchev's invitation to send a delegation to Moscow to discuss ideological differences splitting the Communist world.

Khrushchev had proposed that Mao head the Chinese delegation, but nobody expected the Chinese boss to agree to that. Chou said the delegation will be headed by Teng Hsiao-ping, top theoretician of the Chinese party, and Peng Chen, minister of foreign affairs.

Today, as if to dispel any illusion that Peking's "hard line" is weakening, the official Peking People's Daily published a long denunciation of Yugoslavia's new constitution.

Taking a scarcely-concealed slap at Khrushchev, who has accepted the Yugoslav Communists back in the fold as reformed sinners, Peking's mouthpiece said the constitution proves "that they were talking sheer nonsense who consider that the Tito group have shown some repentance and changed their wrong policy."

The Chinese appear trying to win as much support as possible from other Communist parties before the Moscow meeting. President Liu Shao-chi arrived in Hanoi today for his first visit to North Viet Nam, which only recently showed strong signs of siding with Peking.

Last month Liu visited Indonesia, and the big Communist party there seems to be orienting itself toward the Chinese position after initial wavering.

Peking holds that Khrushchev's policy of peaceful coexistence is an unacceptable revision of Marxism-Leninism, that war with the West still is inevitable and that even a nuclear war would be worthwhile because the Communists would be hurt less than the

A total of 30,300 trees have now been planted in the forest since 1959, with a ratio of 50-50 spruce and red pine. The rate of survival has been about 75 per cent.

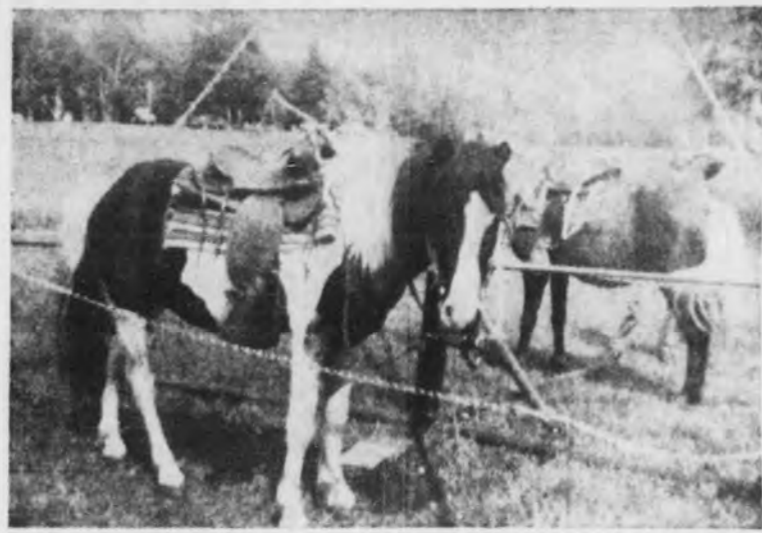
The first plantings will be harvested when they reach maturity in 1975. Thereafter, trees will be harvested yearly and the money obtained will go to the school district.
